HEARING

Rockcastle County Board of Education

The Rockcastle County Board of Education will hold a public hearing in the Rockcastle County Board of Education meeting room on October 7, 1980 at 7:00 p.m. for the purpose of hearing public comments regarding a proposed General Fund tax rate of 7.0 cents.

The General Fund tax rate levied in 1979-80 was 9.4 cents and produced revenue of \$83,560. The proposed General Fund tax rate of 7.0 cents is expected to produce \$96,046 for fiscal year 1980-81. \$7,575 of this amount is from new property and personal property. The Compensating General Fund tax rate in 1980-81 is 6.8 cents with revenue expected to be \$93,302. The general areas to which revenue in excess of 1979-80 revenue is to be allocated is as follows: Cost of collections, exonerations, discounts and delinquents, \$1,200; instruction, \$4,000; pupil transportation, \$5,000 and operation of plant, \$2,286.

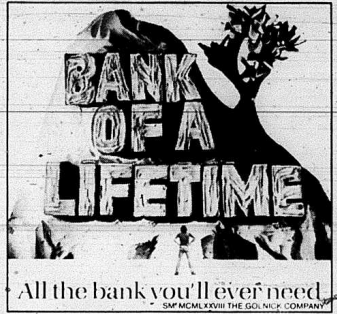

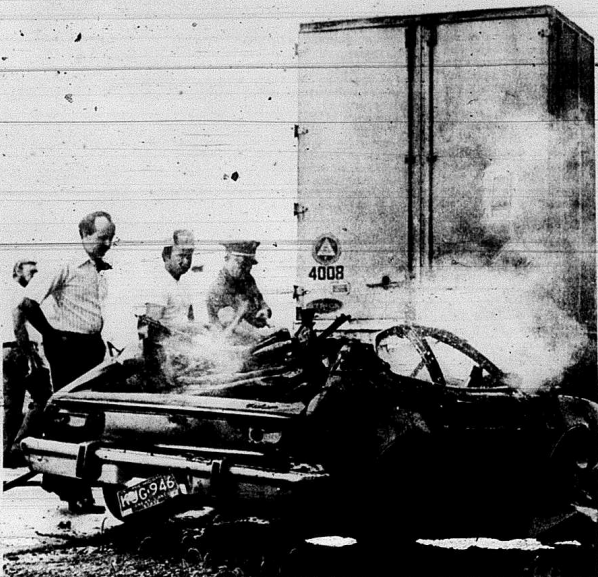

Michigan Woman Fatally Injured in Accident on I-75

Candace Valerie Dulan, 28, of St. Clair Shores, Michigan was killed about 8 a.m. Monday morning when the 1974 Pinto she was driving went underneath a transfer truck parked in the northbound emergency lane of Interstate-75. The Pinto immediately caught fire and burned.

A passenger in the car, John William Roberts, 35, of Compton, California, told State Trooper Jimmie Silvers, who investigated the crash, that he was asleep in the front seat of the Pinto and was awakened by the crash. He said he immediately tried to pull Ms. Dulan from under the steering wheel where she was trapped but was unable to do so. Several truck drivers tried to extinguish the

blaze but to no avail. Roberts escaped from the wreck with minor cuts and bruises about his face and body. He was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital for treatment.

Silvers said motorists traveling south on the interstate reported that Ms. Dulan made no attempt to brake after veering across the road and into the truck. He speculated that Ms. Dulan fell asleep at the wheel but has requested an autopsy.

Victor Robert Wingate of Conley Springs, N.C., driver of the truck, was reportedly asleep in the truck at the time of the accident. He has been cited for improper parking in the emergency lane on a limited access highway.

Rebel Army Marched Through Rockcastle Twice During 1862

Much to the chagrin of the mountain people of Kentucky, who were for the most part staunchly Union, several divisions of the Confederate Army led by General E. Kirby Smith and totaling over 20,000 tramped up from Tennessee into Kentucky and through Rockcastle County during the Civil War. Gen. Smith was on his way to the Bluegrass where he hoped to be responsible for a major rout of the Union forces there.

The cavalry, led by a man named Scott, was sent ahead to clear the country toward Rich-

mond. At London, they took 75 prisoners, 40 wagons and 175 mules from an enemy regiment there. They guarded Mt. Vernon and drove in cups from Crab Orchard, but by-passed the town.

Scott's division then crossed over to the London-Paris road and the Old State Road and discovered that the Big Hill area was occupied by Colonel Metcalfe's Seventh Ky. Cavalry and a battalion of Houk's Third Tennessee (Union) led by Colonel Chiles. Scott charged and Metcalfe rushed to meet the attack but was left almost alone in the field. The "cowards had turned tail and

fled," some fleeing as far as Paris according to Federal accounts. Houk's soldiers fought well and prevented total destruction, but were forced to retreat toward Richmond. From this battle Scott increased to 175 the wagons and to 650 the mules captured since he had entered Kentucky.

