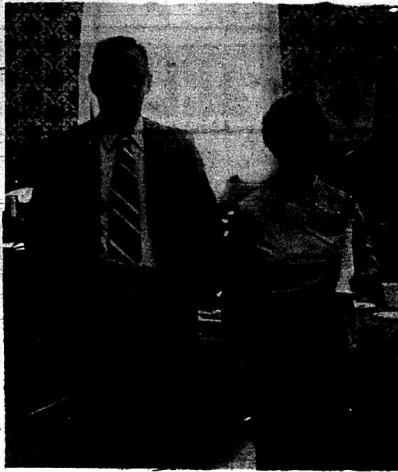

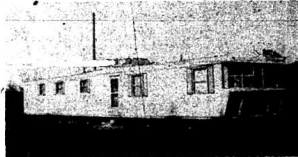

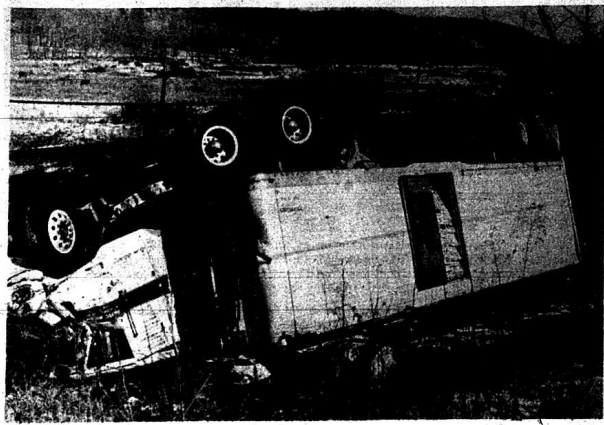

mishap. Mr. McCauley also said that Shelton had driven over 300,000 miles for him with an accident prior to this.

Shell Station Robbed

Earl M. Crowe, 28, of Lexington has been charged with armed robbery and is lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail following an incident Saturday night, February 9th at the Burr Shell Station.

According to Danny Smith, owner and operator of the station, two men pulled into the station, which is located south of Mt. Vernon near the Burr interchange, and bought a dollar's worth of gas. One of the men left the car and went to the restroom while the gas was being put in the car. The attend-

ant was paid for the gas and returned to the station and the man who had left the car came into the station, drew a gun and told the attendant to give him his money. The attendant, who was armed, drew his gun and took the man into custody while the man who had stayed in the car, obviously seeing that something was wrong, left the station and drove away by way of the interstate, Mr. Smith said.

A passing motorist notified state police and city police and Crowe was taken into custody. His bond has been set at \$25,000 and preliminary hearing has been set for February 27th. The other man involved is still free.

Barnes Case Ruled

Justifiable Homicide

Justifiable homicide was the ruling following a preliminary hearing last week for Richard Eugene Barnes, charged with the January 11th slaying of Roy Lee Goforth, 41.

Charges against Barnes were dismissed by District Court Judge Daniel Venters. In order for the case to come to trial now, an indictment will have to be handed down by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

Lester Frank Griffin was freed last Saturday after posting \$100,000 property bond. Griffin is charged in the January 12th slaying of James L. Browning of Mt. Vernon and has been bound over to the Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

Tuition Increase at State Universities

There will have to be a tuition increase at Kentucky universities next fall, executive director of the Council on Higher Education Harry Snyder said at a legislative hearing today.

After the meeting Snyder said he would ask the council to increase tuition at all state institutions except community colleges. He said he didn't know the exact amount of the increases to be requested, but he would ask that state tuition be brought up to levels of benchmark or comparable institutions.

Speaking at a joint Appropriations and Revenue Committee today, Snyder said most of the increase would come at the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville. He said the proposed increase could be considered as early as the February meeting of the council and "not later than April."

He said the state institutions are in "fairly good shape" on out-of-state tuitions, but that in-state university tuitions were lower than benchmark institutions. However, he said, tuition at community colleges are above benchmark levels. Up this point, he said, the council has "deliberately tried to keep tuition low" recognizing that the best form of student aid was lower tuition.

While he said it was diffi-

cult to predict the effect of an increase on revenues, since student aid and enrollments could be affected by an increase, he expected higher tuitions to result in about \$10 million in additional money over the biennium. This increased revenue was not reflected in the budget proposal submitted by the council, he said.

