The surface of the area where blasting operations will be conducted is owned by John Allen, Billy Whitaker, Chester Whitaker, Drexel Webb. The Conscience

Let your conscience be your guide. It is advice which has been given for ages, and it is good advice. IF the conscience has been trained to differentiate between right and wrong.

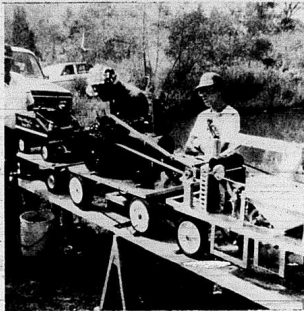
What is conscience? It is the part of man's intellect that accuses his thoughts and deeds, but it's verdict is dependent upon knowledge. Otherwise, it is subject to excuse when it should accuse and vice-versa. For example, the conscience of the cannibal excuses him when he eats his fellowman simply because it has no knowledge that this is wrong. On the other hand, the Jew's conscience may accuse him when he eats certain meats because his knowledge is limited to Old Testament restrictions regarding the eating of those meats.

Even the trained conscience can become seared; that is, unfeeling (1 Tim. 4:13). A conscience which is offended repeatedly, eventually ceases to function properly. If we tell ourselves often enough, long enough, that a wrong is right, we reach the point where we believe it. At that point, our conscience no longer accuses us of wrongdoing - at least in that particular area. A case in point is a "little white lie." Some folks convince themselves that "stretching the truth a bit" is more advantageous in certain instances than is the whole truth. After all, they reason, "the truth would hurt me or someone else," and "God won't

punish me for just one little lie." (We might point out here that God does not categorize lies as small, big, white or black but "all liars shall have their part in the lake that burneth with fire and brimstone" - Rev. 21:8). Under similar conditions, and by the same reasoning, they lie again...and again. Before long, lying has become a common occurrence with them and their conscience is seared; it no longer bothers them at all because they have deceived themselves into thinking that what they are doing is right. God judges not only the end result, but also the means by which the end is reached. Good can no more come of evil than fig trees can bear olive berries. Even though someone may be spared some unpleasantness by a lie, the liar suffers the loss of his soul! Who could call that good?

One who hears and believes religious error will suffer no pains of conscience when he practices what he believes. Their consciences were no barriers to members of the Jones Cult who believed that mass suicide was noble and right. Although the Bible expressly teaches one man for one woman, those who believe in polygamy have no trouble with their consciences if they have a hundred wives.

The conscience, properly fitted with knowledge, and undefiled by offense, is a safe guide. Conversely, the ignorant or defiled conscience is worthless as a guide.

County Tax Rate Will Be Lower for 1980; But not as Much as Expected

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court was scheduled to meet in special session Wednesday morning to officially set the county tax rate for 1980 and the rate was expected to be lower than last year's because of increased assessments levied this year.

Under state law, the county is prohibited from collecting more than 4% in additional revenue than it collected in 1979 with the exception of new construction which is exempt from the restriction.

Tuesday, Robert Cromer, PVA, made his recommendation as to the tax rate which would keep the county within the 4% restriction to County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker.

These rates breakdown as follows with last year's figures in parentheses:

9 1/2¢ per \$100 valuation general fund tax (12.70); 2.6¢ Health Department (4.00); 01¢ Soil Conservation (.25); 01¢ Library (1.50); 1.3¢ County Extension Office (2.00) for a total county tax rate of 1.366¢ compared to last year's \$2.041¢ per \$100 assessment. The franchise rate is also \$1.396¢.

Added to this figure is the state rate of 24 1/2¢ per \$100 assessment (27.90) and the school tax which was 94¢ last year but which has not been set for this year (this tax is set by the state). The school rate is expected to be lower than 1979.

Last year's total county tax rate was \$5.77% per \$100 assessment and this year's rate without the school tax figured in amount so far to \$3.806¢.

Because of new construction and the 4% increase, additional revenue will be generated for county government and local agencies with their own tax base. For example, the Health Department can expect to receive an additional \$4,900; Library, \$1,700; Soil Conservation, \$301 and County Extension Office, \$2,450. The county will have approximately \$130,000 more in additional revenues to expend.

Tax bills are expected to go out the latter part of September.

Council Votes to Extend Clyde Barnett Road Around Lake Linville

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted Monday night to allow the county fifty feet of right-of-way around Lake Linville so that the Clyde Barnett Road can be extended to junction with the Oak Hill Road. The road will likely be built on property already owned by the city.

The council's action came after a request by Doug Brock, a property owner on the lake, who told the council that the fiscal court had appropriated \$3,000 for materials needed to extend the road approximately 8/10 of a mile. County employees will furnish the necessary labor and, Brock said, the county had agreed to maintain the road after it is built.

