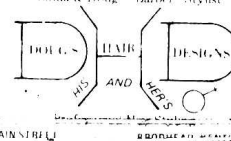

School Board Votes Not To Renew Coaching Contracts for Riddle and Norris

On the recommendation of Superintendent Charles B. Parsons, the Rockcastle County Board of Education voted Tuesday night to re-hire Bill Riddle and Charles Norris as teachers at RCHS but not to renew their coaching contracts for 1960-61.

Mr. Parsons said he believed this recommendation, which was written as part of the agenda, was in the best interests of the school. It also said that he (Mr. Parsons), had been approached by numerous people from all parts of the county asking him to do something about the basketball program at the high school.

The recommendation went on to say, "We are not winning, people have lost interest, the crowds have dropped off and the revenue taken in at the games is not sufficient to meet the cost of operating the program. Administrative personnel at the high school have told me that a change must be made if we are to continue to operate without a deficit."

"When Mr. Riddle met with the board two years ago, he told us then that if he were permitted to stay for two more years until his son graduated, that he would give up the coaching position. Our plans and commitments over the past two years have been based on him honoring his word."

The board's action followed an appearance before them by both Mr. Riddle and Mr. Norris with Mr. Riddle talking to the board at length.

Mr. Riddle said that up until last Christmas, he had fully intended to retire at the end of this season but then a "group of people started talking and I saw no way I could retire with any dignity or respect."

Mr. Riddle went on to say that in all the talk he had heard concerning the need for a new coach, he had never heard Mr. Norris' name mentioned as his replacement. Calling Mr. Norris, "a very qualified person", Mr. Riddle said he felt the head coaching job should be something that was passed down the line.

The basketball system on the grade school level is the cause of a great many of the problems of the high school program, according to Mr. Riddle, who said that the fact that coaches in the grades didn't have adequate time for practice and that the lack of a transportation system for children who lived out in the county was another drawback. Saying that if there was any blame to be laid for the Rockets' poor showing this season it would have to be laid to him as head coach. Mr. Riddle said he felt that he and Mr. Norris had done as well as they could with what they had.

Because of a poor grade school system, Riddle said ball players in the 9th grade here were probably two years behind schools on their schedule. "You can't start in the 9th grade and make a basketball team," Riddle said.

One of Riddle's suggestions to improve the grade school system was to have only one boys' and one girls' team from each school (7th and 8th grades) with the 5th and 6th graders playing intramural only.

Mr. Riddle emphasized that whatever the board's decision was that he would give all his support to the basketball program and to whomever the board might select as coach.

Mr. Norris told the board that they needed to "make some other changes besides the coaches," and that he would not take the job under conditions existing now.

Dr. Rudolph Jurdette, board chairman, told the two men that he had never heard anyone say anything about either man as an individual and that he personally had never seen a Rockcastle team take the floor that he was ashamed of. Mr. Parsons echoed this statement saying that he had never heard anyone speak ill of their character just comments concerning their method of coaching.

Mr. Riddle said that they (he and Mr. Norris) had always tried to help their boys become good individuals rather than just stressing winning.

Following the discussion, the vote was taken and then a motion was made to authorize Mr. Parsons to authorize a committee of seven to help select new basketball coaches for the boys teams.

The names of those appointed will be made public at a later date, Mr. Parsons said.

School Board Opens Bids

Preston Collins of Mt. Vernon was the low bidder for field dirt for the new baseball field at the high school. Bids were opened at Tuesday night's meeting of the board of education.

Mr. Collins submitted the low bid of \$11,897. Five other bids were received ranging up to \$29,500.

For brick repair work to the administration building and the old school bus garage, Donald E. Collins submitted the low bid of \$4,289.50 and it was accepted.

For fire and boiler insurance, Norton Insurance was the low bidder at \$15,367.00 and this bid was accepted.

Bolton Building Supply in Somerset submitted the low bid for 8 fire doors to be installed in the schools at \$476.28 but the bid for materials for the fire alarm system was not awarded because of the board's uncertainty as to whether or not the companies accurately bid the specifications.

In other action, the board re-employed all certified personnel for 1960-61. Two teachers, Jack Laswell and Rena Jordan, have announced their intention to retire already and Mr. Parsons said he was not sure if there would be others retiring or not.

The use of school buses to the Shrine Center in Lexington on April 12th was approved by the board with the Shriners to pay all expenses plus insurance.

Continuing contracts for Terry Parkey, Janet L. Hunt, Charles M. Carter and Roger Vanzant were also approved and a revised school calendar for 1979-80 was approved with school scheduled to dismiss on

May 22. Walter Baldwin was employed as part-time custodian at Brodhead Elementary and a contract with Lee Leathers to transport a student to special education classes in Berea was approved.

