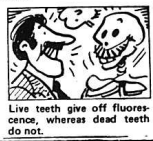

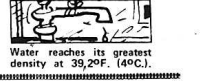

## Fiscal Court Approves Half-Million General and Revenue Sharing Budget

At a called meeting last Friday morning, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court approved the 1980-81 Revenue Sharing and General Budget for a record amount of \$515,651.00. \$194,660.00 of the total amount appropriated is from Revenue Sharing Funds.

At Friday's meeting, Magistrate Frank DeBorde refused to vote on the motion to approve the budget because he said he requested a copy of the budget at the regular meeting the first of June, so he could look and the budget over and know what he was voting on, and his request was denied.

However, on a motion by Magistrate Joe Clark, seconded by J.R. "Boone" Cromer, the budget was approved by the court.

The summary analysis of appropriations shows: \$114,462.32 appropriated for general government; \$2,000 for hospitals, charities and corrections; \$5,720 for libraries and other educational activities; \$12,427.75 for debt service; general fund and \$83,178.93 for miscellaneous, general fund. All these appropriations run about the same as for fiscal year 1979-80 except the miscellaneous, general fund category for which \$29,776.96 was actually expended last fiscal year.

Other appropriations from the general fund include: Highways: \$65,690.00 and other funds (health dept., library, soil conservation, agriculture extension and timber), \$37,512.00.

The highway appropriation does not include \$287,661 the county will receive from the state to be used for upkeep and improvement on all former state maintained roads in the county (this subject will be covered in greater detail in future issues of the Signal).

Total appropriations for the general fund are \$217,789.00.

Major increases and decreases in the general government appropriations include: \$2,055 increase in the salary of the county judge/executive to \$17,829.35; a \$3,400 increase in other salaries (presumably for secretarial help in the county judge/executive's office) to \$9,672; a \$2,345.40 increase in magistrate's salaries to a total appropriation of \$20,345 as opposed to last year's appropriation of \$18,000 and a decrease of \$6,055.20 for a secretary in the sheriff's office (no appropriation made for this fiscal year).

The miscellaneous appropriation of \$83,178.93 includes \$28,500 in appropriations for social security and retirement

benefits (county contribution) and for unemployment insurance. The remainder of this appropriation will presumably be used as emergency funds and transferred where needed.

The big appropriation from the revenue sharing budget is \$51,560.00 for capital construction, maintenance or equipment and \$50,000.00 for public transportation. \$48,600.00 is budgeted for health; \$29,900 for financial administration; \$9,000 for social services for the poor or aged; \$5,000 libraries; and \$800 for public safety.

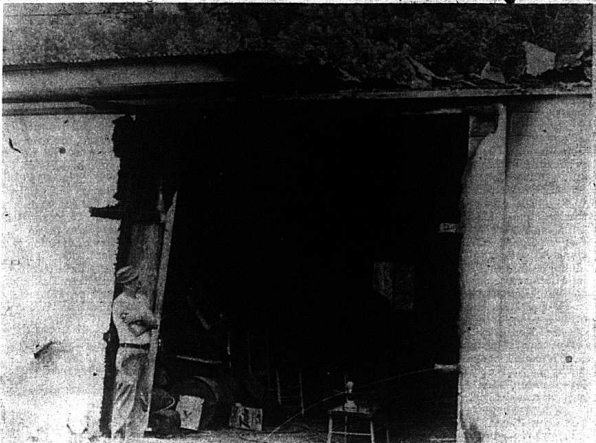
The revenue sharing budget breaks down as follows:

\$600, dispatcher; \$50,000, road maintenance (materials and supplies); \$45,000, garbage disposal; \$3,600, dog warden; \$5,000 library; \$4,000, social services; \$5,000 senior citizens program; \$2,000, social security, retirement, etc.; \$1,000, materials and supplies for financial administration; \$3,900, salaries

and wages; \$14,000, courthouse utilities; \$9,000 fairground utilities; \$9,000 fairground utilities and miscellaneous expense; \$6,000, courthouse repairs; \$3,000, ambulance insurance; \$21,560, ambulance miscellaneous expense; \$7,000 Rockcastle Industrial Development Authority interest and \$14,000, ambulance building.

