Board of Education Hires New Head Basketball Coach for High School

The Rockcastle County Board of Education met Tuesday night, for their regular monthly meeting, and hired a new basketball coach for the upcoming year.

Hired was Roscoe Denny of Malone in Morgan County. Mr. Denny, who is single, is 29 years old and has seven years teaching and coaching experience. He graduated from Eastern Kentucky University where, in his senior year, he coached the 7th and 8th grade basketball team at Model Laboratory School which is located near the EKV campus.

Mr. Denny also served as assistant basketball coach and head track coach at Carroll Co. High School for three years. At Franklin College in Franklin, Indiana, he received a graduate assistantship and served as assistant basketball coach. He then served as head basketball coach at Pine Knott High School for two years before going to Morgan County last year as head coach.

Mr. Denny is a physical education major and is presently working on a masters degree in health from Eastern University.

On question, Mr. Denny said his reason for coming here was, "Wanting the challenge of a larger school in which to coach." Mr. Denny further said, "I feel there is a lot of potential in a school this size and I have seen the boys work out and feel good about what I saw."

During the meeting, the board also voted to purchase .92 of an acre of land adjacent to Mt. Vernon Elementary School from the Bullock heirs for \$5,000, subject to approval of the State Department of Education, Division of Building and Grounds.

The school property presently contains 12.70 acres. In order to construct an addition to the school, an ultimately an entire new school, the state requires a total land area of 14 acres. With the board's purchase Tuesday night, the land area available was raised to 13.62 acres which, Mr. Parsons said, would be sufficient to meet the state's specifications.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education wishes to recognize ten teachers who did not miss a day of work during the past school term. In other business, the board voted to accept the low bid for auditing the board's financial records for fiscal year 1979-80 from J. Courtney Horton of \$1,500. Garland Cummins, Shirley Mullins and Pauline Mullins were approved to audit the financial records of the lunch-room accounts.

Also approved were the following increases:

Travel reimbursement from 16 to 18¢ per mile, effective July 1st for employees required to travel in the performance of their assigned jobs; regular bus drivers - \$25 a month; contract drivers, mechanic and haulers and school secretaries, 3% increase; aides, cooks and janitors, 25¢ per hour; principals and other certified personnel, 8% increase in extra service only; Edw Reynolds and Paul Owens increase to \$812 per month and Naomi Mink and Shirley Mullins, increase to \$725.00 per month.

The board also approved a contract with Ronnie Cash to paint all outside doors and frames at RCHS (total of \$4) for \$265.00. Charles Carter was hired to paint the outside woodwork on the county schools at \$3.10 per hour.

Fiscal Court Leases

Old Armour Creamery Building

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court met Tuesday, June 3rd and agreed to lease two buildings and a 1964 Chevrolet wrecker and assorted tools. The buildings are located on property on old 25 formerly owned by Armour Creamery, will be used as a garage or for storage for the County's road equipment.

The county is leasing the property from the present owners, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bussell, at a total cost of \$300.00 a month. Magistrate Frank Deborde voted against the agreement.

The state has released 136 extra miles of road in Rockcastle to be maintained by the county with funds coming from the state to support the maintenance. Now only state and secondary numbered roads are the responsibility of the State Dept. of Highways.

The 1980-81 Revenue Sharing budget was presented to the Court and was tentatively approved subject to approval by the state. County Revenue Sharing Funds were spent as follows:

- Dispatch (at the jail), \$600;
- county road maintenance, \$50,000;
- garbage disposal, \$45,000;
- dog wardens, \$3,600;
- Library, \$5,000;
- social services, \$4,000;
- senior citizens program, \$5,000;
- fringe benefits (salaries), \$2,000;
- materials and supplies, \$1,000;
- treasurer's salary, \$3,900;
- courthouse utilities, \$14,000;
- courthouse repair (general), \$8,000;
- Rockcastle Fairgrounds, \$9,000;
- ambulance expenses, \$24,560;
- Rockcastle Ind. Dev. Authority (interest), \$7,000 and ambulance building, \$14,000.

