NATIONAL FOREST TIMBER FOR SALE

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, 100 Vaught Road, Winchester, Ky. 40391, up to 10:00 a.m., local time, at the place of bid opening on October 27, 1980, and opened immediately thereafter. All timber marked or designated for cutting is located on an area of about 1368 acres of which 170 acres have been designated for cutting, within The Daniel Boone National Forest, on War Fork, Alcom Branch and Ash Gut Branch, Compartment Nos. 3036 and 3049, Berea Ranger District, Jackson County, Kentucky estimated to be 639 MBF of sawtimber.

In accordance with the National Forest Management Act of 1976, a bidder qualifying as a small business under the Small Business Act, (as amended) and the regulations issued thereunder may elect at the time of sealed bid submission to have the Forest Service construct the

included specified roads. If the bidder elects to have the Forest Service construct the roads, the price paid for the timber shall include the estimated construction cost which is \$62,072. This estimate is for construction as if accomplished by an independent contractor under a public works contract. Such road will be constructed to the design classes and, in accordance with drawings and specifications, included in the sample contract.

Specified roads, whether constructed by the purchaser or the Forest Service, shall be completed by December 6, 1981. As advertised rates, the applicable purchaser credits are \$19,393 with a Purchaser Credit Limit of \$22,492. The Forest Service has programmed \$29,132 in cash contribution to partially offset the difference between Purchaser Credit Limit at advertised rates and the maximum Purchaser Credit Limit. Following sale award, under Purchaser credit election, Forest Service contribution will be decreased by any overbid with a corresponding increase in Purchaser Credit Limit up to a maximum of \$51,524.

If the high bidder elects to have the Forest Service build the road, and there is insufficient value of timber after including the bid premium, the Forest Service will not offset the deficit with contributed funds. You should consider this when deciding upon your election.

If the bidder elects to have the Forest Service construct the roads, the Forest Service intends to perform construction by contract. When the Forest Service intends to construct the road through a contract, award of the timber sale will not be made unless either a satisfactory road plan is received or if Forest Service fails to receive such a bid within 120 days of determination of ac-

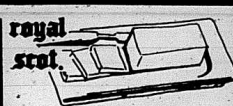

Fifth District Republican candidate, Harold (Hal) Rogers met with Ronald Reagan and George Bush (September 15, 1980) in Washington to help set the legislative goals for the first year of the Reagan Administration. According to Hal Rogers, two

issues he discussed with Reagan and Bush were tax reforms and steps that must be taken to bolster America's defense in the 1980's. Rogers concluded his remarks while in the nation's capitol this week by pointing out, "In the past four years,

unemployment has soared. Inflation has doubled. Interest rates have doubled and gas prices have doubled. The G.O.P. is committed to do something about America's problems, and we're on the problem right now."

City Council Fails to Grant Water and Sewer Service to Project

A lack of a second Monday night to a motion by City Councilman Ernest Stanley, kept the Mt. Vernon City Council, in special session, from guaranteeing water and sewer service to 52 low-income housing units to be built and owned by three men from Somerset: Connie Curis, Jerry Ikerd, and Gerald Lovins.

The request for the service came from Wes Whitley, architect for the project which has been approved by HUD for construction. Mr. Whitley told the council that it was planned to build the housing on old U.S. 25 near the Armour Creamery Plant. The complex would include 14 three-bedroom units and 38 two-bedroom apartments and would be rented to low-in-

come families for no more than 25 percent of their total income. Water and sewer charges would be included in the rent.

The request for a guarantee of water and sewer service seemed a mere technicality since Mr. Whitley reported that the final closing of the project with HUD officials was set for Saturday morning in Louisville and since, on question, Water Superintendent Matt Powell, Jr., reported to the council that there would not be any problem supplying either service.

However, matters did hit a snag when several council members and Jim Cox, a landowner near the proposed project, began asking questions of Mr. Whitley which indicated their fear that the increased traffic

and other problems would not make this a totally desirable addition to our community.

Mr. Whitley tried to allay the council and Mr. Cox's fears and even spent some time with Mr. Cox in recess discussing the possibility of a "buffer zone" of trees being created between private landowners and the project. But it was to no avail as once again Mr. Stanley's motion died for lack of a second.

