High School Opinions

As a national election approaches, with the direction of the country to be guided by the outcome and with that direction influencing the kind of world the youth will live in, it seems only fair to find out how some youth feel about this election and the future of their country.

Of the five 15-17-year-old high school students interviewed, most seem to expect current domestic and world problems to worsen rather than improve no matter who is president. It was a little surprising to learn that one of the big concerns of those interviewed was the fear of our involvement in a major war. During my high school days, it was a major fear that was during the cold war when there was talk of bomb shelters and other types of civil defense. Detente had never been heard of.

Donald Jones, 16, said that he was, at present, undecided and expected the debate to help him decide who he would support were he old enough to vote. He sees the major problem facing the country as the need for a long-range energy program at home which he feels is tied to the economy. He feels that no matter who is at fault concerning the energy problem, strong, decisive steps must be taken. Donald thinks the U.S.'s involvement in Vietnam caused our influence and reputation in the world to become eroded.

Mary Henderson, 17, would probably vote for Ronald Reagan if she were voting because "He is the lesser of two evils." She has nothing against Jimmy Carter, except that he hasn't shown much leadership and she is not against giving Reagan a chance to prove himself. She thinks nuclear war is unavoidable - if not now, someday. Mary was more optimistic about domestic problems such as the economy and felt with right leadership the situation could be corrected.

Jamie Anderkin, 17, doesn't think things could get much worse nor that Carter has done much for the country. She would vote for Reagan. Jamie finds it hard to understand the basis for all the concern that if Reagan's elected there will be war. The

main problem in the country, as she sees it, is a "general lack of leadership." She is also bothered by the apparent lack of support by young people of their country. "It didn't used to be like that."

Tim Young, 16, would be for President Carter because he has experience in office while "Reagan has just been governor." He said, "Carter has kept our country together for the next four years. Tim sees our major problems by the year 2000 as overpopulation. Where the energy shortage is concerned, he thinks that nothing will be allowed to replace our petroleum-using machines until our supply of oil is depleted.

Bobby Bailey, 15, favors Reagan over Carter "because Carter hasn't kept his campaign promises - like cutting taxes." He expects Reagan, if elected, to get the defense budget up so that we can keep "up" with everybody else and, if war comes, we'd have the equipment needed. One main domestic problem, Bobby, is too much government say-so. "It doesn't matter whether you

EPA Funded 20 Year Treatment Facilities Plan Submitted to City

Earlier this month, Schimpfer-Corrodino Associates of Louisville and Crawford Engineers, Inc. of Burnside, completed and submitted to the local city government, the final report of the Mt. Vernon 201 Facilities Plan, a 20-year plan based on projected growth with expansion-need ratio for the existing sewer treatment facility.

The extensive, 275 page study was funded and aided by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and is the culmination of a five-year research investigation and study period. This plan fulfills requirements stipulated in Public Law 92-500 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act which establishes Mt. Vernon's eligibility for participation in the municipal construction grant program funded by EPA.

Cost of the total project, which is being done in phases to meet the growth demand, is \$963,200. EPA will be funding \$722,400 of the amount with

\$240,000 coming from the local level. Do's and Don'ts for Halloween Safety

Halloween is just around the corner and a few safety precautions can assure the only scares children get are the fun kind.

Edsel Moore, manager of consumer product safety for the Department for Human Resources, recommended these tips for trick-or-treaters: Masks should be tight-fitting with eye holes large enough for good vision.

All materials used in costumes should be flame retardant. Don't let costumes come into contact with any ignition source, like jack-o-lanterns.

Costumes should be marked with strips of reflector tape.

Shoes should be comfortable and suitable for walking; avoid high heels.

Costumes should not be long enough to trip over.

Children should carry a flashlight and go only into neighborhoods they know well. High traffic areas and intersections should be avoided.

Trick-or-treaters should go only to homes that are lighted. A dark house probably means no one is home or children aren't welcome.

