### PUBLIC NOTICE OF BLASTING SCHEDULE

Pursuant to 405 KAR 1-090, Ikerd-Bandy Co., Inc., P.O. Box 246, Ferguson, Kentucky, shall conduct blasting operations on its 218 acres surface mine permit near Blue Springs, Ky. in Rockcastle County. The blasting site consists of approximately 160 acres, located north of Sinking Branch. Latitude 37 degrees 16' 20", Longitude 84 degrees 20' 07".

Blasting will be conducted Monday through Saturday between the hours from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. No deviation will be made from this schedule except in emergency situations, where rain, lightning, atmospheric conditions, deteriorated explosives or any circumstances which would endanger the safety of miners or the general public requires unscheduled detonation. This schedule will remain in effect for ninety (90) days after the date of publication. Any major alteration of this blasting schedule will be published.

Ten minutes prior to a detonation, all access roads to the immediate area of the shot will be blocked by company personnel.

Five minutes prior to a detonation, a warning siren of three long blasts will be sounded.

After detonation and inspection of the blast area by the blaster, an "ALL CLEAR" siren consisting of one long blast will be sounded.

All sirens will be audible for a distance of one-half mile from the immediate blast area.

The area where blasting will be conducted is encompassed by permit number 102-0021.

## KET Documentary Examines

### "Rational Suicide" June 16

"I don't think of myself now as killing myself. I feel no desire to kill, or injure or maim. To me, that's the difference between rational and irrational suicide; irrational is neurotically involved with killing..."

These words, spoken by New York artist and psycho-therapist Jo Roman 32 days before carrying out her carefully planned suicide, are the opening words of "Choosing Suicide," premiering Monday, June

16 at 9 p.m. (ET), 8 p.m. (CT) on KET. This one-hour documentary focuses on Roman's determination to end her life with dignity and on her own terms.

Roman believed in planned self-termination and opposed forced prolongation of life upon anyone who wished to end it.

For the last ten years, Roman had intended to end her life sometime in her 70s and was writing a book advocating her thoughts on "rational suicide."

At 63, Roman discovered she had breast cancer and began organizing for an imminent departure.

When the advance of the disease seemed to threaten her ability to finish the book, Roman asked her friend, documentary producer Richard Ellison, to record her ideas and plans on tape. Ellison, in turn, recruited wisdomakers Leah Siegel and Don Blauvelt. Together they taped 19 hours of intimate conversations and confrontations with close friends and relatives, some of whom strongly opposed Roman's intentions.

Jo Roman ended her life exactly as she had envisioned. She wrote farewell letters to 60 friends and an obituary for the New York Times. The last evening was spent in her New York City apartment with her husband, her daughter and close family friend working on her final creation, a coffin-shaped "life sculpture." Then, in the early morning hours of June 10, 1979, 62-year-old Jo Roman washed down 35 sleeping pills with a glass of champagne. Husband, Mel Roman, a professor of psychiatry, was with her in her final moments. "She was," he said, "completely without fear or ambivalence." Immediately following "Choosing Suicide," at 10 p.m. (ET), 9 p.m. (CT), "Choosing Suicide: The Implications" with host, Hugh Downs, examines the issue of rational suicide.

"Choosing Suicide" is a LRE/Video Team Production.

### Fishing

#### Regulations

Three changes in commercial fishing regulations, including an adjustment in commercial trotline gear tag requirements to comply with leg-

islation passed by the 1980 Kentucky General Assembly, have been approved by the state Fish and Wildlife Commission.

In Conformance with the new statute, which becomes effective July 1st, only one gear tag will be required for each commercial trotline instead of one tag for each 100 feet of line (or part thereof). The commission further modified the regulation to include a maximum length of 1,000 feet for all commercial trotlines and added the stipulation that they not be tied together in one continuous line.

For commercial fishermen with special permits to use gill and trammel nets in Kentucky, Barkley and Rough River lakes during the period November 1st through March 31st only, the commission set a 4-1/2 inch bar mesh size maximum, but left the minimum size at 3-1/2 inches.

Formerly there were no maximum bar mesh size limit on the nets used under the special permits. This change, and that concerning the length of commercial trotlines, will become effective as soon as the regulations are processed by the Legislative Research Commission, probably in about 60 days. Fish and Wildlife Commissioner Carl E. Kays said.