Tuesday, Jerry Ikerd told the Signal that he had asked the council to reconsider their action since they had already provided in April of 1979 to provide the services for this project. Another Call meeting of the council has been set for Thursday night at 7:30 p.m.

ACCIDENT

A one-vehicle accident on Ky. 1004 about 4 miles east of Mt. Vernon resulted in injuries to the hospital.

Rodney Johnson, 18, of Rt. 1, Orlando, was driving the car, according to State Police Officer, James Lawless, when he lost control in loose gravel causing his vehicle to strike a guard rail. Johnson sustained Class 2 injuries. Two occupants in the car, Larry Cameron, 18, of Mt. Vernon, and Rodney Cameron, 15, of Route 2, Orlando, were also injured in the accident.

Johnson Apprehended in Arizona; Charged in Myrtle Kidwell Shooting

Ricky Dean Johnson, 21, charged with first degree assault in connection with the shooting of Myrtle Kidwell in June was apprehended Saturday night, September 20th in Pinal County, Arizona, according to State Police Detective Fred Walton.

Walton said Johnson has waived extradition and will be returned to Rockcastle County to stand trial.

In addition to the assault charge, Johnson also faces a misdemeanor charge of unlawful transaction with a minor and a truck theft charge from Jackson County, Walton further said.

185 County Homes Weatherized Since Jan.

In the last eight months, 185 homes in Rockcastle County have been "weatherized" with funds from the Department of Energy for a total of \$62,957.65 spent for materials.

The Department of Energy funds for Rockcastle County come through the Daniel Boone Development Council which serves three other counties, Laurel, Jackson and Clay. Local offices are in the old Dinner Bell Building on Richmond Street.

Originally, program funds were more limited. In 1977, for example, only \$100 could be spent per house. Later the amount was increased to \$250. In 1979, with spiraling fuel costs and a continued emphasis on fuel conservation, the amount per dwelling was increased to \$560.00.

To qualify for the energy saving improvements, a person must go to the local office and apply. The office must also receive verification of the income of the applicant. It takes at least a month and sometimes a longer waiting period before a crew of workmen get to the

applicant.

An evaluator goes to the home first and determines the work to be done depending upon the condition of the dwelling. The first priority is taking care of areas of extreme infiltration of cold air - places such as cracks, holes and broken windows. With the limit of \$560.00, remodeling is out of the question. If extensive work of this nature is required, the office frequently contacts Christian Appalachian Project (CAP) for help.

There are three labor crews and one insulating crew. These crews are able to follow the evaluator to the home with some idea of supplies and equipment needed. All of the supplies are bought locally and all the workers are local citizens working under the C.E.T.A. program - a program providing employment and on-the-job training for the unemployed.

Most improvements include caulking, weatherstripping, underpinning, insulating, putting up new doors and facings, replacing window units and minor repairs. Occasionally such things as siding, a patched or new roof or storm windows can be justified.

Rented homes can be weatherized providing the owner comes in and signs a contract stating that the rent on the property will not be raised for five years or the present tenant evicted in order to raise the rent. The purpose of the program is to offer aid to the tenant not the landlord.

A home can qualify for improvements only once. So, when all the needy homes have

Rate Increase Approved for Jackson Co. RECC

The State Energy Regulatory Commission has approved a rate increase for the Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative which will produce \$832,353 in additional revenues.

The increase will raise the residential customer's minimum monthly bill from \$3.82 to \$4.82.

Jackson County Rural Electric serves about 39,000 customers in Jackson, Rockcastle, Laurel, Clay, Owensley, Lee and Estill counties.

Improvement Council Plans New Building for New Industry

The Rockcastle County Improvement Council met in regular session Monday night and outlined plans for providing a building for lease to Mt. Vernon Plastics, a new industry planning to locate in Rockcastle County.

Jack Tourasos, President of the company and Kyle Thomason, Vice-President, in charge of manufacturing, have already moved to Mt. Vernon to begin establishment of the firm and were present at the meeting to discuss plans.

If all goes according to schedule, bids will be opened October 8th and contracts awarded October 15th with construction beginning immediately. Construction of the 10,000 Square foot metal precast building is expected to take at least 4 months. The McGregg architectural firm of Richmond has been chosen to prepare drawings and specifications for the building.