As sources of income, in addition to the revenue sharing funds, the county expects to receive:

\$155,951 from tax levies; \$1,500, delinquent tax receipts; \$65,000, truck license distribution; \$22,104, base court revenue or courthouse rental; \$500, interest on deposits; \$678, occupational license; \$1,190, election expense refund; \$690, motor vehicle operator's licenses; \$4,000, property transfer tax; \$8,307, rent; \$8,900, jail purpose. The budget also includes a \$40,000 surplus from previous year.

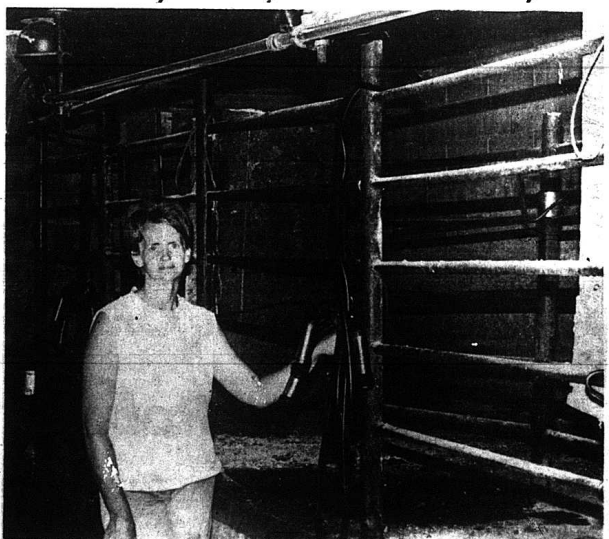
## This Rockcastle County Dairy Farmer is a Lady

It takes a woman with lot of guts, nerve and ambition to run a successful dairy operator and that describes Fern Brown exactly. Fern lives in the rich Willilla farming section of the county with her husband, James E. "Doc" Brown. They own over 70 acres and raise all the feed for the dairy herd themselves. Besides 50 acres of corn and some hay, they also raise peppers and tobacco.

For 12 years now, Fern has been milking. You might wonder what would motivate a woman to choose milking as a career. The answer is simple, milk is the best income on the farm and she says most people who milk would agree with her. Besides the fact that Fern obviously enjoys milking, she finds that she can get up early (6 to 7 a.m.), work for about two and a half hours, have her day free by 9 a.m., work for about an hour and a half in the later afternoon or early evening and have her nights free. For a total of four hours a day, she can not only be her own boss, but makes more money than she could ever dream of making by working all day away from home. She admits the drawback is that it is confining, yet she and her husband find time to play golf and bowl on a regular basis.

The Browns are milking about 25 cows right now out of their herd of 38. All but one, a

### Legislative Report

By: Rep. Harold DeMarcus

The 1980 General Assembly

passed several resolutions that served to authorize seventeen projects or studies which will be conducted and completed by no later than January of 1982. The purpose of the studies, which will cost in excess of \$377,000 is to identify alternatives and solutions to problems that plague the Commonwealth.

House Concurrent Resolution 4, will establish a special committee to continue the study of nuclear disposal problems within the state. Also, this committee will oversee the development of plans for shutting down the Maxey Flats nuclear waste disposal site. The estimated cost of this project is \$5,000.

Senate Joint Resolution 8, directs the Legislative Research Commission, in conjunction with other state agencies, to study the feasibility of helicopter ambulance services in Kentucky. The estimated cost of this research is \$12,000.

Senate Resolution 97, at a cost of \$7,000, will study the financial effects of the Minimum Foundation Program's unit allocation system on our smaller school districts.

House Joint Resolution 24, directs a comprehensive study of the Kentucky workmen's compensation program to be conducted by consultants chosen by the governor. The legislature appropriated \$150,000 to pay for this study.

House Concurrent Resolution 49, will establish a special solar energy advisory committee to assess Kentucky's potential for solar and other renewable energies over the next 5 to 10 years. It will cost about \$10,000 a year to fund this committee.

House Concurrent Resolution 78, directs the Legislative Research Commission to conduct a study of the use of imported coal by Kentucky electrical generating, gasification and liquefaction projects. This \$14,000 study will determine if any Kentucky industries are foolishly buying imported coal.