Following the battle, Scott decided to hold up, await further orders and allow the infantry to catch up. The troops camped along the old State Road from Big Hill to the Rockcastle River during the period from August 26 to the 28th in 1862. The other divisions

"Nothing to Typhoid Rumors," Midkiff Says

According to Steven Midkiff, local Environmentalist for the Health Department, there is absolutely no truth to the rumors that typhoid cases have been reported in the county.

The rumors reportedly got started when a resident of Brodhead called the Division of Water in Frankfort and told them there were seven cases of typhoid in the county and that several teachers from Brodhead School were absent due to the illness. An investigator from this office was in the county the latter part of the last week and,

along with Mr. Midkiff, checked out the rumor and found it baseless.

The bad taste of the city's water has been the cause for many complaints over the past weeks but Midkiff said there was absolutely no danger from the water as the chlorine content checked daily and chlorine is what curbs bacteria. He said the bad taste was being caused by the manganese released by the growth of the algae after it dies and manganese causes the bad taste and also causes the water to have a

slightly brownish color.

Midkiff further said that the city's water was still a great deal more free of bacteria than most springs which people are using to haul water from. Midkiff said this was because of the type of rock we primarily have in the county, cracked Limestone, which allows ground water to seep into springs. He Midkiff is now planning to obtain samples of the water at the springs being most used by people in an effort to determine the safety of this water.

CONG. VANDERJAGT TO BE IN SOMERSET

Congressman Guy Vanderjagt of Michigan will be in Somerset on Saturday, September 20th at noon for the campaign kick-off of the Republican ticket in the 5th District of Kentucky.

"It is important and will be appreciated if a good crowd from Rockcastle County appears at this campaign rally to show support for all our Republican candidates," Alonzo McCollum, county chairman said.

REGISTRATION BOOKS TO BE CLOSED

Rockcastle County voters are urged to check with Irene Bales, Clerk, to see if they are registered in the correct precinct.

If you have moved out of your original precinct since last voting, you will need to change your voting precinct. Or, if your name or address has changed, you will need to correct this.

There will be a voting machine in the courthouse on the second floor equipped for practice voting. Since the machine will be filled with candidates' names, you might want to check the ballot before going to the polls.

Industrial Authority Awards Contracts

The Rockcastle County Industrial Authority project to construct a 450,000 gallon water storage tank has been awarded a grant totaling \$224,170. The tank will be built on the present industrial site located on Highway 150 between Brodhead and Mt. Vernon and will serve both the industrial park needs and, when necessary, the City of Mt. Vernon.

Two contracts were awarded the latter part of August by the Authority. McCord Engineering and Construction, Inc. of Louisville received a contract for \$46,000 to construct the tank foundation and Caldwell Tanks, Inc. of Louisville will be awarded the \$106,915 contract to furnish the tank.

Construction at the industrial park is to begin this week. The project is expected to be completed by May of 1981.

Plans for Toxic Waste Recycling Plant on the Shelf for Now

Regarding two earlier articles concerning a toxic waste recycling plant possibly coming to this county, we have learned, by way of a telephone conversation with Tom Desmond of the T.L.D. Corp. of Louisville, that plans for the site have possibly been shelved.

According to Desmond, the original plans were for the partial assembly of an incinerator to be transported to Sey-

mour, Indiana to be used in a clean-up operation of an illegal waste site here. The incinerator was to be built at the Cass building between Brodhead and Mt. Vernon and was expected to take until Spring to finish.

Desmond also said that later plans for the property had possibly included ethanol production. As of now, there are no plans for either, the incinerator or the fuel production.

School Board Sets Tax Rate

The Rockcastle County Board of Education will hold a public hearing in the Rockcastle County Board of Education meeting room on October 7, 1980 at 7 p.m. for the purpose of hearing public comments regarding a proposed General Fund tax rate of 7.0 cents.

The General Fund tax rate levied in 1979-80 was 9.4 cents and produced revenue of \$83,560. The proposed General Fund tax rate of 7.0 cents is expected to produce \$66,046 for fiscal year 1980-81. \$7,575 of this amount is from new property and personal property.

Compensating General Fund tax rate in 1980-81 is 8.8 cents with revenue expected to be \$93,302.

The general areas to which revenue in excess of 1979-80 revenue is to be allocated are: Cost of collections, and extensions, discounts and delinquencies.