Local Busy Spring Shows Contamination Present

Rockcastle County Health Department Environmentalist, Steve Midkiff, says a test of the water, in one of the widely-used springs in the county, shows the water to contain coliform organisms which indicates that harmful bacteria may be present in the water.

The sample was taken from the spring at Brush Creek, across the bridge on the left. Mr. Midkiff says this spring is used heavily and that most people

who have always drunk from it have built up immunities to bacteria over the years.

However, since the lack of rain this summer has caused Mt. Vernon's water to taste bad, others have begun drinking the water for the first time and this is the reason Mr. Midkiff decided to take the sample.

Midkiff said he also plans to sample 4 or 5 other sources of water in the county and will make the test results public.

Two suspects are being sought in connection with a burglary at the home of Jack Dailey on Route 3, Mt. Vernon.

According to State Police reports, several rifles and shotguns, a pistol and some gold jewelry were taken in the Thursday, September 18th break-in.

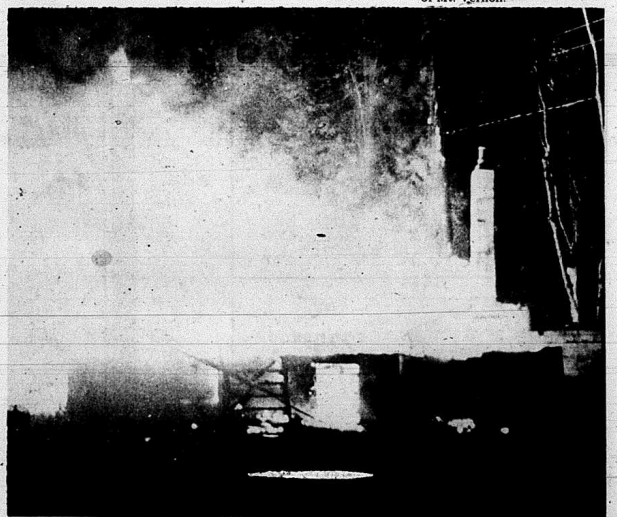

Make Storage "Pits" for Root Vegetables

There are several places you can store fresh garden produce for the fall and winter: an unheated basement or cellar, an extra refrigerator, an unheated room, a partitioned-off corner of a heated basement, a root cellar, attic, crawlspace, dried peppers and shuck beans, and insulated outdoor storage pits.

You can make outdoor storage pits yourself for keeping Irish potatoes, carrots, beets, turnips, salsify, parsnips and cabbage. They'll last 4 months or more.

The temperature in above-ground insulated pits will range from about 32 to 50 degrees F. Layers of straw (or leaves) and dirt keep the food cold and moist, similar conditions in an unheated basement or root cellar. Pits should be put on well-drained soil.

Making a storage pit

1. Spread a layer of straw or leaves 2 or 3 inches thick on the ground. Or, dig a hole 6 to 8 inches deep. Then spread the layer of straw or leaves in it.
2. Place layers of vegetables in a cone-shaped pile, putting straw or leaves between layers of different vegetables.
3. Cover finished pile with about 3 inches of straw; then cover with 4 to 6 inches of dirt. Pat dirt firm with back of a shovel, leaving an upright "tunnel" of straw to the top so that air can get in.
4. Place a board or sheet of metal on top and anchor it with a rock.
5. Dig a shallow ditch around the pit for water drainage.

Plan to store about a half bushel or so of mixed vegetables in each pit. Once you open up the pit, it's easiest to take out all the vegetables, if you can use them up within a week or two. Keep them in the coldest part of your house, under the sink, or in your refrigerator.

Don't store fruits in the same pit with vegetables. You can keep sound, hard pears and apples about 8 to 10 weeks in a separate storage pit.

DRYING APPLES

Use crisp, tart fall or winter cooking apples for drying. Wash, peel, core and trim out any blemishes. Cut them into slices or rings about 1/8 inch thick and drop them into a salt-water-and-vinegar or ascorbic acid solution to help prevent darkening.

You can either sulphur apples or dry them without any further pre-treatment, but unsulfured apples will turn darker and will have a different flavor than the sulfured ones.