House Resolution 120, directs the study of the state and federal laws which may be hampering the transportation of coal. This \$7,000 study will address a long-time problem in the state's coal industry.

House Concurrent Resolution 105, directs the Legislative Research Commission to study the shared responsibility of the Railroad Commission and the state Department of Transportation in regards to rail safety and planning programs. This \$7,000 study will investigate the all too frequent and dangerous train derailments in Kentucky.

Senate Resolution 78, directs the study of the economic impact of Kentucky's prevail-

ing wage law on public building projects. The estimated cost of this project is \$14,000.

The 1978 General Assembly approved 33 studies at a cost of \$80,000.

By virtue of the 17 studies at a cost of \$377,000, the 1980 General Assembly has reduced the cost of legislative studies by fifty percent. This action is very commendable, especially considering the current state of Kentucky's economy.

Further, the 1980 studies will address many issues that should have been confronted a long time ago. If the 17 studies produce some alternatives to these problems, they will be well worth the price.

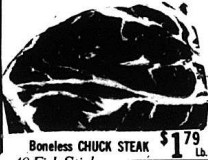

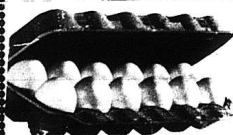

As the sealing compound can still be trusted to do its job. The screw band must be firmly tight before the jar of food is processed, and should never be further tightened after processing.

As the food in the jar heats up during processing in the boiling water bath or steam pressure canner, the heated air in the headspace above the food expands and is gently expelled under the lid (which is not yet tight enough to prevent this venting).

3-Way Test for Seal-As the food in the jar cools after processing, the vacuum forms, pulling the center of the lid down and forming a tight seal. When the jar seals, you can hear it, you can see it, and you can feel it.

If you're right there when the lid seals, you can hear the "click". If you're out of the room when it happens, tap the lid with a spoon when the jar is

cold. A clear ringing sound means a seal. If food is touching the jar lid, the sound will be dull, but it won't sound like the tapping on an unsealed jar lid.

You can see a tight seal because the lid is curved down. You can feel a tight seal because the center of the lid is down when you press it and will not

How Jar Lids Seal-The two-piece lids most home canners use self-seal when a vacuum forms during the cooling of the contents of the jar after processing.

In order for this to happen, the top edge of the jar must have no nicks or imperfections. It must be clean, and it must be free of any bits of food. The lid must be unused and new enough

## County To Receive \$774 In Coal Severance Monies

Governor John Y. Brown, Jr. today handed out checks totaling \$2.4 million to judge executives from 68 counties (including Rockcastle) across Kentucky.

The money is from coal severance tax funds and is earmarked for maintenance and improvements on county roads in the eligible counties.

The funds are part of the

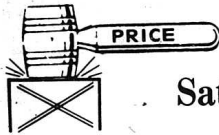
1980 General Assembly's \$4.5 million appropriation to the energy road fund and a \$1.5 million coal impact fund.

The judges and their county fiscal courts will be responsible for selecting roads that will receive attention with the severance funds.

Brown's proposal approved by the 1980 General Assembly specified that 40 percent of the severance allocation be spent on county roads and the remaining 60 percent on the state highway

system in the coal counties.

Under the energy road fund, 46 counties will receive a total of \$1.8 million. Approximately \$60,000 will go to coal impact counties (Rockcastle not included).

Brown said the funds are the first in his overall effort to give local officials a freer hand in managing their own affairs with revenue generated at the grass roots level.

A second phase of the program will go into effect July 1 when county road allotments to each county will increase approximately 50 percent, Brown said.

"The determination as to where and how the county road aid dollars will be spent rests with the county fiscal courts where local decisions rightly belong," Brown said.

The increased county road aid allotments resulted from another Brown proposal, House Bill 973, which altered the state's gasoline sales tax rate. Under the energy road fund

allocations, Rockcastle County will receive \$704.40 as opposed to the top allocation to Pike County of \$256,602.00 and the lowest allocation to Clinton County of \$88.

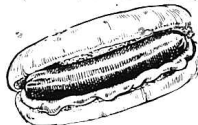

The cows soon pay for themselves, but the big setback comes if you happen to lose one. Recently, they have lost two. The calves produced by the herd are raised on the halves by a boy in Somerset. This works out well for the Browns since they are too busy to bucket feed that many calves. The calves, which take over two years to start producing milk, offset possible losses within the herd. Recently the Browns have even talked of increasing the size of the herd.