Members of the city's water and sewer committees were designated by the council to work with the county's engineers to establish a center line for the road.

Sidewalks around town should be coming in for some upgrading. Councilman Tom Welch reported to the council that he had contacted several merchants in town, including Hatt's Five and Ten, Ramsey's Pool Hall, Fain Furniture, Contingent Telephone, and Vernon Bargain Store, who had agreed to provide materials for upgrading of the sidewalks in front of their businesses if city employees would provide the labor. Councilman Conrad Parrett also reported that the county had agreed to the loan of two of their trucks to help haul mate-

rials. The county will also be asked to provide some CETA workers to help with the project if possible.

Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Bullock to discuss the possibility of an ordinance being passed which would prohibit the playing of baseball in city streets. City Attorney Carl Clontz told the council that if such an ordinance were approved, it would have to

be narrowly defined as to what constituted "baseball playing" so that policemen would have a very clear idea of when the law was being broken.

Approval of the ordinance was put in the form of a motion by Councilman Welch and seconded by Councilman Conrad Parrett but the Council held off on further action until the exact wording of the ordinance could be decided.

Marijuana Patch Destroyed; Valued Between \$4,000-6,000

Sheriff Henry Lee Abney State Policeman Jimmy Silvers and Det. Fred Walton destroyed a patch of marijuana found growing about 300 yards from the back side of Lake Linville Friday in a well-hidden cove.

Cash value of the crop was estimated, by officers, as being

between \$4,000 and \$6,000. Some of the plants were as tall as 12 feet and had begun to seed.

The plants were well cultivated with tools and plant food in evidence.

No arrests have been made as yet in the case.

Hiring Freeze Prohibiting Replacement of County Agent

The Cooperative Extension Service of the University of Kentucky reports that filling Rockcastle County's Extension Agency vacancy will have high priority when the recently imposed job freeze is lifted.

H. Lee Durham held this position for many years before retiring and shortly afterwards,

Governor Brown announced a freeze on all University positions which includes the extension agent's job.

Rockcastle is one of 18 counties right now across the state without an agent and has high priority when the freeze is lifted because it is one of the counties which has been without an agent the longest.

LIONS DISTRICT GOVERNOR TO BE AT LIVINGSTON

Andrew Isaacs, District Governor of Lions International for this region of Kentucky will make an official visit to the Lions Club at Livingston on September 11, 1980.

Isaacs has been active in projects for CARE, sight conservation and had been the moving force in getting telephone directories printed in braille for Kentucky's sightless. He also organized the Central Kentucky Hearing Aid Bank, based in Lexington.

He now serves as Chairman of the Coalfields Veterans. This body is composed of present and past District Governors in the entire state of Kentucky.

STRUCK BY TRAIN

Anita Malicoat, 36, of Orlando and James Malicoat, 43, also of Orlando were riding in a vehicle which was struck by a train on the Brush Creek School Road, 4.7 miles east of Mt. Vernon about 7:18 a.m., Friday, September 5.

Ms. Malicoat, driver of the vehicle, said that she did not see or hear the train until she had pulled onto the tracks and observed the train lights. She said she put the vehicle in reverse and attempted to back off the track but was struck before she could clear the track.

Both occupants were taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital where Ms. Malicoat was treated for Class 2 injuries and Mr. Malicoat received treatment for minor injuries.

County Farmers Feeling Effects of Drought on Crops and Livestock

Rockcastle County farmers, like cattlemen across the state, are feeling the effects of the hot dry summer on the western side of the county seems hardest hit by the drought according to local ASCS officials. Farmers here report no rain since they planted their corn crops and that the fertilizer is still lying on top of the ground.

Tobacco has been severely affected, according to Harold Ballinger of the ASCS office, poundage is expected to be down about one-half county wide. Last year, tobacco yield in the county was down about 330,000 lbs. due to the wet weather. Mr. Ballinger also said that the poundage loss can be carried over until next year in most cases.

Very little, if any, hay will be salvaged and pasture on most farms are gone. Farmers will have to start selling off cattle if water supplies do not improve, Mr. Ballinger said. Some are now hauling water for dairy herds.

Corn production in the county is also down, in some instances from 94-104 bushels an acre to 22 bushels.

About 45 local farmers are participating in the Feed Grain Program and are eligible for low-yield payments under the disaster provisions of the program. The deadline for applying for the program was July 15; however, farmers can pay a small fee and still sign-up for benefits. Producers who think they might qualify under the program should contact the local ASCS office in the courthouse immediately. Production will have to be determined by ASCS crop appraisers, so contact the office before destroying evidence of the crop in the field in order to be eligible for pro-

gram benefits. Cattle producers and dairy men who have suffered a substantial loss (40% in five stock feed they normally produce could be eligible for assistance under the Emergency Feed Program. For more information, contact the ASCS office.