Parents should check everything in the child's bag and allow children to only factory-wrapped pieces of candy. Because of the dangers of hidden safety pins and razor blades; discard fruit.

The best advice, Moore said, is for parents to take their children on their own's rather than send them.

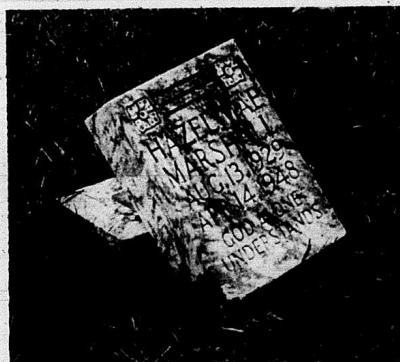
The cemetery has been van-



Apples are especially good for out-of-hand munching. However, why not try a new Halloween recipe this fall using apples.

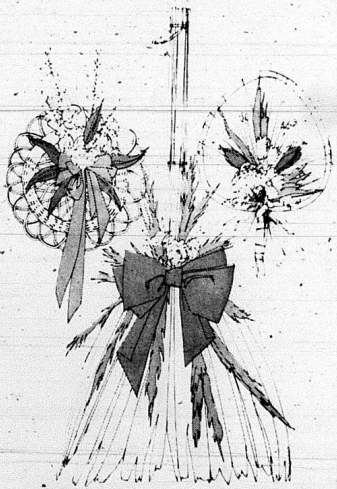
- Hobgoblin Salad
- 1 package orange flavored gelatin
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 cup ginger ale, cold
- 2 cups grated apples
- 1 cup grated raw carrots
- Mix orange-flavored gelatin with boiling water and ginger ale. When partially jellied, add grated apples and carrots. Mold in shallow sauce dishes. Unmold on fresh grape leaves or shredded red cabbage. Decorate with eyes, nose and mouth made of black gumdrops.
- Jack-O'-Lantern Pie
- 6 medium size tart apples, quartered
- 3/4 to 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup cinnamon
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tbsp. butter or margarine
- Pastry for 9-inch pie
- 1 cup crushed cheese puffs
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 4 crushed cheese puffs and mix. This makes the pastry very flaky and gives it an orange color.
- Then, core and slice apples.
- Line the pie pan with pastry. Place a layer of apples over the bottom, then sprinkle with a mixture of sugar, cinnamon and 1/2 tsp. with fat. Repeat until all ingredients are used.
- Cover with pastry. Instead of making slits to allow the steam to escape, cut grinning jack-o-lantern-face in the crust.

HALLOWEEN HINT

Halloween is more scary on a spooky Halloween night—kids fearful of ghosts and goblins or parents fearful of candy and covetries. On Halloween night mothers, with toothbrushes as measuring sticks, are busy as measuring as witches on broomsticks, and rightly so.



According to the dentist who specializes in treating children, or pediatric dentists as they're called, parents prevent tooth decay by allowing sweets

under controlled conditions. The American Academy of Pedodontics counsels parents to serve sweets

after a meal. If a child eats sweets, having them in conjunction with a meal can limit the occurrence of cavities. Food has its greatest decaying effect while it is in the mouth and immediately following. By restricting snacks and candies to meal-time or times when a child is eating, the period of danger to young teeth is reduced.

Pediatric dentists also caution parents to be watchful of the "stickies," which is not a brand of kiddie monsters but foods that hold sugar to the tooth's surface. These include candies, sodas, sweet sauces, cakes and cookies, pastas, and dried fruits like raisins. Items, they should brush their teeth immediately.

