

Energy Policy And Profits

Question: What effect will decontrol and the windfall profits taxes have on my energy stocks?

Answer: The windfall profits tax, of course, will make a dent in the industry's profits. But this could be offset by gains from decontrol of gas and oil prices. In fact, energy experts at the investment firm of Bache, Halsey, Stuart Shields believe that profit growth should beat the inflation rate over the next few years - Furthermore, Bache anticipates that oil and gas price hikes will bring a revision in asset values that are not fully reflected in current stock prices.

Brodhead Board Agrees to Housing Facility Certificate of Need

The Brodhead Town Board met August 14 and opened bids on the Flood Abatement Project just off Main Street near the post office. The low bid of \$10,197.00. David Hammons of Brodhead was accepted by the board.

On Monday night, September 1, the board held its regular scheduled meeting. The board had received a request for a Certificate of Need for a 10-unit housing project to be built on the county-owned fairground site. Wallick Construction of Englewood, Ohio will be building the facility which is scheduled to be completed 14 months after construction begins.

The developers have an option to buy 7 acres of the 30-acre county-owned tract at a purchase price of \$70,000. Twenty-

one of the units will be designated for elderly-handicapped occupants and 40 are 1, 2 and 3 bedroom family units.

After some discussion concerning the desirability of such type housing in Brodhead, the board decided to take no action on the matter until someone could meet with the board and discuss with them the ramifications of the project.

In other business, the board voted to purchase a typewriter for the city clerk and to have Cam Halcomb take care of the trash cans on Main Street during the month of September.

Following a meeting Tuesday night with Jim Cass of the Tri-County Community Development Agency, the board agreed to write a supportive letter stating the need for the housing project in Brodhead.

Livingston Storm Drainage Work To Be Completed

The City of Livingston opened bids on September 29, 1980 for storm drainage improvements in the City, according to Mayor Bobby Wilson. The bids called for cleaning out about 260' of open ditchline and cleaning out 88 feet of 3' x 3' culvert extending under U.S. 25 and the L&N Railroad.

According to Mayor Wilson, the work is being done through a Flood Damage Abatement grant received by the City from the Kentucky Department of Natural Resources. The low bidder for the work was Carter Johnson of Mt. Vernon who bid \$3,845 and received the contract. Other bidders were Tamco of London; \$5,543; Preston Collins of Rockcastle County, \$6,900 and J.C. Construction of London: \$7,329.

Work on the project will begin in approximately 2 weeks.

EDNA CAMERON

Edna Cameron of Highway 1004, Route 2, Livingston, filed August 24, 1980 as candidate in the November 4 School Board election.

Mr. Cameron is running in Educational Division No. 4 against incumbent Isabelle "Cookie" Mason.

Her petition stated that she is designated as a quality education candidate and is legally qualified to hold said office.

Filing deadline for the school board election is September 10.

Permit Application Requested For Waste Reclamation-Incinerator Plant

Following a recent local inquiry into a run regarding the possible issuance of a permit and/or license by the Department of Natural Resources for the development of a toxic waste disposal site in Rockcastle County, the Signal has learned that a meeting was held last Wednesday, August 27 with members of the Department and a Craig Winders of Scientific Processes, Inc., 301 W. Whitney, Louisville, Ky. The purpose of the meeting was to request an application for a permit to locate a waste reclamation plant with an incinerator on property recently belonging to Bill Cass and located on Highway 150 just outside Brodhead.

According to Mrs. Kim Vorbeck, a regional environmental specialist who was present at the meeting Wednesday, Mr. Winders told her that his company had no plans to do any construction at the site until Spring. He also told her, and other department officials, that plans are incomplete at this time and that the company does not at present have any disposal contracts. He also stated that with another company, T.L.D. Inc., also of Louisville, he, said, would be handling the personnel and business details. The Signal checked twice with the Secretary of State for information as to the nature of this corporation and found, both times, that the file for the T.L.D. Corp. was missing.

Mrs. Vorbeck also said that Winders reported at the meeting that David Gravelly of Louisville had been retained by the company as a consultant.

Winders told the Natural Resources people that he had planned to meet with members of the community and divulge the intentions of the developers with regard to the proposed

reclamation-incinerator plant. He also stated that he was unaware that any construction was going on at the site and said that he would call a halt to it immediately. The construction referred to includes dirt removal behind the building and the appearance of what resembles a pit and/or pond. Winders sent word to Mrs. Vorbeck that he would be in town before the next issue of the Signal and grant an interview. However, he did not and attempts to contact Mr. Winders by the Signal were unsuccessful.

