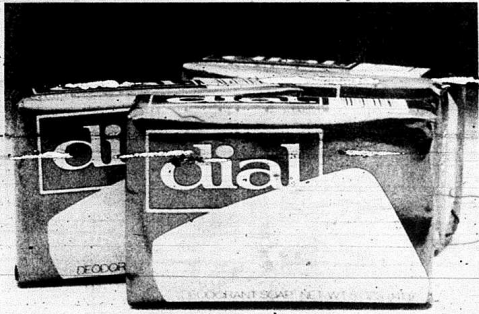

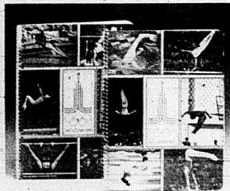

Farmers of the county have suffered severe crop shortages during this growing season due to the drought, which has been worse than most young farmers can remember. Last summer, the situation was the opposite. Excessive rainfall caused crops to rot and mold.

## Council Reverses Decision; Will Furnish Water and Sewer to Complex

With all six members and Mayor Roland Mullins in special session last Thursday night, and after three votes on the same question, the Mt. Vernon City Council agreed to provide water and sewer service to Valley View Apartments scheduled to be built on old U.S. 25 behind the former Armour Creamery building.

Valley View Apartments is a 52-unit complex of two and three bedroom apartments which will be available to low-income families or to anyone who can pay the rent. In the case of low-income families, rental, including water and sewer, is figured at not more than 25% of the family's gross income.

The matter had been one of much concern to private property owners in the area who primarily feared that an influx of 52 additional families would cause serious traffic problems in an already congested area. One resident, Mrs. Peg Challiff, voiced this concern saying there were already places on the road where it was almost impossible for two cars to meet.

Another resident, Grant Asper, echoed Mrs. Challiff's fears and Mr. Challiff raised the question of the effect of supplying water to 52 additional families on the present residents' water pressure. However, Water Dept. Supt. Matt Powell said the water pressure would not be affected.

Also at the meeting was former sheriff Manuel Shepherd, who questioned the need for the apartments since there were already four in the county which has a population of approximately 14,000. Mr. Whitley explained that the Kentucky Housing Authority set priorities for the projects in towns where the need had been established from figures supplied by local governments.

Connie Curis, one of the owners of the development who was at the meeting, pointed out to the council that the \$1.8 million development would generate between \$15,000 and \$20,000 in increased tax revenue for the city.

Jess Bullock, former owner of the property on which the apartments are to be built, reminded the council that water and sewer service was assured the developers in April of 1979 by the council.

However, Mayor Roland Mullins very quickly pointed

out that the project discussed at that time was for individual housing units to be sold with low interest government loans - not a multi-family complex.

Councilman Ernie Tolle reiterated that if the apartments were built there must be adequate supervision. Mr. Curis responded by inviting everyone to visit their project in Somerset to see how well maintained it is. He said that under present eviction laws for this type of housing, tenants can be evicted in three days for damaging the property and can be put on ten-day notice for being too loud or boisterous. Eviction can follow within 30 days for this offense.

Mr. Curis went on to say that because the apartments will be privately owned, no waiting list has to be followed.

### Legislative Report

 The Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee held its first meeting of the 1980 interim on September 17th.

The committee has legislative jurisdiction on matters pertaining to Kentucky's agriculture industry, mining and ecology. The committee's prime focus will be on coal mining, especially in that most of the committee's members are from the coal producing counties in eastern and western Kentucky.

The state's Commissioner of the Department of Mines and Minerals appeared before the committee to explain the Commonwealth's deep mine safety program. The program was created by the legislature in late 1976 as a result of the Scotia mine disaster earlier that year.

The program consists of training individuals in mine safety, placing them in the mines as analysts to observe and evaluate all persons working there, in order to identify and correct unsafe duties. Kentucky's mine-safety analysis program is the only one of its

kind in the nation.

The Commonwealth has the best safety record of any major coal-producing state. The state had 8.33 accidents per 200,000 manhours worked in underground mines last year as compared with the national rate of 13.06. The Commissioner of Mines and Minerals attributed this safety record to the mine-safety analysis program.

Another mining issue discussed at the meeting was that of unlicensed mines. The Commissioner told the committee that only a small percentage of mines in Kentucky are unlicensed and that his department is coordinating a plan with local, state and federal officials to correct this situation.

It is important to note that there are those who believe the percentage of unlicensed mines in Kentucky is substantially more than the commissioner led the committee to believe. Unlicensed mines neither adhere to regulations designed to protect the environment nor carry workmen's compensation insurance. Further, unlicensed mines do not have to put up a bond to insure that the strip-mined land will be restored.