The Council on Higher Education budget requested about \$174 million in additional general fund money over the biennium. The proposal included \$376.7 million for fiscal 1980-81 and \$428.8 million for 1981-2. Of these totals the Council itself would receive \$9.2 million for 1980-81 and \$10.2 million for the following year, an increase from \$5.7 million budgeted for this year.

The Higher Education Assistance Authority budget for 1979-80 is \$7.3 million, and the request for the year beginning July 1 is \$17.8 million with \$19.4 million requested for the next year.

The majority of the total, about \$757 over the biennium, is requested for state colleges and universities. This is about a \$145 million increase for the two year period.

Snyder called the request a "people-oriented budget" with the emphasis on salary up-

Increased Food Stamps For Some Households

Some food stamp households are receiving increased benefits due to changes in a state-initiated utility allowance program.

Households presently receiving food stamp coupons may qualify for more coupons by using the standard utility

allowance rather than actual expenses in computing their income. Recipients are required to pay their utility bills separately from their rent and mortgage payments.

Rachel Childress, food stamp outreach coordinator for the state Department for Human Resources, said the standard utility allowance deduction was increased as of December 1.

The program began last March and reflects seasonal changes in the cost of heating services, she said.

April 1st Designated "Census Day"

April 1st has been designated "Census Day", according to Gray Nelson, Manager of the District Census Office in Richmond. Mr. Nelson said that all households are requested to return the questionnaires on this day which will be mailed from

local post offices on March 28th. If the questionnaires are not returned, Mr. Nelson said

that an enumerator will visit those households to find out the reason and to explain the importance of the information

in making an application for one of these positions, or for a job in the census office at Richmond, you should contact the District Census Office at 305 Gerl Lane in Richmond, Ky. 40475 or call 606-824-0600.

There will be approximately 20 enumerators hired from Rockcastle County and these jobs will last approximately 3 to 6 weeks. They are considered full-time jobs in that it will take approximately 8 hours a day, five days a week and some time in the evenings and on Saturdays to take care of the workload which will be assigned each enumerator. The evenings and Saturday hours come in because it is virtually impossible to contact people who work during regular daytime hours. This job pays on the piece rate and averages out to about \$4 an hour plus mileage.

Jobs in the Richmond census office are also available to Rockcastle Countians and these jobs are also full-time, paying \$3.55 per hour for 40 hours a week. These positions will last until approximately the end of August. Persons hired will train in all phases of the operation and will be transferred to different positions about every 2-4 weeks. There are presently 15 persons employed in Richmond and this will reach a peak in April of about 100.

If you live in Lincoln County, your district office is in Rowling Green. The same information printed above applies but you should contact the District Census Office at 911 College Street, First Floor, Bowling Green, Ky. 42101 to apply for a position.

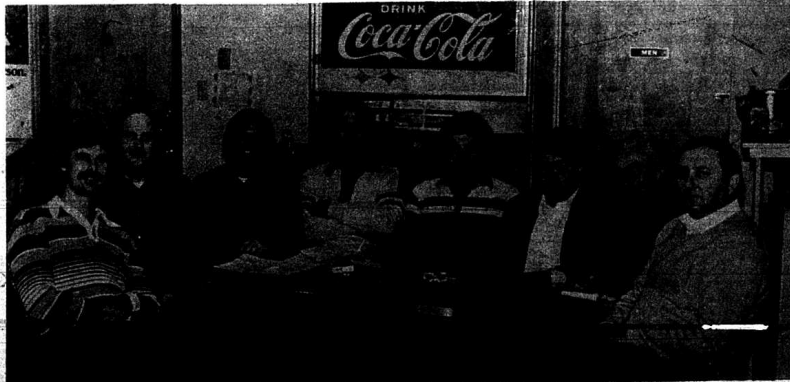
R.C.I.C. Meeting Monday Night Includes 25th Anniversary Celebration



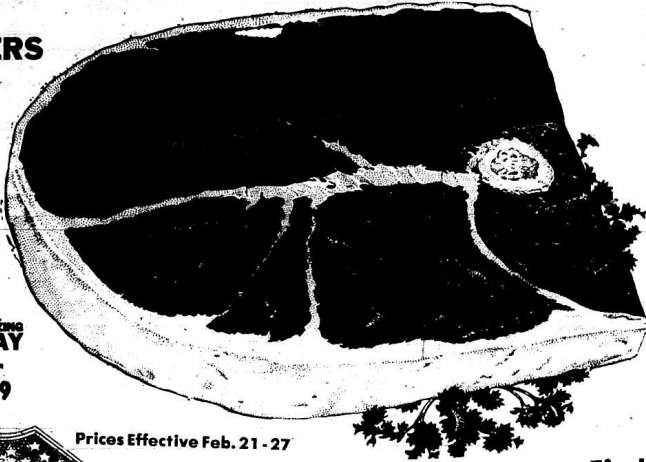

County Agent's Notes

Farm Forest Management
Winter months provide ap-

propriate time to develop management programs for the farm which will improve productivity. Many of these improvements deal with the selection of row crops which produce a valuable cash crop at harvest.

