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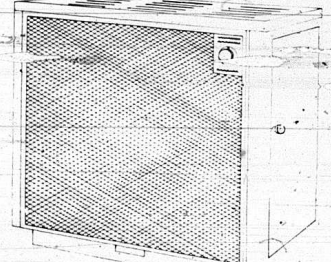

All timber marked or designated for cutting is located on an area of about 1642 acres of which 215 acres have been marked for cutting within the Daniel Boone National Forest, on the drainage of Wolf Creek, Crooked Creek, and Trace Branch, Compartment No. 3127, 3133, 3156, and 3157, Berea Ranger District, Rockcastle County, Kentucky, estimated to be 787 MBF of saw timber.

A warrant has been issued for Ernie Cope for knowingly receiving stolen property, State Police Detective Fred Walton said.

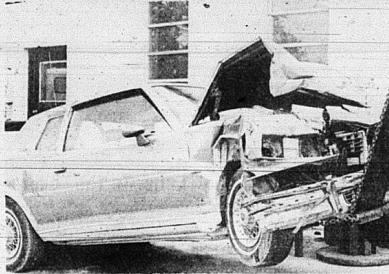

City Council Discusses Pay Raises For Employees at Monday Night's Meeting

Part way through Monday night's meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night, the council became embroiled in a discussion as to how much city and waterworks' employees raises should amount to this year.

The Council had just passed the waterworks and general fund budget and the waterworks budget included a 7 1/2% raise for the men from \$3.53 per hour to \$3.79 and an appropriation for hospitalization insurance for the first time - a cost estimated at approximately \$4,200 per year.

Most of the councilmen were in favor of increasing the men beyond the 7 1/2% provided for in the new budget; however, Mayor Roland Mullins, while expressing his own interest in raising the men's salaries higher, told the council that until the budget could be reworked to provide for additional monies the council should hold off on any firm action.

Mayor Mullins recommended to the council that Water Dept. Superintendent Matt Powell, who is on vacation this month, not attend the meeting, be asked to attend next month's meeting with a recommendation as to what he feels the men's raise should be and then the recommendation could be either approved or disapproved by the council.

Councilman Tom Welch did make a motion that the men's hourly wage be increased to \$4.00 per hour and the city still pay their insurance but Mayor Mullins said he would not recognize that motion unless the council first reworked the budget to provide for the additional money. The mayor expressed his concern to the council that unless the additional costs were covered, the men's raise would be laid off when the monies ran out before next fiscal year.

Mayor Mullins then adjourned the meeting only to have to reconvene it shortly thereafter when it was discovered that the remaining several items on the agenda for disposal.

Prior to the meeting, two public hearings were held. One concerned allocation of the city's municipal road aid monies which the council voted to spend on blacktopping the Poplar Street extension in the Fair-ground Hill area. The allocation amounts to \$5,895.

The council also allocated their \$19,864 from-revenue sharing funds with the big appropriation for the city's going to street improvement, \$5,200 was also allocated for the police car and \$4,246 appropriated by the council for the Renfro Lake Park project. \$2,750 was set aside for equipment depreciation and minor appropriations went the fire department, senior citizens, Cumberland River Mental Health/Mental Retardation Board and for office supplies, printing and postage.

Mr. and Mrs. Sterling Hoskins, formerly of Richmond, were present for the meeting to discuss their employment as operators of the Renfro Valley Boat Dock. It became necessary to hire someone in this capacity after the council was notified earlier this month that Christian Appalachian Project did not intend to renew their lease.

The couple were questioned at length by the council as to their qualifications for operating the dock and the terms of the proposed lease. The council later voted to hire the couple with the city to receive 10% of the net profits, subject to the drawing up of a contract by City Attorney Carl Clontz between Mr. and Mrs. Hoskins and the city.

Mr. Hoskins told the council that he and his wife would clean up the boat dock area and keep it clean and make it a decent, respectable place for

everyone to enjoy. He also said that they would not tolerate anyone on the premises under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

Mr. Hoskins reported that residents along the lake had been complaining that people were swimming in areas other than those designated and were "skinny-dipping." Mr. Hoskins asked the council if anything could be done to stop this practice. The council discussed the matter but did not come up with any solution to the problem.