In other action, the commission set August 1st as the date for dedication of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources office building now under construction at the Game Farm near Frankfort. The dedication will be at 2 p.m., Kays said, and all sportsmen are invited to attend the ceremonies which will include a reception and tour of the new facility.

### Qualifies in First Stage - Receiving Federal Grant Money

Mt. Vernon recently received word that it has been qualified by the Housing and Urban Development Administration (HUD) for money available to communities from Urban Development Acts and Grants (UDAG). This money has been available for over a year to communities who have experienced a lag in economic growth as compared to other parts of the nation.

Becoming qualified, as Mt. Vernon has, in this preliminary planning process is the first of two milestones the city must pass. It makes the community a serious contender for federal money which is not handed out upon request but is received only after much tedious and paperwork.

Will Linder of Will Linder and Associates of Berea, a consultant and grant writer for municipal and county governments, wrote Mt. Vernon's preliminary application for certification. Mr. Linder, who has helped other communities receive federal grant monies, was invited to the April Mt. Vernon City Council meeting to discuss the possible avenues for development.

## Council Discusses WW Budget; Sets Specifications for New Streets

The 1980-81 budget for Mt. Vernon Waterworks was one of the topics of discussion of Monday night's regular meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council.

The budget, which totals \$250,800, is made up of \$7,800 in earned interest by the waterworks and the remainder in the sale of water and sewer service.

Projected expenditures are as follows:

- Treasurer, \$600; city attorney, \$900; clerk, \$6,000; personnel, fringe and other, \$86,728; health insurance, \$4,200; supplies, equipment and other operating costs, \$52,784; insurance, \$7,400; utilities, \$17,000; depreciation, \$20,000; debt service (bonds), \$65,208 and facilities study, \$10,000.

The council discussed the budget briefly during Monday night's meeting and will vote on its adoption at the July meeting.

In other business, the council voted the following specifications into effect: Streets that are to be taken into the city for maintenance:

- 16 feet of blacktop; proper drainage ditches, proper size utility tile, 8 inches of drainage grade; 4 inches of blacktop; right of way 50 feet for newly developed sites and recommendation by the street committee before any street is taken over

by the city for maintenance.

The council spent about an hour in executive session discussing police department matters and, when the regular meeting was resumed, Councilman Conrad Parrett made a motion to reinstate Police Chief Larry Williams with a 10-day suspension without pay and then a probation period of 10 days.

Councilman Ernest Stanley seconded the motion with Councilmen Bob Jasper and Tom Welch voting yes and Councilman Ernie Tolle abstaining.

Fire Department Chief John Cox was before the council to request the purchase by the council of summer and winter uniforms for members of the fire department at an estimated cost of \$700. The council approved the request.

Councilman Tom Welch then brought a matter before the council concerning the safety hazard which exists at the

intersection of West Main and Williams Streets, primarily to persons pulling onto West Main from Williams.

Welch said that because of parking too near the intersection on the right side of West Main Street, a driver's view was obstructed thus causing the problem.

Mr. Welch made a motion that a yellow line be painted on the curb on West Main Street for a distance of 30 feet to allow for a better view of West Main. However, the motion died for lack of a second.

## Old Stage Coach Stop at Lone Oak Dates to Early Eighteen Hundreds

Rockcastle County has what is one of the few, if not the only, still standing Stage Coach Stop. It sits on land which was originally owned by Stevens and Gilbert, according to present owner, Wally Phillips.

They "took up" the land (possibly as much as 6,000 acres) according to government stipulations of the time. Later it was traded or sold to "Devil Bill" Adams, a local man who owned 75 slaves, a great many for a man living in the hills. Ownership later fell to J.T. Ballard from whom the Phillips bought the property over 60 years ago.

According to Mr. Phillips' knowledge of the history of the place, a Mr. Millon from Berea was at one time proprietor of the tavern although it is not believed he owned the property surrounding it.

The old tavern is located about 13 miles from Livingston on 1955 in the Lone Oak section of the county. Directly in front of the house ran what is commonly referred to as the Old State Road, once kept up by money collected from toll gates at various points. Local men were employed to do work on the road. (Charles Phillips, Wally's father, worked in this capacity after he returned from the Civil War). This was the first major road through Kentucky. It began north in Cincinnati, Ohio and ran south to Cumberland Gap, Tenn. It crossed the

Kentucky River at Clay's Ferry, came through Big Hill in Jackson County, through the southeastern edge of Rockcastle County and crossed the Rockcastle River at Cruse's Ferry.