According to recent laws, a notice of a public local hearing, prior to construction of such a facility, must be published in

the local newspaper. Recently in Kentucky, a permit was reportedly withheld because of forceful local opposition to such a plant being reactivated following a shut-down.

Thursday of last week, Mrs. Vorbeck and Brian Bussell, Field Supervisor of the State Fire Marshall's office, Division of Hazardous Materials, conducted an on-site inspection of the Cass property and found nothing out of the ordinary except the dirt removal. Billy Cass was present at the inspection and, according to Mrs. Vorbeck, cooperated with the officials but would not comment as to what plans are for the property.

Board of Education Hires bus drivers; Makes Transportation Changes

The Rockcastle County Board of Education met Tuesday night in regular session with most routine items of business on the agenda.

The board made the following transportation changes: Added \$10 a month and 1.3 mi. to route of contract hauler Opal Robinson; extended Harper's route 20 miles and added \$15 a month; Added \$10 a month to pay of Carolyn Chasteen, contract hauler, because route requires two trips; approved employment of Joe Allen as contract hauler for \$20 per month; increased the pay of Juanita Wilson, contract hauler by \$20 per month and employed Jimmy Taylor to replace Ina Taylor as contract hauler at Pine Hill at the same salary.

The following bus drivers were employed: Clyde Burdette to replace William Taylor who transferred to Paul Harper's route and Donald Parsons to replace Mace Rowland. Substitute drivers employed were Verl Robbins, Ray Burdine,

Dallas McGuire, David Riley, James Alcorn, Johnny Coffey and Ina Taylor.

The board also voted to hire Dale Whitaker and Dwain Adams as substitute teachers, subject to a hearing.

CITY COUNCIL MEETS IN SPECIAL SESSION

The Mt. Vernon City Council met Tuesday night, September 2, in a special session with Richard Moore of Schimpeler, Corradino and Assoc. Engineering Planners and Jack Crawford, engineer to discuss the sewer plant renovation. The council agreed to allow Mayor Roland Mullins to sign a grant application to be submitted to EPA for federal funds to help finance the renovation costs.

The council also voted to adopt the resolution for the 201 facility survey which had been approved by EPA and the state and will enlarge the sewer plant capacity to 300,000 gallons per day.

Fiscal Court Meets; Unsightly Waste Areas Criticized

At the regular meeting of the Fiscal Court Tuesday morning, September 2, Wayne Adams met with the court and asked when nothing was being done to improve the garbage pick-up stations.

Mr. Adams said that the garbage trucks that are supposed to clean up county dump sites instead are cleaning up private sites.

County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker said that they were not supposed to pick-up for private individuals and that dump sites had been the cleanest in the last two months than during any time since he has been in office. He said he thought they were presently doing a better job.

The court also voted some changes concerning county employees. Effective the first of the month, employees will be

paid twice monthly rather than once; they will be paid for 7 holidays during the year and Paul Hansel, County Road Supervisor will be paid an additional \$5 per hour for timekeeping duties not to exceed two hours per day.

In other business, the court voted to amend the 1980-81 budget to include the following unanticipated revenues: \$18,740.80 from the county road revenue sharing program; \$5,798.79 from the general fund budget and \$116.39 from the Department of Human Resources.

Doug Brock requested the court to accept a section of road connecting the Clyde Barnett Road with the Oak Hill Road in the Lake Linville area. The court voted to accept the road but not to exceed a \$5,000 limit for improvements.

Rockcastle Manufacturing- One Year Later; Number of Employees To Increase By November

One-year-old Rockcastle Manufacturing is the county's largest industrial employer and, for the time being, sits alone on the county's 89-acre industrial site.

In August 87 1979, 35 employees moved to the new location from the Central Body Shop building where they had been training for several months. About 12% of the present number of employees are from the original 35 and includes one supervisor.

According to Lee Gloschen, plant manager, the factory has experienced about a 2 to 1 turnover which is slightly better than most companies expect during the first year of setting up an operation, especially in a non-industrialized area. Employee supply has not been a problem as approximately 3,000 applications are on file now.