ARC GRANTS \$250,000 FOR BELL CO. VO ED PROGRAM

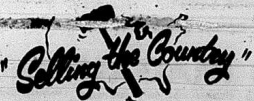


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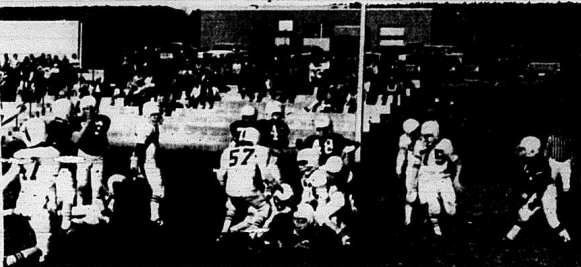

OPEN LETTER TO U.K. FOOTBALL FANS

Dear U.K. Football Fan:
You are the most unique person I have ever known. Each autumn, Saturday after Saturday, you make your way to Lexington from all over the state to the football games. Why? I've asked myself that question a hundred times.
"You haven't had a lot to cheer about most Saturdays. I can understand the fan enthusiasm at schools like Alabama and Georgia but your devotion to U.K. football, is, as the King of Siam said, "a puzzlement." The university brass felt like Kentucky's program had to improve when the Wildcats moved to Commonwealth Stadium if they were going to be able to pay off the mortgage. They needn't have worried. You've had those 58,000 seats almost every game. Almost every season is a sellout.
Kentucky's program has improved since the move from old Stoll Field but going into this season the 'Cats were playing only just a little better than 500-ball. 41 wins, 37 losses and 1 tie. Still, you pack the place.
Coach Fran Curci, in his speeches around the state, likes to compare the Kentucky program to those at Arkansas and Nebraska. His contention is that, like the other two, Kentucky is a state that is basically interested in one team. He's right. You have given the Wildcats your total support. From every nook and cranny of this state, you U.K. fans that doesn't completely explain it either. Arkansas and Nebraska have powerful football programs and in most seasons, both will be ranked among the nation's major powers. It's easy for them to get state wide support. So that's not the total answer. I confess I don't know what makes you tick. I don't quite understand the overwhelming support you give the Kentucky football program. I do know this, the University is mighty lucky to have you.

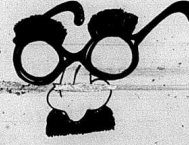

County FmHA Helps Set Statewide 1981 Goals

Jackson-Rockcastle Counties Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) County Supervisor Robert Hornsby and his staff last week helped set the Agency's statewide plan for investing some \$350 million through its farm, housing, community and business/industry programs in fiscal year 1981.

The county staff joined with other FmHA county, district and state officials at a three-day state meeting in Owensboro to review the FmHA Kentucky State Management Plan. The Plan sets the Agency's goals and objectives for the coming year.

Mr. Hornsby said, "We expressed our views directly to the National FmHA Administrator Gordon Cavanaugh and State Director Bill Burnette. We worked with about 240 other

FmHA people to iron out the details of next year's plan.

"FmHA is trying to make the best possible use of its limited funds to serve people and communities that need help the most. The Management Plan will help us to target our assistance where it will do the most good. We set goals, issued timetables and outlined how we will try to overcome the problems."

Mr. Hornsby said one of the ways we will work more closely with other Federal and state agencies as well as with planning districts and local communities. Many of these groups were consulted before the draft of the Management Plan was put together.

"In addition to the planning, we had the opportunity to tell Administrator Gordon Ca-

vanagh, who came in from Washington, about some of the problems we face on the county level. We expressed our concerns about not having enough staff and program funds to help as many people as we would like," Mr. Hornsby said.

State Director Bill Burnette pointed out that FmHA programs have nearly tripled during the past three years with almost no increase in staff.

About half of all FmHA funds in Kentucky go toward helping family farmers. "Overall," he said, "Kentucky is one of the largest states in the nation in terms of investing in assistance to farmers and other people in rural areas."

KENTUCKY AFIELD

The period from November 1 through the third Wednesday in November is "closed season" in Kentucky's woods and fields.

During this time, almost all hunting is prohibited, even for species such as groundhog and gray fox that otherwise have no closed season.

The reason for this "no guns" rule is to allow wildlife law enforcement officers to more easily detect those hunters who just can't seem to wait for the third Thursday in November, the opening day of small game season.

