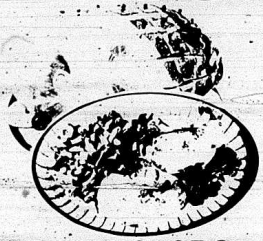

upper class families could bear. The state pays all these bills if the child is a ward of the state (foster child). If the natural parents keep the child or if it is adopted, they can expect to get not more than \$190 per month SSI and a medical card which pays 60-70% of what the child's needs. If the child is in an institutional facility, it costs the state from \$60 to \$70 a day. If the handicapped child is in a foster Special Needs Home, like the Harrisons, who have over 100 hours of specialized training, the state pays \$11 per day.

Mr. Harrison, besides working nights at IBM, coaching little league baseball, basketball and football and serving as Sunday School Superintendent, also attends to the administrative end of dealing with the numerous agencies and overwhelming paperwork connected with running their home. He has had to develop stoney determination and steady persistence in dealing with the bureaucratic shuffle he gets when any small thing is attempted. He is vice president of the state Foster Parents Association and has worked in Frankfurt for policy change within foster care. Only within the last year and a half, at his encouragement and insistence, has the state developed the Certified Special Needs Home with parents who are trained by doctors, therapists and teachers to deal with problems which arise when caring for special needs children. Previously handicapped children were placed in regular foster homes and the same amount was paid toward their care even

though care of the handicapped is often more than double that of the normal child. Now they are paid slightly more.

The Harrisons feel this is God's purpose for their lives, that God gave them both the ability and desire to demonstrate His love. They both enjoy the challenge but Mrs. Harrison is quick to admit that she is like any other mother. Sometimes she has to get out and away. She says that she is actually pampered by her husband and boys who need her in one form or another. Mr. Harrison encourages her to involve herself in community activities and personal interests. She takes piano lessons, sings in the church choir and last year, he took care of the household while she took a vacation with a neighbor family. They go away together often for week-ends and, at least once a week, just the two go out to eat or to a movie. They both value their marriage and work to keep it alive realizing that God could both get too caught up in what they are doing.

Tony and Peter were 4 and 6 when their parents began taking foster children. They were then a receiving home for newborn babies waiting for adoption. Once they happened to get a baby who had seizures and worked closely with doctors in regulating the medication. From then on, they had the reputation within referral agencies as the "family who would take anything." Soon they were taking those who were difficult to place.

People often question them about their own children as if they are concerned about the possible effects of the lifestyle on them rather than having had to sacrifice, they obviously have had enriched lives. And, when they are taught at church and Sunday School about love, they come home to see the examples. The boys have always been consulted about new arrivals. Steve and Anthony were adopted partly because the boys didn't want to see them go. The Harrisons can't care for violent children. Teenagers are accepted only as temporary placements. They have had to turn some children away because of lack of room so the children's interests are protected and they get lots of love and attention and have developed into independent and caring persons who are able to accept others like they are and to help when they can.

Mrs. Harrison thinks that Wildie and Rockcastle County have to be the perfect place for them to live. The whole community is so supportive. Imogene Wheeler, Lucille Owens, David Parsons, Juy Parsons, Ann Abney and others will care for the children when she needs someone. She is convinced that without them, Home Health, the school board, the church and others, they simply could not continue. She has heard people say that Rockcastle County is backward, but their experiences have shown the attitude of people here to be anything but backward. They have kept racial, black, Indian and mal-formed children yet everywhere they have responded to with love for the person inside.

The Harrisons are special people. In six and one-half years, they have taken 30 children into their home. Not everyone can do what they have done, but many of us may be overwhelmed with guilt that we help no one outside our own family. And then, we try quickly to shuffle our thoughts to something more soothing or consoling.

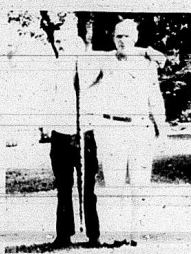

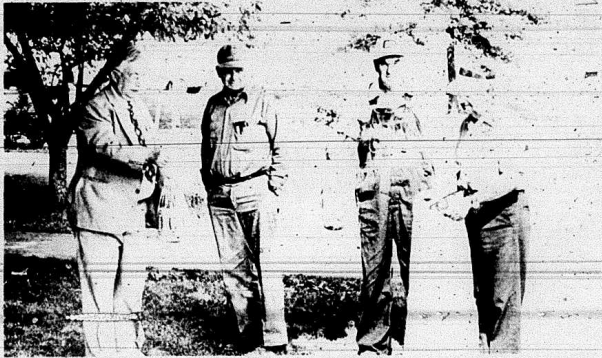

## Dragging Operation Confirms No Body In Lake Linville

Dragging operations of Lake Linville, near the dam, were carried out last Wednesday by City of Mt. Vernon employees and members of the Rockcastle County Rescue Squad with nothing being discovered in the area where Mrs. Lola Hopkins of Crab Orchard, said she brought up human hair while fishing late Friday afternoon, July 18th.

dragging operation in the area to make absolutely certain that nothing or no one was in the water and they were assisted by the Rockcastle County Rescue Squad. During last Wednesday's operation, a man's T-shirt was brought up to the surface by the Rescue Squad but Rescue Squad member, Gary Hansel, said the shirt was definitely not, on anyone and had most likely just blown out of a boat or been dropped overboard accidentally.

