## The Tragedy of Being Lost

There are many popular notions and opinions today regarding eternal salvation. These ideas vary from the extreme of universal salvation to the theory that no one will be saved.

Jesus settled the question, "Who can be saved," in the sermon on the mount. He taught that many will travel the broad road to destruction while few will tread the narrow way to Heaven (Matt. 7:13-14).

Many of the parables Jesus used vividly describe the tragedy of one's being eternally lost. For example, in the parable of the two builders, He compared being lost to the complete destruction of a building. The parable shows that all are building for eternity and the great storm of judgment will be the day of testing. Those whose houses are built upon the rock will stand and those built upon the sand will collapse (Matt. 7:24-27). To avoid the tragedy of being lost to build for eternity, one must hear and obey Jesus.

Another parable compares being lost to a closed door when entrance is denied (Matt. 25:1-13). We learn from this parable that (1) Christ is coming, (2) we should watch and (3) we should watch. The significance of the closed door is - to the wise - security and peace; to the foolish, misery and despair. The oil represents the preparation made in view of His coming. Will the door of eternal salvation be closed to you?

The third parable of this study shows that those who are lost will be "speechless." (Matt. 22:1-14). An invitation is extended which is rejected by others. The King provided each guest with a garment - a radiant robe - a mark of royal favor. The Lord's righteousness is our garment (Isa. 61:1). We don the wedding garment when we accept His invitation (Ga. 3:26-27). At His coming those who are not wearing the wedding garment will be treated as intruders. They will be "speechless" (sin is without excuse). How tragic to hear Him say, "bind him into outer darkness."

Avoid the tragedy of being lost. Come to our meeting October 19-24. Obey the gospel and be saved. You don't have to be lost. Heaven is a prepared place for a prepared people.

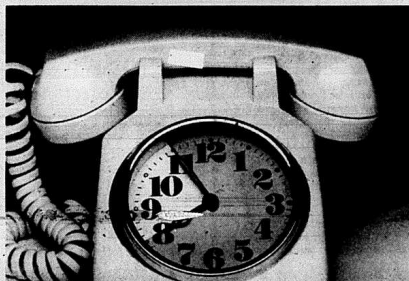

Many Rockcastle Countians are disturbed over large increases in their tax bills this year. Earlier these taxpayers received notices from local PVA Robert Cromer's office of reassessments and were not sure exactly what the notices meant until they opened their tax bills, received this week, to find the change reflected there.

In two September 10th Courier Journal articles, it was noted that "In Rockcastle County, assessments on all categories of real property, which includes commercial, residential and agricultural land are well above the market value. Residential property in Rockcastle County is assessed at 76.12% above the fair market value, state figures show. Farmland is assessed at 40.42% and commercial is 43.75% above the fair market value."

## School Board Approves 7% Tax Rate and Over 4 Million Dollar Budget

The Rockcastle County Board of Education met in regular session Tuesday night and set the 1980 tax rate at 7% per \$100 assessment, which was down from last year's rate of 8.4% and approved the 1980-81 General School Budget for a grand total of \$4,060,992.09.

Estimated expenditures for the year, which provides for a term of 189 days, are: Administration, \$75,000; Instruction, \$2,525,000; Attendance Services, \$27,000; Health Services, \$16,000; Pupil Transportation Services, \$625,000; Operation of Plant, \$228,000; Maintenance of Plant, \$77,000; Fixed Charges, \$157,252.09; Food Services, \$5,000; Community Services, \$1,000; Capital Outlay, \$50,000; Advancement and Transfer, \$274,740 for a total budget appropriation of \$4,060,992.09.

Estimated receipts by the board are: District Taxation, \$668,376.00; Receipts from Sources other than District Taxation, \$3,392,616.09 for a total estimated receipts of \$4,060,992.09.

Cromer recommended improvements to 1249 from the Buffalo Church back towards Sand Springs; Amos Burdette recommended resurfacing the gravel portion of 1787; Joe Clark recommended resurfacing 1004 from U.S. 25 to the junction of 1912 and Sherman Sargent mentioned that the Old Brodhead-Mt. Vernon Road, 1326, could use some resurfacing.

The highway department takes the recommendations into consideration when determining improvements to be made.

