**"ASSERTIVENESS OR AGGRESSIVENESS IN YOUR MARRIAGE"**  
-PART II-

As I mentioned last week in part one, the burden of responsibility for introducing a cooperative relationship within a marriage, if it does not already exist, rests upon the husband. If the husband and wife do not have this cooperative relationship of equal chances as he relates to her as an authoritarian figure. He acts as though he were in charge and his wife subservient to his control. This is not a good relationship such as this leaves no room for cooperation or intimacy and both husband and wife lose out.

If the husband will not make the decision to relate to his wife as an equal and change his behavior from aggressiveness to assertiveness, the wife may make some changes herself. She may come to realize, over a period of time, that her opinions count in life, that she is a person of importance, and that she is being taken for granted by her husband. Many such women who come to this realization, begin to grow in confidence as they express their talents and gifts. Some even take courses in assertiveness training to better prepare themselves in their self-expression.

According to Davis Mace (quoted in last week's column from The Christian Home magazine, March, 1980), the wife may do one of two things. She may quietly yet firmly change her behavior toward her husband while at the same time sharing what changes occur. At the same time, she begins to realize that it takes time to convince him and that she must demonstrate all along the way that her new status will bring about an improvement in the relationship and not a deterioration. She is essentially expressing her convictions with courage; standing up and being counted. In short, she is being assertive. The husband should be convinced after a time that he himself is not being threatened and that the necessary changes on his part can be made without loss of respect.

On the other hand, the wife may be stirred into a fighting mood by her new sense of freedom, insisting on immediate changes, while making no effort to be patient or to understand her husband's feelings. She has retaliated, become aggressive and is on the attack. Her whole purpose is defeated because if then puts her husband on the defensive as he sees his wife for the first time as the enemy. He will react with indignation and with aggressive behavior of his own and both husband and wife will be locked into an adversary position. The only alternatives will then be for the wife to back down completely from her position and, never found freedom, or for the marriage to continue on its downward spiral. In summary, for a marriage to flourish and not just exist: "assertiveness, yes. Aggressiveness, no."

The Brodhead Town Board voted at their March meeting to increase water rates to customers both inside and outside the city limits effective with the April billing.

## Copper Creek Residents Meet To Discuss Addington Oil Co. Leases

Twenty people met on Copper Creek last Friday night to gather information and support from each other concerning the leases each had signed with Addington Oil Co.

Jan Sutherland and Jerry Harst, representing the Appalachian Coalition's concern for the future of our land and family farms, met with the group at 7:30 to provide information on the widespread leasing by this oil company which has resulted in rights to 17,000 acres of Rockcastle County. Seventy people in this county have signed leases and twenty of them met on Copper Creek, some of the best farmland in the county. To have this land and the sustenance gained from it threatened, is a nightmare to many people.

These leases, which folks from Copper Creek were told were "just oil and gas leases, like you've signed before" or "a tax shelter for the company, nothing will ever come of it, give broad mining rights to the oil company without any provisions for protection or reclamation of the land or damage to buildings, timber, water sources, roads or damage to top soil.

In signing these leases, landowners gave the company permission to comply with all laws (of which there are none presently), but nowhere in the lease does it say the company must comply with the laws. Similarly, there is a clause in the lease which gives the company the right to remove their equipment within 6 months, but does not say that they must remove their equipment from landowners property.

These leases last forever, or until all minerals, oil shale, "subject matter" which includes top soil, are taken out. The company has made grandiose promises of royalties, making people aware of the possibility of this in front of folks for a rental fee of one dollar an acre. For this fee, the oil company can "explore" on your land. If it finds that it is not economically feasible or profit-

able enough, to market the shale or other minerals, you would receive no royalties. Even when the product is taken to market, the way the oil company controls the mining, transportation and processing of the product, the 5% of "new revenue" provided for in the lease, could dwindle to nothing after transportation costs are subtracted. The company has been quoted as saying that if the processing plant were over 2 miles away, transportation costs would make mining and marketing too costly to do.

Addington Oil Company's lawyer, Robert Johnson, has cried "energy crisis" and called upon our patriotic duty to get this oil shale developed. In the midst of all kinds of evidence that says we can conserve energy less expensively than we can mine for it, this company's position is clear-exploitation of people and our land for private gain.

That these leases have been misrepresented to people is be-

## Governor Proposes New Method of Allocating Severance Tax Revenue

A proposed new method for returning a portion of the coal severance tax revenue to coal-producing counties is estimated to net the 50 counties approximately \$22.3 million over the next two years, according to Gov. John Y. Brown.

The new method for returning coal severance tax revenues was contained in the governor's proposed 1980-82 Kentucky executive budget, unveiled last week before the state's lawmakers.

To help give additional revenues to the financially depleted state treasury and to help return more money to the coal-producing counties, Gov. Brown proposed a revenue sharing agreement that met with the approval of coal-county legislators.

Basically, the revenue sharing agreement asks the coal-

ing verified in county after county. In addition to the misrepresentations, some people say that the leases that are recorded in the courthouse are not the ones they signed, and some people were only given the last page of the lease to sign, never being offered the full lease to read.

Contacted in Frankfort, Rep. Harold Demarcus says he is behind the people of Copper Creek and all other concerned citizens "100%". "A dollar an acre? That's pitiful. Anyone who feels that they have been defrauded or that the lease was misrepresented to them should make their statement in writing and have it sworn to. If we can get enough people in all these counties, maybe we can default all these leases-no promises made, but we can sure try."

In return, 50 percent of all coal severance taxes in excess of \$177 million would be returned to the coal-producing and coal impact counties starting in fiscal year 1981-82. The \$177 million figure is the estimate of coal severance tax revenues the state expects to collect this year.