Spread apples one layer deep on drying trays. Dry them in a sunny oven, dehydrator or even in your attic, if it is well ventilated. If you dry them in the sunlight, be sure to bring them in at night or on a rainy day. If you have an old car out in the yard, you can set your

tray of apples in it to dry, leaving windows open for ventilation.

Apples are done when they are leathery, with no moisture showing when you cut and squeeze them.

Conditioning and Pasteurizing
Since it's hard to dry foods evenly, you should condition them before storing. Cool the dried apples or other food to room temperature, then put into a large closed jar, can or plastic container. Open the container and stir them once or twice a day for a week. This should make the whole batch equally dry.

Heat treat (pasteurize) sun-dried foods to get rid of insects or insect eggs (You won't need to do this if fruits have been sulfured). Spread dried foods on trays in oven, heat 10 to 15 minutes at 175 degrees F. or 30 minutes at 150 degrees F. Then spread out to cool on clean dish towels. Package when food reaches room temperature.

Storing Dried Foods

Use moisture-vapor-proof containers with tight-fitting lids. You could store small quantities in plastic or waxed paper sandwich bags, placing them all in a larger container with a tight closure. Once you open a package of dried foods, keep it in the refrigerator or you may have trouble with insects.

Nutritive Value

Dried fruit, just as it is, makes an excellent and nutritious snack. Properly dried, reconstituted fruits and vegetables supply useful amounts of necessary fiber in your diet. They return to almost their original size, form and appearance.

Because of their high natural-sugar content, dried fruits are rich in food energy. Many are also rich in iron and other minerals. Dried beans and peas are high in protein.

Drying does, however, destroy most of the vitamin C in vegetables and unsweetened fruits. Much of the Vitamin A is also destroyed, especially in sun-dried foods. Sulfuring does protect against the loss of vitamins C and A in fruits.

CATTLE GRUB CONTROL

Cattle grub systemic insecticides should be applied to cattle any time from now until the end of October. Cattle grubs are fly larvae that develop in the bodies of cattle. The eggs are laid in the spring by the adult flies and the maggot-like larvae wander throughout the animal's body for eight to ten months.

Eventually, usually in late winter, the larvae end up under the skin of the back where they do most of their growing. They create large burrows that are filled with pus.

These insects reduce the vigor of the infested animals, causing some reduction in weight gains and milk production. Cattle being finished for slaughter are routinely discounted if they are grubby because slaughter plants must trim affected meat. In addition, hides are damaged when the larvae cut breathing holes through them.

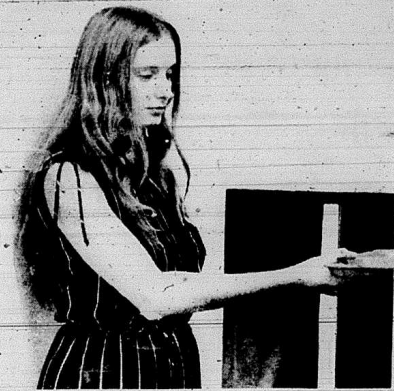
Control is easy using systemic insecticides applied as spot-ons, sprays or feed-throughs.

Pour-on chemicals include Co-Ral 4% Oil Solution (OS), Nuvonon 8% OS, XI 1.8 6 EC, Tiguvon 3% DS and Warbes 13.2% OS. These insecticides are applied using a graduated dipper available from the pesticide dealer, according to the weight of the animal. Check labels for specifics.

Spot-on is the only spot-on insecticide labeled for cattle grubs. This product is designed to be applied all in one spot on the animal. This product is also labeled according to the weight of the animal and should be applied only with the applicator designated on the label.

Co-Ral 25% WP or 11.6% EC and GX118 11.6% EC can be applied as sprays for cattle grub control. Use a high pressure sprayer to insure that the hair and skin is completely wetted.

FOREST FIRE SEASON WILL SOON BE HERE

The fall forest fire season will soon be here and the dangers of using fire will be vastly increased. According to Rockcastle County Forest Ranger Steven Bullen, the period from October 1 through December 15 is known as the Official Fire Season. During this period, it is illegal for any person to burn any material within 150 feet of any woodland before 4:30 p.m. After 4:30 p.m., a person may legally burn materials on his own property if all reasonable precautions are taken to prevent escape of the fire.

