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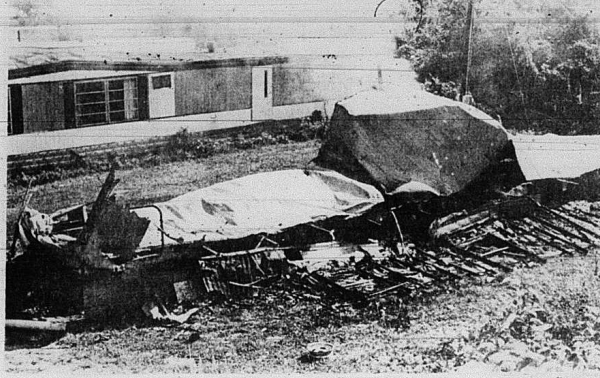

## Policemen Submit Resignations; City Employees Get Raise



A mobile home, belonging to Ms. Juanita Couch, on Spring Street in Mt. Vernon, was totally destroyed by fire around 3:10 a.m. last Thursday morning. City firemen responded to a call that a trailer had exploded and, upon arrival, found the blaze too far advanced to control. According to

reports, Ms. Couch and another occupant, Andy Mason, awakened to find the trailer on fire. Ms. Couch received minor burns escaping the fire and Mr. Mason was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital for treatment where his condition is listed as fair.

After an extended executive session, concerning the police department and raises for city and waterworks employees, during Monday night's meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council, the Council accepted the resignation of Police Chief Larry Williams and Patrolman Tyree Gray, Jr. and instituted a five-day suspension, without pay, against Patrolman Charles Lovell. The suspension was reportedly a disciplinary action. The council asked City Clerk Mary McClure to note in her minutes that both Williams and Gray had been encouraged by the council to stay on the force.

On question, Mayor Roland Mullins said the men did not state their reason for their resignations, which will become effective the latter part of August. Voting no on both motions was Councilman Ernie Tolle.

Concerning pay raises for city and waterworks employees, Councilman Tom Welch made a motion to increase the hourly pay of waterworks employees to \$4 per hour plus the city will pay hospitalization insurance. City Clerk Mary McClure and Waterworks Superintendent, Matt Powell, Jr. each received a 13% increase. The council said the raises were given with the understanding that part-time help for Mrs. McClure would not be hired other than for 10 days vacation per year and sick days and that

there would be no replacement hired for two men who recently retired from the waterworks department.

In other action, the council flipped a coin to determine whether to award the bid for auditing of the waterworks books to Robinson, Hughes and Christopher or to Potter and Co. Identical low bids of \$1,750 were submitted by the two firms to the council at their July meeting and both bids contained a specification that other expenses might be incurred after the audit was begun. The city asked the two firms if they would eliminate this clause and make their bids firm at \$1,750 and both agreed. Local representatives of the two companies were at the meeting and agreed to the coin toss as the fair way to settle who got the bid.

Following a discussion with boat dock manager, Sterling Hoskins, the council asked City Attorney Carl Clontz to draw up an ordinance prohibiting swimming anywhere on Lake Linville except at the beach area near the boat dock. After the ordinance is in effect, persons swimming illegally in the lake will be cited by city policemen, the council decided.

Councilman Tom Welch brought before the council a complaint he had received from a man whose neighbor was keeping several dogs in a pen very near the complainant's

bedroom window. Councilman Welch said he had personally looked the situation over and he wanted to know if the council could do anything to prohibit situations such as this.

City Attorney Carl Clontz told the council that there was no law against any number of dogs being kept in pens - only a dog ordinance against them being turned loose to roam at will. He also said he did not think the council could intervene in this situation that it probably was what is termed a "private nuisance" and the man's only recourse would be through a law suit against his neighbor.

Councilman Welch also told the council that he had contacted Buck Farthing of Buck's Auto Parts and asked him if the city would give him all of their repair work on police cars and other city-owned vehicles, if he could give the city a discount on parts. Mr. Welch reported that Farthing had answered favorably and he (Welch) recommended the city take this action.

However, Councilman Roger McClure dissented saying he felt the city's business should be spread around.

After some discussion, it was decided to let Buck's Auto Parts have the city's business for a three-month period then to switch to another business if the prices were found to be comparable.

Det. Walton said the items included: a green and yellow gasoline powered Big Foot dirt tamper (the kind possibly used on construction sites); two red three-gallon gas cans; a red wratchet type boom or come-along; a pitch fork and a five-gallon army green water can containing anti-freeze.

