1980 County Tax Assessment Shows Gain of \$41,761,265 Over Last Year

The final recapitulation of the 1980 Rockcastle County assessment shows a total of \$104,940,215 - a jump of \$41,761,265 over last year's assessment of \$93,178,950, according to Robert Cromer, Property Valuation Administrator.

Mr. Cromer said the big hike in the assessment was caused by his having to increase assessment almost county-wide because of the above photo. Construction will not begin until the city's water lines and telephone poles have been relocated.

The big jump came in residential and farm property, each gaining over \$17,000,000. The total assessment figure listed above does not reflect new construction, which is not governed by the 4% restriction on increase in revenue and new construction in the county amounted to \$1,758,900 which would bring the total assessment to about \$136,600,000.

Mr. Cromer pointed out that the Fiscal Court will be able to set the tax rate at their

August meeting because 75 percent of the county's assessments, across the state, have not been certified by the Department of Revenue. To date, only 58 counties have been certified so far and Rockcastle is one of these. Mr. Cromer said he expected the county to be able to set their rate within about two weeks which would not delay the sending out of tax bills the end of September. Last year's tax rate was 5.775c per \$100 assessment but this year's rate is still expected to be considerably lower.

Homestead exemptions this year amounted to \$8,827,100 for residential and farm residences and Mr. Cromer reported that 47 new homes were added to this year's assessment compared to 21 last year. Eleven homes were lost from the tax rolls through destruction by fire.

A breakdown of the assessment is as follows, with last year's figures in parentheses:

957,865; farm, \$44,578,125 (27,154,645); commercial, \$11,724,650 (\$8,518,135); mineral-timber rights, \$113,300 (\$98,300).

Motor vehicles, \$14,788,055 (\$13,974,200); aircraft, \$77,500 (\$63,000); boats, \$247,550 (\$242,400); merchants inventory, \$2,775,500 (\$2,588,065); professional trade tools/business fixtures, \$1,529,775 (\$1,451,130); drilling, mining and construction equipment, \$1,028,390 (\$768,135); mobile homes, \$1,559,600 (\$2,137,130).

Manufacturing machinery, \$308,890; stocks and bonds, \$7,500,265 (\$5,778,020) and bank shares, \$2,853,665 (\$2,425,000).

The decrease in the assessment for mobile homes is caused by a change of a number of mobile homes, sitting on permanent foundations, to residential property. The tax rate is lower for real estate than the tangible tax rate.



A \$570,238 contract has been awarded to Elmo Greer Associates, G&G Kentucky Construction Co. and G&C Coal and Energy Corporation, all of London, in a tri-venture to construct 0.8 miles of U.S. 150, Mt. Vernon-Broadhead Road, from about 240 feet west of Ky. 461, extending westerly. The

The Rockcastle County Board of Education assigned coaching positions for the upcoming 1980-81 school year at its regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

Coaching football at RCHS again this year will be Larry Woods with two assistants, David Hanel and Ryan Riddle. Boys' basketball coach, as already announced, will be Roscoe Denney with Richard Bray assigned as his assistant. Preston Parrett will be coaching RCHS girls basketball and also will continue as elementary athletic director. Judy Bullock will assist Mr. Parrett at RCHS and will also coach girls basketball at MVES. Boys basketball and football coach at MVES will be Charles Carter. At Broadhead Elementary, Gary Scott will be football and basketball coach with Nelson Graves as his assistant. Harry Lee Holland will remain as football and basketball coach at LES with Jerry Pensol as assistant. Basketball coach at LES will be John Hale with the girls or assistant position not yet filled.

The board also accepted the resignation of Wanda Braley, special education teacher; Jean Towery, secretary at RES; John Hamm as girls basketball coach at BES and Lois Cameron as girls basketball coach at Roundstone.

In other business, the board opened sealed bids and accepted the lowest bid for the following items: gasoline, oil, lubricants, anti-freeze, fuel oil, bus tires, coal and coal hauling, school pictures, food products, milk, pest control, garbage disposal and detergents.

Mallicote Arrested

Leroy Mallicote of Rockcastle County was arrested Saturday on charges of intending to mine more than 250 tons of coal without a permit, said John Nagle, chief of special investigations for the state Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection.