Raymond McGuire also met with the court to ask the county to accept a new 1,200 feet long road he has recently tiled and graded in the McGuire Subdivision just off Highway 25. The court agreed to accept the road.

The following unanticipated revenues were received by the county and caused the county budget to require the following amendments:

\$18,740.80 from the unexpended 1979-80 County Road Aid Revenue Sharing Program to the County Road Aid Fund; \$116.39 from the Child Support Unit from Dept. of Human Resources to the County Misc. and Reserve Fund; \$3,798.79 from the budget truck license

distribution to the county road maintenance fund; \$6,236.77 in special severance economic aid funds to the county road maintenance fund and \$9,101.00 from the Dept. of Interior, Bureau of Land Management to the Road Maintenance Fund.

Since the next regular meeting of Fiscal Court falls on Election Day, the court agreed to change the meeting to Wednesday.

### LEGISLATIVE REPORT

By: Rep. Harold DeMarcus

A seldom-used legislative device was utilized at the September meeting of the Program Review and Investigations committee. The committee voted to subpoena records relating to the amount of public funds being kept in six Kentucky banks.  
Although since its creation the committee has had the power to subpoena witnesses and records, during investigations pertaining to public funds, this marks the first time it has chosen to exercise that authority.  
A 1979 investigation of the Public Employees' Deferred Compensation System revealed an unauthorized bank account, where \$500,000 in state funds was being channeled through a bank in Frankfort, with no interest on these funds being paid to the state.  
After this situation was corrected, the committee decided to investigate all bank accounts holding state funds, to insure that no other unauthorized accounts exist.  
In September of 1979, the committee sent a letter to 343 Kentucky banks requesting all records pertaining to bank accounts containing state funds. By November, less than half the banks contacted had responded to the committee's request, those banks failing to reply were sent another letter at this time.  
The 1980 legislative session served to postpone the committee's investigation until July of this year. At this time, all but 38 banks had answered the inquiry. The remaining banks were sent a letter requesting that they respond immediately to the committee's inquiry.  
In August, all but six banks had sent in their records. At that time, a letter was sent to those six banks stating that if they did not respond immediately, their records would be subpoenaed. Also, each bank was contacted by telephone.  
At the September meeting, the six banks had still failed to respond to the committee's request. In a unanimous vote, the committee authorized its staff to issue a subpoena for the records of the six banks in question and to present them at the committee's October meeting.  
There may not be any improprieties relating to the records of these six banks, in fact

they may not even have state accounts. However, the committee will not know until it is allowed to inspect the records.