Livingston Lions Celebrate 40th Year

Approximately 50 persons were on hand to help the Livingston Lions Club celebrate its 40th Anniversary last Thursday night at the Livingston School cafeteria.

The Livingston Club, which was organized in September of 1940, held its first meeting in the Masonic Hall and had 15 charter members. C.F. Mullins of Livingston was honored Thursday night as one of the

Helping the Lions celebrate the occasion was District Governor Andy Isaacs and Deputy Dist. Gov. Clifton Moore. Isaacs pointed out that during the 40 years the Livingston club had bought over 480 pair of eyeglasses for needy children and the elderly of Rockcastle County and that the club had been a tremendous asset to the community and the school.

Legislative Report

By: Rep. Harold DeMarcus

During the August meeting of the Program Review and Investigation Committee, a report was presented on a preliminary investigation into state-owned land. Officials from the state Departments of Finance, Revenue, Transportation and the Secretary of State's office appeared before the committee to address this subject.

A few months ago, several legislators came up with the idea that surplus state-owned land could be sold by auction, funds generated from the sales would then be placed in the state's depleted treasury. There was just one problem, the state didn't know how much land it owned or where it was all located.

This revelation led to state government being charged with the task of talking an inventory of all state-owned land.

In order to narrow the project's scope, the Department of Revenue is working with county property valuation administrators to compile a complete list of all tax exempt property in Kentucky, state-owned land is tax exempt, by accumulating land parcel maps for each county. At this time, land parcel maps have been compiled for 90 of the 120 counties.

The Department of Finance has required individual state agencies to submit a list of all land under their control. This information will be placed in a computer under supervision by the Secretary of State's office.

Also, the Department of Finance is planning to perform a title search of land deeds in every county. This is a large

undertaking which is probably one of the reasons the title searches have yet to begin.

The Department of Transportation is conducting an inventory of highway related land which will be separated from the Departments of Finance and Revenue inventories. However, information gathered by the Transportation inventory will also be pitched to the Secretary of State.

The Right-of-Way purchasing division is conducting the Department of Transportation's inventory. Transportation officials estimate their inventory will be completed by year's end.

The committee has requested the Department of Transportation to appear at their September meeting in order to present a list of surplus right-of-way property and a time table for auctioning off this property.

Presently, all land purchased by the Departments of Finance and Transportation is supposed to be recorded by the Secretary of State and merged into the state-owned land inventory. However, there have

been reports made by county clerks that this is not being done.

In the past, a substantial amount of politics has been involved with state land purchases, especially those relating to highways. The possibility exists that politics may dictate how quickly the state-owned land inventory is completed.

This type of inventory is long over-due and speculation has it that the inventory will be a long time in reaching completion. Of course, if state government is now truly free of politics, the inventory should be completed in a few months. At any rate, the committee will continue to monitor the inventory's progress.

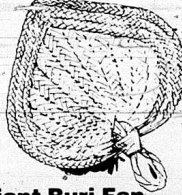

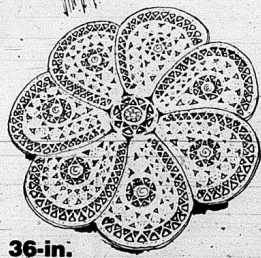

"REBEL ARMY"

(Cont. From Front)

soon followed and Gen. Smith and his complete army entered the Bluegrass fighting and winning the Battle of Richmond.

On August 28, General Smith wrote a letter back to his wife telling her of having traveled 110 miles through a mountain region over almost impassible roads and through a country almost destitute of supplies of all kinds. He described his troops as ragged, barefooted, almost starving and exhausted from marching day and night and from lack of water. He praised their patriotism, fortitude and self control without which, he said, they could never have crossed the mountain mountains. The mountain people he described as being "ferocious and bitterly hostile."

Having been lucky enough to avoid war in our homeland during this generation we can only use our imagination to conjure up a scene of the destruction to the area after the Army passed through. General Smith had ordered his troops to "behave like gentlemen" as they passed through, but the army had to eat and feeding 20,000 hungry men would, to say the least, put a strain on any community.

Martha Margrete Hardin Morris, a woman who lived at Calloway during the Civil War, told her granddaughter, Hattie Morris Mullins, this story many times.

A Mr. Ward and Mr. Poete, both residents of Calloway, heard as everyone did, that the Rebel Army was coming. The two rounded up their cattle and horses and sent them by some slaves to the Salt Petre Cave to be hidden. The slaves protested because they feared the cave, but were threatened with being turned over to the advancing army if they did not obey.

