degrees for 15 seconds, it trig-gers the chemical. The pants are then placed, for 20 minutes, in an oven at 304-350 degrees. The result is a permanent press pant that has a crease which can never be washed out.

To increase durability, the raw edges of the pant cuff are treated with a spray sealer which hardens the fabric and prevents fraying from nume-rous washings.







Drought Stricken Corn Silgge

Many areas of Kentucky have been affected by dry wea-the this symmer. Corn crops areas obviously these to be series obviously, these to be grain. The best alternative to grain harvest is use of the plant for sllage Actually, the nutri-tion value of the corn stalk is not greatly different from the stalk plus grain except for ener-gy content. The primary effect of drought is reduced yield per acre. Production could be re-duced by 50% by severe drought. acre. Pr duced h drought

duced by 30% by severe drought. After the corn plant has tasseled and it is obvious there will be little or no grain pro-duced, the plant should be har-vested for sliage. The only con-sideration is moisture content. Good sliage is made from mate-rial containing 32.38% dry mat-ter. As soon as the plant is in this range it should be plut in the silo. The best advice is

The most danger from high nitrates is to people filling a silo and go in only when absolutely necessary. Watch for yealow gases or dead birds around the silo. After a few days, the danger is reduced.