Mallicote allegedly disturbed 4.5 acres at a site near Brushy Ridge Road in Rockcastle County. Investigators from the London regional surface-mining office found "a pit large enough to obtain a minimum of 1,700 tons of coal at the site," Nagle said. The tonnage estimates were determined through engineering measurements, he said.

Mallicote was released on \$1,000 bond. He will be arraigned August 13 in Rockcastle District Court in Mt. Vernon.

Natural Resources Secretary Jackie Swigart said that the arrest is part of a continuing effort by the department to halt illegal mining by "wildcat" operators. Illegal mining operations reduce the profits of legitimate operators, in addition to leaving the land ravaged and useless, she explained.

Legislative Report

By: Rep. Harold DeMarcus

The Committee for Program Review and Investigations held its first meeting of the 1980 interim. During the

meeting results of a preliminary investigation of state property leases was presented.

The Commonwealth leases approximately 800 pieces of real property from the private sector over the entire state at an annual cost of \$8 million.

The Commonwealth rents space for many purposes, including office space for bureaucratic agencies. Also, the Administrative Office of the Courts rents space in the courthouses of all 120 counties in Kentucky.

The preliminary review of state leases for real property concentrated on 100 pieces of rents space in Franklin County. Several discrepancies were revealed, in some cases rent payments were made in advance and property was leased which did not meet fire code requirements.

The State Board of Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors negotiated a thirty-five year lease in which the entire amount of the lease was paid in advance. This lease has a penalty clause stipulating that the lease cannot be cancelled for the first fifteen years unless the first fifteen years rent is paid in full. advance. Kentucky's Constitution provides that all claims upon the state treasury which are authorized by law shall be paid when due. This means payment by the state is not to be made until services have been rendered.

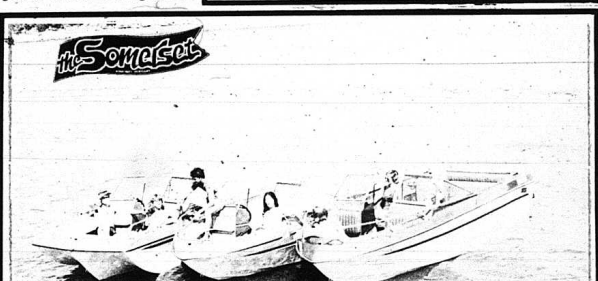

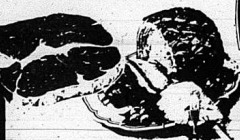

Headquarters for the national family meeting will be the Ramada Inn in Effingham.

Livesay, of Decatur, Illinois, vice president; Mrs. Ralph Greene, of Sneedville, Tennessee; sec. treas., Mrs. Virginia Smith, of Mercerburg, Pennsylvania; bulletin editor, Hugh K. Livesay, of Cornwells Heights, Pennsylvania; scrapbook editor, and James J. Livesay, of Jackson, Mississippi, historian.

Founded in Roanoke, Virginia, in 1957, the Livesay Historical Society promotes research on the history of the family and a spirit of family loyalty, officials said. The non-profit organization publicizes a

quarterly bulletin which is mailed to several hundred Livesay descendants, has published two general works on the family and assisted in the publication of several branch histories. The Society has no membership dues but is supported by gifts from Livesay descendants and members of their families.

Approval was granted the Adult Education program with Verla Scott as teacher at \$6.00 per hour for the night classes taught at BES. Also approved was the lunchroom policy statement for 1980-81 with lunch prices set at 55¢ for elementary and 60¢ for high school.

The Title 6-B Handicapped Program, with contract to employ Mrs. Joan Peoples as school psychologist for \$42.00 per evaluation, was approved by the board for the upcoming school year.

The board accepted a negotiated contract with Disney Construction Co. of Laurel County to install new fireproof wall and pull-down doors in the Brohead School cafeteria for \$8,000.00. Authority was given Supt. Parsons to make necessary transfers and assignments in personnel to start

school, subject to approval of personnel involved and the board.

All-Day Dove Hunting

All day dove hunting will be permitted in Kentucky this year, according to regulations adopted by the state Fish and Wildlife Commission.

