Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, 100 Vaught Road, Winchester, Kentucky 40391, up to 10:00 a.m. local time at the place of bid opening on August 11, 1980, and opened immediately thereafter. All timber marked or designated for cutting is located on an area of about 1642 acres of which 215 acres have been marked for cutting within the Daniel Boone National Forest, on the drainage of Wolf Creek, Crooked Creek, and Trace Branch, Compartment No. 3127, 3133, 3156, and 3157, Berea Ranger District, Rockcastle County, Kentucky estimated to be 767 MBF of saw timber.

In accordance with the National Forest Management Act of 1976, a bidder qualifying as a small business under the Small Business Act (as amended) and the regulations issued thereunder may elect at the time of sealed bid submission to have the Forest Service construct the included specified roads. If the bidder elects to have the Forest Service construct the included roads, the price paid for the timber shall include the estimated construction cost which is \$45,180.00. The estimate is for construction as if accomplished to the design classes and in accordance with drawings and specifications included in the same contract.

Specified roads, whether constructed by the purchaser or the Forest Service, shall be completed by September 1, 1981.

At advertised rates the applicable purchaser credits are \$18,443.00 with a Purchaser Credit Limit of \$22,838.00. The Forest Service has progressed over \$12,188.00 in cash contribution to partially offset the difference between Purchaser Credit Limit at advertised rates and the maximum Purchaser Credit Limit. 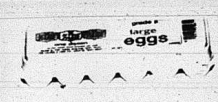

Beginning about 5:30 p.m. and continuing until sometimes 11:30 p.m., people from all parts of this small town make a surge to the streets with a strange and curious symptom-walking. It may be contagious, but I checked with local doctors and found that it is not injurious to youth, health. Alas! I found, after much research and investigation, that it is actually like old Dr. M.M. Feebler's People Remedy. It is "good for" heart, lungs, blood vessels, muscles, fatigue, depression, stress, and other general and specific maladies and complaints of modern day society.

Of course, walkers vary with degree of dedication. Take for instance, two local pioneers in the field, Jim and Martha Cox. They walk every day. They walk with an umbrella when it rains, with long-johns, when it's freezing, and with sustained enthusiasm when it's sweltering. Any and all ages may enjoy this activity with equal poise and pleasure, but with regard to men and women, it seems, more recently, that men are coming to the forefront to be equal part-takers with women in his new venture out into the community on foot. Toted from the easy chair or work by various motivations they observe things they had not noticed whizzing by at 40 miles an hour.

They engage in more meaningful conversation with their partners than "I don't see why you can't stub a check," or "Our yard really needs mowing." Instead the conversation might be as stimulating as, "Get over as far as you can. This one sounds like it's going to run us down," or "Have your mace ready for that mean three legged dog."

It might be noteworthy to mention here that I have observed on many occasions men, unlike women, need support of some kind when walking. Some smoke a pipe. Some chew tobacco. Some walk a dog. Low and behold! Some carry a big stick! I heartily defend their right in this matter.

With soaring gasoline prices and more traffic, will walking perhaps replace the afternoon drive? Most walking couples would agree, it gives a comforting feeling of togetherness and serenity after a sometimes demanding and hectic day. Fiscal Court Now In Control of County Roads With Budget of \$280,000

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court is now the sole administrator of the county road aid program and, effective July 1st, received \$280,000.00 with which to maintain and upgrade 136 miles of county roads.

Mark McDaniels of the Department of Transportation said Tuesday that these funds have, in the past, been turned over to his department after which the fiscal courts in each county would make their recommendations as to which roads, bridges, etc. would be upgraded in that particular year's program. The state engineers would either agree or disagree and then, after a meeting of minds, the state would do the work and charge the county's share of road funds which they were holding.

McDaniels also said that in the larger counties, such as Jefferson and Fayette, the public would never notice the difference but that in smaller counties which did not already have road crews established, the initial expense would be quite heavy. However, Rockcastle County is fortunate in

that it already has 7 dump trucks, 3 graders, a backhoe and an air compressor, in addition to employees to operate all this equipment.

According to a spokesman from County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker's office, additional equipment will be purchased when the budget for the road program is set-up within the next few days. The county also, at their July meeting, hired Paul Hansel as County Road Supervisor. Mr. Hansel's job activities will include keeping tabs on the condition of the roads in the county and reporting to Fiscal Court this information.

A lot of the county judges and fiscal courts have been wanting this new system for some time, McDaniels said, because they felt they could do the same work cheaper and better locally.