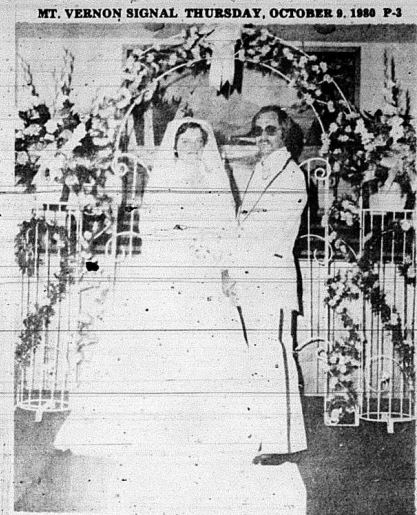

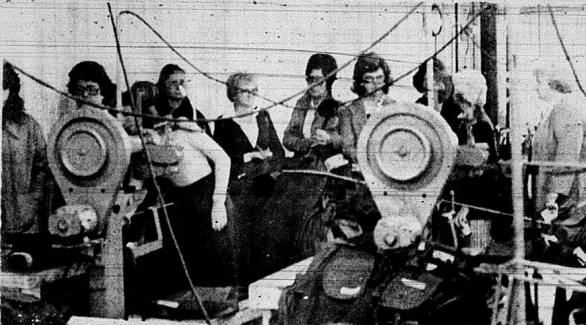

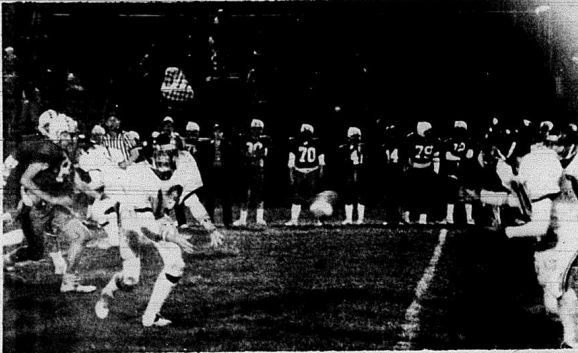

### KENTUCKY PLAYS OPEN THIS WEEK

LEXINGTON — There it is right on the schedule. There it is sandwiched between Alabama and LSU. This week's opponent for the Kentucky Wildcats is Open. Before you go scurrying to the record books, it simply means Kentucky does not play this Saturday but it's been so long since Kentucky has had an open date on its football schedule nobody can recall it.

Coach Fran Curci welcomes the weekend off with open arms. "I think every team needs an open date," he was saying. "You know we were supposed to play Utah State this week but they called us in the off season and asked if we would mind switching the game to the front of the schedule. We were glad to do it and were glad to have the weekend off."

Kentucky's football team has been decimated by injuries this season. Two weeks between games will allow Curci to bring several of the wounded back into the lineup. The offensive line has been especially hard hit and Coach John Marlovich has had to work with five different players almost daily. With two weeks to recuperate, the offensive linemen may have to reintroduce themselves to each other.

There are several advantages of having an open date, says Curci. "You not only give the injured players that extra time to get well but we, as coaches, have a chance to re-evaluate what we're doing. It gives us a chance to regroup and reload for the last half of the season. Then there's an advantage in recruiting. This will give us coaches a chance to visit with the high school players at a time when they're still in the process of making decisions."

Curci thinks open dates are vital to a football program but football schedules are made years in advance. He lucked into his first open date in eight years when Utah gave him a call this season. Next year Kentucky has an open date after the first game but from there on it's football every Saturday for the Cats for eleven straight weeks.

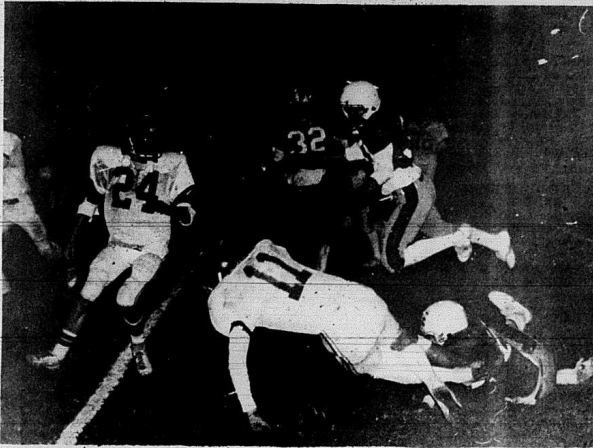

In beating Casey County, this put us 1-0 in our district. Next game is at home against

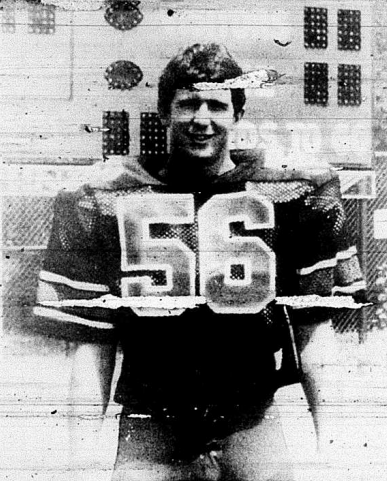

## Clifton Boone-Mail Carrier on Horseback for Over-15 Years Did Not Miss a Day Due to Illness

In an old log house now covered with gray siding and with what appears to be the original stone chimney on one end, seventeen miles from Mt. Vernon, in one of the most beautiful and remote pockets of the county, lives an eighty-year-old man and his wife of 50 years. Two and one-half miles from the Rockcastle River, in a community called Luner, it is hard to imagine that problems such as over population, pollution and disease plague the rest of the world. It is somehow obvious to the onlooker that the resident, like his 6th generation removed forebearer, Daniel Boone, relishes the "elbow room" and isolation the area affords.