Most employees live within a 15-mile radius of the plant. Ten come from Lincoln County, a few from the Pulaski County line and the rest from Rockcastle County.

The company is presently expanding its local plant to include 6 new machines and possibly 10 more employees by November. The goal is to increase to 80 the number of workers and to about 64 the number of machines. With this new expansion, the daily piece work output is projected to increase from 1200 to 1500.

Of the employees, one is a cloth spreader and one is a cutter. Most are machine operators and are paid by the production rate. The average operator makes \$3.50 per hour; however, some make from \$4.20 to \$4.80 and one makes \$5 per hour. The plant also has a mechanic, a shipping clerk, an office clerk, a janitor and two supervisors.

Cintas is the Cincinnati-based company which owns Rockcastle Manufacturing. This is the company's first manufacturing venture. Unlike rental and laundry is the company's main business. Cintas expanded this year by buying nine laundry facilities to bring its total to 20 with the hope of near doubling its volume of business.

Besides rental contracts with numerous large companies, Cintas is developing a sales market with other companies. According to a company spokesman, Cintas, from all indications, will always be in the manufacturing business.

Gloschen says that within the next year, the decision will be made by the company as to whether to expand locally and

make shirts as well as pants.

The green, dark gray, navy and medium blue work pants made by the plant are of an unusually durable quality. The material comes to them from North and South Carolina. From this raw goods, a test sample is pulled and sent to the laundry facility for wash tests. There with 15-20 washings with harsh cleaning compounds, they determine color-fastness and fabric abrasiveness. Only after the sample passes the test is the material used.

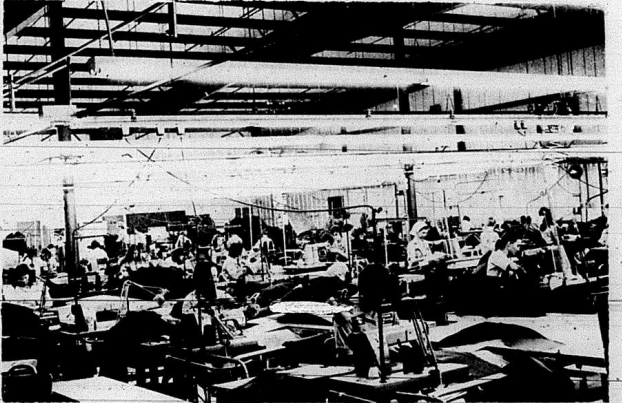
By using a special cutting machine, 100 pairs of pants are cut out at one time.

The fabric comes from the mills with a "memory chemical" in it so that when the crease is pressed in the leg at 350

degrees for 15 seconds, it triggers the chemical. The pants are then placed, for 20 minutes, in an oven at 340-350 degrees. The result is a permanent press pant that has a crease which can never be washed out.

To increase durability, the raw edges of the pant cuff are treated with a spray sealer which hardens the fabric and prevents fraying from numerous washings.

Gloschen said that the extreme heat had been a problem this summer. The plants' 12,000 square feet of space could not be adequately cooled by the air conditioning system initially installed. Large air circulating fans have recently been added to help the situation some.

September is Better Breakfast Month

Breakfast is more than the first meal of the day. The word "breakfast" means "break the fast." The morning meal comes after a 10-12 hour period without food and just before your body needs food energy for the busy morning activities. In fact,

scientific studies have proven that those who start the day with a basic nutritious breakfast, perform better physically and mentally than those who start with lighter or heavier meals. So - it's not surprising that many nutritionists consider breakfast the most important meal of the day.

It is recommended that breakfast provide about a quarter of the day's nutritional needs including about 25 percent of the day's calories.

A good breakfast includes foods from three or more of the basic four food groups: cereal or bread; milk or milk products, fruit or juice and meat or eggs. Lack of adequate breakfast increases the feeling of hunger late in the morning. This often leads to snacking or over eating at the next meal.

For those who tire of the traditional cereal, milk and juice or eggs, toast and milk breakfast, here are some nutritious foods that are guaranteed to help breakfast be less monotonous, especially if mom is in a hurry to get to work.