In other transactions, the court granted the State Highway Dept. permission to close the Cupps-Chapel road to permit construction of the bridge over Long Branch. The contract provides for 100 working days beginning June 23rd.

Berry Gardner, representing Bob Moore, requested permission to be allowed to reconstruct and recondition his road which is an old county road. The road is located on Trace Branch on the South side of 175. Permission was granted.

An engineer for Ikerd and Bandy Coal Co., Jim Davis, appeared before the court to seek permission to strip mine across three old county roads with the promise to rebuild them when mining is finished. Brodhead Town Board

Discusses Revenue Sharing

The Brodhead Town Board met Monday night June 2nd and took action on spending revenue sharing funds. Two thousand dollars of the town's allotted \$731.00 was designated to pay off the loan on the maintenance truck. Projects to repair city streets and work on the road up Water Tank Hill also will be funded by Revenue Sharing. Property owners on Pine Street will be contacted to see if they would be willing to match city money to pave their street. The city's part of the project would be funded by Revenue Sharing.

In other business, the board voted to renew Walter Dee's bond and to send a final notice to delinquent tax payers.

Soil Conservationist, Greg Stephens, appeared before the board to request that the city go half on a plan to go under Silver Street with a 6" pipe to help drain the school grounds. This project will be jointly sponsored by the town of Brodhead, the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Soil Conservation Service. The board agreed to accept Mr. Stephens' recommendation.

After much discussion, and on the advice of the city attorney, the board agreed to issue a license for entertainment to Wayne Lear. The entertainment will be limited to Mr. Lear's Auction Barn on Friday nights between the hours of 7:30 and 11:30 p.m. Bill Bussell was the only member voting against granting the license.

Tommy Baldwin requested and was granted a raise from \$15.00 to \$20.00 per mowing of

the city's park. Mr. Baldwin said that he only mows the park twice monthly and that there is trash of various kinds that he also picks up which was the reason for the request. Dave Taylor was hired to replace David Brodhead street sweeper. The streets are swept each week weather permitting for a set price of \$8.00 a sweeping.

Board member, Ronnie Cash said that Superintendent of School, Charlie B. Parsons, had asked about the price the city would accept for some aluminum posts that are no longer being used. The board decided to offer the posts for \$100.00 each. The posts are to be used at the High School to install extra security lights on the grounds.

The board also voted to enforce a city ordinance which makes it unlawful to park unlicensed vehicles on the street. Several narrow streets are lined with these cars and trucks and create a driving hazard.

Decision Faces Mrs. Cummins After 70 Years in Same Residence

Sally Payne was born April 13, 1890 at Wadd in Rockcastle Co., the youngest of Moses and Sarah Payne's eight children. Her father was killed in an accident with a team of horses when she was only seven and the family stayed on the farm and her mother and the children did washing, ironing and other work to support the family.

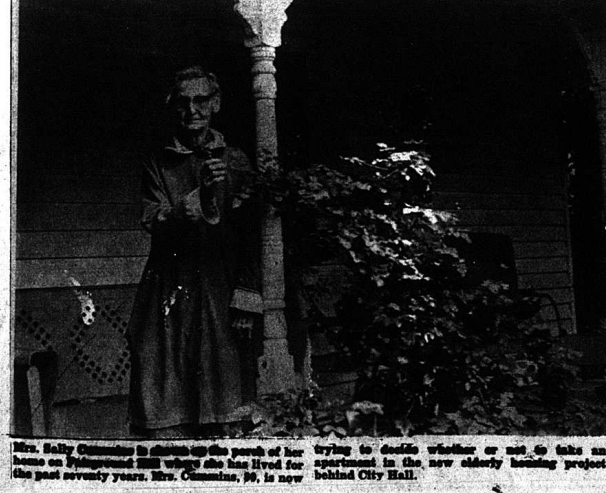
She says it sounds strange that she quit school when she was eleven or twelve to stay home with her mother, who was alone by then, but then married at age fourteen and left home for good. She met her future husband, Asber Cummins, when she came to town with her married sister and her husband to see a merry-go-round that had come to town. (The merry-go-round was set up near the present site of Thrifty Lumber Co.) "He came up and was

talking to us and pretty soon he looked at me and said, 'Do you want to ride with me?' and I said, 'Yeah.' " From then on they were courting. He rode out to see her on a horse and they sometimes went to Freedom Baptist Church on horse back or just visited at her home. Mrs. Cummins said her mother and Mr. Cummins always had great respect for each other.