The milking rooms of their dairy were designed and built by the Browns. The only work they hired one was the block laying. One large room has three stalls built upon a platform. The cows are driven into the compartments and fed grain while they are being milked by milkers. After the morning milking, Mrs. Brown sweeps and hoses down the entire area. One interesting feature of her dairy operation warrants special attention. Mrs. Brown breaks the young heifers herself and has found that tying a string around the cow's waist (now if you have a hard time visualizing a cow's waist, it's just in front of the bag), keeps them from kicking while you are attaching the milkers. She said that she had been kicked really hard a few times and for some unexplainable reason, the string helps. She said one of her sons thinks there is more danger of being kicked while tying the string than not.

The other room in the dairy contains the 250 gallon refrigerated storage tank into which the milk is directly pumped through a glass pipe and clear plastic hose. A large sink is used to clean the milkers after each milking. Also, after each milking, water and a special chemical are pumped through the

hoses and pipe to automatically wash them.

Every other day, a big truck from the Carnation Company in Somerset rolls in and collects the 2,000 lbs. of milk stored in the tank. And, to make it all worthwhile, a check arrives periodically in the mail to pay them for the milk purchased.

The Browns have considered upgrading their operation to be classed as a Grade A dairy, but the last estimate was at a cost of \$1,500. They decided they were not dissatisfied with the Grade B price so they have held off. Much of the cost involved work on the spring, which was their water supply at the time. Now they have city water and say they may consider it once again.

move under your finger. If Seals Loosen—Airtight contact between the lid and glass retains the vacuum and keeps outside air from entering the jar and contaminating its contents. If jar seal loosens within a few days, weeks, or months, one of several things could be to blame: a faulty lid (not likely if it's new), insufficient processing time, or spoilage of the food.

In the case where spoilage causes the seal to loosen, it means the food was either incorrectly processed or not enough care was taken in the selection or preparation of the food to be canned.

Remember: can only firm ripe fresh foods and wash them thoroughly first. Over-ripe and bruised foods can produce spoilage in the canned product. Even if you cut out a bruised or spoiled spot in fruits or vegetables, you can miss a soft or soured area around it.

**If Jar Does Not Seal**—If your jar does not seal upon cooling, you can either reprocess the food in another jar with another lid or put it in the refrigerator and use it up within a few days.

**Canning Without Salt**—Is it safe to can without salt? Salt is important when you can pickles or sauerkraut. But you can leave it out in the plain canning of other vegetables, because there it's just used for flavoring.

The one tablespoon of salt recommended for each quart of vegetables is an insufficient amount to preserve the vegetables. However, salt in pickle recipes is an important preserv-

ative ingredient. The high salt level helps to crisp the vegetable tissues and controls bacterial spoilage. That's why you should not reduce the amount of salt or omit it in a pickle recipe. **Canning Without Sugar**—It's safe to can fruits in fruit juice or plain water. However, the fruits may not hold their shape, color and flavor as well as when sugar is added.

You may can fruit without sweetening, using its own juice, extracted juice or water. Sugar is not needed to prevent spoilage.

Most fruits taste fine packed in a very light syrup made from one cup of sugar to three cups of water. Sour cherries, gooseberries and rhubarb need a heavy syrup.

**Don't Change Jelly Recipe**—Sugar is a very necessary ingredient in jelly recipes. Along with pectin and acid, sugar helps to form a jelly. So if you want your jelly to turn out right, don't cut back on the sugar called for in the recipe.