The council approved payment of a bill to Nash and Stewart for renovation of the water plant in the amount of \$57,187.

Mayor Roland Mullins reported that the city presently has \$200 in their water revenue account and \$9,000 in their depreciation account. The city also has \$54,000 in two certificates of deposit which are not due to mature for some months. Jess Bullock, an officer of the Bank of Mt. Vernon, in a letter to the council, recommended that the remainder of the money needed above the \$19,000 (\$39,187) be borrowed by the council from the Bank of Mt. Vernon at 7 1/2% to be paid back when the certificates (which are earning a higher rate of interest) mature. The council approved this arrangement and

authorized Mayor Mullins to execute the note with the bank.

The Council also voted to paint the curb in front of Taylor Bros. Plumbing located on the corner of West Main and Williams Streets, for a distance of 10 feet from the curb and to also paint the curb on each side of Mrs. Ann Farris' driveway on Richmond Street to allow them some leeway in entering and leaving their driveway.

Dallas Dean, Inc. was the successful low bidder on relocation of the water lines on Hwy. 150. The bids were opened at a call meeting of the council on July 9th and formal acceptance of the bid was made at Monday night's meeting at 7:45. Dallas Dean's bid of \$19,912.25 to a

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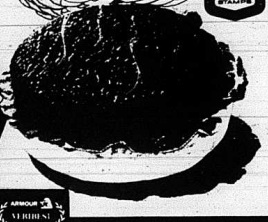

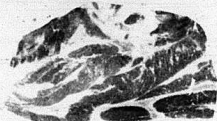

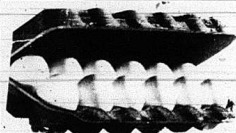

8. They see us go to work even though we do not feel too well, but stay home from church services under the same circumstances.

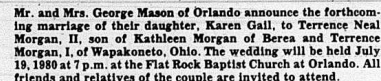
9. They see us avidly study their school work but never pay any attention at all to the homework brought home from Bible class?

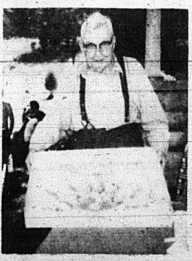

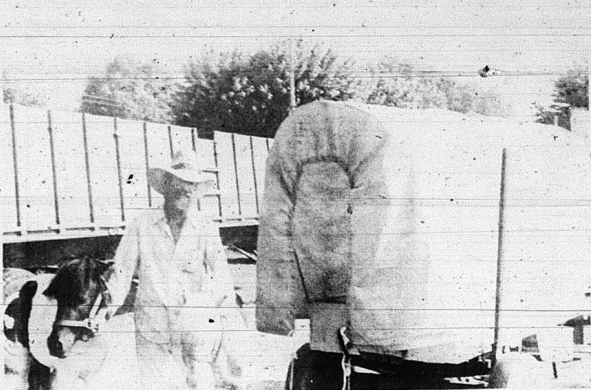

The Great Getaway No. 2

Jim Brooks passed through town this week, riding in a covered wagon pulled by ponies. It's not every day that we see a sight like this, so my curiosity got the best of me and I sidled up, asked him a few dumb questions, and here is what I found out.

Mr. Brooks is taking five years to tour the United States. He is not traveling from coast to coast nor does he do any itinerary other than he does plan to end the trip in Maine. He is presently headed "north" to avoid the heat (he may be a little behind schedule). His journey began last September 5th at Morristown, Tennessee. He spent the winter in the Carolinas where, in Camden, S.C., the temperature dropped to a record-breaking 0 degrees - quite a shock to someone seeking warmer climate and sleeping in a tent.

Mr. Brooks, who is ap-

proaching 50 years of age, is traveling without a cause or product to promote. His purpose is the experience of the unusual trip itself. His experiences are being recorded in a book he is writing and in an article for National Geographic.

To get money for expenses, he stops for a few days and works at odd jobs. Occasionally, he gets a donation. When he came through this county, he was shown hospitality at the E.J. Taylors in Brodhead. They have allowed him to park his wagon and camp on their property and have also provided him with some work.