One major cause of forest fires during the fall fire season is hunting. While most hunters are sportsmen, a few will try to get their game any way they can. Ranger Bullen cautions, "Using fire or smoke to capture or destroy animals is not only unsportsman-like, it is also dangerous and illegal." A wildfire not only damages trees, but often damages or destroys wildlife habitat and food resulting in a reduction of game populations and also creates danger to other property or even danger

to life. Considering all this, using fire or smoke in hunting is just not worth the risk.

The old saying, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" is certainly true in regard to forest fires. The effort and cost to prevent a wildfire is very small compared to the effort and cost to control it. tempts cannot stop damage that has already occurred and, may cause further harm to cattle.

Cattle infested with grubs may not convert feed efficiently and may have reduced weight gain. Damage depends on the number of grubs and how long they remain in the animal.

Milk production decreases of 10 to 15 percent and beef gain reductions of one-tenth to one-fourth of the normal may be reported. Cattle being finished for slaughter are routinely discounted at the market if they are grub-infested because slaughter plants must trim affected meat. The value of hides is also lowered.

The life cycle of the cattle grub makes early treatment necessary. Adult grubs lay eggs on the hairs of the animal in the spring. When grub larvae hatch, they burn through the skin and for the next eight to ten months, they travel through the animal's hide and feast through the connective tissue. They move to the gullet or the spinal column in November, and finally settle under the

skin of the back in late winter.

Infested cattle should be treated before the grubs move to the gullet or the spinal column. Killing large numbers of grub larvae in the gullet or spinal column areas may cause bloat or partial paralysis because of the animal's reaction to the dead insect.

Treatment consists of applying or feeding a systemic insecticide to beef herds, and in dairy herds, to dry cows and young stock not being milked. Lactating dry cows cannot be treated.

Pour-ons, spot-ons or spray insecticides penetrate the animal's hide and feast through products penetrate the gut wall. The insecticide enters the blood stream and kills the larvae throughout the animal's body.

The pour-on method requires the user to estimate the animal's weight and measure the insecticide accordingly. He then pours it along the animal's back. Instructions and a dipper are included with the product.

The spot-on method is similar, except that a highly concentrated product is applied in only one spot on the animal.

Spray treatment requires a high pressure sprayer, with 250 to 400 pounds of pressure per square inch. The insecticide must be forced through the hair so it can be absorbed through the skin.

Feed-through insecticide is given in mineral block or mixture, although it may not be widely available because its active ingredient is no longer being made. Cattle should be fed the insecticide continuously for 14 days to insure grub control.

More information on cattle grub control, as well as lists of recommended insecticides, can be obtained at the county extension office.

Born of Water and of the Spirit

Jesus taught Nicodemus, "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the Kingdom of God" (John 3:5).

There are two elements in the "New Birth," Water and Spirit. Most folk understand that being born of water means to be baptized, but are not sure what is involved in being born of the Spirit.

The Holy Spirit works by the word to impart knowledge. That same Spirit teaches us that God "saved us," by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost (Titus 3:5). This washing of regeneration Paul says was used by the Lord to purify the church: "That he might sanctify and cleanse it by the washing of water by the word" (Eph. 5:26). So it was not by water only, for the word was also employed. And the Holy Spirit brought that word of salvation.

We are born of water and of the Spirit when we have been led by the Spirit's direction to have faith in Christ, repent of sins, confess that faith with our mouth, and put Him on in baptism (Rom. 10:17; Acts 2:38; 8:36-38; Gal. 3:26-27). The new birth employs both elements, the water and the word. One enters God's family must be born of God (Jno. 1:13). "Being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God, which liveth abideth forever" (1 Pet. 1:23). Paul stated, "For in Christ Jesus I have begotten you through the gospel" (1 Cor. 4:15). Now we read again, "Of his own will begat he us by the word of truth, that we should be a kind of first fruits of his creatures" (Jas. 1:18). So we

are begotten of God, by the gospel, as it was set forth by Paul and others. But those things of the gospel were brought to man by the Holy Spirit. "But God hath revealed them unto us by his Spirit: for the Spirit searcheth all things, the deep things of God. Now we have known the spirit of the world, but the Spirit which is of God; that we might know the things that are freely given to us of God." (1 Cor. 2:10-12). Without this performance of the Spirit, we could not have faith.