## U.K. to Display Local Man's Invention

Larry Caudill says his dad, Aris, had a saying, "Give a lazy man a job and he'll find an easy way to do it." Larry has done just that by building a pepper picker.

Pepper crops in this area are harvested by hand usually with the picker using buckets, baskets, or sacks in the row and filling a crate on the back of a truck. It takes two people at least two hours to fill an 800-1,000 lb. crate ready for market. With this new invention two people can pick a crate full in 30 minutes.

The Caudills, who have a 2 1/2 acre pepper crop load ten crates of peppers on a trailer bed, hitch it to their truck and take it to the market.

Larry grew up on the family farm on Brindle Ridge, graduated from Brodhead High School in 1965 and immediately went to work at IBM in Lexington. He and his wife, the former Brenda Harris, have maintained a home in Rockcastle County during the 15 years away. They travel back almost every week-end and often through the week during the busy crop seasons. For a while they lived on a farm in Georgetown and boarded horses, but Larry prefers row-crop farming and has a strong urge to return to Rockcastle County with their two daughters, age five and ten.

His wife says that he spends his leisure time "figuring out things and then putting his ideas into workable devices." Working in a plant where various things are designed and built has served to stimulate Larry's natural mechanical abilities. Loving farming and having limited time to spend working there has channeled his ingenuity toward things which help ease the farmer's work load or solve some of his problems.

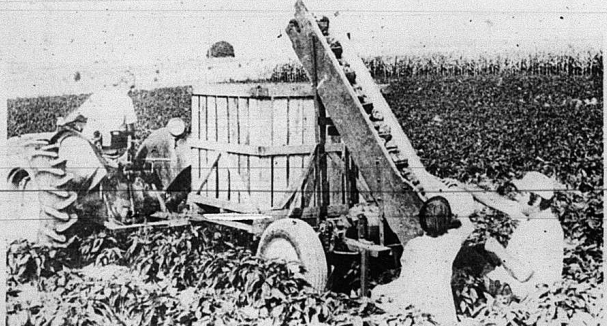
Among the things he has made for use on his father's farm is a tobacco curing fan which prevents work burn. It is basically a chain driven air-blast propeller mounted with a wire frame on wheels. He has also designed and built a four-row crop insecticide sprayer.

The Pepper Harvesting Aid, as the U.K. Agricultural Specialists have officially named Larry's newest piece of machinery, was built during about two months, using spare time, winter before last. This past winter he perfected it. Last summer it had uncomfortable metal seats. They were exchanged for molded plastic swivel boat seats. He switched metal wheels for rubber tires to make transporting it easier and added a transmission to control conveyor belt speed.

The picker or harvesting aid which cost Larry about \$150.00 is constructed of junk farm machinery including

pieces from a horse-drawn to bacco setter and a manure spreader, the elevator off a corn picker and the transmission from an old farm truck. University of Kentucky farm engineers have shown much interest in Larry's invention. About 10 to 12 people came out, took pictures, measured and have made plans to come up with a blueprint to be made available to county Extension Agents and farmers. Larry Caudill will be credited as designer and the reward will be the fact that he has made something to help farmers. This August 19th and 20th Larry's design will be on display at the University of Kentucky Field Day to be held at the South Farm experimental station on the Nicholasville Road in Lexington.

Those who have faith in new ideas they plan to develop have often had to suffer the derisive comments and ribbings of skeptics. Larry was no exception. Local farmers, friends, and even family members winked and joked about the coming machine. But the first day it was used, neighbors who could contain their curiosity no longer turned out (some with breakfast coffee in hand) to see for themselves if the contraption really worked. The road was lined with cars and everybody shared such an eagerness to ride the picker that few peppers were picked because riders were changed so often.





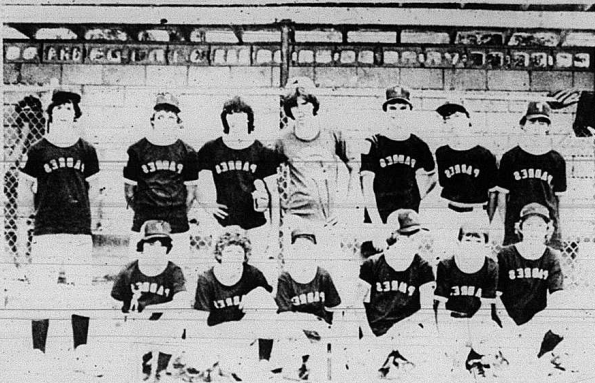

### FISHING REPORT

With surface water temperatures dropping a few degrees

on many lakes over the past few days, fishing has predictably improved and is now good in some locations. The lake-by-lake rundown, according to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

Buckhorn: White bass good at night on the lower lake over river channel; bluegill good in inlets and bays; in tailwaters, trout good; clear, stable, one foot below summer pool and 84 degrees.