No work will be done under this program until at least the first of September because the law requires that 45 days elapse after the public hearing before any money from the program is spent.

At the public hearing held recently, several recommendations were made to the fiscal court concerning roads in the county.

PVA Queried As To Why Assessment Already Listed Over 100% By State

Since last week's article on the increase in real estate assessments in the county, several people have questioned us as to why Rockcastle County has, in the past, been listed as being already assessed at over 100 percent of property valuation.

We put this question to Robert Cromer, Property Valuation Administrator, and he explained that figure in this way.

Mr. Cromer said the law states that property must be assessed at 100 percent of its fair cash value and the Department of Revenue sends an employee to all counties once a week to check recent sales against their assessment in the PVA's office. The difference has resulted from Mr. Cromer said, primarily family sales where one figure is listed as the selling price on the deed but actually the property is assessed for a higher figure.

In last week's article, we also attempted to explain that HB 44 limits the increase which can be collected in tax revenue to 4 percent in 1980 over the

amount in 1979. What we didn't explain was that any new construction, such as homes, motels, etc., are not affected by this 4 percent limit. This new construction is taxed at the same rate (whatever it will be) but is not included in the total assessment figure which will be used to figure the tax rate using the 4 percent limit in increase in revenue.

Mr. Cromer once again reiterated that this year's tax rate on real estate should be at least one-half of last year's rate of about 57 per hundred dollar assessment. If you didn't receive a tax increase, and there were several who didn't, if their assessment was already at the fair cash value, then your tax bill will be considerably lower. If your assessment was doubled then your tax bill should be no higher than last year and may be lower.

Only twelve taxpayers filed for a hearing before the county appeals board which met this week. Eight showed up and there were 5 changes made.

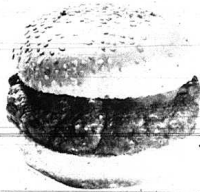

Can or Freeze Berries Shortly After Picking

With this year's bountiful crop of wild and cultivated blackberries, you'll probably want to can some, freeze some, dry some and put some in jams, jellies and preserves.

To get started here are some instructions for canning blackberries by the raw pack method.

If possible, put the berries the same day you pick them. Otherwise, hold them overnight in the refrigerator or over cool place. Sort and wash just before canning.

Canning Blackberries-Wash berries, drain. Fill jars to 1/2 inch of top. For a full pack, shake berries down while filling jars. Cover with boiling syrup. You can make a light syrup with 1 cup of sugar to 3 cups of water. For a medium syrup, use 1 cup of sugar to 2 cups of water.

Leave 1/2 inch headspace, wipe jar rims clean, and adjust lids. Process in boiling-water-bath canner, 10 minutes for pints and 15 minutes for quarts.

As soon as you remove jars from canner, complete seals if necessary.

When jars have cooled completely, check seals. Store jars in a cool, dark, dry place and plan to use them within a year for the best quality and taste.

Freezing Blackberries - When you freeze, blackberries, you have your choice of syrup pack, a sugar pack, or an unsweetened pack.

Use the syrup pack for berries you plan to serve uncanned. Use the sugar pack for the unsweetened pack for berries to be used for pies, cobblers, and other cooked desserts. Use the unsweetened pack for berries to be made into jams and jellies later on.

Use Thin Paraffin Layer to Seal Homemade Jelly - There's a special trick to getting a good paraffin seal on your homemade

Jelly. Pour a single thin coating of paraffin on the hot jelly, then leave it alone until the jelly has set and the paraffin has cooled and hardened.

Don't use this seal for anything other than jelly. All other jams, marmalades and preserves should be processed in a boiling-water-bath canner, using standard half-pint canning jars and regular two-piece canning lids. Open-kettle canning is an approved method for jelly only. That's because processing would cause jelly to get runny, giving an unsatisfactory product.

Here, in more detail, is how to get a good paraffin seal: After making jelly, skim off any foam and pour hot jelly immediately into hot, sterilized glasses or jars. Leave about 1/2 inch at top. Use only enough melted paraffin to make a layer 1/8 inch thick. A single thin layer, which can expand or contract easily, gives a better seal than one thick layer or two thin layers.

Prick any air bubbles in paraffin. Bubbles cause holes as paraffin hardens, and they could prevent a good seal.

Always use new paraffin and melt it in a double boiler, or in a clean tin can over boiling water. Paraffin melted directly over heat can catch fire.