Kentucky's coal industry has always been a source of volatile conflict and it will take more to solve the problem than a few discussions held by a legislative committee or some promises made by state bureaucrats. The problems of unlicensed mines can only be solved by a coordinated dedication on the part of county, state and federal officials.

In the midst of the discussion on unlicensed mines the Commissioner of Mines and Minerals said something to the effect that if he ever failed to do his job, he would pack up and go home. Mr. Commissioner, it's time to fish or cut bait.

Also, during this interim, the committee will be dealing with the issue of oil shale mining.

The 1980 General Assembly prohibited oil shale mining in Kentucky until June 30, 1981. The state Department of Natural Resources must file a set of guidelines to regulate this type of mining by that date.

A task force composed of environmentalists, university professors and technical experts has been named to help the state draft regulations for oil shale mining, reclamation and processing.

Apparently a conflict is brewing between environmen-

Rather, applicants can be screened to get the most desirable.

On question from Councilman Tom Welch, Mr. Whitley once again outlined plans for the "buffer zone" between the housing and private property owners and said that trees would be planted in addition to low-growing shrubbery to provide this "zone."

At this point, Mayor Mullins reiterated his opinion that because of so much sub-standard housing in this area, the apartments were needed. "At the same time," the mayor said, "I feel strongly that the rights of the private property owners must be protected." Mayor Mullins went on to say that any action by the council should be considered in terms of upgrading the street and sidewalk leading from the project.

After much discussion and agreement by Mr. Curtis to provide the materials for resurfacing the street and building a sidewalk, Councilman Ernest Stanley made a motion to grant water and sewer service to the apartments contingent upon the above provision with the city to obtain easements from private property owners for the sidewalks. The motion also included the method the city will use to pay for water and sewer service and authorized

Mayor Mullins to sign all necessary documents.

Councilman Roger McClure seconded the motion and, on the roll call vote, Tolle voted yes with Councilmen Welch, Bob Jasper and Conard Parrett voting no. Mayor Mullins immediately called a recess and said there would be two more votes taken on the motion. He suggested the councilmen get together with the owner and architect to try and iron out any questions the council needed answering which might resolve the issue either way.

Following a short recess, the vote was again taken with the same 3-3 deadlock and this time Mayor Mullins cast a no vote but again called for a recess before the final vote.

Following this recess, the three yes votes stayed the same, Councilman Welch changed his vote to yes, Jasper, Abstadt and Parrett again voted no. The motion carried 4-1.

Addressing issues that affect our national life issues that affect our pocket books, searching for solutions to this broad spectrum of concerns that makes Reader's Digest America's most popular book, a recent issue asks whether automobile air bags offer an answer to safety questions.



Any decision about mandatory air bags for automobiles should be based on solid evidence.

Air bags may be mandated for new cars by 1981, despite the pleas of safety experts.

The cost for each car bag could reach \$828 by 1982. Replacing a used bag could cost up to two-and-a-half times more.

Do air bags offer significant safety advantages? Do they really work?

Research is scanty. A Congressional report challenges the pro-bag claims, suggesting that the National Highway-Traffic-Safety Administration is giving us government by guesswork-guesswork that could cost car buyers billions.

We really ought to know much more about air bags before they're mandated into our steering columns.

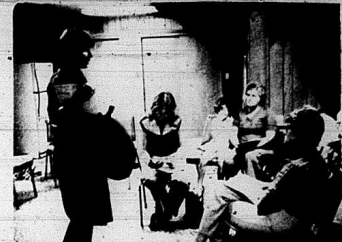

**County Receives**

**\$6,230.41 from State Coal Fund**

Gov. John Y. Brown, Jr. has sent Rockcastle County its first payment under the new Local Economic Assistance Program in the amount of \$6,230.41.

This check represents the balance of the old Coal Producing County Fund and the Coal Severance Economic Aid Fund.

The check includes \$183.55 from the coal producing fund, plus \$34.15 interest and \$1,794.58 from the coal severance fund and \$4,028.15 interest.

The governor also noted that during the next eight years, local governments will receive a projected increase of approximately \$700 million over what they would have received under previous programs. Rockcastle County's share should be \$657,000 by fiscal year 1988, or a total of \$22,800 over the eight-year period.

"I presented this plan to the General Assembly because I feel very strongly that you, as the local elected officials, know best what your problems are and best what the solutions are as well. Rather than designating and approving projects in Frankfort, the Local Economic Assistance Program sends the money directly back to you so you can improve the economic environment and the quality of life in your county," the governor wrote to County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker.