Barren: Black bass good but small on the lower lake early and late on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers over deep submerged structure (10-15 feet); white bass good on small spinners in jumps and trolling deep runners with spinner trailers over flats; clear to murky, stable at pool and 85 degrees.

Herrington: Bluegill good drifting crickets off deep shady banks (6-8 feet); black bass fair

at night on artificial night-crawlers off points and deep rocky banks; white bass fair early and late on plunker and fly combination in jumps; clear, stable at pool and 84 degrees.

Cumberland: Crappie fair to good drifting minnows over cover in deep coves (20-30 feet); black bass fair at night on the upper lake on artificial night-crawlers off points and deep banks and early mornings and at night on the lower lake on artificial night-crawlers and dollies with pork rind trailers off points; in tailwaters, trout good with scattered limits; clear, falling, 27 feet below the timberline and 85 degrees.

Laurel: Bluegill fair to good in inlets and bays; trout fair at night still fishing worms, cheese and corn off deep banks; clear, stable, 10 feet below pool and 88 degrees.

Grayson: Bluegill fair off deep banks; crappie fair over

submerged cover; clear, stable, one foot below pool and 45 degrees.

Dale Hollow: Black bass fair at night on artificial night-crawlers off points and banks; crappie fair off deep banks; clear, falling, three feet below pool and 87 degrees.

Kentucky: Sauger fair trolling deep runners and drifting minnows over ridges; crappie slow over creek channels; in tailwaters, catfish fair; clear, falling slowly, one foot below pool and 87 degrees.

Barkley: Black bass slow early and late on artificial nightcrawlers and crank baits over creek channel drop-offs and along shoreline; crappie slow over deep cover and deep drop-offs; in tailwaters; catfish good, crappie and white bass slow; clear, falling slowly, one foot below pool and 88 degrees.

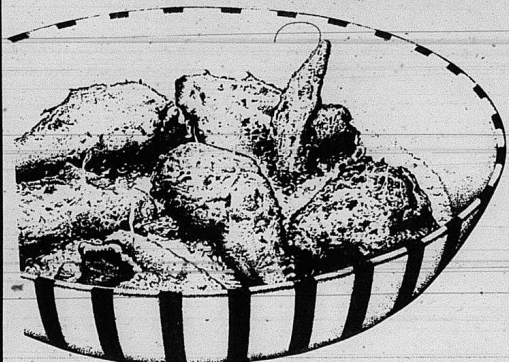

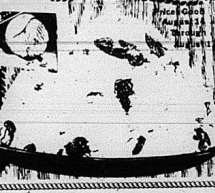

deep submerged tree tops; in tailwaters, trout fair to good; clear, stable at pool and 77 degrees.

Fishtrap: Catfish slow at night still fishing cut bait over upper lake channels; crappie slow late evenings and at night over submerged cover and around stick ups; clear to murky, stable at pool and 87 degrees.

Rough River: Black bass slow to fair early and late and at night on artificial nightcrawlers off points and over deep cover; clear, stable at pool and 88

degrees.

Dewey: Crappie slow to fair around stick ups and tree tops; clear to murky, stable at pool and 86 degrees.

Cave Run: Black bass slow at night on surface lures and artificial nightcrawlers off points and around submerged tree tops; clear, stable at pool and 85 degrees.

Nolin: Bluegill slow in inlets and bays; clear to murky, stable at pool and 86 degrees.

### Kentucky Afield

Kentucky's squirrel hunting season opened last week and throughout the season the hunters in the eastern parts of the state will probably find more squirrels than their counterparts in West Kentucky.

This prediction is based on the results of a survey of mast production last fall. (Mast is a collective term for the wildlife foods -- nuts, seeds and fruits -- produced by trees.)

The amount of mast available varies from year to year and squirrel populations rise or fall in relation to the mast crop.

Mast production in Eastern Kentucky was "significantly higher" than the previous year, about the same in Central Kentucky and "significantly lower" in West Kentucky.

