Notice is hereby given that the Rural Electrification Administration as lead agency has prepared a Final Environmental Impact Statement in accordance with Section 102(2)(c) of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, in connection with a loan guarantee for East Kentucky Power Cooperative (East Kentucky) P.O. Box 707, Winchester, Kentucky 40391. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Region IV; U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Louisville District; U.S. Department of the Interior (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service) and Kentucky Department for Natural Resources and Environment. Protection has acted as cooperating agencies during the NEPA process.

The loan guarantee would allow East Kentucky to secure funds required for the construction of a proposed steam-electric generating station near Trapp, Clark County, Kentucky. The project consists of two 630 KW (gross) coal-fired generating units scheduled for operation in 1984 and 1987, respectively, and ancillary facilities. Proposed electric transmission associated with the project involves three 345 KV lines from the Smith Plant to the Avon Substation (24 km), to the Magalloway Substation (42.4 km), to the Broadhead Substation (59 km), one 161 KV line from Broadhead Substation to Tyner Substation (44.7 km); and four 138 KV lines from the Smith Plant to Lake Reba (14.8 km), Stanton (19.6 km), Spencer Road (24.9 km) and the Dale Station (13.2 km). The project will provide a reliable source of electrical power to fill existing and projected future needs of East Kentucky's member distribution cooperatives.

The Kentucky Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection published a public notice of Preliminary Determination under the regulations for Prevention of Significant Air Quality Deterioration (PSD) on May 21, 1980. EPA completed PSD Final Determination relative to giving approval to construct the facility under PSD regulations, 40 CFR 52.21 was issued August 21, 1980.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency also proposes to issue a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit. NPDES and application number KY0055972. The NPDES Permit contains limitations on the amounts of pollutants of the Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. Section 1251 et seq.) and other lawful standards regulations. A revised draft NPDES Permit is included in this Final Environmental Impact Statement.

The Kentucky Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection has certified the discharges in accordance with the provisions of Section 401 of the Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. Section 1251 et seq.) on August 21, 1980. Additional information on the proposed project may be secured from Mr. Frank M. Bennett, Director, Power Supply Division, Rural Electrification Administration, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250; telephone (202) 447-6183.

REAGAN Wins Presidency; Rogers Elected to Congress

Mason Upset in School Board Race

The Republican team of Reagan-Bush won in Tuesday's election by a large margin in the county, the state and across the nation. Voter turnout was extremely heavy here and elsewhere as Reagan won over 400 electoral votes - only 270 are needed to be elected.

In Rockcastle County, the voting recapitulation sheet showed 1,345 people voting for the Carter-Mondale ticket as compared to 1,408 in the 1976 election, which means that only 63 fewer people failed to vote for the President's re-election. On the other hand, only 2,583 votes were cast for the Republican candidates, Ford and Dole, four years ago whereas 3,543 votes were cast for Reagan and Bush locally this election - a difference of 960 votes. This seems to indicate that in Rockcastle County very little cross-over voting was done just a heavier turn-out by the Republi-

cans. Locally, in the U.S. Senate race, Rep. Mary Louise Foust polled 2,701 votes to incumbent Wendell Ford's 1,993. However, Mrs. Foust lost the election by a wide margin statewide.

As expected in Rockcastle County, as well as across the Fifth Congressional District, Commonwealth Attorney Rep. Harold Rogers of Somerset won

There will be all the other ingredients of a traditional parade, including bands, horses, flags, cars, football teams and clowns.

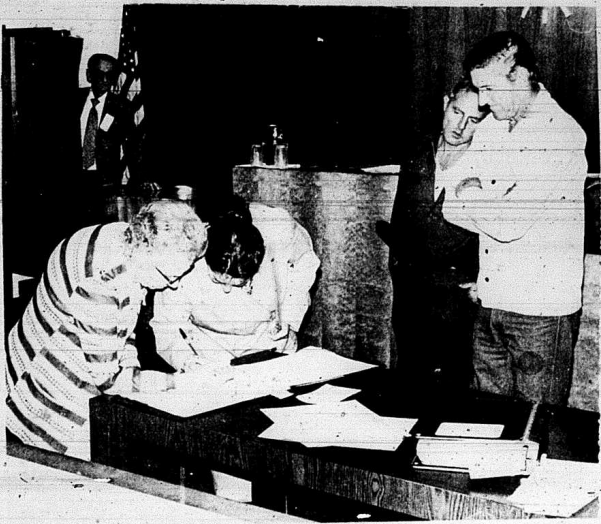
Gypsies Allegedly

Programs for Senior Citizens

Senior Citizens' Programs across the country have come about as a result of an increasing number of older people in our world today and the fact that most of these people want to lead normal social lives.

In Rockcastle County, the Senior Citizens' Program encompasses many phases and deals with many problems faced by senior citizens.