He was nineteen when they married at Mrs. Cummins' home and moved to Mt. Vernon to live with his parents at the edge of Fairground Hill. They lived there until Mr. Cummins could get their house built on an adjoining lot his father had given them. They built two rooms at first and later added more as the family grew. The family grew to include a daughter, Ronnie Mae, now living in Cincinnati, Ohio; a son, Harry of Princeton and a son, Glenn, Dallas, Texas. One son, Ralph, died a few years ago and another son, Daniel, died at the age of ten.

Mrs. Cummins recalls vividly the events of Daniel's death. He left for school one morning but returned before reaching school. He was feeling ill and made the statement that he would never be back to school again. He never was. Local doctors could not find the source of his illness so Mr. Cummins becoming vexed, loaded him into a jolt wagon and drove them to catch a doctor at Berea. Doctors there x-rayed and reported to the parents that his heart was on the wrong side of his body. They advised complete bed rest, but the child who suffered breathing difficulty, insisted upon sitting up in a chair most of the day. When he died, Mrs. Cummins remembers that his teacher and classmates picked large bunches of violets and marched behind his body to the graveyard and sprinkled the flowers on his grave.

It is evident from talking to Mrs. Cummins that she has great faith and love for her (Cont. to 4)

Legislative Report

The 1980 General Assembly enacted several bills that are designed to improve the operation of state and local government in the Commonwealth.

Senate Bill 18, will establish and define procedures for the financial administration of cities in Kentucky. This bill, among other things, will require each city to possess an accounting system maintained on a fund basis and in conformity with generally accepted governmental accounting principles.

House Bill 20, will mandate a referendum on annexation if half the voters in the area to be annexed call for it. If 75 percent of those voting oppose the annexation, the ordinance will not take effect.

House Bill 102, will allow the Personal Service Contract Review subcommittee to review all state contracts before they are paid out. This should alleviate the committee's problem of discovering contract inequities, only to be unable to correct them because the contracts are already paid out.

Senate Bill 119, will require the state attorney general to prosecute cases of corruption in state government. This provision should prohibit political influences from detaining the prosecution of cases involving the unlawful obtaining of state money or property.

House Bill 70, will require the state department of finance to comply with generally accepted accounting principles for the state accounting and reporting system. Generally accepted accounting principles are defined as those adopted by the National Council on Govern-

mental Accounting and the Financial Accounting Standards Board.

House Bill 71, will create a state office of investment and capital management. The Department of Finance. State agencies will be required to submit all proposed bond issues to this office for approval.

This bill was given the full support of the House Republican Caucus. We felt that although the measure was rather weak, it is at least an attempt to keep a firm hand on the state's various bonding authorities.

House Bill 580, will create a fine of \$250 for witnesses from state agencies falling 60 appear when called by the auditor of public accounts. The purpose of this measure is to stiffen the penalty for bureaucrats who attempt to withhold information relating to the expenditures of state revenue.

House Bill 804, will require that income from temporary investments, made by the Public Employees Deferred Compensation System, be used to defray the expenses of administering the system. This measure is the result of a legislative investigation which discovered state revenues being wrongly used to provide tax shelters for state employees.

During the previous session, the legislature developed a program designed to improve the condition of county roads across the state. The plan consists of the state sending funds derived from the governor's gasoline tax, directly to the county judge/executives for county road maintenance.

This method will allow the fiscal courts to decide where and how county road aid money will be spent.

This method will allow the fiscal courts to decide where and how county road aid money will be spent. The Department of Revenue has estimated that for Fiscal years 1980-81 and 1981-82, Lincoln County will receive \$686,947 in county road

funds. Rockcastle County will receive \$620,067 and Pulaski will receive \$1,118,584. NEXT WEEK: AGRICULTURE LEGISLATION.