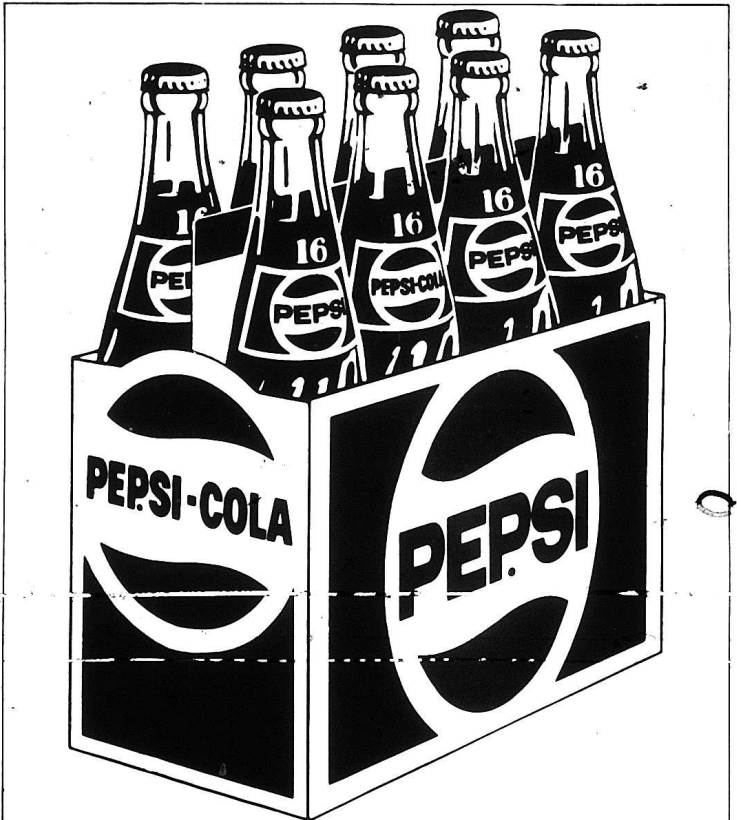
There are some special sugarless jelly and jam recipes made with gelatin or commercial pectin and these are stored in the refrigerator.

It's risky to alter the sugar content to jams, preserves, fruit butters and marmalade, too, because you're apt to end up with a runny product that doesn't keep well.

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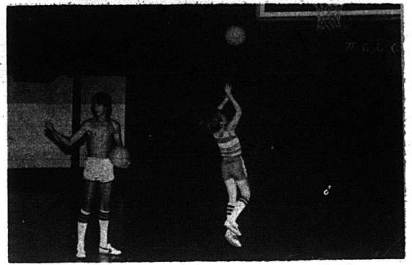

## Fishing Report

Fishing at most Kentucky major lakes can be termed only fair but more white bass are beginning to show up in the jumps. The lake-by-lake rundown, as compiled by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

**Dale Hollow:** White bass fair at night under lights on minnows; bluegill fair off deep banks; walleye slow by trolling deep runners off deep points and banks; clear, falling, at normal pool and 80 degrees.

**Cumberland:** White bass fair in the jumps in late afternoon in the upper lake; white bass and crappie fair to good in the lower lake at night and slow in the upper section; walleye fair by trolling deep runners off steep points and rock walls and casting live nightcrawlers and deep runners at night; trout good in the tailwaters; clear, falling slowly, 6 feet below the timberline and 77 degrees.

**Green:** White bass good in the jumps; bluegill good over submerged cover; clear to murky, stable, at summer pool and 80 degrees.

**Rough:** Black bass fair at night on artificial worms; white bass fair in the jumps on plunker and fly combinations; clear, stable at summer pool and 79 degrees.

**Herrington:** white bass good in the jumps; mixed strings of black bass, catfish and white bass at night on soft crawfish; bluegill good by drift fishing along deep banks; clear, stable at five feet below summer pool and 78 degrees.

**Cave Run:** Bluegill fair off mud banks; black bass slow off deep points on artificial nightcrawlers; musky slow casting inlets and bays in the upper lake and by trolling the main channel with deep runners; clear, stable at summer pool and 79 degrees.

**Laurel:** Bluegill fair over stickups; trout good at night off deep banks; clear, falling slowly in five feet below power pool and 79 degrees.

**Fishtrap:** crappie slow over stickups; clear, stable at summer pool and 79 degrees.

**Buckhorn:** Bluegill excellent off deep banks; white bass fair to good at night off deep walls; in tailwaters, trout good; clear to murky to muddy, stable at two feet below summer pool and 77 degrees.

**Nolin:** Bluegill fair; black bass slow at night on artificial nightcrawlers off points and banks; clear, stable at summer pool and 80 degrees.

**Dewey:** Crappie slow over stickups; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 78 degrees.

**Grayson:** Bluegill fair in inlets and bays; crappie fair over submerged cover, in tailwaters, trout good; clear, stable at summer pool and 80 degrees.