The method of allocation would require two-thirds of the money which is to be returned to go directly to the county of production. ## Kentucky Afield

By John Wilson

Each year, the National Wildlife Federation sponsors and promotes National Wildlife Week to call attention to the needs of, and problems confronting, wildlife.

National Wildlife Week is March 16-27 this year. It's theme, "Save A Place for Wildlife," points out one of the most crucial problems facing virtually all wildlife species—the destruction of habitat.

"Habitat" is the biologist's word for a complex interrelation of environmental factors, including the year-round availability of food, water and shelter. Proper habitat varies from species to species—deer, for example, thrive in areas of second-growth forests with low brush for winter browse, while squir-

rels prefer mature hardwood forests with abundant supplies of acorns and other nuts.

In pioneer times, when Kentucky was almost completely forested, squirrels were incredibly numerous—but there are fewer deer than there are today. In the intervening 200 years, the situation has been largely reversed—we have more deer habitat (and thus more deer) than in Daniel Boone's day, but our statewide squirrel population now is only a hint of what it was in 1800.

So a "place for wildlife" is more than space. A large pine plantation, a 2,000-acre field planted in a single crop or a closely grazed and groomed Bluegrass horse farm contain about as much suitable habitat as a paved parking lot. A place for wildlife is not, in other words, just land; it's how that land is used.

## Fishing Report

Water temperatures continue to rise slowly but fishing continues only fair on most of Kentucky's major lakes. The lake by lake rundown, as reported by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

**Cumberland:** Crappie fair by drifting over submerged cover, 8 to 12 feet deep in upper part of lake and black bass slow by casting spinners in heads of the tributaries; a few walleye taken by casting large minnows in the mouth of Laurel and in the head of South Fork; in lower part of lake, black bass slow on large spinner baits in inlets and bays and crappie fair still fishing minnows around fallen treposts and over submerged cover, 8-10 feet deep, trout slow in tailwaters on corn and cheese; clear to murky to muddy, rising at 10 feet below the timberline and 43 degrees.

**Green River:** Black bass fair by jigging dollies; crappie fair on minnows around stick-ups; clear, rising at 3 feet above winter pool and 42 degrees.

**Herrington, Bluegill** fair in heads of creeks on nightcrawlers and red worms; crappie fair on minnows over submerged cover; clear to murky, stable, 10 feet above winter pool and 43 degrees.

**Nolin:** black bass fair in mouths of creeks on grubs; crappie fair on minnows; bluegill good on worms; clear to murky, rising slowly at 1/2 foot above winter pool, 50 degrees.

**Barren:** black bass fair jigging do jids with pork rind trailers in lower end; crappie good on jigs and minnows in creeks in upper end; clear to murky, rising at 1 foot above winter pool and 50 degrees.

**R. Oh River:** Black bass on crank baits in South Fork and crappie slow on minnows and jigs in both forks and tailwaters; murky to muddy, rising slowly at winter pool and 42 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** white bass fair in large tributaries on spinners and jigs; clear to murky, stable at 2 feet below normal pool and 46 degrees.

**Kentucky:** crappie slow on minnows, 7-12 feet deep, around submerged cover; activity in tailwaters; murky, stable at 1 foot above winter pool and 43 degrees.

**Barkley:** Crappie fair over dropoffs and submerged cover; 12-14 feet deep, on minnows, tailwaters, catfish slow on cut-bait; white bass and crappie slow on do jigs, murky, rising slowly at 1 foot above winter pool and 45 degrees.

**Cave Run:** black bass slow along banks and over stickups on plastic worms and medium deep runners; crappie slow on minnows over stick-ups; clear to murky, falling at 4 feet above winter pool and 46 degrees.

**Laurel:** trout fair trolling crank baits and still fishing corn and cheese; clear, stable at 1 1/2 feet below winter pool and 44 degrees.

**Grayson:** crappie slow on minnows over submerged cover; clear to murky to muddy, stable at winter pool and 37 degrees.

**Fishtrap:** Crappie slow on minnows, murky to muddy, stable at winter pool and 44 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** Little activity; muddy, stable at winter pool and 48 degrees.

**Davey:** No activity, murky to muddy, stable at winter pool and 46 degrees.

**LEXINGTON**—"The sweet sixteen" "The greatest show in basketball." The Kentucky High School state tournament has been described by those and other flowery terms through the years. When it's played at Louisville's Freedom Hall next week for the sixty-third time, we may be seeing the last of the tournaments as we have come to know and love them. Dayton High School has brought suit against the Kentucky High School Athletic Association in an effort to get the state's high schools classified by size. The subject has even been brought up in the state legislature.

Football has played in the different classifications for several years in Kentucky. The largest schools are in Class AAAA, and on down through four classifications with the smallest schools designated Class A.

It has become increasingly difficult for the small schools to win the state basketball championships. Gone are the days when names like Brewers and Cuba were the top teams. It still happens often enough to keep the dreams alive. Edmondson County was the last small school to capture the title. That happened in 1976. Some of the small schools feel their chances are too slim under the present system and would like to change it.

Billy Wise, the Assistant Commissioner of the K.H.S.A.A. says the majority of schools in Kentucky would like to keep the tournament as it is. "Our last two surveys, taken over the past three years, have both been for keeping the present 'Sweet sixteen,'" says Wise. He points out another reason the small schools aren't winning as often as they once did is that there are fewer small schools. "Fifteen years ago we had around 620 high schools playing basketball in Kentucky," says Wise, "now we only have 315."

I can certainly understand the frustration of the smaller schools which try in vain year after year to win the state championship. Going to different classifications would be too drastic. May the "sweet sixteen" go on forever.
