Grant Application Made for Health Facility

County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker has filed a grant for \$60,000 from the Cumberland Area Development District to be used toward construction of a County Health Facility.

The local health board is researching various approaches to constructing the needed building, including the feasibility of a modular-type building for easy additional expansion and the use of local sub-contractors. The board has between 20 and 30 thousand dollars in re-

serve to be used for construction costs.
No plans have as yet been drawn for the building; however, the department expects to make use of county-owned land adjacent to the library for the building site.

Beshear Announces Rehearing on KU Rate Increase

Attorney General Steven L. Beshear announced Thursday his office will file a petition for a rehearing of the Kentucky Utilities Co. rate increase granted by the Energy Regulatory Commission. The petition will be filed today at the regulatory commission along with numerous petitions signed by customers of Kentucky Utilities Co. These customers want the commission to know they are outraged by the size of this rate increase and that they want a rehearing, Beshear said.

Of the \$30 million of increased rates requested by KU, the ERC granted \$27.7 million, or 92 percent of what KU asked for. The ERC gave KU a very significant increase in its profit margin for its stockholders, without any consideration of the consumers' ability to pay for this increase," Beshear said.

The return on common equity was increased from 13 percent to 13.9 percent, a \$2 million increase in profits for the utility company. The attorney general's office believes that a rehearing is necessary because the commission's order will set a bad precedent which could allow every utility in Kentucky to receive all the money they asked for, regardless of either their need or the consumers' ability to pay, Beshear added.

Hobby Turns into Work for Local Woman

When garden, yard and other... finished for the season, time is often left over to pursue a fire-side or indoor interest. More than 50 women in the area have taken up a new hobby - ceramics.

Kathleen McCracken of Johnetta teaches the classes and owns the kiln used to fire the ceramic pieces. Before her mother, Mrs. Carla Hale, died in 1978, they were planning to go into the ceramic business together. They had already made an investment in molds and a larger kiln. About the time Kathleen had given up the idea of trying to start the business by herself, she met and discussed the possibility of a joint effort with Louise Carter of Mt. Vernon, who wanted to start a ceramics business but did not have the knowledge of the art nor the use of a kiln.

In November of 1979, they set up shop in Mrs. Carter's basement with the understanding that they would try it for one year and see what happened. There was, according to Mrs. McCracken, one table of greenware (pottery before it has been fired the first time) and 6 students. Now the basement walls are lined with greenware and 44 clients attended a recent weekly session.

Kathleen attends the classes to help answer questions or give advice and then takes the pieces home with her to be fired. For the total process, pieces have to be cleaned, fired, brought back, painted and/or glazed and fired a second time.

The business has taken over Kathleen's house. Her kiln is in her kitchen and over 100 pieces of ceramic, just fired or waiting to be fired, cover everything. Tom, Kathleen's husband, who works for a mining company, helps her with the heavy molds some of which weigh over 100 lbs. He also plans to build her a small workshop behind their house. Most of her molds are kept and used at her father, Doyle Hale's, workshop because of limited space.

Mr. and Mrs. Hale made and sold children's furniture for several years while Kathleen, their only child, was growing up. Mrs. Hale later went back to school and taught for several years. Mr. Hale specialized in making wooden churns, carriages, spoon and spice racks and numerous other items which he sold to souvenir shops and state parks. Recently, he sold most of his equipment.

In high school, Kathleen remembers she enjoyed earning money for clothes and books by making and selling, both locally and across the state, personalized wooden pins, and key

chains and ceramic wnattons. While attending Eastern, she worked in the library at Mogel School and did not have time to pursue her creative career.

But, now she's 30 "into" ceramics that she wonders if she will "have" the strong desire needed to return to school to finish her degree work.

Ceramics, however, is not her only creative talent. Kathleen has written a children's book and is working on two novels. One is a gothic novel; the other she calls "mainstream." The fact that her aunt, Ethel Hale Blackledge, who was born on Crooked Creek, has recently written and had published a book has excited and encouraged Kathleen. The book, *An Hour is Forever*, is a suspense story for which Ms. Blackledge received a good advance from Hearst Publishers.

Kathleen's three children, Monte, 12, John, 10 and Lesley, 7, enjoy and share in her hobby-business. They also help load and unload the boxes which has grown, like the business, into a major task. About 4 or 5 weekly trips into town are necessary to pick up and return the ceramics. So far, after gas mileage and the electric bill are paid, profits have been reinvested into molds and more "slip" (wet clay used to pour the molds). It takes time to build a business, but when you're having fun, time goes fast.

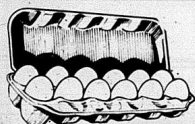

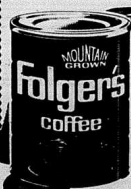

SAFETY IS THE KEY

Protect Your Little Ghosts and Goblins

Make sure that your children have a Happy Halloween while in their costumes. See that the costumes are labeled flame-resistant. Also, use light-colored outfits with reflective tape on the front and back so drivers can see the children.

Using makeup, instead of a mask, lets your child see more easily and is more fun to apply and wear. Finally, use flashlights instead of candles in Halloween pumpkins for safety's sake.

Smoke Detectors Save Lives

Smoke detectors have the potential for reducing death loss from residential fires by 50 percent. Most people who die in fires were not killed by the flames, but actually from inhaled smoke and toxic gases that rise ahead of the flames.

If you have a smoke detector, remember to test it once a month. Clean it twice a year and change the batteries annually.