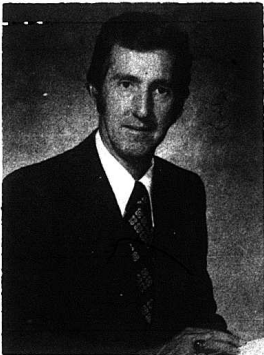

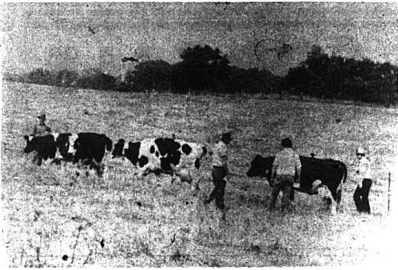

Pfeiffer lists algae, muskrats, rooted aquatic vegetation and oxygen depletion as common troubles. But the most prevalent pond problem is an out-of-balance condition caused by harvesting too many of one kind of fish and not enough of another.

If you own a pond, you're probably already aware of most of these problems. And, if you are fortunate enough to have permission to fish someone else's pond, you should also know some of the problems the owner faces and even be willing to give a helping hand now and

again - just to show your gratitude for the hours of pleasant fishing you've experienced at his pond.

If the pond is becoming overgrown with cattails, for example, you might volunteer a Saturday afternoon to help the pond owner clear them out.

The best way to solve this problem is to wade right into the pond, that is - and pull up the cattails by the roots. On a hot summer day, this kind of "weeding" can be downright refreshing.

Muskrats can cause leaks by burrowing into the pond's dam. If your favorite pond shows signs of muskrat activity, tell

the owner about it and ask him if he'd mind if you steer a trapper to the pond come next trapping season. Or if you're a good shot with a .22, you could volunteer your own services in season, of course. If the damage is severe and immediate attention is required, you can probably get permission from the local conservation officer to rid the pond of muskrats even during the closed furbearer season.

Perhaps the biggest thing you, as an angler, can do to help a pond remain productive is to keep bluegill and release bass. The rule of thumb is that five to seven pounds of bluegill should be removed from the pond for every pound of bass taken out. Pfeiffer says. If this ratio isn't maintained pretty closely, the pond will soon have few bass and too many small, stunted bluegill. When this situation

occurs, renovation (treating the pond to kill all the fish in it) and restocking is generally the best solution.

The department of fish and wildlife offers both technical guidance for farm pond owners and bass, bluegill and channel catfish for stocking. The advice is free, but there is a \$10 handling and processing fee for the fish.

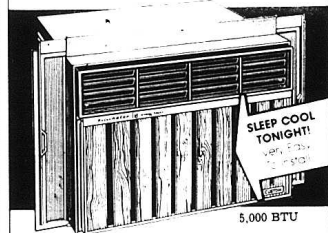

## County Eligible For Procurement Preference

The U.S. Department of Labor has designated forty-one Kentucky counties eligible for federal procurement preference from June 1st, 1980, to May 31st, 1981, because of high unemployment.

Employers located within high unemployment areas of Kentucky are eligible for preference in bidding on federal procurement contracts during the designated period.

The purpose of procurement dollars into areas with the most economic need and high unemployment, said Robert McDonald, the Department for Human Resources' chief labor market analyst.

There have been a total of 1,013 areas throughout the nation designated eligible for the federal procurement preference.

Eligibility for the preference in bidding on federal contracts is determined by an area's unemployment rate for the previous two years, said McDonald. "To be included in the annual listing of eligible areas, an area must have had an unemployment rate of 120 percent of the national average unemployment rate for the previous two years," he said. To be eligible, each of the 41 Kentucky counties matched or exceeded an average unemployment rate of 7.2 percent during the past two years. Most of the counties are in Eastern Ken-

tucky, but a few are in the south central and western regions. Rockcastle County is one of

the counties eligible for federal procurement preference.

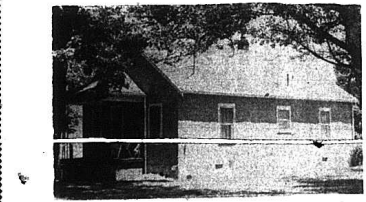