Good mast production will allow a relatively large number of squirrels to survive the winter and enter the breeding season in good shape. This will result in a bumper crop of squirrels the following year. But if mast production is poor, fewer squirrels will survive and the next year's population will

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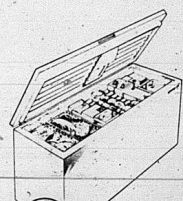

**Tomato Catsup**  
 8 pounds ripe, sound tomatoes  
 1 medium onion, chopped  
 ¼ teaspoon cayenne  
 1 cup sugar  
 1 cup white vinegar  
 1½ teaspoons whole cloves  
 1½ inches stick cinnamon, broken  
 1 teaspoon celery seed  
 4 teaspoons salt

Wash, peel, remove ends and cores and quarter tomatoes. Let tomatoes stand in colander to drain off excess liquid. In 8 to 10 quart kettle or dutch oven, mix tomatoes, onion and cayenne. Bring to boiling and cook until tomatoes are soft, about 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Put tomatoes through food mill or a coarse sieve to extract juice. Add sugar to tomato juice and return to kettle.

Bring to a boil, then simmer briskly 1½ to 2 hours, or until mixture is reduced by half. (You can measure the depth with a ruler at start and end.)

Meanwhile, in small sauce pan, combine white vinegar, whole cloves, stick cinnamon and celery seed. Cover and bring vinegar mixture to boiling. Remove from heat. Let stand.

Strain spiced vinegar mixture into tomato sauce. Discard the spices. Add salt to mixture and simmer till of desired con-

sistency - about 30 minutes. Stir often to prevent sticking.

Put catsup into hot pint jars, leaving ¼ inch headspace. Adjust lids. Process in boiling water-bath canner 5 minutes. Makes 7 pints.

**Justification by Faith**

Many a man has been brainwashed by the doctrines of men that they object to the idea that being baptized could possibly have anything to do with one's salvation. In spite of the fact that Jesus said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16). They have come to equate "salvation" by faith" with "salvation by faith only," and cannot perceive the difference.

The Bible teaches that salvation is "by faith," but nowhere says it is "by faith only," even if some modern (mis-)translations have added that to the text. It is the believer who will be saved (John 3:16; 20:30-31; Acts 13:39; 16:31; Heb. 10:39). The disbeliever will be damned (Mk. 16:16; John 3:18). By faith we are saved (Rom. 8:24), justified (Rom. 3:24), sanctified (Acts 26:18). By it we live (2 Cor. 5:7), overcome the world (1 John 5:4); and have confidence to draw near to God's throne of Grace (Heb. 10:22). Still, the Bible says that "by works a man is justified, and not by faith only" (Jas. 2:24), and "faith apart from works is dead" (Jas. 2:26).

Abraham's faith is used by both Paul and James by way of illustration (Rom. 4; James 2). James used Abraham to show that faith only was insufficient; saving faith is a faith that acts in obedience to God's instructions. He challenges: "Show me thy faith without thy works." "This is impossible, so he says, "I will show thee my faith by my works" (James 2:18). Abraham demonstrated his faith in offering Isaac as a sacrifice because God commanded it (Gen. 22:12). He trusted God to keep His promise concerning a numerous seed through Isaac, even if it took raising him from the dead (James 2:21-24; Heb. 11:17-19).

Paul used Abraham to show that one is justified by

faith and not by keeping the law. His faith was counted for righteousness long before the Law of Moses was given, or even before he was circumcised. He had walked by faith in leaving Ur of the Chaldees (Heb. 11:8), and was in the land of promise when God promised he would be the father of many nations (Gen. 15:8). Although he didn't understand how God would fulfill this promise, he believed God and trusted Him to keep His word. Hence, his faith "was reckoned unto him for righteousness" (Rom. 4:3). After Ishmael was born, God revealed that this would not be the heir, but that Sarah herself would bear a son (cf. Gen. 17:15-19). Abraham considered his own age (99), and the barrenness of his wife (Rom. 3:19), but this did not keep him from believing God and trusting Him to keep His word; he was "fully assured that what He had promised, He was able also to perform" (Rom. 3:21).

This is the kind of faith that is counted for righteousness. It believes the word of God, understands that word, and is not supported by any rational basis. Abraham demonstrated it both with regard to the birth of Isaac and with regard to God's command to offer Isaac as a sacrifice. He did consider the circumstances (cf. Rom. 3:19; Heb. 11:19), but didn't allow his inability to understand God's methods or reasons to keep him from believing and obeying.

Some object to "baptism for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38) because "I don't see any reason for it" or because "I can't see any connection between being baptized and being saved." The man who believes and trusts God for his salvation doesn't have to. He simply believes and obeys and leaves any problems to God to solve. This is real "salvation by faith."

be lower. While last fall's survey rated the statewide mast production as "about average," different sections of the commonwealth showed widely divergent results.

This means, according to the survey, that "1980 squirrel hunting seasons" in the eastern counties, but down sharply in the western counties" of Kentucky.