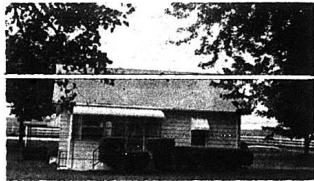

church. She probably feels more that it is "her" church than most members of her denomination. It is the present brick structure of the First Baptist Church. She and another lady went door to door and begged money to build the first parsonage of the church. Those who couldn't donate were encouraged to give a day's labor. Mrs. Cummins was superintendent of the Sunday School Primary Department for nearly twenty years and laments the fact that she can no longer be an active helper; but she says she can and does pray for her church.

She is positive about recent remodeling in the church, welcomes the beautifying and adds that it is so much easier to get new things now than when she was young. Both Mr. and Mrs. Cummins spent time, energy and money getting the first parsonage built. Times were harder then and things moved slower. Mrs. Cummins did most of the actual construction work. Every morning when he arrived to work on the parsonage, a particular deacon would show up.

After engaging in a few minutes conversation, he invariably would tell Mr. Cummins how much too small he was building the house. After several meetings of this, Mr. Cummins retorted, "Well if you'll put up the money we'll build it as big as you want." The deacon stamped his feet after that, Mrs. Cummins said.

The Decision

Even in this day of modern medicine and technology, living to be 90 years old, as Mrs. Sally Cummins has is still quite a marvel. However there are two other marvelous things about this woman. One is that she is still able to live herself in her 8 room house. The other is that she has been content to live in the same house for 70 years. This is something which not many people could claim about even if they get lucky and reach 90.

This fact makes it easy to understand why Mrs. Cummins has been agonizing about having numerous longer conflicts about a possible move. When Mrs. Cummins learned of the apartments now being built to house

interested. When one house has been home for well over half a century at 90 a move is not really welcome no matter how pleasant other housing is reported to be. Home is so familiar that it is like a friend or companion and a feeling of security and comfort comes from being inside its walls.

But the facts have confronted Mrs. Cummins. She must deal with them alone as she has had to do in other situations since the death of her husband over 10 years ago. The facts all point to the logical answer - move to more convenient housing.

Mrs. Cummins home reflects long years of use. It is impossible, of course, for her to do needed repair work and too expensive to hire a laborer.

Not being able to get work done and no way to get where she needs to go were the two things that Mrs. Cummins named as her worst problems. She has to hire yard work done at the once enjoyed. She had some high needs being her church recently that needed cutting and a few days ago, two neighbors showed up to cut

them for her and refused pay. She is grateful for these and other neighbors who help her. One such neighbor hauls sheets and big items Mrs. Cummins cannot hauler by hand and brings some supplies. Still another neighbor often takes her to church when the weather is good. She can ride the church bus to the Sunday Services, it comes long before Sunday School and makes a long trip which is tiresome. So she welcomes a ride straight to church services and home again. Since her children all live some distance away, if she needs to go somewhere she must ask some to take her or hire someone. This is one situation she hates but must accept.

The recent more severe winters have been especially difficult because her water pipes freeze and stay frozen for long periods of time. The way the pipes were built and the location of the pipes underneath the house make it almost impossible to insulate them. She said she paid some a large sum of money to cap the pipes for last year and only to find out when the temperatures dropped that he

had froze only one pipe. The rest froze again. Mrs. Cummins does not get out in winter and feels like this may be the reason why she has not had a cold in three winters.

Like many others, Mrs. Cummins faces the continued rising cost of living on a fixed income. Her home with fuel oil which is one expense that has more than doubled in recent years.

Mrs. Cummins who weighs only 80 lbs. says that she once weighed a whopping 90 lbs. She enjoys cooking and eats three hot meals a day. The only short-cut she takes is to leave off baking breads. It is hard to make enough for just one person and bread is on thing she doesn't like warmed up. When the Senior Citizens Program brings her bread, it is usually past her regular lunch time and so it makes a perfect warmed up supper meal.