Mr. Ward had a large hillside pen full of black hogs. The Army (possibly Scott's cavalry) was passing through the sup-

per decided to camp there for the night. That night, huge fires lighted the hillsides and the hungry men ate. Mrs. Morris recalled the terrible scene the next morning of trampled crops, torn-down fences and a hillside black with the half-eaten carcasses and hides of the hogs.

On October 17 of the same year, General Smith was again at the "Big Rockcastle River" on his way back to Tennessee with his command extending all the way back to Big Hill. Smith had grown extremely resentful of Gen. Braxton Bragg who had assumed authority over Smith's activities in Kentucky and had, at every turn, caused General Smith embarrassment and humiliation. Smith had planned on spending the winter in Kentucky, but Bragg decided early in October on their return to Tennessee and assigned to Smith the more difficult route back and burdened him down with much of his wagon train. Bragg and his army, returned by way of Mt. Vernon and reached Knoxville several days ahead of Smith.

According to reports from Gen. Smith, getting the supply trains back over Big Hill and through this mountains was an almost impossible job. He was forced to use double teams much of the way and had no hope of saving all of the train. He sent word to Bragg that he would try to save the provisions and ammunition wagons but did not expect to save much of the artillery. "When the starved and tired mules faltered and fell, the demoralized men seized the wagons and lifted them, by sheer force over the worst places." When he reached Tennessee, he reported that he had returned with only 6,000 men capable of waging battles. In Kentucky, the only major conflict in which he had been engaged was the Battle of Richmond.

According to Ed Mullins of this county, his father W.G. Mullins told of finding an abundance of cannon and musket balls in White Oak Branch (which is directly along the route taken by the army) during his youth. Other residents report having found them as recently as 40 years ago. Very likely, much artillery was also left behind, but since this was early in the War, it was probably later put to use by the Union forces.

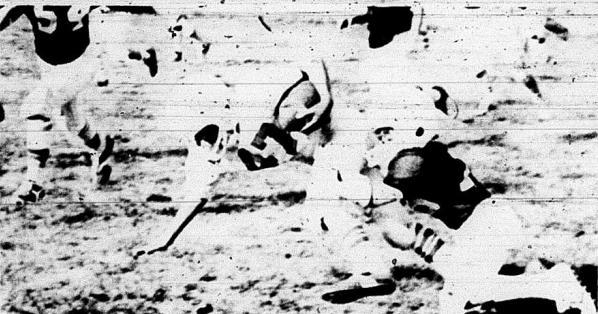

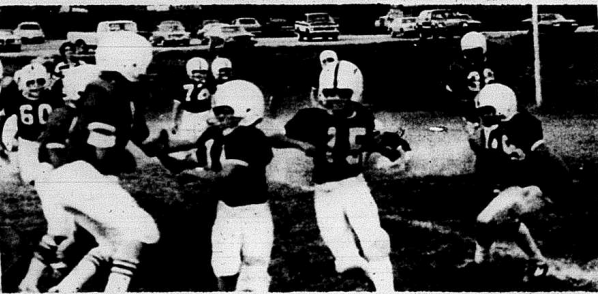

LEXINGTON — It's one of the strangest series in college football. The one that is to be renewed in Lexington this Saturday between Kentucky and Indiana. The 2 schools are located only 3 1/2 hours apart as the car drives, yet they have met only 14 times on the gridiron. They first got together way back in 1893. That's 87 years ago. In one span, the two teams went 40 years between games. Kentucky and Indiana did not play football from 1927 until the current series was started in 1967. They've met 7 times since then and Indiana has won 6 of them. Kentucky's Fran Curci and Indiana's Lee Corso took over the head coaching duties the same year, 1973. Both were brought in to rebuild poor football programs. Curci had made his mark at Tampa and Miami. Corso had turned the program around at the University of Louisville. Both have done good jobs. Curci and Corso have one thing in common. Both were not shot high school quarterbacks in Miami, Florida. Corso is older than Curci and went on to play for Florida State. Curci was an All American at Miami. The two men are not the closest of friends. Curci's Cats and Corso's Hoosiers met that first season for both coaches in Bloomington, Indiana. Indiana won 17 to 3. The two teams met the following year in Lexington and Mike Fanuzzi and Sonny Collins led the Cats to a 28-22 victory. There was a 5 year break in this strange series between bording states. It was renewed last September in Bloomington and Indiana jumped on top quickly and held on for an 18 to 10 decision. The rivalry that has developed between these ancient adversaries is strong considering how few times the two teams have met. Corso, perhaps because of his years in Louisville seems to take it especially serious. Normally a gregarious person, last season he refused to speak with the media from Kentucky. Saturday's game is a very critical game for both ball clubs. That seems strange somehow when you're talking about two schools who are generally considered BASKETBALL powers.