The board also approved a G. E. D. Certificate for Terry L. Hale, approved the advertising for custodial supplies, accepted a contract, through the State Department of Education with Food Distribution System, Inc. of Louisville to deliver all state commodity foods direct from a

Large Crowd Attends Local Meeting To Discuss Action on Addington Leases

There were over 100 persons present for Monday night's meeting in the county courtroom of the courthouse to discuss problems which might arise from their lease with Addington Oil Company.

The group was mainly concerned with the effect to their land by the mining of shale rock for the extraction of oil and by the fact that, at present, Kentucky has no regulations governing the mining of shale oil.

A guest speaker at the meeting, Jay Nuckols, a farmer from Casey County who has a masters degree in engineering and who is a member of the Shale Belt Alliance, told the crowd that the shale oil issue was not just a local or even state-wide issue but a national issue. He said that lobbying in the U. S. Congress was very intense, particularly by the construction industry because of a cut-back in the number of oil refineries and nuclear power plants being built.

The oil industry, Mr. Nuckols said, is now a multi-national industry and their main concern is, of course, developing oil and reaping the profits. Nuckols said that the construction and oil industries were both trying to persuade Congress to proceed with two plans - the synthetic fuel corporation (government owned and operated) and headed up by members of the oil consortium) and the Energy Mobilization Board.

Nuckols said that it was projected that over the next four years, over \$20 billion dollars would be invested, of our tax dollars, in the development of synthetic fuel will, according to Mr. Nuckols, the total recovery from the development of shale oil fields in the state will produce, at the most, 2,000,000 barrels of oil a day or only about 10% of the total consumption of this country which is 19,000,000 barrels a day. Nuckols said that 40% of the fuel now consumed could be saved by improving home, more insulation in homes and the upgrading of automobiles. This could be accomplished, Mr. Nuckols said, with an outlay of 1/10th of the \$20 billion dollars which is projected to be the initial amount spend for development of synthetic fuels.

Tim Murphy, a lobbyist to the state legislature for the Kentucky Rivers Coalition, told the crowd of the status of SB257 which was originally drawn up to provide for a two-year moratorium on the mining of shale oil while the Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection (DNREP) studied pilot projects which had been permitted and held to certain regulations. However, the bill was amended by Senator Hughes, a former attorney for Addington, to exempt 5 acres per county for exploring and drilling with no provisions for monitoring or permitting.

After very vocal dissatisfaction with the amendments was expressed by the public, the bill was assigned to a House Committee on Natural Resources and that committee deleted the 5 acre exemption. Two amendments were then added, one that landowners and DNREP must be given 15 days notice before Addington Oil begins exploring or drilling on leased lands and, the other amendment, giving DNREP the right to be on the leased site in order to monitor all processes. These amendments protect the land and allow DNREP to observe the technologies necessary for formulating appropriate regulations.

Mr. Murphy also had some interesting figures for the crowd. He told them that in Montana, when leases were

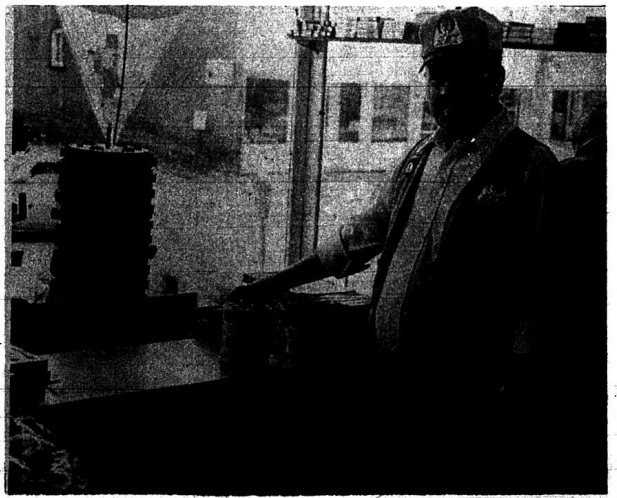
The Community Choir will soon be beginning practice for "Fiddler on the Roof" to be presented at the May Rockcastle Revue.

Legislative Report

By Rep. Harold DeMarcus

As many of you know the Addington Oil Company, Inc., of Bardonia, Kentucky, leased the mineral rights of thousands of acres of farm land in central and southern Kentucky. The fact that these leases took the form of broad-form deeds has many upset, and understandably so.

Presumably, the Addington Oil Company intends to commercially mine and process the oil-shale located beneath our farm lands. Oil-shale, when heated, can produce a liquid which can be refined into petroleum products.

The mining of oil-shale has become an issue in the 1980 General Assembly because the state currently has no regulations dealing with the problem.

