Thirteen Have Applied for RCHS Head Coach Position

Supt. Charles Parsons told members of the board of education, at their regular monthly meeting Monday night, that a committee had been appointed to accept and review applications for the head basketball coaching position open at RCHS.

Mr. Parsons said that, to date, 13 applications have been received and three of the applicants had been interviewed with two more scheduled for early next week.

Applications are coming in from all over the state and Mr. Parsons said no one local had applied for the position.

Mr. Parsons said that he hoped it would be possible to at least name the head coach at the next meeting.

Members of the athletic committee are: Cleston Saylor, Dr. Rudolph Burdette, Preston Parrett, Jack Laswell, George Poynter and Mr. Parsons.

In other action, the board accepted a roofing contract with Phillip Harrison for a section of Livingston School which covers the library and some classrooms for \$3,002.40.

The board also gave reasonable assurance of employment for next school year for all classified personnel (non-certified) for 1980-81.

Approved project applications for the following programs for 1980-81: ESNA Title I, Title IV and Title VI-B; Summer Youth Employment; Rehabilitation; CETA Training program, including transportation; Gifted Program and Public Law 874 Impacted.

Approved a continuing contract for Norma Eversole.

Approved construction of a baseball/football field at Roundstone School to be located behind the dwelling house on the school property.

Approved school calendar for 1980-81 beginning with in-service day for teachers on August 18, 1980 and student enrollment on Wednesday, August 20th.

Approved a leave-of-absence for Ruth Allen, teacher at RCHS, from April 28 to May 22, 1980.

Approved the purchase of 25 feet of demountable metal partition for RCHS English Dept. from Virginia Metal Corporation at an estimated cost of \$1,562.00.

Approved the use of the Mt. Vernon School playground for use by the Rockcastle County Recreation Council's summer program. The recreation council is to pay 1/2 the cost of the lights (estimated at \$3.00 per hour by KU); softball groups (for tournaments, etc.) are to pay \$10 per night and any damage to property (broken windows, etc.) to be replaced by the recreation council.

Approved four out-of-state class trips for students with the group to pay 50¢ per mile plus cost of driver.

Approved GED certificates

for Diana L. Robinson and Clayton E. Alexander. The board also heard a report from Mr. Parsons concerning the registration for kindergarten and first grade which was held recently. Mr. Parsons said the registration showed a decline over last year's enrollment - kindergarten minus 29 and first grade minus 22 and if these figures held true through actual enrollment of the children, it might mean that fewer teachers would be needed for next school year.

However, Mr. Parsons said that with retirements, there should be no need to lay-off teachers as has been necessary in some school systems across the state.

The board also approved a teachers salary schedule for 1980-81 which includes a \$900 annual salary increase for 9 1/4 months for each certified employee.

Salary schedules for teachers in 1980-81 will range from \$7,820 for a Rank V teacher with 0-3 years experience to \$17,890 for a Rank I teacher with 10 or more years experience.

Clyde Barnett, a Republican and Walker Norton, a Democrat, were named to the Rockcastle County Board of Elections recently.

Mr. Barnett and Mr. Norton will serve on the board with Sheriff Henry Lee Abney and Mrs. Irene Bales, court clerk, who serves as chairman of the board.

Fiscal Court Accepts Recommendations

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court met with the State Highway Department for the court's regular meeting Tuesday to take recommendations for the rural secondary program for fiscal year 1980-81.

The State Highway Department made the following recommendations:

Rebuild the bridge on Cooksburg-Johnetta Road; blacktop 1.757 miles of Road 1187 and resurfacing of Highway 1249.

The court adopted and approved these recommendations.

June Allotment of Food Stamps May Be Delayed, Stumbo Says

There is a good chance the June allotment of food stamps to Kentucky recipients will be delayed, Human Resources Secretary Grady Stumbo said today.

It is also possible families receiving food stamps will see a reduction in benefits for several months, he said.

Federal officials have said the national food stamp program will run out of money soon unless Congress appropriates additional funds. The head of the program, U.S. Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland, said Monday he has told all governors it is unlikely Congressional action will be taken in time to forestall suspension of food stamp benefits.

"We have been in touch with the people in Washington and we understand that if the budget appropriation isn't passed by May 15, Secretary Bergland will suspend food stamp payments on June 1. We are sending notices to our clients about the situation with

their May authorization-to-purchase cards," Stumbo said.

"Approximately 138,000 Kentucky families depend on food stamps. We are concerned that a delay in receiving food stamps will cause them hardship," he added.