Layer drained canned fruit with vanilla custard pudding. Peanut butter - banana sandwich. Top dry cereal with ice milk. Layer of granola cereal with butterscotch pudding. Cheese and lunchmeat rollups. Mix bite-size oat cereal or biscuit cereal with raisins, salted peanuts and milk. Fresh apple slices with slices of cheese and milk. Shake milk and egg and

DAIRY FARM NEWS

Drought Stricken Corn Silage

Many areas of Kentucky have been affected by dry weather this summer. Corn crops are severely stricken in these areas. Obviously, these crops are going to yield much less or no grain. The best alternative to grain harvest is use of the plant for silage. Actually, the nutrition value of the corn stalk is not greatly different from the stalk plus grain except for energy content. The primary effect of drought is reduced yield per acre. Production could be reduced by 50% by severe drought.

After the corn plant has tasseled and it is obvious there will be little or no grain produced, the plant should be harvested for silage. The only consideration is moisture content. Good silage is made from material containing 32-38% dry matter. As soon as the plant is in this range, it should be put in the silo. The best advice is

"cut-don't wait." Rain will not revive corn which has passed the pollination stage and on which the leaves have dried.

Corn plants may contain more nitrates in drought years, especially in the lower stalk portion. If used for green chop, this could cause some problems, however, most of the nitrates will disappear in the silo, greatly reducing the potential hazard. The most danger from high nitrates is to people filling a silo. Silage gases can be very toxic under these conditions. Run the blower before entering a silo and go in only when absolutely necessary. Watch for yellow gases or dead birds around the silo. After a few days, the danger is reduced.

Any material should be ensiled using good sound practices. Use about 3/8" cut, fill quickly and harvest at the right moisture content. Pack and cover quickly when putting in horizontal silos. If the silage is too dry at harvest, try adding water. It is difficult to add enough water to improve ensiling but some will help. Corn which becomes too dry is never as good as it would have been, harvested at the correct moisture content.

Drought in the summer affects both summer and winter feeding. Hay and silage production will be less. Look for alternatives. Purchases may be probably the first alternative to consider. Some areas of the state will have adequate hay crops and states to our north have not been stricken by the dry weather. When buying hay, buy quality. It doesn't do much good to fill her up on poor quality hay.

Secondly, have the silage and your hay analyzed. This may be more important this year than ever because of the variation in grain content and quality of silage. Most likely, you will need to feed more grain with the silage than normal.

Small grains for fall pasture may be an answer for some people. Investigate every possi-

bility. Harvest drought corn as soon as it reaches the moisture range of 62-68% and it is obvious there will be very little grain. Forage test and have a ration balanced to meet the deficiencies in the silage. Consider all alternatives for feeding cows to maintain high yields of milk. Economic conditions still favor feeding for top production.

fresh fruit (such as peaches, strawberries or bananas). Breakfast cookies with milk. Granola over ice milk.

Following are some recipes for a good breakfast.

Chipper Banana Muffins
 1/4 cup mashed ripe banana (about 1 medium-sized)
 3/4 cup milk
 1 egg
 2 tsp. vegetable oil
 1 1/4 cups complete pancake mix
 4/4 cup sugar
 1/3 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Heat oven to 425 degrees F. Blend together banana, milk, egg and oil; add to combined pancake mix and sugar, mixing just until dry ingredients are moistened. Fill 12 greased or paper-lined medium-sized muffin cups 2/3 full. Sprinkle muffin batter evenly with chocolate pieces. Bake at 425 degrees about 15 minutes or until golden brown. Serve warm with butter and cinnamon sugar, if desired. Makes 1 dozen muffins.

Breakfast Pizza Waffles
 One half 10 oz. pkg. frozen buttermilk waffles (jumbo size - 4 waffles)
 4 bologna slices
 4/4 cup pizza sauce or catsup
 1/4 cup (2 oz) shredded Mozzarella cheese
 4 teaspoons grated Parmesan

Heat oven to 425. Place waffles on large cookie sheet; bake about 5 minutes at 425 degrees F. Remove from oven. For each serving, top 1 waffle with 1 bologna slice. Spread bologna slice with about 1 tablespoon pizza sauce; sprinkle with about 2 tsp. Mozzarella cheese and 1 tsp. Parmesan cheese. Continue baking for 8 to 10 minutes or until cheese is melted and bubbly; serve immediately. Makes 4 servings.