Counties that produce or extract minerals should receive a portion of the taxes paid to extract the minerals.

time, assured the Jaycees of receiving \$1,000 of the funds yearly for their responsibility. The Recreation Council was to use the remaining funds to operate and maintain park programs. County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker signed the agreement stating that he would provide an employee to supervise and operate the playground.

Since the Recreation Council failed to meet the terms of the agreement this summer, no money has been forthcoming from the city to them as agreed. Nine members of the council were contacted about the meeting, according to Danny McKinney, spokesman for the Jaycees. McKinney was asked to represent the Council and explain why the agreement was not carried out.

Also, the employee promised by the County Judge was never provided. When asked

why the money was not available, the Judge responded by saying that no CETA workers were available for the project this summer but that they (the Jaycees) could have one now. Jaycee members declined the offer feeling it was too late in the season to help now.

This has left the Jaycees with the Brunt of the disappointing situation. They still owe \$4,000 and have no way to repay the loan without all parties meeting the terms of the agreement. The Jaycees asked the Judge and the three magistrates present if they could possibly help them meet their pressing obligation of \$1,050, which was due last April, since they were anticipating receiving a CETA worker as part of the agreement. The Judge and the magistrates agreed to provide \$500, subject to approval of the other members of the Fiscal Court, if the city would provide the remaining \$500. Mayor Roland Mullins and three city council present agreed, subject to the same approval of their full body.

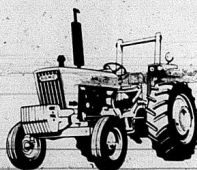

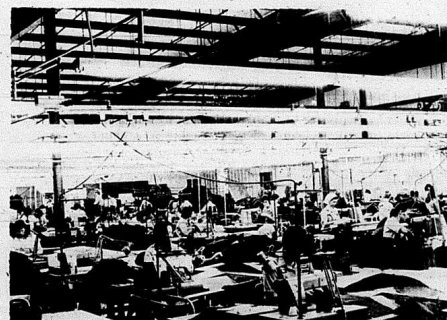

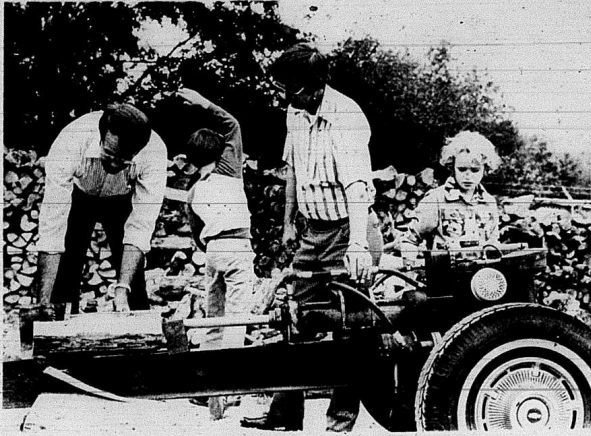

## Log Splitter is Very Important Item These Days; Especially One Built from Scratch at One-Fifth of Cost

Take one used army surplus gasoline engine, a hydraulic cylinder from a road grader, a 6 inch "I" beam, a refrigerator tank (used as a hydraulic fluid reservoir), an axle and two wheels from a trailer, a wedge of sharpened steel and two local "engineers" by the name of Bill Dowell and Leslie Harris and the end result is a log splitter. Neither Harris or Dowell had ever seen a log splitter (except in pictures) before they built the device. They both admitted that the project took lots of thought, planning and

several pots of coffee. Planning, hunting parts and building the splitter took less than a month and cost about \$160.00 as compared to the cost of a new one of this size, which is between \$800 and \$2,000. According to Harris, finding the needed parts was the hardest task. Actual construction took only about a week of working at night. Dowell said the only parts which were not considered "junk" were some new hydraulic hoses and fittings, a muffler and a coupling between the hydraulic pump and the motor. Last winter, the Dowells

stayed warm with a wood-burning stove which Dowell made. It looks much like those pictured in catalogs and works exactly the way the "boughten" ones do. Dowell had no construction guide; he merely took some seven gauge steel, a welding machine and three evenings of work and whipped up a stove. This story just goes to prove one thing. Not only will people go to any expense to save money, they will often go to great lengths to cut down on the expense.

## KDR Refunding Litter Tax Collected

The Kentucky Department of Revenue has mailed checks totaling \$1,942,033.67 to Kentucky businesses that made payments under the 1978 Litter Control Act.