Mrs. Hopkins, who was fishing with Mrs. Wanda Collins and Mrs. Collins' son, Willie, discarded the substance she reeled in on her fishing pole, and which she said was also reeled in by the Collins youth twice, on the bank to the spot on the lake from which she was fishing. However, two state policemen conducted a diving operation in the area on Monday afternoon and did not find anything - although diving conditions were not the best.

City employees said that they twice hung into an object which they were unable to get to the surface of the water but Matt Powell, water Dept. Superintendent, who was in the boat, said that the object was too heavy to be a body and was probably a log or tire. Both Mr. Hansel and Mr. Powell agreed on question that the area was searched thoroughly and had there been a body it would be better to conduct a

## Japanese Beetles Are Plaguing Farmers and City Dwellers Alike

Grapes are supposed to be the favorite food of the voracious Japanese Beetles but you would have a hard time convincing Bronco Abney of Wildie. Mr. Abney says the little varmints have destroyed a 12 acre field of Red Clover, in about a month and a half, despite the fact that he has captured a 55 gallon barrel full using Beetle Bait.

Mr. Ballinger said the beetles are susceptible to Sevin but that it is not economically or physically practical to spray entire crops with the insecticide. The Beetle Bait traps seem to pull in beetles from quite an area around in addition to those already on the premises. The traps are made cutting the top off a plastic jug and setting another jug down on top of it (top down).

There are some natural enemies Mr. Ballinger said: extremely dry weather; the milky disease whose spores live in the soil for long periods and infect and kill successive broods of Japanese Beetles; the spring Tiphia from Korea and the fall Tiphia from Japan which can live only on the grubs of the Japanese beetle and several of the more common birds including starlings and English sparrows.

Mr. Abney also reports that, despite reports to the contrary, the beetles have even attacked his tobacco crop to some extent.

From all accounts, the Japanese Beetles seem as though they are going to be a fact of life we will have to learn to live with.

Harold Ballinger of the local ASCS office gave us some background which, he said, first came to this country in 1916 from, obviously, Japan.

## Break-Ins and Thefts Reported

"Charity begins at home" is a trite expression we hear often, but it may be no trite at all where the phrase is more aptly applied that in the home of Judy and Joette (pronounced Jo' tee) Harrison of Wildie where charity is not only begins but seems unending.

9 months, Steve was not sitting or crawling. They contacted a physical education major at Berea College who agreed to work with him in the college pool in an effort to improve his motor skills and strength. At 10 months he was swimming. His improvement became more rapid and at 14 months, he was sitting. By age two and one-half, he was walking and talking. At this point, they were told that he would be only moderately retarded. That was two and one-half years ago.

## Miss Stewart Finalist In Teenager Pageant

The Harrisons are Madison County natives who were living in Berea and regularly attending Wildie Christian Church when just the type rural residence they had been looking for became available in Wildie and they have now lived here for three and one-half years.

Anthony, the other adopted child, came to the Harrisons two years ago. He is deaf and suffers from a heart condition and migraine headaches, all effects of meningitis contracted at age 2 while living in another foster home. He was later adopted, given up and returned to the state and was in and out of various foster homes until he came to them. They enrolled him at the Danville School for the Deaf which is a boarding school. When he found out that the Harrisons were going to adopt him, he did not want to go back to Danville. He wanted to be at his new "home." So, the Harrisons petitioned the School Board to provide transportation and education for Anthony so he could stay at home. He now attends classes for the deaf every day on the campus of E.K.U. Anthony and Mrs. Har-

rison have learned sign language and he also communicates orally. He is above average in intelligence and "this summer will be severely mentally handicapped" were the words of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Institute of the Cincinnati Bible Seminary.

The Harrison home is classified by the Dept. of Human Resources' Bureau for Social Services as a Certified Special Needs Home. That means they accept foster children (wards of the state because parental rights have been terminated) who have some physical, emotional or mental handicap or are multiply handicapped.

Steve came to the Harrisons as a foster child at age 3 months. They were told at that time that he would be profoundly retarded due, in part, to a mentally ill mother who had used drugs. He was obviously malnourished and environmentally delayed but he smiled consentfully. At age

Holly, who is 9, came to them at age 4 from a nursing home. According to Mrs. Harrison, in most cases a child so severely handicapped would be in an institution, yet Holly attends Trainable Mentally Handicapped classes at MVES. Holly has cerebral palsy, epilepsy and is severely mentally retarded. She has no self help skills. When she came to them, she had been allowed to lie in bed and was so stiff she could not get out of bed. At the Harrisons, no child lies in the bed so Holly was placed on the floor and turned every 30 minutes. They made two trips a week to the U.K. Medical Center for therapy. Within 6 months, she was able to sit in a chair. Home Health provided her with a wheel chair. More recently, physical therapy and exercising from Home Health's Joy Parsons, her classroom teacher, Ann Abney, and her family, she has learned to stand with the help of "prone standers" which again Home Health bought for her. Holly has attended 18 little league baseball games this season in which her brothers play and her father coaches. When they are on the field, she knows and

Dear Editor,

There seems to be much confusion and criticism of the "Lake Linville Hair Mystery", and rumors continue to run wild throughout the county. As a member of the Rockcastle County Rescue Squad that assisted in the dragging operation carried out Wednesday afternoon, July 23, I feel it is necessary to put into perspective Mrs. Hopkins' claim so that the public will know what is fact and what is fiction.