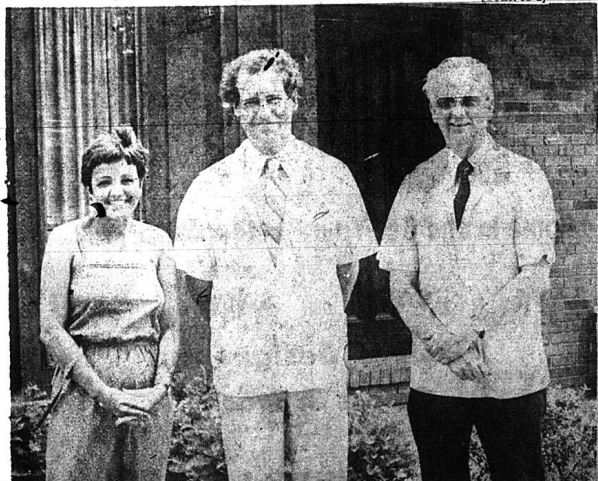
The tavern served as a rest stop for stage coach travelers, serving meals and providing rooms to rest or sleep while repairs were being made or horses were changed. It also provided lodgings for drovers who needed to stop and house their animals for the night. Provisions were made on the grounds to take care of the animals. Of course, people riding through on horseback found it inviting to take shelter and meals here. One such famous traveler was General U.S.

Grant who rode through during the Civil War, stopped and ate dinner. John Rose, Mr. Phillips' grandfather fed and took care of his horse during the stop.

Possibly because women and children were often guests, strong drinks were not sold here but across the road was a saloon where they could be bought. This log structure was moved by John Lair to the area close to the Saltpetre Cave some years ago and was later destroyed by fire.

The old house has 2 fireplaces with huge stone chimneys at each end, one which bears the date 1808. Mr. Phillips believes it was actually built before that. The house, instead, logs are now covered outside

### Legislative Report

By: Rep. Harold DeMareus

The 1980 General Assembly enacted several measures that should help Kentucky's agricultural products maintain their accustomed reputation for high quality. Also, some agricultural controls being regulated by state government have been amended to remove a portion of the bureaucratic burden being heaped upon our farmers.

House Bill 472, will prohibit the sale of tobacco seed unless it has been certified by the Kentucky Seed Improvement Association or by an out-of-state agency with standards no less than those of the Kentucky agency. Also, this bill removes the prohibition for sale of tobacco seed having been grown in one year and mixed with seed grown in a different year.

House Bill 568, will include purebred red-poll cattle among those purebred cattle that are eligible for state funding for promotional shows and sales.

### FOOD PRESERVATION

**What Freezer Containers Are Best?** Use only those made for frozen food storage: rigid plastic containers, heavy weight plastic freezer bags, freezer jars and specially-treated paper for wrapping meats, fish and poultry.

Cold air is dry. It will cause stored foods to dry out and get "freezer burn" if the moisture is not held in with the proper freezer wrap. Freezer burn causes food quality and flavor to deteriorate.

Rigid plastic freezer containers are probably best for packaging juicy foods and they can be used year after year. Freezer jars are good, too, but they don't stack as easily. Protect freezer bags with the re-usable cardboard cartons made to go with them.

**Can You Use Other Food Cartons?** No, not by themselves. Cottage cheese, ice cream, sour cream and yogurt cartons do make satisfactory outer containers for frozen foods in plastic freezer bags. However, they are hard to stack neatly in the freezer.

**Can You Use Canning Jars?** Yes, but freezer jars are much more satisfactory. Never use ordinary jars. These have not been tempered to withstand sudden severe changes in temperature. They could crack and break in your freezer.

**Blanch Vegetables Before Freezing.** Blanching vegetables with boiling water or steam is the most important step in preparing them for freezing. Red and green peppers are the only vegetables that don't need blanching to keep them from losing food value and flavor in your freezer storage.

Boiling-water blanching is easier, but steam blanching saves more nutrients. Corn tastes better when it has been steam-blanching. Use a minute timer to help you blanch for just

the right amount of time. Then, plunge vegetables into ice water or cold running water for at least as long to cool thoroughly and freeze immediately.