Stumbo said Gov. John Y. Brown Jr.'s newly-organized Food Stamp Crisis Task Force is looking for resources to aid needy people if food stamps are cut off.

The task force is made up of state and local government officials and community groups

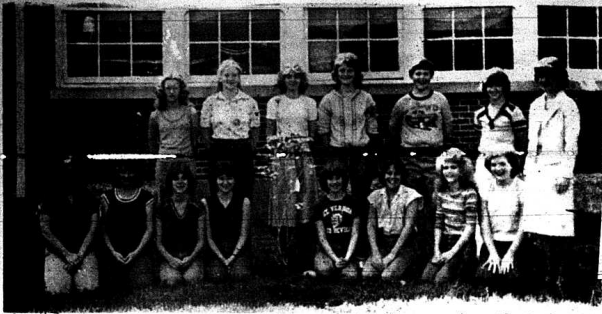

True religion teaches that marriage is honorable in ALL (Heb. 13:4). False religion - in some cases - teaches celibacy (1 Tim. 4:1-3).

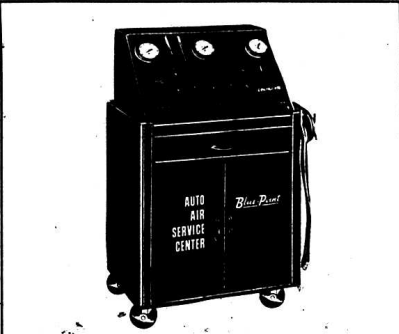

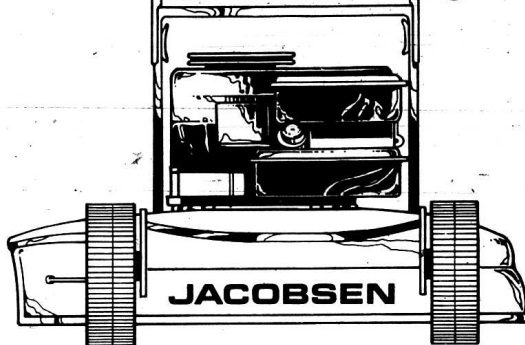

Fishing Report

It was a good week end weather-wise but fishing on Kentucky's major lakes could be termed only fair. The lake-by-lake rundown, according to the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

Laurel: Crappie fair in wooded sloughs; bluegill excellent in wooded coves; black bass fair on surface lures; trout good at night; clear, stable, 2 feet below power pool and 62 degrees.

Cave Run: Musky good in upper end on medium deep runners in timbered coves; crappie fair around stickups, 6 feet deep; black bass slow by jugging and casting spinner baits in timbered coves; clear, stable at summer pool and 63 degrees.

Dewey: Bluegill good off rocky points; crappie fair around stickups and in treetops; black bass fair on surface lures in mouths of inlets and bays; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 62 degrees.

Rough River: Crappie good and improving over submerged cover and stickups (2-5 feet deep); bluegill fair in north fork and good in south fork around rocky banks; black bass slow on medium deep runners and artificial worms; in tailwaters, trout fair to good; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 65 degrees.

Cumberland: Crappie good in lower end by drift and still fishing around willows and stickups (6-8 feet deep) and fair in upper end by drift fishing (4-12 feet deep); black bass good in lower end on surface lures and buzz baits; in tailwaters, trout fair and walleye fair to good; in headwaters, white bass slow in South Fork and fair in Cumberland, Laurel and Rock-

castle; clear to murky, falling slowly, 2 feet below timberline and 62 degrees.

Barren: Crappie fair over submerged cover, about 6 feet deep; black bass fair on surface lures early and late, on worms during the day and on spinner baits at night; clear, stable at summer pool and 68 degrees.

Nolin: Black bass fair on surface lures; bluegill fair along rock ledges; Crappie slow in the stickups; clear, stable at summer pool and 68 degrees.

Barkley: Crappie fair to good over submerged cover, in tailwaters, bluegill and catfish fair; clear, stable at summer pool and 64 degrees.

Kentucky: Black bass fair in inlets and bays on worms and spinner baits; crappie slow to fair, 8-20 feet deep; in tailwaters, catfish good to excellent; clear, stable at summer pool and 63 degrees.

Dale Hollow: Bluegill fair to good around willows; crappie slow around willows; clear, stable at normal pool and 65 degrees.

Green: Bluegill good on worms; black bass fair off points and bays on surface lures and crank baits; crappie fair in stickups; clear, falling, 1/2 foot below summer pool and 60 degrees.