Mrs. Lola Hopkins and companions were fishing at Lake Linville Friday afternoon, July 18. They were using closed-faced spin cast reels, heavy

weights, single barbed hooks approximately half the thickness of a pencil lead, and bait for cat fishing. Mrs. Hopkins' party were fishing on the south side of Lake Linville approximately ten feet up from the spillway entrance casting toward the concrete stand that is out in the water. Mrs. Hopkins' claim is that upon six occasions she and a Collins youth reeled to shore a material foreign to their knowledge and described as that of human hair quality.

Mrs. Hopkins returned to Lake Linville Wednesday afternoon to assist the dragging operation by casting to the location where they fished out this strange material. Bringing with her what she said was the exact fishing equipment used on that Friday, she made several casts that fell within five to ten feet of each other.

While talking to me, Mrs. Hopkins appeared to be scared to be back in the area especially at the thought that those dragging might bring up what her hair-like material came from. She talked about the events of that Friday fishing trip and her reluctance to report her find earlier. Her description of the material was that it was difficult to remove from the hook, six inches in length, brown in color, and in strands with the texture of human hair (even to reaching down into the lake and wetting her own hair to see what it felt like). Mrs. Hopkins stated that she didn't think too much of it only that it felt different. The more this strange material was found on her hook, the more apprehensive she became, even to stop fishing.

Evidently by this time it was clear for she started talking about the lantern drawing the bugs and her placing the lantern on a flat rock in the water. All of the strange material was left on the bank as they left. Mrs. Hopkins stated that this event bothered her all weekend and that she couldn't get it off her mind. Therefore, on Monday, July 21, Mrs. Hopkins notified city authorities of her find.

On this same Monday, two Kentucky State Police divers searched for two hours to find evidence to support Mrs. Hopkins' claim. Not all of this time was spent underwater for the divers returned to rest, check their air, and to warm up. The bank where Mrs. Hopkins' party was fishing was searched to find the material that they left. The divers were hampered by zero visibility near the bottom of the lake. All the divers could do was feel along the bottom. No evidence to support Mrs. Hopkins' claim was found and further attempts were cancelled due to the poor visibility and the fact that the area had been searched as best possible.

It was then decided that a second effort would be made to be as certain as possible that no human body was in this area, that of dragging of the lake.

At 1 p.m., Wednesday, July 23, the Rockcastle County Rescue Squad, Mt. Vernon Water Dept. personnel, and several volunteers began dragging the area where Mrs. Hopkins claimed to have fished out the strange material. Using three boats, four different types of dragging equipment (two pieces per



boat), and making as thorough a search as possible of a sixty foot area the combined force of men searched for six hours in a hot and tiresome effort to produce anything to support Mrs. Hopkins' claim.

The only things that the drag hooks brought to the surface were tree limbs, moss and leaves, lots of fishing line, and one man's black-pull-over shirt. The shirt was inspected with no evidence that a body had once been in the shirt. If the shirt was on a body either the body or some remain of a body would have remained with the shirt during recovery. Therefore, to this date no human body has ever been recovered from Lake Linville or no evidence to support such a claim has been found.

As dragging the lake ended at 10 a.m. it was decided that no other attempts would be made.

I feel that Mrs. Hopkins did the right thing by notifying the proper authorities about her find. I don't feel that Mrs. Hopkins perpetrated a hoax. I think that she was honest about fishing out a material that was foreign knowledge and strange enough to give her enough uneasy feelings that she reported this incident. Since the only evidence was thrown away, the material fished out may never be known. With the search made and the circumstances surrounding this case the probability of the material being human hair is highly unlikely.

The critics drawn from the search effort is unwarranted. The search personnel both under water and above did the best job that they could. Thinking back to three weeks ago when two bodies were recovered from the Rockcastle River by the rescue squad, I feel that we are capable of recovering bodies submerged in water. Only when the time dragging operations began in this instance, in approximately three hours both bodies were recovered. There were two eye-witnesses to the drowning, from the time they went underwater to the time dragging began was approximately an hour and a half, rumors do not had the time to confuse the search, and the directions for

the search were within a twenty foot area. All efforts made in this hair mystery were the best possible. I feel that all has been done to make certain that it was not human hair that was fished out.

Again, it is as easy to think that Mrs. Hopkins did not fish out human hair as it is to think that it was. No human body has ever been recovered nor is the probability great that the strange material was even human hair.

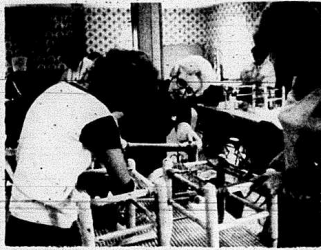
