## Log Splitter is Very Important Item These Days; Especially One Built from Scratch at One-Fifth of Cost

By: Nancy Mullins Take one used army surplus gasoline engine, a hydr-silo cylinder from a road grader, a 6 inch. 'I' bean, a refrigerator tak (use-''a sea-bydraulif fluid reservoir), an axle and two wheels from a trailier, a wedge of sharpened steel and two local ''wnineers'' by the name of Bill of sharpened steel and two local "begineers" by the name of Bill Dowell and Lesile Harris and the end result is a log splitter "Neither Harris or Dowell had ever seen a log splitter (except in pictures) before they built 'one-university They both admitted that the project took lots of thought, planning and

several pots of coffee. Planning, hunting parts and building the splitter took less than a month and cost about \$160.00 as com-pared to the cost of a new one of this size, which is between \$800 pared to the cost of a new one of this cize which is between \$500 and \$2200. According to Harris, finding the needed parts was the hardset task. Actual con-struction took only about a week of working at night. Dowell said the only parts which were not considered "junk" were some new hydrau-lic hoses and fittings, a muffler and a coupling between the hydrakile pump and the motor. , Last winter, the Dowells

staved warm with a wood-burn ing stove which Dowell made. It looks much like those pictured in catalogs and works exactly the way the "boughten" ones

Dowell had no construction guide; he merely took some seven gauge steel, a welding machine and three evenings of work and whipped up a stove.

This story just goes to prove one thing. Not only will people go to any expense to save money, they stall other go to great lengths to cut down on the expense.





The first permit of course, is for the hunter, who hasn't already taken a deer. This per-mit is blue and has a complete windown of deer hunting regu-lations and a list of check stations attached to it. A portion of this permit has a space for hunters to punch out a circle to indicate the method -gun or archery - used to take the deer.