Recently Mrs. Cummins looked at the apartments and indicated they were more to her liking than she had expected they would be. But she was still unsure about the move as they

she applied for the apartment, she asked if she would be required to take it if she chose not to. Her mind. She of course is not.

If Mrs. Cummins qualifies for this housing and takes it, she leaves many of her current and sometimes overwhelming problems behind. She will live in an evenly heated, well lighted apartment with no frozen pipes and no yard work to hire done. She will be living alone yet very close to family, who will share her interests and needs. She will be paying one bill for rent and utilities which hopefully will be less than she is now paying for utilities. There will be easy access to laundry facilities and will be much closer to town.

But the trauma of moving is what Mrs. Cummins fears, of being uprooted after so many years and, after the move, of possibly being unhappy. But she has sprunk and right now she thinks the move is in order. What to do about her house, what belongings to take with her and what to do with the rest, and just how she's going to do it all seems to be her next concern.

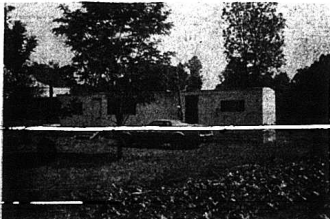



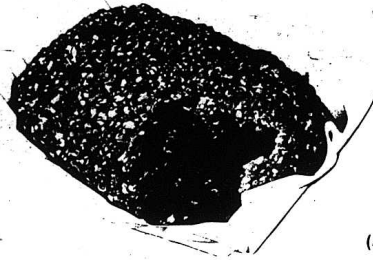

Marriage and Divorce

A reader asks that I write on this subject. Marriage is ordained of God for man's good and happiness. When all pertaining to this relationship is in harmony with God's wisdom, happiness and well being will be the result. When man ignores God's will, he is bound for misery, heartache and sin. Divorce anything but happy. It is the end of a series of mistakes and the result is sin.

Reams have been written, myriads of sermons have been preached and many debates have been held in order to determine the scripturalness of divorce and remarriage. I know of but three classes people that can marry: (1) One who has never been married; (2) One whose mate is dead (Rom. 7:1-4); (3) One whose mate has been put away for fornication (Matt. 19:9). This is God's will and when His will is violated, there is sin. All the sophistry in the world cannot set it aside, no matter how badly human wisdom and desires wish it otherwise.

God's law of marriage is universal and not just for "God's convenanted people." Marriage began in Eden, not on Pentecost. "From the beginning" it was so (Matt. 19:1-9). God decreed one man for one woman for life. Part of the reason "God gave them up" (Rom. 1:24,26,28) was because Adam's race changed the natural use of a woman to that which was against nature (Rom. 1:26). God created woman to be a help sufficient for man in marriage, not just a tool for his lustful desires. Sex is meant to be an expression of love and devotion between two people who have vowed to be one, to

blend their lives in every way. Divorce results when those involved fail to follow God's wisdom. The husband is commanded to love (as) his wife. This commanded love is outgoing concern for the welfare of his wife. In it, there is little room for self. The man who will love his wife as God directs will be more concerned with his wife's happiness than his own. Women are to be taught to love (philos) their husbands (Titus 2:4). Friction in marriage begins when one becomes more interested in self than in one's mate. Becoming self-serving, we begin to neglect; neglect generates frustration and resentment. The couple begins to drift apart. Each begins to "make a life" without the other and soon they have little in common. Perhaps one of them finds someone else in whom they find "understanding," and the divorce is well on its way.

Sometimes, divorce has its beginnings when an immature, self-centered person marries. One who is empiric (all for self) lives out his own desires, and when things do not go as he wants them, he'll do what best serves him. He really cares nothing for the sanctity of marriage. This self-centeredness engenders lust and leads to adultery, and adultery corrupts the union that God has made. God hates putting away - not just the putting away, but all that's involved in it. Putting away results from unrighteous attitudes and acts. God hates injustice, selfishness, lust, pride, anger, all of the sinful things involved in putting away. This is unrighteous, and no Christian can be involved.

