



Fiscal Court Approves Half-Million General and Revenue Sharing Budget

At a called meeting last Friday morning, the Rockcastle County File County Strong Portugation and General Budget for a record amount of \$515,651.00. \$194,660.00 of the total amount appropriated is from Revenue Sharing Funds. At Friday's meeting, Magis-trate Frank DeBorde refused to vote on the motion to approve the budget because he said he requested a copy of the budget at the regult meeting the first of June, so he could look and the budget over and know what he budget over and know what was voting on, and his requ was denied.

However, on a motion by Magistrate Joe Clark, seconded by J.R. "Boone" Cromer, the budget was approved by the

Dudget was approved by the court. The summary analysis of appropriations shows: \$114.462. 32 appropriated for general gov-emment; \$2,000 for hospitals, charities and corrections; \$5,730 for libraries and other educa-tional activities; \$12,427 15 for debt service, general fund and \$83,174,95 for miscelaneous, fations run about the spre as for fiscal year 1975-90 except the miscelaneous, general fund cat-egory for which \$29,776 56 was excludive generaled at fiscal year.

Improvement on al former state maintained roads in the county (this subject will be tourner issues of the Signal) Total appropriations for the general fund are \$217,789.00. Major increases and de-creases in the general govern-ment appropriations include: \$2055 increase in the salary of the county judge/executive to \$17,829.35; a \$3,400 increase in other salaries (presumably for secretarial help in the county judge/executive's office to \$9, 72, a \$2,345 40 increase in mag-istrate's salaries to a total appropriation of \$20,345 as opistrate's salaries to a tota appropriation of \$20,345 as op appropriation of \$20,345 as op-posed to last year's appropria-tion of \$18,000 and a decrease of \$6,055,20 for a secretary in the sherrif's office (no appropria-tion made for this fiscal year). benefits (county contribution) and for unemployment insur-ance. The remainder of this appropriation will presumably be used as emergency funds and transferred where needed.

The big appropriation from the revenue sharing budget is \$51,560.00 for capital construct-\$51,560.00 for capital construct-lon, maintenance or equipment and \$50,000.00 for public trans-portation. \$48,600.00 is budget-ef for healty. \$29,900 for finan-cial administration; \$2,000 for social services for the poor or aged; \$5,000, libraries; and \$500 for public safety. Dy: Nancy Mullins It takes a woman with lot of guts, nerve and ambition to run a successful dairy operation and that describes Fern Browr exactly. Fern lives in the rich Willailla farming section of the county with her husband, James E. "Doc" Brown, They own over 70 acres and raise all the feed for the dairy herd themselves. Be-sides 50 acres of corn and some bay, they also raise peppers and tobacco. For 12 years now. Fern her-

hay, they also raise peppers and tobacco. For 12 years now, Fern has been milking. You might won-der what would motivate a woman to choose milking as a career. The answer is simple, milk is the best income on the farm and she says most people who milk would agree with her. 

The 1980 General Assembly

passed several' resolutions that served to authorize seventeen projects or studies which will be conducted and completed by no later than January of 1982. The purpose of the studies, which will cost in excess of \$377,000 is the Commonwealth. to identify alternativ

the Commonwealth. Huge Concurrent Resolu-tion 4, will establish a special committee to continue the study of nuclear disposal problems within the state. Also, this committee will oversee the de-velopment of plans for shutting down the Maxey Flat nuclear waste disposal site. The esti-anted cost of this project is Somet Lott E-minime for the setter of the set of the setter of the setter of the set of the setter of

Senate Joint Resolution 8. directs the Legislative Research Commission. In conjunction with other state agencies, to study the feasibility of helicop-ter ambulance services in Ken-tuckty. The setimated cost of this research is \$12,000. Senate Resolution 77, at a cost of \$7,000, will study the financial effects of the Mini-mum Foundation Program's un-ti allocation system on our smaller school districts. House Joint Resolution 24, directs the Legislative Research

It minoration system to our Housdoil theorem to be Housdoil Resolution 24, directs a comprehensive study of the Kentucky workmen's compensation program to be conducted by consultants cho-sen by the governor. The legisla-ture appropriated \$150,000 to pay for this study. -House Concurrent Resolu-tion 42, will establish a special solar energy advisory commit-tee to assess Kentucky's poten-tial for solar and other renew-able energies over the next 5 to 00 years. It will cost about \$10,000 a year to fund this committee.

\$10,000 a year to fund this committee. House Concurrent Resolu-tion 78, directs the Legislative. Research Commission to con-duct a study of the use of imported coal by Kentucky elec-

imported coal by Kentucky elec-trical generating, gasification and liquefaction projects. This \$14,000 study will determine if any Kentucky industries are foolishly buying imported coal. House Resolution 120, di-rects the study of the state and federal laws which may be hampering the transportation of coal. This \$7,000 study will address a long-time problem in the state's coal industry.

of coal. This \$7,000 study will address a long-time problem in the state's coal industry. House Concurrent Resolu-tion 105, directs the Legislative Research Commission to study the shared responsibility of the state Department of Transpor-tation in regards to rail safety and planning programs. This \$7,000 study will investigate th all too frequent and dangerous Senate Resolution 78, di-rects the study of the economic impact of Kentucky's prevail-

ing wage law on public building projects. The estimated cost of this project is 314,000. The 1978 General Assembly \$200,000. By virtue of the 17 studies fat a cost of \$377,000, the 1980 General Assembly has reduced the cost of legislative studies by fifty percent. This action is very outmendable, especially con-sidering the current state of Acatucky's economy. Turther, the 1980 studies will address many issues that ong time ago. If the 17 studies produce some alternatives to heave problems, they will be well worth the price.





probably already aware of most of these problems. And, if you of these problems. And, if you are fortunate enough to have permission to fish someone else's pond, you should also know some of the problems the owner faces and even be willing to give a helping hand now and

again - just to show your gratitude for the hours of plea-sant fishing you've experienced at his pond. If the pond is becoming overgrows with cattails, for example, you might volunter a Saturday afternoon to help the pond owner clear them out pond owner clear them out