Use fresh water each time you start to process a new vegetable. Blanch no more than 1 pound at a time.

**Check Date on Canning Lids**  
Check the manufacturer's date for your two-piece canning lids and use the oldest ones first. The sealing compound is supposed to be good for several years - unless the lids have been stored too long in too hot a place. If the sealing compound has started to deteriorate, it won't seal your jars properly.

It's really best to buy new lids every year. You can use those old ones on jelly jars after you seal them with paraffin. Or, use them for closures on jars in which you are storing dried foods, or on jars for refrigerator storage of leftovers.

**Buy New Rubber Rings for Canning.** If you're using porcelain-lined zinc caps, or old-style lightning jars with wire balls and glass lids, be sure to buy new sealing rubbers. Used ones will have lost some of their stretch and may not give you a good seal.

gular employees at these sites and are paid the minimum \$3.10 per hour. The local office is in the Department for Human Resources Building.

The CETA program is set up to supplement social security income for persons over 55 years of age.

Rockcastle has 7 persons on this program and they are located in the ASC office, soil conservation, weatherization, city hall and courthouse.

Each worker under this program receives \$3.10 per hour and works 69 hours per month.

The Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) employs 16 persons in Rockcastle County.

These persons must have been out of work for 15 of the last 20 months and the employment period lasts only 18 months for each person hired.

The purpose of the program is to train workers for a permanent job and many do later receive steady employment as a result of this program.

Part of the program involves 8 hours of classes one day a week either to teach a specific skill or to help qualify workers for a high school diploma. Veterans get first priority when filling a vacancy.

These CETA workers are assigned to the ambulance service, county road crew, home health and senior citizens. They receive \$3.30 per hour and local

The Weatherization project has 23 additional CETA workers, hired to insulate homes for winter to help save energy costs.

This program is set up in conjunction with the regular CETA program but has separate headquarters in the old Dinner Bell Building.

with siding and insulate with sheetrock. The place ue logs can be seen is up the stairwells on the inside walls. No nails were used in the staircase. The timbers were placed together for maximum support aided by large pegs and grooves.

Large hand-hewn beams across the ceiling are said to have come from Virginia. These beams can be seen in both large front rooms which once flanked the drive-through-arch where the stage drove to unload on either side. Upstairs, running the length of the two rooms and covering the sheltered drive through, were several guest rooms for passengers. This open area through the building has since been enclosed and made into added living space. Hanging by a brass ring from one of the front doors was reportedly a cedar bugle which was sounded to announce the approach of the stage coach and also possibly announced when meals were ready.

In Indianapolis, Indiana, an old stage coach, which probably traveled this route, is on display. The old 7th Street Coach House there was one end of the line for this route.

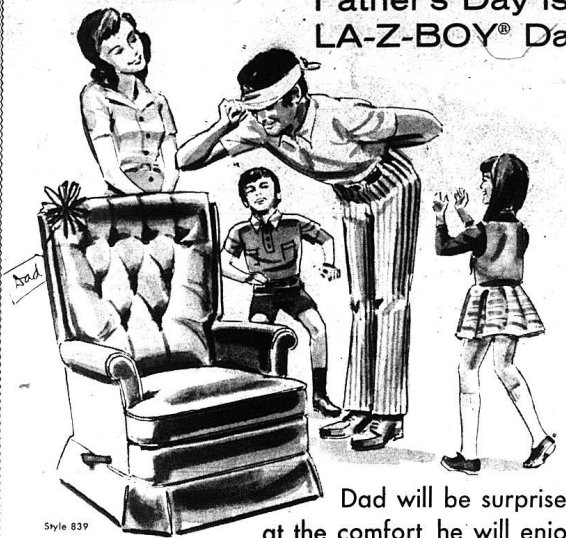

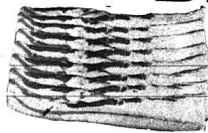

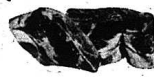

egg dealers and producers to hold referendum to vote on an egg tax (one cent for each fifteen dozen lots of eggs) that would go to research, marketing, extension and education to increase the domestic and foreign consumption of eggs. This bill also reduces from two cents to one cent the inspector fee stamp for each fifteen dozen lot of eggs sold or bought by an egg handler.