Senate Bill 257, which has passed the Senate and is now being considered by the House, seeks to require the Department of Natural Resources to study the possible environmental effects of oil-shale mining and processing. Also, to prohibit any persons from engaging in the commercial mining and processing of oil-shale until the department issues regulations providing standards for such mining.

Senate Bill 257 also requires the department to adopt shale-mining regulations by June 30, 1981, and prohibits such mining until said regulations are adopted. However, the bill will permit core drilling, sample removal or such pilot projects involving mining of not more than five acres in any one county.

Senate Bill 257, is a very necessary piece of legislation, but it needs to be amended in order to give the landowner full protection. Presently, two important amendments to Senate Bill 257 are being considered by the House of Representatives.

One seeks to give Natural Resources the authority to go on shale-mining sites in order to gather data to be used to formulate comprehensive shale mining regulations. This amendment will immediately serve to oversee shale mining, especially the pilot projects that may be instituted.

The second amendment seeks to require any person or persons instigating a shale mining project to give both the land-

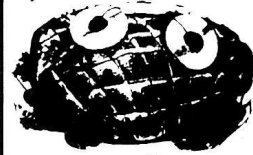

owner and Natural Resources sufficient notice as to when such mining projects will be initiated. This amendment will further protect the landowner and Natural Resources on-site observation purposes.

In related action, the House of Representatives has approved a bill which would nullify the effects of the controversial broad-form deed.

House Bill 328, which passed by a vote of 83-7, would limit coal mining to the meth-

ods known in the area when the broad-form deeds were signed. However, the mineral owner and the surface owner could agree on a different arrangement.

Many of the broad-form deeds for mineral rights were signed early in the century before heavy earth-moving equipment and strip-mining

came on the scene. Also, House Bill 566 which brings Kentucky into line with the federal strip-mining law has now passed both the House and Senate.

If the federal government approves the state's version of the strip-mining law, Kentucky will be able to regulate mining in the state and be eligible

to receive millions of dollars which can be used to reclaim abandoned strip mines around the Commonwealth.

Eggs

Easter often finds us with hard-cooked eggs that need to be used. Following are some recipes to help you use your leftover eggs.

Creole Eggs

6 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
4 cups tomato juice
1 1/2 cups celery, finely chopped
1 green pepper, finely chopped
1 medium onion, finely chopped
2 T. butter or margarine
2 cups thick white sauce
Boil tomato juice, onion, celery and pepper until thick. Stir to prevent scorching. In a buttered dish put a layer of half the eggs, a layer of half the tomato mixture, and a layer of 1 cup white sauce. Repeat and dot with butter. Bake in a 300 degree oven for approximately 1 hour. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

Thick White Sauce

3 tablespoons butter
5 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon salt
2 cups milk

Melt butter in heavy saucepan. Remove from heat, add flour and seasoning. Stir until well blended. Slowly add milk, stirring constantly until smooth. Return to heat and cook until thickened, stirring to keep smooth.

Egg Salad

6 hard-cooked eggs
1/2 cup pickle relish
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 T. mayonnaise or salad dressing

Chop the eggs, mix all ingredients. Yield: 6 servings, 1/2 cup each.

Pom-Pom Easter Animals

To make pom-pom form use cardboard. You may want to make several. To make pom-poms cut off a workable length of yarn (3 ft. or so). Wind tightly over edge of 2 1/2" circles with 1/4" hole in center. Do one row completely around then another. Cut more yarn as needed. Yarn may be doubled. Wrap until hole is closed. Cut yarn along outside of circle. Remove yarn through center and tie center tightly. (May be tied before removing). Leave ties long enough to tie together to make the chicken, etc.

Duck-yellow yarn and orange felt use orange velvet ribbon (narrow) around neck.

Wind very tightly until center of circle is closed.

Rabbit-white yarn and white and pink felt-use white for ears and pink for center. Pick for nose and pick velvet ribbon (narrow) around neck. For whiskers-use the bristles from a paint brush. Use ball fringe (pom-pom) for tail.

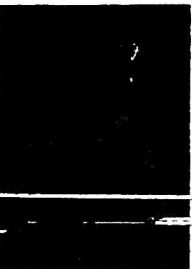

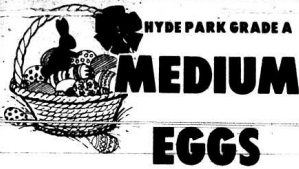

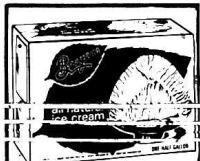

Fishing Report

Fishing is improving, despite heavy rains in some areas, due to slowly rising water temperatures. The lake-by-lake rundown, according to the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

Cumberland: black bass fair and improving by casting small spinners and crank baits at heads of creeks (a few white bass caught incidentally); crappie fair and improving by jigging, 3-4 feet deep, and in minnows, about 6 feet deep; in tallwaters, trout slow, clear to murky, falling slowly, 1 foot above the timberline and 48 degrees.