Fire Safety

The sounds of a fire siren piercing the night air can be a frightening one. Especially when it brings home the feeling of being unprepared in your own home. That fire engine could have been on the way to your house. Why put yourself and your loved ones through jeopardy? Take a few moments to fire safety now could make a difference later. The fire protection engineers urge you to check your home for fire sources. Potential risks such as worn electrical cords that should have been repaired or replaced, flammable liquids not stored in the proper container or overloaded electrical outlets. Remember,

the best way to keep a fire from spreading is to keep it from starting. But, should a fire start, make sure your family knows the escape routes from your home. Have a place to meet outside and never go back into a burning building.

It's the time of year when we sometimes use portable space heaters for warmth, in a room. Make sure drapes, chairs, or other flammable objects are kept away from the heaters.

Many fires are caused by children playing with matches. Keep them out of reach of your children.

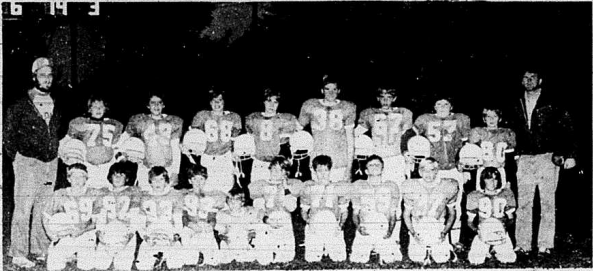

NOBODY WANTS TO BE NUMBER ONE
 LEXINGTON — The football season is barely half over and already basketball fever has hit the Commonwealth. The college teams began practice last week and the prospects for basketball riches are so real the fans can contain their enthusiasm for the opening of the new season. Louisville is the defending national champion. Kentucky has been tabbed in most of the preseason publications as the tier applicant.
 Everybody wants to be king of the hill in late March when a national champion is crowned. Nobody likes being ranked number one at the start of the campaign. Coach Joe B. Hall finds his Kentucky Wildcats in that

unenviable position. To dather be ranked around fourteenth or sixteenth or something like that," he said at practice the other day. "Then a team can look forward to working its way into the top ten, say up to about sixth. Then as the season winds down you could be battling for the number one spot. Why, though, not start the season as number one?" It puts too much pressure on the players," Joe says. "They're trying to keep from losing instead of trying to win. We want to be an exciting team this year. We do have talent. But we're awfully young. We only have one recruited senior, Fred Cowan and one recruited junior, Chuck Verderber. We are going with sophomores and freshmen. We may be the best junior college team in the country this season. Kentucky is young. 5. Hang up on bad connections. And have the person who placed the call tell the operator. You'll be reconnected, and you won't have to pay for the interrupted time.
6. Use "800" numbers when possible. Remember that "800" numbers are toll free.

IRE-Released Names of Taxpayers With Undelivered Refund Checks

Paul Niederecker, District Director of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), has released the names of those Kentucky taxpayers to whom Federal tax refund checks were issued in 1980 and the checks were returned to IRS as "undeliverable." Some refund checks belong to individuals, others to businesses.

The list includes 501 individual taxpayer names with refund checks totaling \$139,548.98. The individual taxpayer refund checks range from the lowest at \$1.02 to the highest at \$4,000.00.

The list also includes the names of 71 businesses who have refund checks totaling \$34.

417.34. The business refund checks range from the lowest at \$1.00 to the highest check at \$8,371.64.

According to the IRS, most of these checks remain undeliverable because taxpayers have moved and left no forwarding address with the U.S. Postal Service. Other taxpayers may have changed their names and addresses.

If you are a taxpayer still wondering about your refund check for this year, please call IRS at one of the following numbers. You may be on the "undeliverable" refund list.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

AND BEING SILENT WHERE IT'S SILENT

Unequal Yokes

"Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers." (2 Cor. 6:14). From this passage of scripture some raise the question as to whether or not it's wrong for a Christian to marry or remain married to an unbeliever.

In the first place, 2 Cor. 6:14 is not speaking specifically of the marriage relationship. The context reveals that God is exhorting Christians to turn from false worship, false gods and religions (see verses 4-8). The same continues in verse 17, "Come ye out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord." If verse 14 is speaking of marriage, then so is the 17th verse! But both speak primarily of idolatry.

Does verse 14 have application today? Yes! And does it apply to marriage? Yes.

The 17th verse is not speaking of marriage; the principle given is one that applies to every relationship of life. The fact that the term "unequally yoked" is used implies that not all "yokes" are unequal. The point made is that alliances with unbelievers that DEFEAT the Christian from faithfully serving the Lord are to be avoided. And this is true with marriage, with business, with recreation, or with anything else. Any "yoking" that does not allow the Christian to be honest, faithful and true to Christ is forbidden.

Many men have entered into business with unbelievers, then found that their morals in doing business were determined by Satan. Christianity was not considered. That is unequal yoking. Many have gone off on

hunting trips with those who weren't Christians, and found that game laws were disregarded, liquor freely imbibed, and they were unwilling endorsers of it. That is unequal yoking. And, the men have married women who were not Christians and found their children trained in a false religion, their own dedication subverted by marital bonds and giving unwilling support (by the wife's activity) to a false religion. Any relationship that puts your life and influence into the hands of another is an unequal yoke.

There were many Christians during the time of the apostles who had mates who were not (see 1 Cor. 7:12-17; 1 Pet. 3:1-6, etc.). While they were to make every effort to bring them to Christ, there is no hint that the salvation would depend on the mate's obedience to Christ. Each of us must give account of ourselves to God (2 Cor. 5:10; Rom. 14:10-12). The Christian must try to win his mate to Christ; teach, encourage, set the right example, pray for him. But never allow the marriage to be an unequal yoking, do not allow him to lead you astray. And, whether or not he approves, put the Lord first in your life.