In the past, hunting hours for doves were from noon until one-half hour before sunset. The new regulation allows hunting to begin one-half hour before sunrise and continue until one-half hour before sunset, local prevailing time.

This change, adopted under U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service guidelines for hunting migratory game birds, marks the first time that morning hunting has been permitted in the Eastern Management Unit, which includes Kentucky and all other states east of the Mississippi River.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service approved all-day hunting upon the request of the Southeastern Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies. The federal agency agreed with the state wildlife agencies that all day dove hunting would (1) better distribute hunting pressure (2) offer more pleasant hunting conditions in the cool morning hours and (3) provide better conditions for the use of

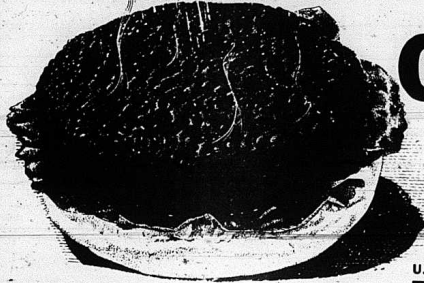

involving a state lease for the Ramada Inn property in Frankfort. Among other things this property did not conform to fire code provisions when it was first rented.

In 1976 Kentucky State University was faced with a shortage of student housing facilities. It was estimated that 28,000 square feet would be needed to house 156 students.

At that time the state's Commissioner of Finance suggested this lease. Apartments in Frankfort be rented for this purpose. The apartment property constituted 38,000 square feet at \$3.23 per square foot for a total cost of \$125,000 annually.

The State Department of Finance decided to rent the Frankfort Ramada Inn. This hotel property constituted 38,000 square feet at \$3.92 per square foot for a total cost of \$239,840 annually. The state has paid a total of \$611,520 over the last three years to lease the Ramada Inn property.

The Ramada Inn lease contains a provision which gives the state an option to purchase the property applying the rental payments made to the purchase price.

The owner of the Ramada Inn obtained an appraisal which valued the property at \$600,000. The state obtained two appraisals which valued the property at \$1.4 million.

On July 16th, the Department of Finance announced that the state will purchase the Ramada Inn for a total price, including rental payments, of \$1.7 million. That price includes \$151,000 worth of equipment and improvements.

Last year a daily newspaper reported that the state had paid \$26,000 to rent a 1.3 acre parking lot in Franklin County that it already owned.

The Committee for Program Review and Investigations will conduct a thorough investigation and in-depth study of leasing practices. These efforts should result in recommendations leading to some long overdue changes in the property leasing practices of state government.

retrievers. The fish and wildlife service, in giving the states in the Eastern Management Unit the right to choose morning hunting, noted that "full day hunting has been employed in the Central and Western Management Units for many years without apparent detriment to the mourning dove population and to the satisfaction of the public."

Other dove hunting regulations remain basically unchanged. The season will open Sept. 1 and run through Oct. 31, with the second phase of the split season running from Nov. 27 through Dec. 5. The daily limit is 20 doves and the possession limit after two or more days of hunting is 24.

Shotguns used to hunt doves (and all other game in Kentucky except deer) must be plugged to hold no more than three shells. Hunting migratory game birds on or over baited fields is illegal.

A "baited" field is legally described as one on which "shelled, shucked or unshucked corn, wheat or other grain, salt or other feed" has been "placed, exposed, deposited, distributed or otherwise" to lure or attract doves.

The law also states that a field continues to be a baited field for ten days after the removal of the attractant. Growing grains specifically for wildlife management and leaving them in the field does not constitute baiting, nor does cutting or plowing attractants resulting from valid and normal agricultural operations.

Other migratory game bird seasons set by the Fish and Wildlife Commission are: Woodcock and Wilson snipe, Oct. 4-Dec. 7 and teal, Sept. 7-14. The limits on woodcock are 5 daily and 10 in possession.