Be Prepared When You Apply for Social Security

Plan to apply soon for social security benefits? If so, here's a tip from Bob Anderson, manager of the Richmond Social Security Office. Be prepared with as much needed information as possible. This should help you get that first check faster.

Both you and any eligible dependents will need your social security cards. And, you'll need your birth certificates or other suitable proof of age. As a wage earner or self-employed person, you also need your latest W-2 form (Wage and Tax Statement) or self-employment tax return because earnings for the previous year will not yet appear on your social security earnings record.

Additional information may be needed in your individual case. For example, if you are filing for monthly disability benefits, you should have a list of doctors, hospitals or other facilities where you have been examined or treated. If you apply for survivors payments, proof of death and marriage are needed.

"Inquire before you retire" is particularly good advice if your retirement plans are uncertain. For example, you may be undecided on whether to start drawing reduced benefits be-

fore 65 or wait and get your full amount at 65. You may want to know more about how your benefit can be increased by delaying your retirement until after 65. And, can you continue working and still draw, some benefits?

All these and other questions can be answered by the people in any social security office. It's a good idea to contact them at least 2 or 3 months before you think you may retire. In that way, your checks can start on time if you actually do decide to apply.

If you are nearing 65, you should know that you do not have to retire to get Medicare protection. But you must apply for it. And, this should be done a few months before you are 65 so you receive full coverage at the earliest possible date.

If you are severely disabled before 65, contact the social security office whenever it appears your impairment will keep you from doing gainful work at least a year. Payments to you and your dependents can start with the 6th full month of disability. In addition to providing details of medical treatment, it will help if you also have a summary of where and when you have worked in recent years.

Farmers Home Adm. Increases Interest Rates

Interest rates on some loans made by the Farmers Home Administration are higher effective April 14. William E. Burnette, State Director for Kentucky said today. Interest rates charged by FmHA are prescribed by law and are closely tied to the cost of federal borrowing and prevailing private market interest rates. Burnette said.

Interest rates for Farm Operating loans will go from 11 to 12.5 percent, rates will increase from 13 to 14 percent for Economic and Disaster Emergency loans, except that actual loss Disaster Emergency loans will remain at 5 percent as prescribed by law. The rate of 12 percent will apply for Farm Ownership, Soil and Water, and all other long-term Real Estate loans. Interest rates for the agency's programs of low-interest loans for limited resource farmers will not be increased at this time, Burnette said. Loans under the program made for farm production will continue at 7 percent and for farm real estate at 5 percent.

The interest rate for unsubsidized loans for Home Ownership, Rural Rental Housing and Rural Housing Site Development will increase from 11 to 13 percent. The "interest credit" feature of the Home Ownership loan program will not be affected by the interest rate change. The interest rate on loans for Agricultural Facilities and Water and Waste Disposal Systems remain unchanged at 5 percent, Burnette said. The interest rate will continue to be negotiated between the borrower and lender on loans guaranteed by the Farmers Home Administration.

The Farmers Home Administration provides a full range of rural development credit in Kentucky through a network of 65 county offices, 7 district offices and the State Office located in Lexington. In Fiscal Year 1979, the agency provided \$361,158,590 in loans and grants in the state in four major program areas: farming, housing, community facilities and business and industrial development.

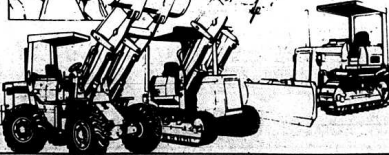

Avoid Too Much Fat, Saturated Fat, and Cholesterol

If you have a high blood cholesterol level, you have a greater chance of having a heart attack. Other factors can also increase your risk of heart attack: high blood pressure and cigarette smoking. For example, but high blood cholesterol is clearly a major dietary risk indicator.

Populations like ours with diets that are saturated and cholesterol tend to have high blood cholesterol levels. Individuals within these populations usually have greater risks of having heart attacks than people eating low-fat, low-cholesterol diets.

Eating extra saturated fat and cholesterol will increase blood cholesterol levels in most people. However, there are some variations among people related to heredity and the way each person's uses cholesterol.

Some people can consume diets high in saturated fats and cholesterol and still keep their blood cholesterol levels. Other people unfortunately, have high blood cholesterol levels even if they eat low-fat, low-cholesterol diets.

