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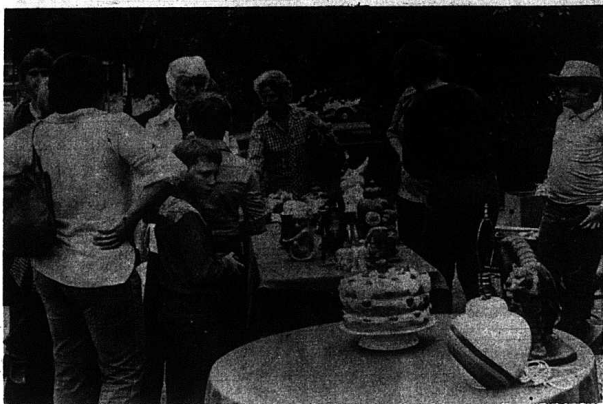

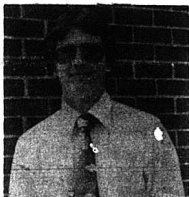

Harold Rogers Wins County and District 5th District Representative Race

Harold Rogers of Somerset easily won in the Republican contest for U.S. Representative of the 5th District in Tuesday's primary.

In Rockcastle County, Rogers received 738 votes to win by a more than 2 to 1 margin over his closest opponent John D. Rogers, also of Somerset, who received 355. Gene Huff was the third largest vote getter in the county in the representative race with 313 followed by Tom Emberton with 102 votes.

With 93% of the vote in from the 5th District, Harold Rogers led Tom Emberton, the 1971 GOP gubernatorial candidate 11,940 to 9,873 with Gene Huff, a state senator from Laurel County third with 9,522. Behind them was State Senator John Rogers with 7,167, state Representative Raymond Overstreet of Liberty with 4,728 and state Representative Elmer Patrick of Williamsburg with 3,800.

Hal Rogers, who has been active in the Republican party for several years, was defeated in his last bid for public office when he ran for Lieutenant Governor last year with Louie Nunn.

In the Democratic election to name a contender for Rogers, Ted Marcum easily won in Rockcastle Co. with 239 votes compared to Lyle Willis', 54; Jesse Ramey's, 44 and Charles Harris', 22.

Across the district, Marcum, a former state highway official had rolled up 3,786 votes to Willie J. Ramey's, 1,190 and Harris', 1,024. These figures

were with a little over half the votes counted.

In the U.S. Senate primary, incumbent Democrat Wendell Ford had only one opponent, Flora Stewart, whom he easily defeated, both in Rockcastle County and across the district. In Rockcastle, Ford's majority was 420 to 38 and across the district, Ford won 85% of the Democratic vote.

In the Republican contest to name an opponent for Ford in the fall, Mary Louise Foust, a former state auditor, won in Rockcastle County and across the district. In Rockcastle County, Mrs. Foust received 376 votes to her closest opponent, Granville Thomas', 287.

There were no surprises in the Kentucky presidential preference primary. Again, Rockcastle was a pretty good indicator of election returns across the state.

Ronald Reagan was the top vote getter in the county with 1,215 and George Bush, who has announced his withdrawal from the race, got 80. Statewide, Reagan won all 27 delegates to the national convention and with these, and other primaries held yesterday in other states, Reagan now has locked-up the Republican nomination for president.

President Carter won over Ted Kennedy in Rockcastle County by 385 votes to 88 while state-wide he gained 38 of the 50 Democrat delegates. He now stands only 80 some votes shy of a locked-in nomination.

Champion Coonhounds Are Hobby of Dale Sowder

What do successful farmers in Rockcastle County do for enjoyment? The answer might vary but one such man has gained fame through his hobby. The man is Dale Sowder of Brindle Ridge and his hobby is his registered Black and Tan coonhounds, Black and Tan, because of its highly developed sense of smell, is a dog bred especially for coon hunting and is recognized by the American Kennel Club as the only pure bred breed even though there are five other coonhounds which differ mostly in color.

Mr. Sowder has about thirty Black and Tans, including pups, and has owned this breed since 1937. From this lineage he has received 104 trophies for competitive hunting. He does not enter his dogs in shows or bench competitions where they are judged solely on looks, even though they would likely win trophies here too. Characteristic of the Black and Tan, Mr. Sowder's dogs have a shiny black coat with tan markings on the head, chest and legs. Their coloring plus the perfect proportions make them beautiful dogs.