Barren: black bass good in the shallow water on spinner baits; white bass fair in heads of creeks on small spinners; crappie good in creeks on minnows and jigs; murky to muddy, rising slowly at 1 1/2 feet below summer pool and 58 degrees.

Nolin: black bass fair on crank baits and by jigging live nightcrawlers; crappie fair on minnows; white bass slow (beginning to move up the rivers) on dollies; clear to murky to muddy, rising, 6 feet below summer pool and 53 degrees.

Dale Hollow: white bass fair on spinners and jigs at heads of larger creeks; crappie fair over submerged cover; black bass spotty on live nightcrawlers and spinner baits; clear to muddy, falling, 3 feet above normal pool, 54 degrees.

Green: crappie fair over stumps and around trestops; black bass fair jigging dollies and live nightcrawlers over stump beds and dropoffs; murky to muddy, falling slowly, 1 1/2

feet below summer pool and 52 degrees.

Lexington: black bass fair and improving by jigging live nightcrawlers; bluegill fair at heads of creeks on worms; clear to murky to muddy, rising, 3 feet above summer pool and 48 degrees.

Buckhorn: crappie fair on minnows in heads of creeks; bluegill fair on worms in same areas; muddy, falling, 15 feet below summer pool and 49 degrees.

Kentucky: crappie fair on minnows over submerged cover, 7-16 feet deep; no activity in tallwaters, murky to muddy, stable at 3 feet below summer pool and 49 degrees.

Barley: crappie slow on minnows over submerged cover and dropoffs; no activity in tallwaters; murky to muddy, rising slowly at 82 feet below summer pool and 49 degrees.

Rough River: black bass slow on black dollies in stick-ups; crappie slow on minnows in same areas; murky to muddy, rising at 8 feet below summer pool and 48 degrees.

Grayson: black bass slow and improving by jigging live nightcrawlers over submerged cover; crappie slow on minnows over submerged cover; clear to murky to muddy, rising at 6 feet below summer pool and 50 degrees.

COMMUNICATING WITH YOUR CHILD - Part II

According to Dr. Haim Ginott in his book, "Between Parent and Child, constructive communication with our children is based on both respect and skill. It requires that the form of communication preserves the self-respect of parent and child and that the statements of understanding come before statements of advice and instruction.

Your child, age nine, comes home from school full of anger. The scheduled class picnic was called off due to rain. You decide on a different approach instead of the old clichés in response to the situation. In place of, "There is no use crying over a rained-out picnic," you begin to reason to yourself that your child has feelings and that he has a right to these feelings. Allowing for these emotions you respond with, "You seem hurt that the picnic was called off. You really wanted to go on the picnic badly, didn't you? You were ready to go and now you can't right?" After a pause, then your child may come to a wise and self-attained conclusion of his own such as: "Oh, well, there will be other days."

It takes a little time but it is time well spent because you have allowed your child to participate in self-expression about a thing that affects us all: disappointment. What is more, you have grown in your relationship with your child.

drawn for the mining of shale oil, landowners there were paid from \$200 to \$2000 per acre for their rights - as opposed to \$1 per acre here. Mr. Murphy said this occurred because of the Montana people's foreknowledge of the value of the shale rock and their knowledge of possible damage to the land from the mining.

The lease, signed by a majority of the landowners, was then examined, word for word, and the many possible dangers to the land and its owners were pointed out.

These dangers include one mining method which could take as much as 200 feet of rock from beneath the ground causing subsidence or collapsing of the land; no compensation for removal of fences or damage to roads or buildings on property leased; no restrictions as to how close to buildings (including residences) mining operations could be carried out; the use of farm buildings for storage by the mining company with no compensation and the right to construct a refinery on your property if so desired.

All through the meeting, comments were interjected by the landowners as to their lack of understanding of the lease they signed and as to the methods used to obtain their signatures.

The submission of affidavits by landowners to the Attorney General's, Office of Consumer Protection, detailing the circumstances of their signing the leases, was the strong recommendation to the landowners who wish their leases with adding to be cancelled or renegotiated. The crowd was told that it was imperative to express their dissatisfaction if they wished action to be taken by the attorney general's office.

Over 80% of the landowners in Casey Co., who signed leases, have submitted affidavits to the attorney general's office thus far and many from Rockcastle have also.

The central thought expressed through the discussion Monday night was that their (the landowners) only hope lay in their "sticking together" in their attempt to have the Addington leases at least renegotiated.

After the meeting, a steering committee was formed to spearhead an information collection group so they might keep all landowners abreast of developments.