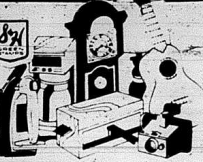



Your Cooperative Extension Service Farming News

County Extension Agent for 4-H Late Summer Alfalfa Seedlings

Seeding alfalfa in a dry, dusty seedbed has resulted in many stand failures over the years. The problem arises when a shower results in sufficient moisture for germination but insufficient to get the root system established. Many producers have their seedbed ready now and are waiting for a rain of an inch or more before seeding. This is certainly a recommended practice because that amount of moisture would help insure establishment. The question now arises how long to wait since many people are skeptical of getting that inch or so of rain.

Mid-September should be used as the cut-off date for seeding alfalfa. Seedings made after September 15 run a much higher risk of winter loss. Alfalfa seedlings should have at least six weeks to germinate and grow before the first hard freeze. If moisture conditions are still unfavorable and a decision is made to postpone seeding until next spring, be sure to store seed properly. Consider seeding small grain on the land as a cover crop at the rate of one bushel per acre.

Soil Sampling for Fall Fertilization

Kentucky farmers should be making plans for fall fertilization of their crops, according to an Extension soils specialist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Soil samples taken now are going to give farmers a picture when the soil is under the greatest stress. Fertilization of

tobacco ground before the winter cover crop is planted is of immediate importance.

As soon as the tobacco is harvested, farmers should take soil samples to see if lime will be needed. If lime is recommended, put it on before disking tobacco stubble. By doing this, farmers will be decreasing the risk of manganese toxicity in their tobacco ground next year. Also, fertilize now for fall forages, including alfalfa and cool season grasses. Since most fall forages are not planted until mid to late September, there is enough time to get samples analyzed and recommendations applied.

Farmers should take samples that represent the field in which the crop is to be grown. The samples have to accurately reflect the field for proper recommendations to be made. The soil samples should be taken to your county Extension office where they will be mailed to the UK soil testing laboratory for analysis and proper recommendations.

Additional information on soil sampling and fall fertilization programs can be obtained through publications available at your county extension office.

Calorie Needs Diminish With Age

Aging is accompanied by many changes in lifestyle, including what and how much you need to eat. To stay in good health, your diet should change as you age. You must make better food choices as you grow older.

Older people need the same nutrients that younger people do but fewer calories. This means that as you age, you need to get the same amount of nutrients in less total food. The diet has little room for so-called "empty-calorie" foods, which are foods that are high in calories, but low in nutrients. As the body ages, caloric needs diminish 5 percent per decade which translates into 100 fewer calories per day. A woman who, at 25, can maintain her weight at 2,000 calories per day will need only 1,700 calories per day at 55. The daily caloric need will be further reduced to 1,500 at age 75.

Because most people find it difficult to cut down on the amount of food they consume, old age is often accompanied by

weight problems. Obesity, as a result, has become a major American health problem and is associated with many chronic diseases, such as diabetes and heart disease.

The National Research Council recommends the following number of calories per day for the average man or woman getting moderate exercise in moderate climate:

Age	Men	Women
24-34	2,700	2,000
35-44	2,600	1,900
45-54	2,500	1,800
55-64	2,400	1,700
65-74	2,300	1,600
75 and over	2,200	1,500

These tables suggest a significant reduction in calories as you age. So, cutting down the amount of food you eat, but not the variety, is the important dietary change to make as you age.

Dietary Guidelines For Americans

The U.S. Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare has recently set seven guidelines for American diets. One of the guidelines is to maintain ideal weight. Those agencies propose the following for all Americans to aid them in better health through maintaining proper weight:

1. Increase physical exercise.
2. Eat less fat and fatty foods.
3. Eat less sugar and sweets.
4. Avoid too much alcohol.
5. Improve eating habits by eating slowly, eating smaller portions and avoiding seconds.

If you are too fat, your chances of developing some chronic disorders are increased. Obesity is associated with high blood pressure, increased levels of blood fats (triglycerides and cholesterol) and the most common type of diabetes. All of these, in turn, are associated with increased risks of heart attacks and strokes. Thus, you should try to maintain "ideal" weight.