Bonus Breakfast Cookies

3/4 cup butter or margarine
 2/3 cup peanut butter
 2/3 cup firmly packed brown sugar
 2 eggs
 2 tsp. water
 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
 1 tsp. soda
 1/4 tsp. salt
 3 cups corn flakes, coarsely crushed

Heat oven to 350 degrees F. Beat together butter, peanut butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Blend in eggs and water. Add combined flour, soda and salt; mix well. Stir in cereal. Drop by rounded tablespoon onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 for 12 to 15 minutes or until light golden brown. Cool on cookie sheet about 2 minutes; remove to wire rack. Cool completely. Makes about 3 dozen cookies.

Golden Granola

3 cups quick or old fashioned oats, uncooked
 1 cup shredded or flaked coconut
 1/3 cup chopped pecans or walnuts
 4/4 cup honey
 1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted
 1 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
 1/4 tsp. salt
 2/3 cup raisins

Heat oven to 350; combine all ingredients except raisins in large bowl; mix well. Bake in 13x9-inch baking pan at 350 for 25 to 30 minutes or until golden brown, stirring every 5 minutes. Stir in raisins. Cool thoroughly. Store in tightly covered container. Makes about 6 cups.

Fishing Report

Fishing took a turn for the better during the last long week end of the summer and black bass, especially, were fished as improved in many major lakes. The rundown, according to the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

Buckhorn: Black bass good early morning and late afternoon on surface lures and crank baits off points and dropoffs; white bass and crappie good at night on minnows in the old river channels; bluegill good on worms and buglets; clear and stable at summer pool, 65 degrees.

Grayson: Black bass fair in late afternoon casting the banks with plastic worms; bluegill fair below the dam; trout slow; clear, stable at 1 1/2 feet below summer pool and 83 degrees.

Herrington: Black bass good at night on plastic worms; bluegill good along steep walls scattered white bass in the humps; clear, falling slowly at 5 feet below summer pool and 81 degrees.

Green: Black bass fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers and spinner baits; bluegill fair over submerged cover; clear, falling slowly at 2 1/2 feet below summer pool and 84 degrees.

Nolin: Black bass fair during the day on crank baits off shallow points and slow at night on artificial nightcrawlers off deep points; bluegill slow; clear, stable at summer pool and 83 degrees.

Barren: Black bass good early morning and late afternoon on crank baits and at night on spinner baits and artificial worms; bluegill fair off steep bluffs; clear, stable at summer pool and 82 degrees.

Cumberland: Black bass fair early morning and late afternoon on surface lures over old stumps and submerged cover in upper section and by trolling deep runners across points in the lower areas; crappie fair by drift fishing minnows about 20 feet deep; walleye fair by trolling deep runners in the lower lake; clear, falling at 24 feet below the timberline and 83 degrees.

Rough River: Black bass fair at night on artificial worms in the South Fork; crappie slow in the North Fork; clear, stable at summer pool and 85 degrees.

Dale Hollow: Crappie fair over deep submerged cover; black bass fair at night on artificial nightcrawlers; clear, falling at 4 1/2 feet below normal pool and 84 degrees.

Laurel: Bluegill fair on worms and crickets in the stick-ups; trout fair at night; clear, falling slowly at 13 feet below pool and 80 degrees.

Kentucky: Sauger slow trolling deep runners; black bass slow on spinner baits; in tailwater, catfish fair; clear and stable at 2 1/2 feet below pool

and 82 degrees.

Barkley: Black bass slow on artificial nightcrawlers and spinners along the shoreline and over dropoffs; crappie slow over submerged cover and dropoffs below the dam, catfish fair; clear, falling slowly at 2 1/2 feet below summer pool and 85 degrees.

Fishtrap: Crappie slow over stickups; catfish fair on cutbait; clear to muddy, stable at 2 feet above pool and 82 degrees.

Case Run: Musky slow on buzz baits in timbered coves and trolling medium deep runners over main channel; black bass slow on artificial nightcrawlers; clear, stable at pool and 84 degrees.

Dewey: Crappie slow over treetails and stickups; clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 82 degrees.