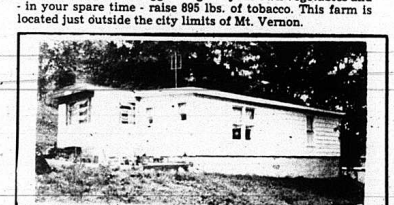

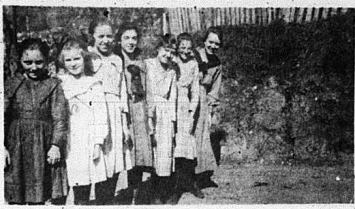

Good Pickles and Relishes - Cucumber pickles should be firm, solid and a dark-olive green color. They should be translucent and have a uniform color throughout.

Relishes should have a crisp texture and have the color of the original fruit or vegetable.

Mixed pickles should be firm, crisp, and have a bright color.

Why are pickles soft? - This could be one of several reasons: You used too weak a brine; you didn't keep the cucumbers covered with brine; you overprocessed them; the seal was not airtight; you used moldy garlic or spices.

Why are they shriveled? - Because they were cooked them, or overprocessed them, or put cucumbers in too strong a solution of brine, vinegar, or sugar.

Why are they hollow or pale? - If they are hollow, it is because you used poorly-developed cucumbers, or you let them stand more than 24 hours before brining; or you used too strong or too weak a brine during fermentation.

Pickles which pickles are due to improper brining.

Rules for success - I can't say the following often enough: Use only fresh, good quality fruits and vegetables for pickling; follow your recipe to the letter, using the right ingredients and measuring them accurately; use a good standard vinegar, free from sediment; use only coarse salt and soft water for brining; use whole fresh spices and never leave them in the jars of pickles; and always process your pickles and relishes in a boiling-water-bath canner for the time given in an up-to-date recipe.

People didn't used to process pickles in the old days and a batch of spoiled pickles was not too uncommon. Open kettle canning without processing just can't guarantee a safe high-quality product with good storage life.

What fruits to pickle - You can pickle almost any fruit, but the favorites are peaches, pears, crab apples, cantaloupe, and watermelon rind.

What vegetables to pickle - You can pickle almost any vegetable, but here are the favorites: okra, just the small and very young ones; green tomatoes, cauliflower, carrots and green beans.

Mixed vegetables are especially good. Here is the recipe from our pickles and relishes circular:

Mixed Vegetables Pickles

- 1 quart small cucumbers
- 2 cups pickling salt
- 2 cups carrots (cut in 3/4 inch circles)
- 2 cups string beans
- 1/4 cup coarse salt
- 1 cup water
- 1/3 cup white mustard seed
- 11/2 cups sugar
- 11/2 quarts vinegar

Cover vegetables with a brine made from the salt and water. Let stand overnight. Drain, cover vegetables with clear water, and let stand for 2 days.

Then cover with mixture of sugar and vinegar, and let stand overnight. Drain off the vinegar and heat it to simmering. Then add vegetables and simmer 15 minutes. Pack in hot jars, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Adjust lids. Process 10 minutes in boiling-water-bath canner.

Make Pickled green or yellow peppers - When the peppers in your garden start coming on, there are often more than you can use. For variety, put up some jars of pickled green pep-

pers or banana peppers.

- Here is a recipe. If your skin is sensitive, it's a good idea to wear rubber gloves when you handle the peppers.
- 4 quarts green or banana peppers
- 11/2 cups coarse salt
- 2 cloves garlic
- 2 tablespoons prepared horseradish
- 10 cups vinegar
- 2 cups water
- 1/4 cup sugar

Cut two small slits in each pepper. Dissolve salt in 4 quarts of water. Pour over peppers and let stand 12 to 18 hours in a cool place. Drain, rinse and drain thoroughly. Combine remaining ingredients; simmer 15 minutes. Remove garlic. Pack peppers into clean hot jars leaving 1/4 inch headspace. Pour boiling-hot pickling liquid over peppers leaving 1/4 inch headspace. Adjust caps. Process half-pints and pints 10 minutes in boiling-water-bath canner.