House Bill 105, will require the state Department of Agriculture to assemble and maintain a comprehensive directory of foreign investors who own agricultural land in Kentucky.

House Bill 346, will exclude plows and five or more pieces of idle farm machinery from the provisions regulating automobile, vehicle or machinery recyclers. This bill will serve to keep farm machinery setting in a barnyard from being subjected to the laws which regulate junkyards.

Senate Bill 29, will prohibit an "implied warranty" in the sale of cattle, hogs, sheep and horses or poultry unless the seller knowingly sell diseased or sick animals.

Senate Bill 132, will increase the farm truck weight from 30,000 pounds to 38,000 pounds. Further, farm truck weight will be determined on the basis of gross weight rather than axle weight.

Senate Bill 133, will allow farmland owned by a corporation to be assessed at its agricultural value for inheritance tax purposes.

House bill 909, will limit the situations in which an agricultural operation could be declared a public or private nuisance. No agricultural operation could become a nuisance by any changed conditions in or about its locality after it has been in operation for more than one year and when the operation was not a nuisance at the time it began.

Additionally, the legislature appropriated funds to carry out many establishment programs that will be administered by the state Department of Agriculture. For example, \$108,000 was appropriated to the experts and statistics division for the development of new and expanded export markets for Kentucky agricultural products.

The pest and noxious weed division was appropriated \$65,000 for a demonstration project to combat the multiflora rose. This division will assist Kentucky farmers plagued with this weed by spraying with Kermit which helps control the multiflora rose.

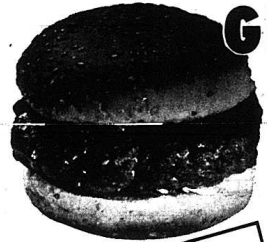

## Fishing Report

With water temperatures in the high 70s, best fishing at most of Kentucky's major lakes is for bluegill, with a few reporting fair to good white bass fishing at night and fair black bass fishing, also at night.

The lake-by-lake rundown, according to the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

**Barren:** Black bass fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers and spinner baits; off points and riprap; white bass good at night under lights with some beginning to show up in the jumps; bluegill good on worms and crickets; clear, stable at summer pool and 78 degrees.

**Nolin:** Black bass fair, some

large ones; on artificial nightcrawlers at night; off rocky points and low during the day; bluegill good; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 78 degrees.

**Barkley:** Black bass fair on artificial nightcrawlers and spinner baits along the shoreline; white bass fair at night; crappie slow over submerged cover and dropoffs; in the tailwaters, bluegill good and catfish and white bass fair; clear, stable at summer pool and 76 degrees.

**Kentucky:** Catfish fair to good on minnows and cut bait off riprap and in inlets and bays; black bass fair on spinner lures, spinner baits, artificial nightcrawlers and crank baits in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, catfish excellent, white bass fair; clear, stable at summer pool and 72 degrees.

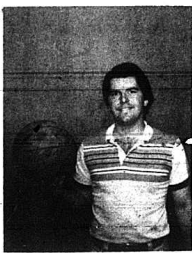
**Dale Hollow:** white bass good at night over river channels; bluegill good off deep banks; clear, falling at normal pool and 78 degrees.

**Cumberland:** Crappie fair and white bass slow at night under lights, 20-25 feet deep, along steep rocky points; bluegill fair off deep banks and in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, trout fair to good; walleye fair on jigs and minnows; clear, stable at 3 feet below the timbering and 78 degrees.

**Rough River:** White bass slow in the jumps; bluegill slow over stickups and dropoffs; black bass slow at night on artificial nightcrawlers; clear, stable at summer pool and 78 degrees.

**Green River:** Black bass fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers and spinner baits; bluegill fair; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 76 degrees.

**Herrington:** Bluegill good drift fishing 3-4 feet deep; catfish and white perch good on crawfish off shallow points; clear, stable at summer pool and 78 degrees.

There are plenty of ways for people to make donations to "good causes." It's time the sponsoring groups took a better look at their product.

Both sponsoring groups blame the newest of Kentucky's all star games for their own demise. That game, pitting an all star team from Kentucky and Indiana against one from the rest of the country, is playing to huge crowds. If those games produce any revenue for "good causes" it's a well kept secret.