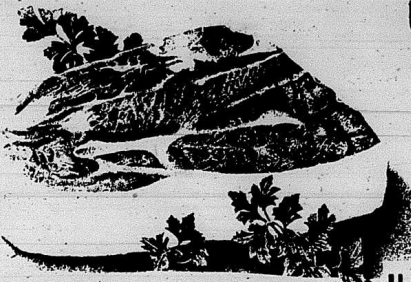

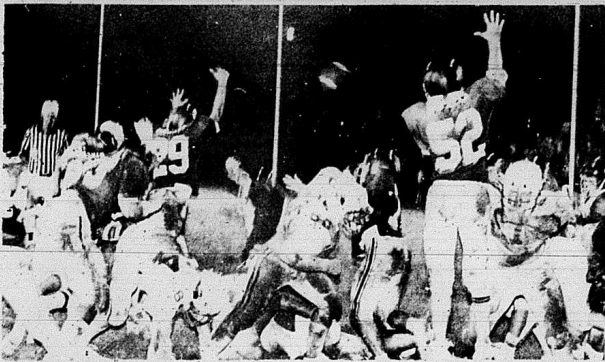

Rockets Lose To Wayne Co; Hammons, Thomason Injured

The Wayne County Cardinals came to town last Friday night and their appearance was costly to the Rockets. Running back Bobby Hammons was injured late in the second quarter and, it was discovered later, had a hairline fracture of the ankle and quarterback Dwayne Thomason, who had bruised a collarbone in practice, was injured in the third quarter and did not return to the game. Hammons had already suffered a bruised kidney in practice a couple of weeks ago and his status for this week's game is not known at this time.

Domas Smith, the highly touted running back for the Cardinals, lived up to his reputation. Although he scored only one of the Cardinal's four touchdowns, he was everywhere on the field.

Smith scored the first time for the Cardinals around left end from 17 yards out with 5:44 left in the first quarter. An offside penalty against the Rockets enabled the Cardinals to pick up two more points. After the kick-off was returned to the Rockets' 37 yard line by Bobby Hammons, Hammons then ran for a first down to the 50. But, a Rocket fumble, recovered by the Cardinals, gave them the ball on the Rockets' 46. The Cardinals moved the ball to the 28 yard line before being thrown for a seven-yard loss by Gordon Whitehead. On 4-11, the Cardinals tried a pass which was incomplete and the Rockets took over on their own 35 yard line. The Rockets were immediately tagged with an offside penalty and on 1-15, Dwayne Thomason, with some excellent blocking, completed a 10-yard

pass to Craig McGuire. Hammons picked up four yards then lost one and Hammons had to punt.

The Rockets and Cardinals exchanged the ball for the remainder of the first quarter with no one able to get in for the score.

About mid-way through the second quarter, what looked like a break for the Rockets was to no avail as a fumble recovered by the Rockets on their own 35 was played back to the Cardinals two hands later on the Rockets' 28 yard line. The Cardinals then drove to the Rockets' 2 from where Chuck Good went in for the score on a quarterback sneak. The extra point attempt was blocked by the Rockets and the 4-11 ended with the score at 14-0.

The Rockets had the ball to begin the second half but were unable to move it and Jim Clontz, who had to come into the game for punting duties after the loss of Bobby Hammons, punted the ball to the Cardinals' 10 yard line. However, a penalty for too many men was assessed against the Rockets on the punt and Clontz had to kick again. Under a lot of pressure, Clontz's kick only traveled to the Cardinals' 42 yard line and, from there, the Cardinals drove to within inches of the goal line and half-back Kenny New then went over for the score. The extra point attempt was no good.

The Rockets began their drive from their own 37 and a Thomason pass was picked off by Tommy Ball and returned to the Rockets' 1. Thomason was shaken up on the play and had to come out of the game at that point. The Cardinals then scored their last touchdown on

the night from the one on a quarterback sneak. The extra point attempt was good and the score was 27-0.

Due to injuries, the Rockets had to use several reserves the rest of the game and Wayne County also put in mostly reserves. Several fumbles by both teams ensued but there was no further scoring in the game by either team.

Brooks, defensive back Venus Hester, offensive tackle Earl "Bubba" Wilson are all expected to start. Running backs Charlie Jackson and Henry Parks, quarterback Larry McCrimmon and offensive lineman Robert Cobb are expected to be front line reserves.

These young men have shown a lot of character. Found innocent of a crime, they still had broken team rules. Last year tested each of them and each passed the test. This year, if not better football players, they should be better men.

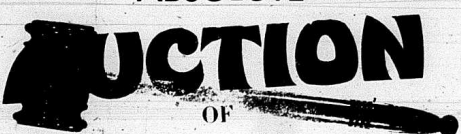