One main expense is, of course, his food which he prepares himself. (He said that he had only eaten in restaurants on two occasions since the trip began). The other major expense is his ponies. He has had as many as 4 and as few as 1. He began his journey on foot, walking the first 1,240 miles, with ponies carrying the supplies. He

later obtained a two-wheeled cart to carry supplies and he walked alongside. After developing planter warts and losing 50 pounds, he gave up the idea of walking and, in London, resorted to his present rig, a small four-wheeled wagon covered with orange tarpaulin.

One expense he hasn't had is gasoline and to make a point of it, he had a sign attached to the back of his cart, at one time, which read "To ... With Iran's Oil." A sentiment that many have felt in the last year.

Mr. Brooks' home is in New Mexico and when asked how his family felt about his venture, he said that if his mother were twenty years younger, she would have accompanied him. He graduated from the University of Wisconsin with a major in botany and has worked as a free-lance artist, draftsman and truck driver.

Perlina Anderkin submitted the only bid for auditing the general fund account and taxes for the city. Her bid was \$125 for a total of \$250.



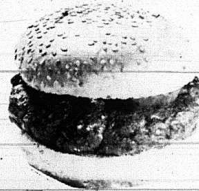

Senior League Wins Little League Loses

Last Monday afternoon both Rockcastle County All-Star teams traveled to London and Monticello to compete in first round action of the district tournament.

The Little League team traveled to London where they played the host team and did not fare so well as they dropped the contest 3-3. However, the game was not as lopsided as the score indicates. Rockcastle's inconsistency in pitching was the main difference as the local pitchers had trouble getting the ball over the plate thus resulting in numerous walks. Also, a few key errors resulted in the big difference in the number of runs.

The Little League, who had had only three and a half hours of practice time prior to the district game, did the best job they could.

It was a different story for the senior league who went to Monticello to play Jackson County and came away with a 16-3 win.

Spencer Benge did an excellent job on the mound and went the entire seven innings.

The Senior League played the winner of the Wayne County-Clinton County game in second round action Wednesday afternoon, but the results were not known in time for inclusion in this week's paper.

Kentucky Afield

During these hot summer days, most of us try to find a cool spot to escape the heat. We don't stir around much, either, unless it's to get up for another cold drink.

So why should we expect fish to act any differently? Fish are cold-blooded and don't react to heat or cold in exactly the same ways warm-blooded creatures do, but they still have definite temperature preferences.

Back in April and May, fish could find suitable water temperatures near the surface. Many species were attracted to shallow water spawning sites, so most anglers had little trouble locating fish.

But now that summer's here, the fish have no reason to stay in shallow water, particularly when there's a delightful layer of cool and dark water of water down 10 feet or so below the surface.

This layer of water, technically known as the thermocline, is where most of the fish will be. If you've got a fishing thermometer, it's fairly easy to locate this layer. Lower the temperature probe into the water and watch the dial. Through the top layer, or epilimnion, the temperature won't vary much more than a degree or two.

Then the temperature will start dropping rapidly - as much as one degree for every additional foot in depth. This is the thermocline (the word means "slope of temperature") where you should be fishing.

But keep lowering the probe. After a few more feet, the temperature will stabilize again and won't decrease much as you go deeper. This is a sign that you've reached the hypolimnion, the third and final layer of water. There is almost no light penetration in this deepest layer, little water circulation and usually not enough oxygen to support fish life.

So it's obvious that you want to keep your lure or bait in the thermocline and out of the hypolimnion. Early in the morning, late in the afternoon or at night, the fish will enter the upper layer to feed, then retreat back to deep water during the heat of the day. That's why early, late or night fishermen do well - easy shallow water techniques are productive then.

It isn't important that you remember the word "hypolimnion," or even be able to pronounce it. The key point to keep in mind during summer fishing trips is that the key to finding fish is often a matter of the proper depth.

This isn't necessarily the same as fishing deep, since in some lakes the "dead" hypolimnion can extend to within 15 feet of the surface - and obviously the fish will have to be above this level.

Almost all lakes in Kentucky stratify into these distinct layers each summer. The big exceptions are Kentucky and Barkley lakes, which are too shallow and have too much

current flow to stratify. Deep, clear lakes like Cumerland will form layers, but often oxygen will exist deep into the hypolimnion because enough light penetrates the depth to allow plant life in the lake to produce oxygen.