But to put things in perspective, you have to remember that the 1978 mast crop in West Kentucky was a very good one, leading to higher than normal squirrel numbers last year. So the "downy sharply" mentioned in the survey is actually a return to about average numbers of squirrels.

Whether the population is up or down, however, isn't important to hunter success, as the ability to locate squirrels. Early season hunting, when the squirrels are scattered and hard

Kim, who became a Christian at the age of 9, responds to a feeling of the need to enrich Christian lives, both hers and others, with music and fellowship. That is essentially what Living Water Camp Meeting is all about.

Kim is the director of the endeavor this year. Because of her youth and inexperience, for the past two years she has served as assistant director to Don Putnam who, along with others from CleftRock and the community, believed in Kim's idea and were willing to support her effort. This year, she is on her own with help from Steve Towery of Conway and Nancy Hilgefort of Broadhead.

This year's Living Water features eight professional groups and will cost approximately \$8,500 which is a low budget compared to the first year's cost of \$12,000 and last year's \$10,000. The effort has, however, broken even and Kim doubts that it will this year. About 300 attended that first year and about 600 last year. Kim hopes the number will double again this year. There has never been any problem reaching the financial commitment because of generous donations from people who feel it is worthy.

The groups booked for the two-day meeting earn a living from scheduling Christian music festivals such as this in much the same way as professional evangelists and persons like Anita Bryant. It is not really the easiest way to survive economically since Christian festivals are not yet that prevalent and weather and other factors enter in.

Hopefully, one of this year's biggest drawing cards to the meeting will be the soap opera star who plays Carol

Stallings on "As the World Turns." Her name is Rita Walter. She and her husband, Norman, a minister, do not charge for the booking. Only their traveling expenses are met. Besides singing, they interact with the audience and give testimony to their faith.

Launching such a revolutionary idea as a Christian Festival, which erects no denominational barriers and has the musical rhythms of rock, pop, classical and folk set to Christian words, might be a bit hard anywhere. It has been especially hard in Rockcastle County. This came as a shock to Kim, who, as a tender young spirit, felt and expected it to be embraced by most sincere church leaders whose churches failed to

provide enough Christian youth activities. Young people are very accepting and respectful of others and others' beliefs. Often they become disillusioned by Christian adult neighborhoods and "Christian cliques." Kim says, "The idea was meant to bring the community together in a united Christian effort to offer something special but so far it has been a thorn in the flesh of some. It was not intended to be that way. Its purpose is to spread the gospel of Jesus without doctrine."

The varieties of contemporary secular music, with its appeal to the youth, Kim feels, often have depressing immoral lyrics. Christian youth, while resisting the philosophy of these songs, find it hard to resist

the songs themselves because of the appealing sounds and rhythms. Contemporary Christian music, which is really just beginning to catch on, is the alternative-Christian lyrics set to a different beat.

Conservative church-goers who feel that the music used in today's churches is the only kind, need to realize that where we are today in worship, which seems so correct to us, came about through great changes. Kim pointed out that down through the ages, staid believers have been offended by updated music. She doesn't feel ready herself to look music in church services, but invites people to come hear and see and then make judgements.

Kim's belief is that Christianity doesn't make us perfect; it just make us have different goals. Kim, who has a degree in psychology and a minor in public health education from Eastern Kentucky University, has as her immediate goal, a trip to Israel this fall to work for three

months in the Baptist village as a volunteer. After that, she may return to receive more schooling and possibly later do family counseling or social work.

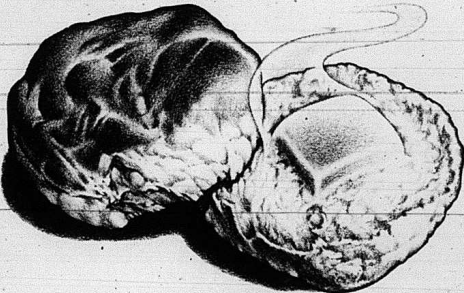

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals or free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents. Additional forms are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. A simple statement of income and family size is required, plus a signed certification by the parent or guardian that the information provided is correct.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, they should contact the school.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family's size and income changes during the school year, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below that shown on the family size and income scale.

Under the provisions of the policy, the school official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis.

If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to:

for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy on file in each school and in the Superintendent's office contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, color, or national origin.

Each school and board of education has a copy of the completed policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

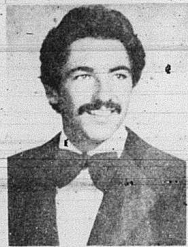
