

The evenings and Saturday hours come in because it is virtually impossible to contact people who work during regular daytime hours. This job pays on the piece rate and averages out to about 34 an hour plus mileage.

Jobs in the Richmond census office are also available to Rockeastle Countinas and these jobs are also full-time, paying \$3.55 per hour for 40 hours a week. These positions will last until approximately the end of August. Persons hired will train in all phases of the operation and will be transferred to different positions about every 24 weeks There are presently 15 persons employed in Richmond and this will reach a peak in April of about 100.