So, let us check the process of the new birth. The Holy Spirit has given God's word to man, and when this word is received into the heart, it then generates faith. By this means one is begotten of God. This, through faith, then leads one to put on Christ in baptism, and he is thus "born of water and of the Spirit." Now study closely what Paul says: "The children are all children of God by faith in Christ Jesus. For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ" (Gal. 3:26-27). The Holy Spirit has generated faith that is culminated in a new birth in Christ. "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new" (2 Cor. 5:17).

It should be obvious that those who have not been baptized without water baptism are not teaching the new birth as the Bible teaches it. We must also admit that those who teach that both of the water and the Spirit have not been born again according to the teaching of Jesus

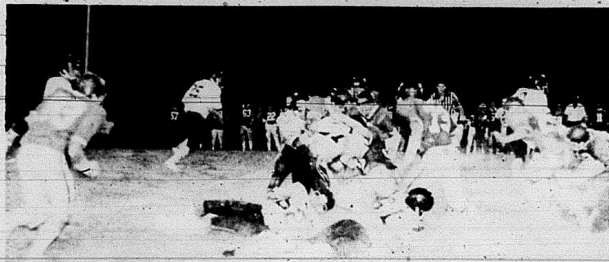

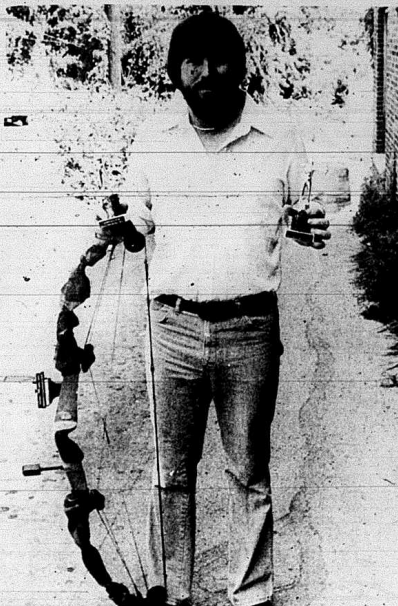

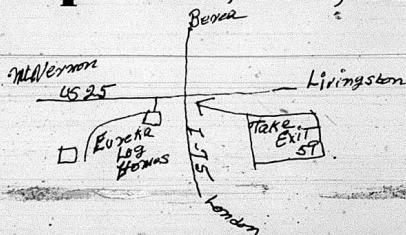

NO CHEWING TOBACCO FOR U.K. COACHES

LEXINGTON — The Kentucky football team has been set upon with a rash of painful boils. One player had to be hospitalized. The locker rooms have been sprayed with Lysol and the coaching staff has abstained from chewing tobacco to spearmit chewing gum.

Four of the five players stricken with the boils are offensive linemen. David Bond had to be hospitalized and missed the trip to Oklahoma. Less severe cases hit Mickey Cochran, Mike Smyth and Mike Pace, all offensive linemen.

To be on the safe side, Kentucky's practice facility at the Shively Sports Center was fumigated from top to bottom. "It's everything. The boils are caused by a staff infection and this could be the reason the epidemic seems to be dying out. There's a secret belief around the U.K. camp that the real culprit in the whole thing is the man who does such a great job coaching the offensive line. Jon Mirolovich. Not Jon, but his ever present chewing tobacco. Apparently somebody got the word to Jon and he's been chewing gum ever since during practice. The rash of boils has stopped.

Other than the battle against the boils, Kentucky has not been without a great number of injuries. "We haven't had all those injuries, we had last year," says Al Green, the head trainer, turning to knock on a wood panel in the training room. "I think those things go in cycles." Al was saying "I think we hit the bad part of the cycle last year."

Football is a contact sport and people get hurt, but the epidemic of boils was unexpected. "We call them Kentucky boils," says Green. "They are caused by a staff infection and are not the common boils a lot of people have. We think we've got it under control now that we've fogged the building from top to bottom with germicide."