One cash crop that has lost needed attention is the products provided by Kentucky farm forests. Kentucky is 47% covered with commercial forests capable of providing much needed timber.

The average land holding in the Commonwealth is slightly over 50 acres. Currently, only a very small percentage of the wooded acreage is being managed properly to provide the present and future needs. Various programs can be initiated for proper forest management.

Each program deals with different trees ages during the rotation period of growth. The most important management program during the late winter or early spring would be the planting of commercially important trees. Presently, close to 2 million acres in Kentucky are unsuitable for cropland and could

be planted into forest stands. Annually, this acreage grows due to the depletion of soils and discontinuation of farming practices on abandoned pastures and worn-out cropland. When such conditions exist, it is strongly recommended to plant trees.

Planting trees now under a proposed management plan results in a more productive forest, which in turn means more lumber and other forest products and profits. With proper management in the forest, as with general farming practices, products develop continuous, even supply, which will help maintain a moderate price.

For further information regarding the assistance in developing and managing a forest crop, contact the Kentucky Division of Forestry, ASCS office and your local County Extension Office.

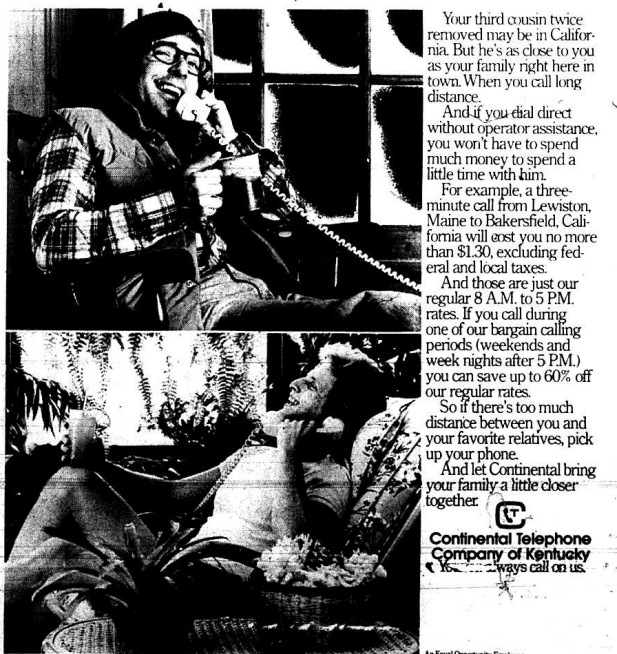

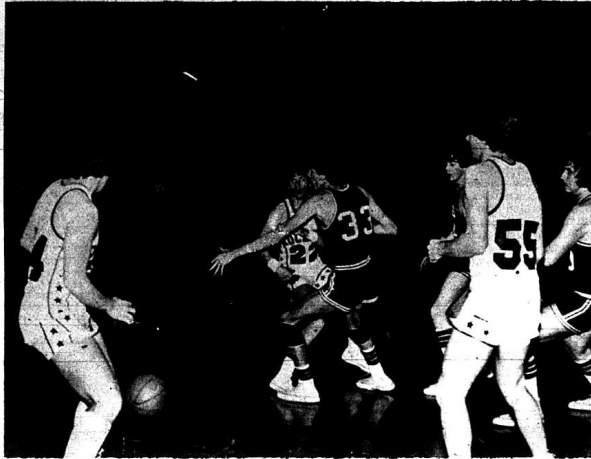

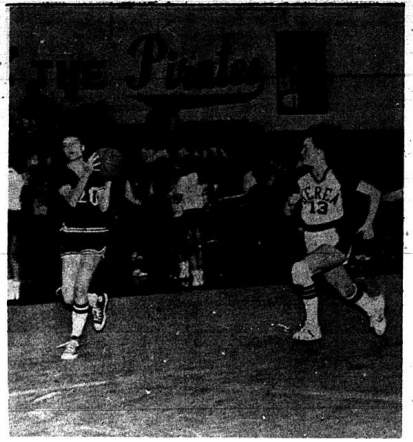