Fishing Report

In spite of windy unsettled weekend weather, anglers at Kentucky's 15 largest lakes experienced generally fair results. The lake-by-lake rundown, as reported by conservation officers at each lake:-

Kentucky: Catfish fair to good on worms and cut bait along rip rap and rocky shoreline. Bass fair. Crayfish runners and by still fishing crayfish in coves and off rocky points; in tailwaters, catfish excellent; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 75 degrees. Over activity light because of high winds.

Barkley: Crappie fair over submerged cover and drop offs; black bass fair on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers along shoreline cover; in tailwaters, white bass and bluegill fair; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 75 degrees. Little fishing activity because of high winds.

Cumberland: Crappie fair drift fishing in coves during the day and by night fishing; bluegill fair to good in coves and off steep banks; in tailwaters, trout crappie, and walleye fair; clear, stable at two feet below timberline and 72 degrees.

Dale Hollow: White bass good night fishing over river channels; bluegill good off deep banks; clear, stable at normal pool and 74 degrees.

Laurel: Trout good night fishing off deep banks; bluegill good around stick ups; clear, stable at four feet below power pool and 77 degrees.

Cave Run: Musky fair trolling medium to deep runners and artificial nightcrawlers off points; crappie and bluegill slow off deep banks; in tailwaters, drum good; clear to murky, stable 5 feet below summer pool and 78 degrees.

Grayson: Bluegill fair in coves; crappie slow over submerged cover; clear, stable at summer pool and 78 degrees.

LEXINGTON—What's this? The Southeastern Conference basketball coaches want to drop the post season tournament? Yes they do. They voted unanimously to junk the whole thing after just two years. All the coaches can do is recommend. The university presidents and athletics directors will make the final decision at the next S.E.C. meeting in December.

The S.E.C. stated a tournament up until 1952. It was halted after that year until the renewal in 1979. There will be another S.E.C. Tournament next March but if the school administrators agree with the coaches, that will be the last one.

Ironically, one of the coaches to plead the case for dropping the tournament was Dale Brown of L.S.U. Dale was one of the strongest supporters of starting up the tournament again. What changed his mind? Coach Brown gave the group two reasons for changing his mind. One, the tournament takes too much out of a team to go on and do well in the N.C.A.A. Tournament. Two, the players miss a whole week of class in addition to the school days missed during the regular season.

The attitude of the conference coaches toward the tournament is a complete reversal from just a few seasons ago. Kentucky's Joe B. Hall and Alabama's C.M. Newton were the only ones opposed to it. Now the group is unanimous in favor of dropping it.

Frankly, other than producing revenue at the end of the season, the tournament just never did make much sense. The Southeastern Conference plays a round robin schedule. Every team plays every other team twice each season. There can't be any better way to determine the team best qualified to represent the league in the N.C.A.A. Tournament. In the two tournaments held since the S.E.C. meet has been renewed, the regular season champion has failed to win the tournament both times. The coaches have tried it twice now and they realize it isn't working. When something is bad, get rid of it.

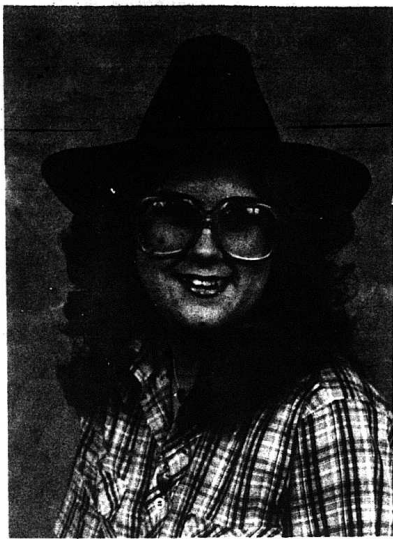

At dawn, as the rest of the world begins to wake up, these nocturnal anglers are back at the dock, busy with their fishing knives. Chances are they have been more successful than their daytime counterparts and know that fishing at night is worth losing sleep over.