Mr. Sowder's dogs show signs of being extremely well cared for, (maybe even a little pampered).

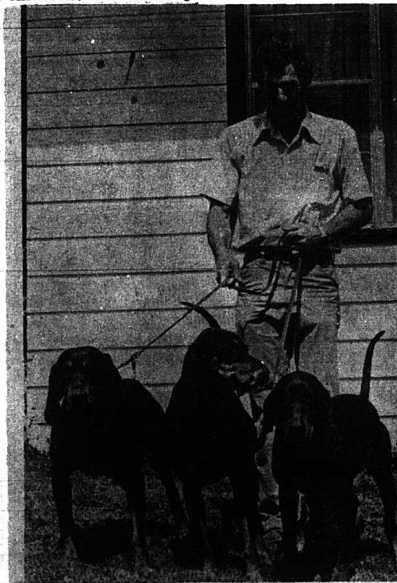
Go Joe won the 1970 High Scoring Black and Tan World Championship sponsored by the ACHA (American Coon Hound Association). A total of 446 dogs

entered this competition held in Van, Ky. He has had 6 NITE Champions and 1 Grand NITE Champion. This year his dogs won in Madison and Oldham counties and are again quantified, as they are most years, for the World Event. This year the World ACHA Contest will be held in Arkansas and Mr. Sowder is not sure he is going to travel that far. There is no prize money for winners and frequent trips to enter events, plus the \$10.00 a day it takes to feed his dogs, makes this sport one of the most expensive.

Mr. Sowder does sell some pups but never dogs he has worked to train, even though a dog of this caliber could easily bring as much as \$5,000.00. The art, of course, is in the training and the reward comes when, as Mrs. Sowder put it, "Everybody dreads his dogs."

There are two categories for judging in a hunt: one is the Strike, when the dog barks and the other is the Tree. The hounds are grouped in fours and the first in the group to strike gets 100 points, second, 75, third, 50, and fourth, 25. Treeling is scoring the same way. For anything other than a coon that a dog strikes at or trees, points are deducted from his score. Thus the winner is eventually determined. From looking at the walls of the Sowder home, Mr. Sowder has seldom come

handed.

LEXINGTON—We can learn a lot from our dentists. I'm not talking just about care of our teeth. I visited my dentist recently and while my mouth was open and my tongue pressed down he was talking about Kentucky football. "I hear they've suspended Don Fielder," he said. Don Fielder suspended? The only returning defensive end to the team would be a major loss.

A telephone call to Coach Fran Curci confirmed my dentist's report. "Yes," said Fran, "Fielder is suspended for one semester and won't play this season. He is suspended for breaking team rules." That's as far as Curci would go on the reasons for the suspension.

Fielder came to Kentucky a year ago, moving from Golden West Junior College in California. The 6'3", 227 pounder started for the Cats all season and has one year of eligibility left. Curci hopes that Fielder will play his final year in 1981.

Curci says Fielder will really be missed. "He was our only returning defensive end after we switched Jeff Dennis to linebacker this spring," Curci said. "We will study the situation thoroughly between now and the beginning of practice in August but I think we'll have to move Dennis back to end. We've got some real problems on defense. We're very thin and inexperienced at defensive end and at linebacker. Nose guard is a mystery to us too right now. We lost a great one in Richard Jaffe. I think defense is the most important part of football. If you can't stop anybody, you can't win."

After the football camp on the U.K. campus early next month, the whole coaching staff will leave for vacation at the same time. When they return, they'll get down to the serious business of planning the practice sessions for mid-August. One of the problems was complicated when Don Fielder was suspended.