There is controversy about what recommendation are appropriate for healthy Americans. But for the U.S. population, as a whole, reduction in our current intake of total fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol is sensible. This suggestion is especially appropriate for people who have high blood pressure or who smoke.

Some recommendations are not meant to prohibit the use of

any specific food item or to prevent you from eating a variety of foods. For example, eggs and organ meats (such as liver) contain cholesterol, but they also contain many essential vitamins and minerals, as well as protein. Such items can be eaten in moderation.

To avoid too much fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol, choose lean meat, fish poultry sources. Moderate your use of eggs and organ meats (such as liver). Limit your intake of butter, cream, hydrogenated margarines, shortenings, and coconut oil, and foods made from such products. Trim excess fat off meats. Broil, bake, or boil rather than fry. Read labels carefully to determine both a amount and types of fats contained in foods.

MICROWAVE COOKING

Microwave ovens are here to stay. With the energy situation as it is, these ovens will actually give housewives more money in the future. It is much cheaper to operate a microwave than a regular oven. The one major reason - nearly all the cooking energy produced is used to directly heat food, not the surrounding air and utensils.

There are several things to be aware of on the market that will do a better job browning foods.

Microwave Oven Time Savers

1. Freshen staple potato chips or crackers: 2 cups 30 to 45 seconds on "Med-High."
2. Speed defrosting of frozen juices: Remove metal cap and "Med-low" in the can for 1 to 2 minutes, then transfer to glass pitcher for faster thawing.
3. Defrost frozen non-dairy creamer, or frozen milk in opened carton.
4. Heat syrup for pancakes or waffles in the bottle, or a pitcher for 1 minute on "Med-high."
5. Dissolve honey that has turned to sugar on "Med-high."
6. Soften 8 oz. uncovered jar of cheese on "Low" for 2 to 2 1/2 minutes.
7. Dry bread crumbs or bread cubes for croutons or make a bread crumb topping. Two slices of bread on a paper towel, require about 1 1/2 minutes; turning slices halfway through, process in blender or cube first.
8. Prepare hot drinks (coffee, tea, milk) in a cup liquid, 2 minutes on "High."

Think back a few years! What one thing occurred in your youth that to this day, recreates feelings of personal inadequacy or worthlessness? For me, it was stuttering before my 8th grade English class as I attempted to give a speech. The memory of my embarrassment remains even today. You, no doubt, have similar memories. As adults, we can generally handle such feelings, if our childhood was basically secure. But, our children are very vulnerable and do not have the wisdom and maturity that adulthood brings to handle the social and emotional crises that occur during their own development.

Be honest with yourself! More than likely, you condemned yourself as a social disgrace due to some real or imagined physical characteristic such as a pudgy nose, facial acne, awkwardness, overweight, etc. More than likely, you pictured yourself being tried before a judge and jury of your own peers, found guilty, and then sentenced to social exile. In your own mind, you were a loser, someone only a mother could love. What you didn't realize then, but do now, is that you were not alone. All your friends had similar inadequacies (including the quarterback of the football team and the valedictorian of the senior class).

Remember that our children are going through the same agonies we went through and need all the support and understanding that loving parents can give. Helping them to realize that such feelings are normal and that they are not alone with such feelings contributes greatly to their self-esteem. Accepting themselves, warts and all, also helps in rounding out their personality development.

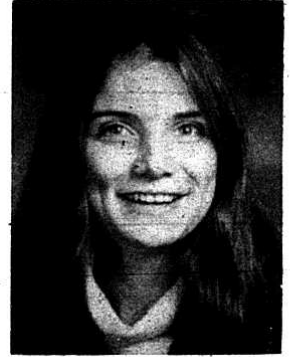



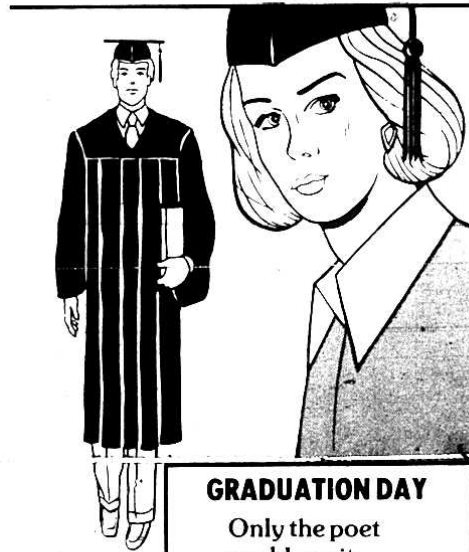