White bass and crappie anglers who use lanterns are, in effect, attracting an entire food chain around their anchored boat. The light from the lanterns attracts plankton (in the water, these small plants and animals look something like swirling comets). The plankton attracts shad and other bait fish, which in turn lures hungry sport fish to the scene.

The fisherman, with several baited lines over the side, waits for this natural process to work itself out. Sometimes almost the entire night will pass with little activity, then the white bass will suddenly get fast and furious.

Minnows are the favorite bait for this type of fishing and the anglers experiment with different depths to find out how deep the fish are running. In addition to rods, reels, hooks and bait, about the only other equipment required is extra lantern fuel, warm jackets (it gets chilly on the lake, even in summer) and plenty of coffee.

Fishermen at Laurel Lake, near Corbin, use similar techniques but fish with "organic" baits - worms, cheese or corn - for rainbow trout. During the summer months, night fishing is the most productive way to take trout at Laurel.

On lakes with clear water and a lot of daytime activity, largemouth bass usually "hole up" during the day. But they become active after dark, move into shallow water and do most of their feeding then. They will strike readily on just about anything from topwater lures to plastic worms, although most night bass fishermen like a lead surface lure, one that makes enough noise to allow the bass to home in on it by sound alone. Black is by far the most popular lure color for night fishing.

Experienced night fisher-

men usually like dark nights - the darker the better. Heavy tackle is required, because it is often necessary to cast toward a shoreline that is barely visible, so jerking lures out of trees or bushes is a regular part of night casting.

It is important to move quietly and show as little light as possible, since the fish in shallow water will be spooky. And remember that bass won't be active all night long - activity, like it does during the day, will come in spurts. But feeding periods are usually longer and more intense at night.

White bass have finished spawning now, and several lakes are reporting good mixed catches of white bass and crappie. Night largemouth fishing should be getting good around now and will get better as the summer progresses.

So if your daytime trips aren't as productive as you'd like, try sleeping during the day and fishing all night.

Bullen Reports on Forest Fires

The Kentucky Division of Forestry Office in Pineville has compiled the figures for forest fire damage this Spring Fire Season, which ended May 31. According to Rockcastle County Ranger Steve Bullen, 183 forest fires burned 4,090 acres and 97 other fires burned 483 acres in the 10-county Southeastern District. Of this District total, Rockcastle County suffered 38 forest fires, burning 300 acres.

Since the woods have greened up, the damage caused by these fires may not be obvious at first glance and the most serious effects may not show up for several years. However, young seedlings and saplings, which would have been the future forest are often killed and larger trees have fire scars which will soon cause the base of the tree to rot. Eventually the lower log, which is the most valuable part of the tree, will become completely worthless and often the entire tree becomes worthless. In addition to timber damage, these fires often threaten, and sometimes destroy improvements such as fences, barns, houses and other buildings.

"Although the amount of tax dollars to suppress the fires can be calculated, it is next to impossible to calculate the total loss from forest fires," says Mr. Bullen, "and the really tragic thing is that over 95% of these fires are man-caused and could have been prevented."

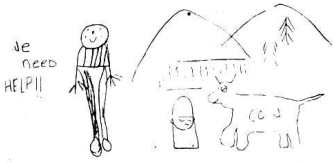

Legislature Creates Dept. of Tourism



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EXTENSION HOME ECONOMICS

FOOD PRESERVATION

Equipment Check. A few early birds have already been putting up peas, asparagus and greens, but for most of us the food-preservation season is still just around the corner.

Is your home-canning equipment in good shape and ready to go? Check your water bath canner for leaks, be sure it has a rack and tight-fitting lid. Remember that enameled water bath canners do chip, then can rust out in the chipped place and spring a leak. So do handle with care!

Examine the gasket on your pressure canner and replace this rubber ring if it is starting to crack or has stretched out of fit. It's important for it to fit snugly so that no steam escapes to lower the pressure while you're processing food.