The hot lunch program is one of the services with which most people are familiar. It is, no doubt, one of the best and most rewarding aspects of the program because it provides not only the nutrition needed, but socialization - a chance to meet and see new and old friends. Anyone who cooks for one, and eats 3 meals alone, will readily admit that it is difficult, painstaking and boring. Sometimes financial insecurity, real or imagined, causes an older person to cut corners at mealtime and end up lacking in a well balanced diet. However, most people attend the Mt. Vernon center at the library or the Brodhead Center at the Fairgrounds would likely admit that the main motive for attending the lunches is to get together with others who have similar interests. Whether a baby, teen-

ager, or adult, one of the most depressing and emotionally damaging environments is isolation. According to Mr. Welkie Ballinger of Mt. Vernon, the meals/provided by D and W Cafeteria of Corbin are good, but, says Mr. Ballinger, "The thing about coming here is not just the meals, but getting out of the house and having something to do."

Transportation for participants is no longer the problem it used to be. The Rockcastle Co. Fiscal Court granted the group revenue sharing monies to buy a van and most of the lunch participants ride to and from the center on the van. They begin arriving at 10:30 a.m. and Cafeteria of Corbin is good, but, says Mr. Ballinger, "The thing about coming here is not just the meals, but getting out of the house and having something to do."

The hot noontime meal is not a program for indigents; it is intended for everyone. The lunches are free but a donation of 25c is expected to help buy gas. The cost of the meal is \$1.75. Average daily attendance for lunch at the Mt. Vernon Center is 43 with a 25 average at Brodhead, according to Faye Thompson, who has been local center director for the past two years. Ms. Thompson has three

sides, Joyce Ballinger, Sharon Eversole and Evelyn Foynter at Mt. Vernon and two aides, Mary Belle Johnson and Irene Taylor at Brodhead, plus volunteers.

The local agency is governed and advised by a board consisting of Lance Dillingham, chairman; Joe Harmon, vice-chairman; Hazel Cummins, Archie French, Curtis Bradley, Rachel Pigan, Sophia Brown and Hazel Slipp.

Recreation is a vital part of the program. Once a month, lunch participants celebrate the birthdays occurring that month with a party and use all the holidays as a good excuse for a special celebration. Last Friday, 38 attended the Halloween party. Prizes were given to Willie Coyle, Hazel Cummins and Welkie Ballinger for best costume. T.V., crafts, pool, bingo and other games are often enjoyed at the center. The van provides transportation to the hospital and nursing home to visit friends or relatives. Recently, senior citizens have taken trips to Shakertown, the Red River Gorge, Gatlinburg and have enjoyed picnics at local sites. These trips are sponsored by the individual. For Lance Dillingham, the trips and entertainment are the most enjoyable part of the program.

Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor,

As I write this letter, my family is very sad for two reasons; first, on November 10, 1980, my brother, Bobby L. Taylor will be dead one year (he was murdered in his home). The other reason is that Detective Fred Walton is being removed from our county.

I am sure the citizens of Rockcastle County know that Detective Walton has worked many, many long, hard hours since he came here in February of 1980. He's worked hard to make our county a better and safer place to live. He also cares about the people of this county. My family knows he cares.

I would like to tell you how my family met Detective Fred Walton. On November 10, 1979, between 6 and 7 p.m., my brother was murdered in his home. A detective, not Walton, was assigned to his case and for four long, long, horrible months we waited and not one time did the detective ever call my mom and dad. (As most people know, my father was paralyzed and in bed for 38 years and, at this time in very poor health. Mom had to stay with him at all times).

My mom and I called the police station so many times for someone to just come out and talk to her and dad but nobody did. Finally, I couldn't stand it any more coming home at night from work and looking at the tears in their sad eyes. My dad told me once, with tears streaming down his face, "If I could only get out of bed and go talk to them, maybe I could tell them something that would help." And Mom would say, "Doesn't somebody care?"

So, again, as many times before, I went back to the police station and pleaded with the detective and one of the sergeants and told them that I knew my brother's death was just another case but he had a

mother and father who loved him as much as life itself and that I knew they couldn't visit every home when something like this happened but I begged them to give us 10 minutes of their time. He promised he would in a few days. Two weeks later, Mom called the detective to see when he was going to come see them. He said the next day. They looked for him to

come for three days. Another month passed, he never came by or even took the time to call. Then, I saw two people that I loved so much begin to fall apart and I stood by helplessly when they would look at me and say, "Did you find out anything today?" And, I would have to say no and with tears streaming down their faces, Mom said,

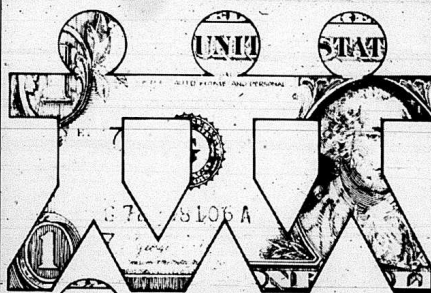

If anyone offers to sell you a deer permit at a discount, be plenty suspicious. Two hundred permits were stolen from a

Louisville sporting goods store recently. These permits are numbered 055201 through 055400.

Anyone found hunting with one of these stolen permits can be charged both with hunting without a valid permit and with receiving stolen property, according to officials of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. The state's wildlife conservation officers are being instructed to arrest anyone possessing one of these stolen permits.