The only exceptions to this general no hunting rule are the woodcock and snipe seasons, Oct. 4 through Dec. 7; the goose rail and gallinule season, Nov. 12 through Jan. 20; archery deer hunting, opened Oct. 1 and the first "week end" deer hunt, Nov. 6-10.

The "shake-out" season for raccoons is also open during this period, but raccoon hunters may not carry firearms of any kind during this season.

Another exception is granted to those who hunt with hawks. Falconry season opens Nov. 1 and continues through the regular season for the species hunted.

But just because you can't hunt is no reason to stay indoors in front of the TV during this time. There are several pre-season activities which make you hunting more enjoyable and productive when the Nov. 20 opening day finally does roll around.

If you spend most of your time behind a desk, start taking brisk walks at least three times a week and you'll be in much better shape for opening day. You'll be able to hunt longer without fatigue and you could possibly prevent problems ranging from sore feet to a heart attack brought on by too much exertion after a long lay-off.

Your shooting reflexes also probably need to be sharpened

up. A few sessions with some clay pigeons (no closed seasons or bag limits on these birds) should get you swinging smoothly again. And, while you're at it, better check the sights or the scope on your deer rifle to make sure it's shooting where you aim it.

November is a good time to do some scouting for new places to hunt. Remember that you must have permission to hunt on private lands (written permission if you hunt with rifle of 240-caliber or larger). A couple of afternoons driving through the countryside and talking to landowners could widen your hunting horizons considerably.

Or, if there's a youngster in your family or among your acquaintances, you might want to spend the first part of November teaching him or her the basics of hunting - how to handle fire arms safely and responsibly, how to shoot accurately, how to be a conscientious and responsible hunter and sportsman.

Giving someone else a proper introduction to the fine and honorable sport of hunting could turn out to be one of the best things you could do with your time this November, both for you and for the youngster.

STATE UNEMPLOYMENT FUND IS RUNNING LOW

Kentucky's unemployment insurance trust fund is running low on money and the state will probably have to borrow \$35 million from the national unemployment trust fund in January, Rick Crawford of the Department for Human Resources told the interim joint committee on Labor and Industry today.

Crawford, the director of the program, said the problems include an unemployment rate of 10 to 17 percent in the last year, the fact that taxes collected did not keep up with benefits paid out and the high unemployment rate in the state.

Crawford said employers are taxed on the first \$6,000 of annual wages paid to each of their employees, but benefits are geared to wages; currently, the average salary paid is \$12,000 per year.

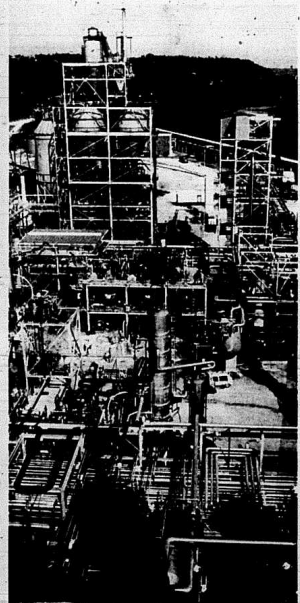

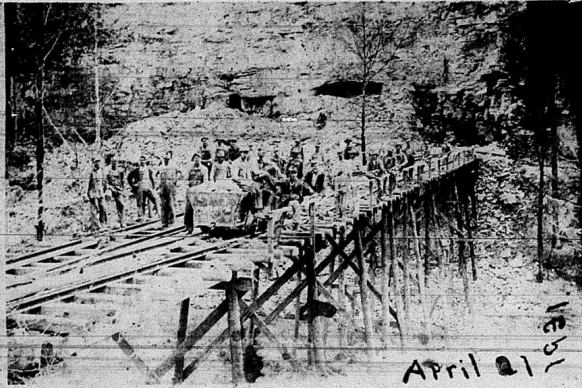

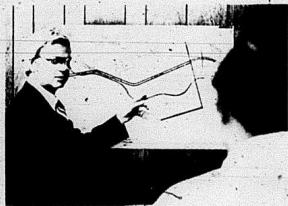