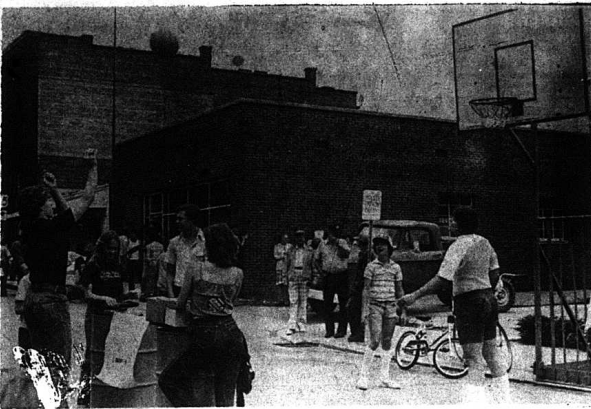

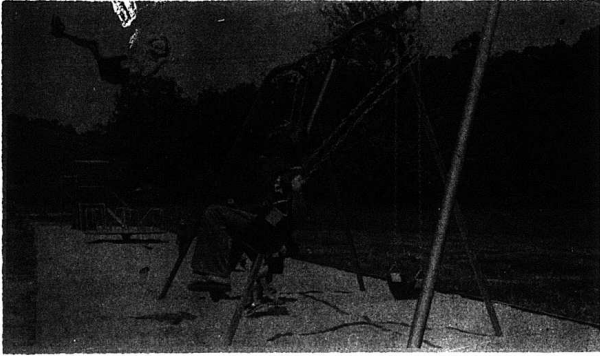

Public Attitudes Revealed on Soil and Water Conservation

Results of a national survey of the public's attitudes on several major agricultural issues, including conservation of soil and water and related resources, were released January 17, 1980.

"The survey revealed that most American people believe more soil and water conservation is needed and are committed to a conservation ethic," said M. Rupert Cutler, assistant secretary of agriculture for natural resources and environment. "A majority also favors a public and private partnership to resolve soil and water problems."

Louis Harris and Associates, Inc., interviewed 7,010 adults - representing a cross-

section of the nation's population - during the survey, conducted between October 19 and November 21, 1979.

"We conducted the survey to assess the public's opinion, attitudes and understanding of soil and water conservation problems and practices," Cutler said. "We will use the findings to help design future USDA soil and water conservation programs."

Other questions sought public opinion on such issues as gasoline, small farms and priorities in land use.

Some of the survey's major findings are:

Half of all Americans consider misuse of our soil and water resources a serious problem.

Fifty-three percent consider the loss of good farmland a serious problem.

People see conservation as a joint public and private responsibility and feel the burden should be shared fairly between government and farmer or other landowner.

By 7 to 1, Americans accept Federal action to protect farmland from erosion as a proper role for government.

Americans support the concept of small, family farms and federal policies aimed at preserving and increasing them. However, people understand that most of the food grown in this country is produced on large farms.

The public consistently indicated a preference for allocating a greater share of soil and water resources to agriculture - specifically to food production - rather than to competing housing, industrial, energy or recreation uses.

More than 8 to 10 Americans are rated moderate-to-high on a conservation ethic scale, believing conservation is impor-

tant for the country. More than three-fourths of Americans feel we have not reached the point in soil and water conservation efforts where we should be more concerned about holding down costs than completing the work that remains to be done.

By more than 2 to 1, the American public says gasoline should receive more government support than synthetic fuels. In head-to-head choices, gasoline is seen as more likely than synthetic fuels to reduce oil imports, keep down gasoline costs, and less likely to damage the land.

Americans value highly citizen participation in federal decisionmaking, even though their reported participation is low at 33 percent. A large proportion value the ability to have a say in decisionmaking. They would participate more, they say, if they felt the effects of government decisions were more direct or if they felt they were truly being heard. While 21 percent say they would participate much more if the government were to help pay the cost of their participation, 44 percent say government financial help would not increase their participation.

A substantial majority of the public feels government should provide loans to people trying to get started in farming.

"The survey is one of the public participation activities undertaken in the development of the future USDA program for conserving soil and water resources," Cutler said. "This effort is part of the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA), Public Law 95-192."

4-H Camp

Summer 4-H activities that include making new friends, swimming and boating, sports and games, crafts and nature study will be available to Rockcastle County youngsters at 4-H camp.

Rockcastle County youth will camp July 14-18 at the J.M. Feltner Memorial 4-H camp in London. This is one of five 4-H camps in the Commonwealth offering a wide variety of summer fun activities for youth in the 9-19 age range. Other counties camping during that week will be Jackson, Clay, Knox and Harrison.

Fun and learning, along with a chance to enjoy the outdoors, are the main ingredients to make this year's camp exciting. Trained instructors will help with classes and activities, teaching beginners and helping the more skilled campers observe safety rules. Classes in anchovy and rifery will develop safety consciousness as well as provide the opportunity to improve shooting skills.