But in our other lakes - large and small - fishing in the thermocline is one key to 'full stringers. It won't, in itself, necessarily mean that you'll catch fish, but will guarantee that you'll at least be putting your lure where the fish are and that's a big first step.

Fishing Report

As the heat wave continues over Kentucky, night fishing continues to be the best bet. The lake-by-lake rundown, as reported by fish and wildlife conservation officers at each lake:

Kentucky: White bass slow night fishing over submerged cover along river and creek channels; bluegill slow fishing willow fly hatches with fly rod poppers; in tailwaters, catfish fair to good, sauger slow; clear, falling slowly, 5 feet below summer pool and 86 degrees.

Barkley: Bluegill fair on fly rod poppers near willow fly hatches; black bass fair casting spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers over drop offs and around island shorelines; in tailwaters, catfish and white bass fair; clear, stable at summer pool and 89 degrees.

Barren: Black bass fair at night casting spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off points; bluegill, clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 87 degrees.

Nolin: Bluegill slow along deep banks; black bass slow at night off deep points on artificial nightcrawlers; clear to murky, stable at one foot below pool and 90 degrees.

Rough River: Bluegill slow along deep banks; black bass slow casting artificial nightcrawlers off points at night; clear, stable at summer pool and 90 degrees.

Green: Bluegill slow to fair off deep banks; white bass slow near mayfly hatches; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear, stable at pool and 87 degrees.

Herrington: Catfish and drum fair still fishing crawfish and worms off points; black bass slow at night casting artifi-

cial nightcrawlers off points; clear, stable at summer pool and 88 degrees.

Cumberland: Crappie fair drift fishing in coves (around 35 feet deep); black bass fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers and jig and rind combinations (cont. to 11)

LEXINGTON—I hadn't seen him for three months when he walked into my office the other day. He had on a blue basketball jersey with the letters "U.S.A." across the front, red basketball shorts and a pair of thongs on his feet. He was deeply tanned from the hours on the tennis court, water skiing and golf. I never saw Kyle Macy looking better.

Kyle is spending the summer in Lexington getting ready for his first attempt at professional basketball with the Phoenix Suns. "We go to camp on August the 25th," said Kyle. "I'll go out a few days early, probably around the 20th. I was out there for several days last week from the rookie camp and I thought I did okay. We had around 20 rookies there and they invited six of us back to join the veterans next month." Kyle has no fear of making the team. He has already signed a three year, no-contact contract with the Suns.

Macy is working out on a regular basis to be in top shape for the pro season. "I play basketball three nights a week. I usually play with Jack Givens and James Lee and whoever shows up. I also lift weights three nights a week. I had never lifted a weight in my life when I came to Kentucky four years ago. I think it has helped me tremendously and I weigh about twenty pounds more now than I did then."

He got a couple of awards recently that were just for playing basketball that might be his favorites. "I was really pleased to win the Sullivan Medal from U.K. It's based on leadership and is not an award just for athletes. Winning the Southeastern Conference Athlete of the Year last month meant an awful lot to me. It was based to some degree on athletic ability, but the judges also took into consideration classroom work and extra curricular activities in making the award. The fact that I won over a world record holder and a quarterback who had led a team to two national championships made it really special."

I have a feeling there are a lot more awards waiting for Kyle Macy.

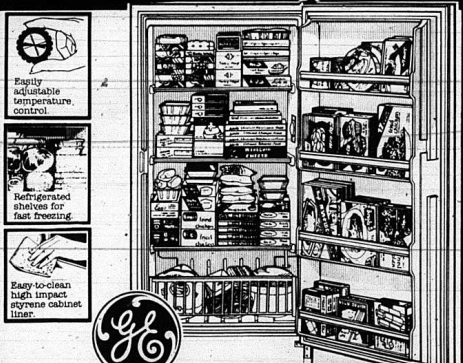

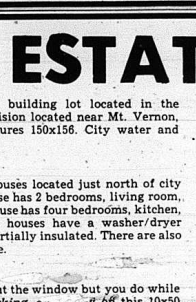