Test Pressure Gauge. If your pressure canner has a dial gauge, have it tested for accuracy at the County Extension Office. You should have it tested at the start of every food preservation season. Take in the whole top of the canner to do this. If the gauge is off 5 pounds or more, buy a new gauge. If it is off 4 pounds or less, you can compensate for the difference by processing your food at that much higher or lower a reading. For instance, if the gauge reads 1 pound high, process food at 11 pounds.

A weighted pressure gauge does not need to be tested periodically.

Jars and Lids. We don't anticipate a shortage of either jars or lids this year, but it's still a good idea to estimate the supply you'll need and buy some of it ahead of time as these appear in the stores.

Other Useful Items. A colander, blancher, jar funnel, jar lifter and tongs are hard to do without. They'll make your job both easier and safer. You should also have several large kettles, vegetable brush, sharp paring knife, measuring cups, dish towels and dish cloths, labels and a marking pen.

Freezer Check. Now would be a good time to defrost and clean out your freezer, and to make sure it is running as cold as it should - zero degrees or colder. If not, have serviced.

Loss of Nutrients. No matter what food preservation process you use - canning, freezing or drying, you lose some nutrients. But it's a worthwhile trade-off. You swap some nutritional content for a continuous and economical supply of food throughout the year.

In Freezing. Steam blanching retains more of the vitamins and minerals than does water blanching, in which some of these are lost in the water. And blanching actually stops the enzyme action that would otherwise cause further loss of vitamins during freezer storage.

Freezing loss occurs in properly-processed fruits and vegetables stored at zero degrees F. or lower. However, losses in vitamins and minerals will occur if frozen foods are stored at temperature of 15 degrees F. or higher. For example, half of the original vitamin C in asparagus, peas, and lima beans will be lost during storage at 15 degrees F. for 6 months.

In Canning. Heat processing leads to some breakdown in vitamins, but not in minerals. Heat processing also has some positive effects. By destroying anti-digestive factors, it makes the protein and carbohydrates in peas and beans more usable by our bodies.

In Drying. When fruits are given a sulfur treatment before drying, it helps to decrease the loss of vitamins A and C, as well as to preserve color and flavor. And steam blanching is the preferred blanching method for vegetables to be dried.

To save nutrients when you reconstitute dried fruits and vegetables, cook them in the same water in which they were soaked. Minerals, and also many vitamins, are water-soluble.

In Cooking. Actually, the largest nutrient loss occurs during "normal" home cooking, regardless of the food preservation method that has been used. For instance, a bowl of cooked peas will contain from 35 to 45 percent of its original raw vitamin C content, whether the peas were canned, frozen, dried, or fresh from the garden.

This is why nutritive value is so high in fresh fruits and vegetables as possible. And this is why they say to cook fresh vegetables just a few minutes, so they still have a crisp texture and bright color. "Normal" home cooking too often means overcooking.

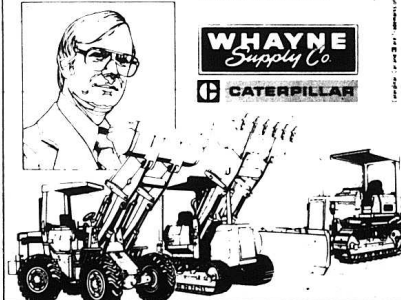

Poetry Workshop

On June 14, a Poetry Workshop will be held in the conference room of the Rockcastle County Library in Mt. Vernon. Sidney and Grover Farr, Berea, are the coordinators for the workshop.

The Appalachian Poetry Project idea was conceived by John Stephenson, Director of the Appalachian Center at the University of Kentucky. The project was funded last October by the West Virginia Commission and Gurney Norman, a writer from Hazard, and an associate professor in the English Department, was named the project director.

The workshop to be held in Mt. Vernon is open and free to the public at no charge. Each participant in the workshop may submit a maximum of five pages of poetry for consideration and possible inclusion in the anthology.

Grover and Sidney Farr extend an invitation to people in the Berea, Richmond, Brodhead, and Mt. Vernon areas to the workshop which will begin at 9:00 a.m. and end at 5:00 p.m. It will be a good idea to get acquainted with other writers in the area.