Clifton Boone has not always been a horseback rider, however, for between the years of 1948-1964, he made 3 trips into town weekly on horseback to carry the mail on Star Route 2. On these trips, which were made on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, he made delivery to the West Virginia Post Office, and residents along his route and finally to the Luner Post Office. The route was up the East Fork of Skeggs Creek over a trail that a car could not travel. At Ernest Bullock's farm, he got on 1249 for the remainder of the 15 mile trip.

During the 15 years and 7 months that he carried the mail, according to Mt. Vernon Postmaster James O. Smith, as well as Mr. Boone's own account, he did not miss a trip due to illness although several times high water prevented his getting through. Those missed days had to be made up. Often he would have to take his wagon back to town the next day if parcels were too heavy or large to carry on horseback. The parcels usually included such things as

baby chicks, Blair orders or clothes.

Mr. Boone left his home at 7 a.m. and was scheduled to return to the Luner office at 5 p.m.; however, weather and other factors sometimes varied the schedule. Mr. Boone and his wife, Vera, remember that on one of the coldest days that he made the trip, the temperature dropped to 20 degrees below zero. Adverse weather conditions presented no major problems for him. He merely dressed warmly and, if he got too cold, walked a while. Mrs. Boone remembered that once he had to buy an axe to cut snow and ice laden bushes and limbs from his path in order to get through. Mr. Boone always carried a "good rain coat and hat" for unexpected storms and showers. His reference to the "good weather" was simply, "you just had to take it."

Clifton Boone's grandfather, William, and other members of the Boone family migrated here in the 1870's from North Carolina. His father, Ene or Ean Boone, married Martha Renner of Rockcastle County. His uncle, Dan Boone, who lived at Ottawa, told him that he was a 5th generation descendant of Daniel Boone, the explorer and early settler in Kentucky.

Mr. Boone believes that the Luner Post Office was established around the early 1920's. Will Kirby carried the mail over the route for 18 years. Bob Logsdon, Curversole and Ben Thomas were other carriers who carried the mail before Mr. Boone. After he gave the route up in 1964, M.E. Cromer, James Boone and Tom Coffey all had the horseback route before it was done away with in favor of the rural route delivery system.

A few years ago, the county had post offices within easy

access of rural residents in every section. Some were operated in connection with a small country store and some merely from a room in a residence. Many post office and community names have been all but forgotten and are heard by the younger generation. Bronco, Spiro, Bloss, Hansford, Wadd and Hiatt - to name a few.

Methods of transporting the mail to these outposts varied. Seemingly bottomless roads were made impassable by weather and rough terrain. Each carrier, no doubt, chose the conveyance best suited to his particular route. A Mr. Goodrich had a drag sled, Simmie Hampton rode a bicycle and, of course, many rode horses, mules or drove buggies or wagons. Often the carrier was the source of supplies from town. For instance, if a person were sick and needed medicine, the carrier might be obliging enough to return with the supplies although, legally, he was not permitted to carry anything other than the U.S. Mail.

Wildie, Conway, Renfro Valley, Johnetta, Orlando, Climax, Lamer, Brodhead, Liv-

ington and Mt. Vernon are the post offices remaining in the county.

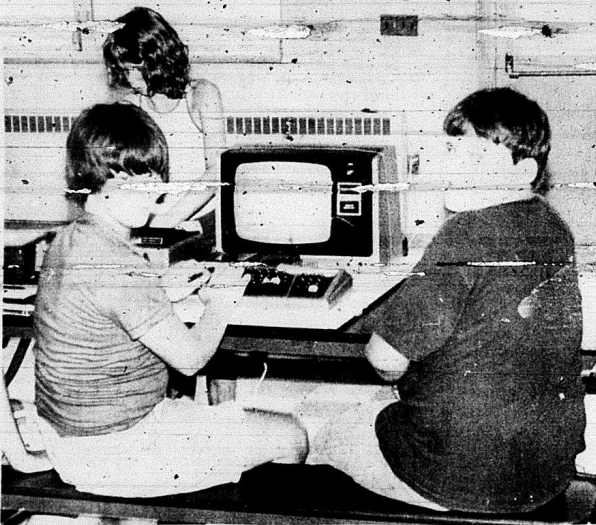