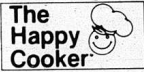

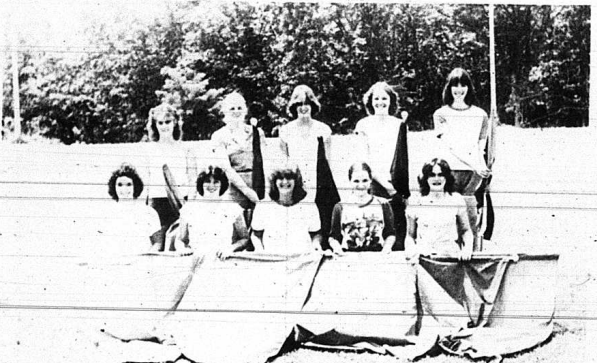

federal agency which regulates hunting for migratory species, has permitted all-day dove hunting in both the Central and Western Management Units for a number of years. Only in the eastern unit, were hunters restricted to afternoon hunting.

At the request of the Southeastern Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies, the federal fish and wildlife service took another look at this restriction and decided it was unnecessary.

So this year, states in the Eastern Management Unit (including Kentucky) can choose all-day hunting for all or part of the season. After careful consid-

eration, the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission decided to permit day-long hunting for the entire Sept. 1 - Oct. 31 and Nov. 27 - Dec. 5 season.

So while starting time - one half hour before sunrise - is new, the time at which hunting must cease - one half hour before sunset - remains unchanged as does the daily limit of 12 and the possession limit of 24 doves.

An impetus for allowing all-day hunting comes from the fact that dove populations across the country continue to increase. What's more, they are increasing faster in states which

permit dove hunting than those which do not, according to U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service surveys - in part because states which allow hunting also engage in dove habitat management programs, paid for by hunting license fees.

All-day hunting in the Central and Western Management Units has not been detrimental to dove populations, according to the fish and wildlife service. Morning hunting in these units has been allowed for many years.

Other reasons the fish and wildlife agencies of the Southeast asked for morning shooting involves the weather. As dove hunters know well, it can get

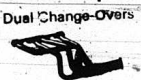

LEXINGTON—Gordy Coleman, the big guy who used to swat the long ball for the Cincinnati Reds, was in town last week. Gordy was my guest on my radio program and he got my attention when he said the first ingredient the Reds are looking for in a young ball player is speed. Here was this man who is now Director of the Speakers Bureau for the Reds, talking about players running fast when Gordy himself was one of the big power hitters during his playing days.

Later, at dinner, I probed Gordy about the Reds' great desire for speed. "I think we first got on to it during the 1970 season. That's the year we moved from old Crosley Field to Riverfront Stadium. Crosley was a hitter's ball park and we had people like Johnny Bench, Tony Perez and Lee May who could hit it a mile. We won something like seventy of the hundred games we played in Crosley Field that year. In June, after we moved over to Riverfront," Coleman went on, "we played only about five hundred ball the rest of the season. Not only were the fences further out at Riverfront but we were playing on the artificial surface. The ball picks up speed on that surface and it takes speed to compensate."

Coleman said that something else happened about that time to change the thinking of the Reds from power to speed. "In 1970, we had Bobby Tolan who could fly. He led the league in stolen bases. Bobby got on base a lot and when he was on first the other team's pitcher had to be concerned with him stealing. The pitchers were throwing a lot of fast balls to the hitter hoping to 'throw Tolan out.' Bench, Perez and May had a feast on those fast balls and they hit over 30 home runs each." Gordy said the real value of Tolan's speed surfaced the next season. "Bobby got hit by a pitch and was out of the lineup. The pitchers were able to throw their best stuff and Bench, Perez and May, instead of hitting a lot of home runs, struck out a lot." Coleman said. "Speed is the name of the game for us now."

It seemed strange to hear the big man who weighs well over two hundred pounds and played football at Duke and hit ninety-eight home runs in the major leagues talking about speed.

pretty hot and muggy during early September afternoons. It's going to be a pleasant relief to be able to hunt during the cooler morning hours.

It will also be easier on retrievers. Many dove hunters use dogs to find downed birds, and cooler temperatures and better scenting conditions in the morning will make their work more effective.

As always, state and federal biologists will keep a close watch on dove harvest figures and dove populations. These trained professionals will be able to tell if morning shooting is having any unexpected detrimental effects.

The mourning dove represents a valuable renewable resource, an important source of revenue (through hunting license sales and federal excise taxes on sporting arms and ammunition) for state fish and wildlife departments and a source of recreation for thousands of hunters. So you can be assured that decisions affecting its management—like all-day hunting—are not made lightly and will be watched closely.