What the ideal weight is for you? There is no absolute answer. If you have been obese since childhood, you may find it difficult to reach or to maintain your weight within the acceptable range. For most people, their weight should not be more than it was when they were

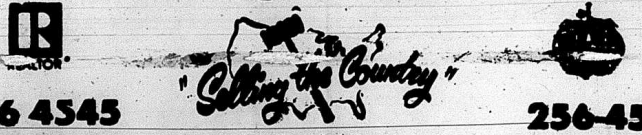

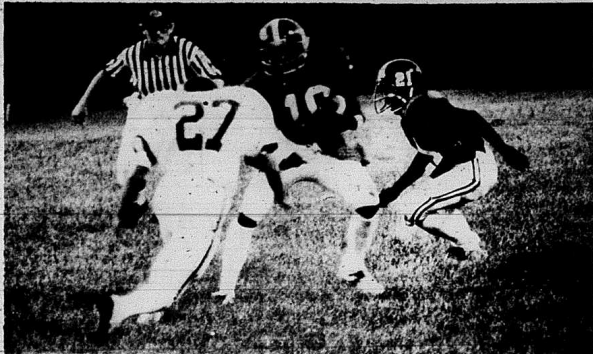

We played a tough Lincoln County team Friday night and finally came out of a game with no injuries. I want to praise my kids for a pretty good defensive effort they displayed at times. Lincoln was very fast and we were unable to contain their speed both up the middle and outside. We played a seven-man front line many times to stop their running game; but, they proved to be too much. We just didn't have enough size, quickness or experience to match up

I want to mention that we had two new backs starting their first game ever. They were Bobby Dooley and Teddy Lawrence. I had to get these boys ready this week due to all the injuries we've had and I thought they did a good job in executing their plays. Again, we had a lot of trouble in getting our offensive line to block. When the Kentucky Wildcats open the season Saturday against Utah State... U.K. & Fran Curci will be one man that's happy over his "Hogtown" connection. He'll be counting heavily on two juniors from Haroldsburg, Henry Parks and Venus Meaux.

"An interesting thing," Coach Curci was saying after practice the other day, "we wanted Henry back but we weren't that sure about Venus. Henry was the really touted, outstanding high school back. Coach Johnson out at Haroldsburg is the only coach I know of that still runs the single wing attack. Parks was the tailback and safetyman on defense and Meaux was the blocking back that hardly ever carried the ball. He played linebacker on defense. We signed Henry and we tried to get Venus to come as a walk-up. He wasn't too interested in that."

Alvis Johnson has built the Class A school with a 4-year student body of only about 340 into one of Kentucky's football powers. He remembers trying to get U.K. to take Venus Meaux. "It took me two months to convince them to take Venus," he was saying. "I begged them to take him. I kept telling them that Venus was better than Henry and they kept asking me if he's faster, how come you're playing him at blocking back? I don't think they would have taken Venus if Happy Chandler hadn't helped me argue his case. I think what sold Kentucky on him though," Coach Johnson was saying, "is when they saw him win a track meet."

"That got our attention," Fran Curci said. "Venus ran the hundred in 10 seconds flat and we thought then he could play for us. We can't coach speed. Venus is an outstanding defensive back. He has an excellent chance to play pro ball. Henry has been hurt this fall but he's a quality running back and will play a lot for us this year. He has that gliding gait and can really operate when he gets in the open field. Both Parks and Meaux are exceptional athletes and we're counting on them both this season."

Fran Curci is glad of the "Hogtown" connection. Kentucky's fans will be too.

and headed west following their leader, Lewis Craig. They were going to Kentucky for reasons of religious freedom. Two hundred of the people were members of Craig's church in Spottsylvania County and the others were mostly friends and relatives who had chosen to go with them. The laws of Virginia forbade their beliefs and Mr. Craig, along with others of his church, had been jailed there for preaching. This "Travelling Church" couldn't wait for Spring - they went while they were of the mind to go.

In December, 1781, they entered Rockcastle County. None of these early settlers called themselves "Christians Only" and would not convert to generation, but this was the root stock of the Christian Church.

In 1830, the Reformation was in full swing headed by Alexander and Thomas Campbell. Barton Stone traveled through the county as early as 1819 and had broken the church ties with the Presbytery at a meeting in Bourbon County at Cane Ridge. It was these combined influences of the reforms that worked their way over in Rockcastle County to the fact that they had much in common - that they shared essentially the same approach to the New Testament and by 1830, the Mt. Vernon congregation had been dropped because of these beliefs by the Boone Creek Baptist Association along with Mt. Zion, Nicholasville, Liberty and Friendship.

By the end of the Civil War, the Mt. Vernon Christian Church was meeting in the old log courthouse. About 1866, a building was built land this was a two-story frame building located across from the courthouse. By 1920, it had become apparent that a new building was needed and the old building was sold on October 22, 1923. According to the terms of the original deed, the new building to the Egbert Fish heirs, who generously signed the property over to the Church so that it could be sold and the proceeds applied to the new building. The present building was completed in December of 1924 and was dedicated by Bro. C.W. Cauble on May 18, 1925.

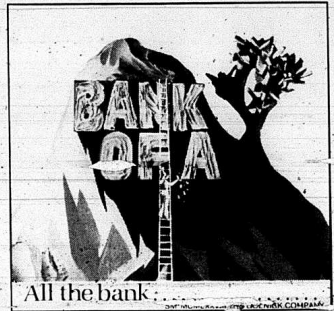