Commissioner of Revenue Robert Alphin said today refunds have gone out to 2,896 taxpayers who made payments under the "litter tax" law, which was in effect from June 1978 until it was declared unconstitutional in May 1980. Following the May ruling, the commonwealth was ordered to refund all revenues collected. The Litter Control Act was

passed by the 1978 General Assembly as a means of funding some activities of the Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection. Under its provisions, various wholesalers, manufacturers and processors were required to remit 3 cents per \$100 of their gross receipts from sales of such items as newspapers, magazines, tires and other materials wrapped in plastic, paper or fiber containers.

The law was invalidated by the Kentucky Supreme Court May 14.

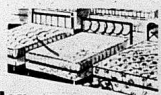

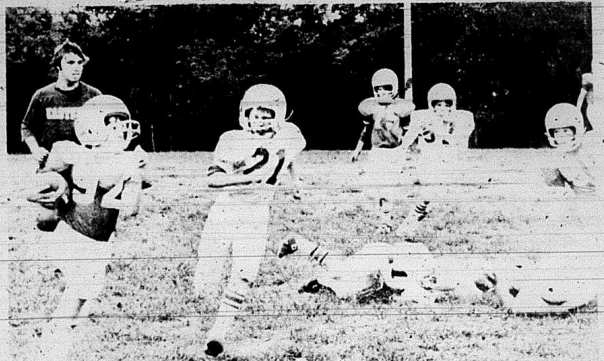

### FOOTBALL PLAYERS GET GRADES TOO

LEXINGTON — Win or lose at Alabama Saturday, Kentucky's football coaching staff will be sitting in a darkened room shortly after 8 o'clock Sunday morning. Black and white pictures will flutter on the movie screen and each coach will be marking on his legal pad on every play. The grading is done on the "play-by-play" basis. The players directly under their charge. A player gets two grades on each play. First, he is graded on technique and secondly he is graded on execution. To put it simply, if Coach Jon Mironovich is grading the offensive linebacker technique would be if he attempted to block the right person. If he did, the player gets a 1. Execution means did he successfully make the block. If he did, he gets another 1. When all the numbers are added up, if the player grades out to 75% or he passes. That is considered a winning grade. If most of the players grade out at 75% or better, Kentucky should win.

Any player that grades out 75% or better automatically made a member of the "Wildcat Club" for that week. It isn't widely publicized, but the players consider it a great honor.

"Cats' paws" are awarded for big plays. Those are the decals that the players wear on their helmets. Several seasons back, two coaches on Fran Curci's staff came to him with the idea of the "Cats' paws." Joe Galat and Bill Naruzzi, both gone now, thought it would be a good incentive plan for the Kentucky players. Coach Curci didn't think much of the idea. "I thought it was silly, frankly," Curci was telling me the other day, "but how wrong I was." The players really go for them and if they get a "paw" as many as they deserve, they're in the office the next day to argue their case.

Football players, like all U.K. students, are graded in the classroom but, unlike the other students, they're graded on the playing field as well.

## Kentucky Afield

Kentucky's bowhunting deer season opens Oct. 1 and the big news this year is that archers may take two deer. Back in the good old days (that is, prior to this season) the lucky bow hunter who went out opening day and took his deer after maybe only an hour or two of hunting was through for the season. But this year, he may purchase a "second deer" permit and continue to hunt.

If he takes the first deer by bow, he may use his second permit to bow hunt during the Nov. 8-10 and Dec. 6-8 gun seasons or, if he still hasn't taken that second deer, use a crossbow during the special crossbow only season Dec. 21-31.

But after he takes deep number two, that's all. Under no circumstances may a hunter legally take more than two deer in Kentucky this season.

If you haven't bought your deer permit yet, remember that the "first deer" permit and the "second deer" permit are different. Make sure you ask for the right one. Each permit costs \$10.50.

The first permit, of course, is for the hunter who hasn't already taken a deer. This permit is blue and has a complete rundown of deer hunting regulations and a list of check stations attached to it.

A portion of this permit has a space for hunters to punch out a circle to indicate the method—gun or archery—used to take the deer. According to fish and wildlife regulations, this sec-

tion must be purchased before the deer is moved.

This section of the permit is then presented to the check

station operator, nearest to where the deer was taken (or to the nearest available conservation officer) who will validate

the permit. This section of the permit must be retained if the hunter wishes to hunt for a second deer.

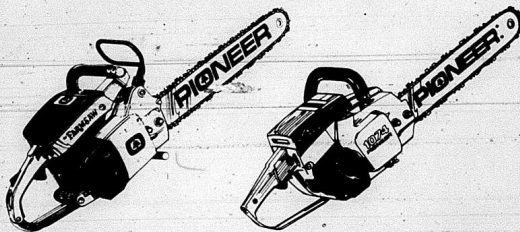
