Public Attitudes Revealed on Soil and Water Conservation

Results of a national survey of the public's attitudes on several major agricultural issues, including conservation of soil and water and related re-sources, were released January 17, 1990. "The survey revealed that most American people believe more soil and water conserva-tion is needed and are commit-ted to a conservation ethic."

ted to a conservation ethic," said M. Rupert Cutler, assistant secretary of agriculture for natural resources and environ-ment. "A majority also favors a public and private partnership to resolve soil and water pro-

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