But, if you've bought your permit from a legal source (a county court clerk or a store authorized by the clerk to sell licenses) and have read the deer hunting guide attached to it, you're all set for the Nov. 8-10 deer gun hunt.

For some Kentucky hunters, this hunt will be for their second deer; hunters who have already taken a deer during the bow season (which opened Oct. 1) may buy a second permit and take another deer either by gun, bow or crossbow.

If you score during the November gun hunt, you may

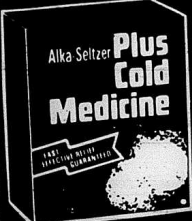

Food Dollar May Not Buy Enough Nutrition

Americans spend an average of \$1,200 per person for food each year, but they may not be buying their money's worth in nutrition. Americans have changed both where and how they spend their food dollars during the last 15 years. They are eating out more and spending a greater share of the food budget at the restaurant than they did in 1965.

Of weekly food expenditures, averaging \$23 per person, \$17 or 73 percent goes for groceries and \$6 or 27 percent for meals and snacks away from home. In 1965, Americans spent

Sacrificing Children

"Thou hast taken thy sons and thy daughters, whom thou hast borne unto me, and these hast thou sacrificed unto them to be devoured." (Ezek. 16:20).

In the above scripture, the Lord accuses the Israelites of having sacrificed their children to idols. This is only one of the references to this terrible practice in the Old Testament. And almost without exception, whenever one of these references is read in a Bible class, some mother will exclaim that she just cannot see how any mother could do such a thing to her children.

Surely, we all imagine to ourselves, they must have been the worst sort of barbarians to do such! How blind we are. For all our pious lamentations, I seriously doubt that there has ever been a nation of people who sacrificed more children to their idols than the people of America today.

I do not speak just of "un-Christian" America. In the Lord's church I have seen mothers and fathers who recoil in horror at the mention of the human sacrifices practiced by the Israelites, while at the same time allowing their own children to run straight to every altar Satan has erected in our land. Some even push them down the road faster.

Parents who encourage their children to seek popularity through immodest dress and dancing; parents, who by their

examples, teach their children to drink, curse, lie and break the law; parents who fail to love and discipline their children; parents who give their children everything they want; parents who are too wrapped up in their own lives even to teach their children the Bible; and take them to worship God, in what respect do they differ from the Israelite parents who sacrificed them to idols?

We sacrifice them to the gods of our jobs, television, materialism and social popularity and then have the gall to be appalled at the practice of the Israelites. Lord, forgive us, and help us to see our folly before it is too late - before Judgment comes on us, too.

"And ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath; but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord" (Eph. 6:4).



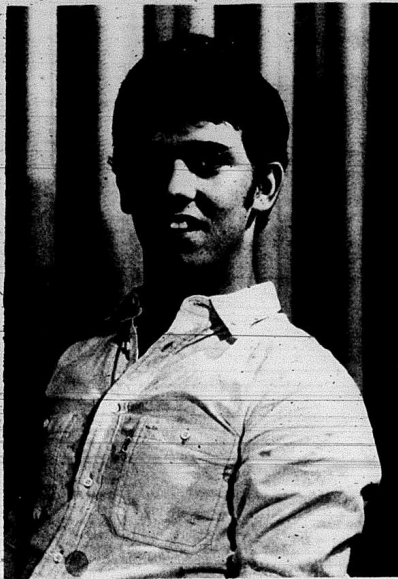

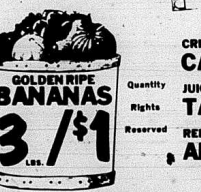

"Kentucky Field" (Cont. From 3) still buy" the "second deer" permit, but you may use it only for bow or crossbow hunting. Remember the basic rules: "one gun, twof by bow"

The only exception is if the deer is taken in one of five special areas - Bluegrass Army Depot, Ft. Campbell, Ft. Knox, Land Between the Lakes or the Ballard Wildlife Management area. If your first dees came

from one of these areas, you may use any legal method to take the second. Nor will the method used to take the first deer limit the legal means you use to take the second in one of these areas.

A few other reminders about the upcoming gun hunt: remember that gun hunters are required to wear either a cap, hat, vest, coat or coveralls of hunter orange color and that the entire garment must be hunter orange.

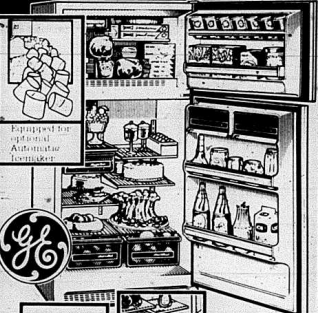

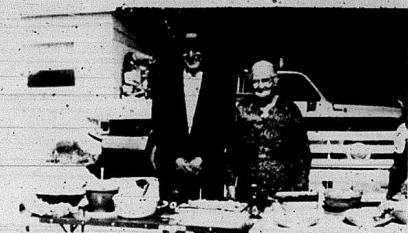

Another service provided is outreach, information and referral. This is going into the community and seeking out people who need services - whether hot lunch or a service provided by another agency - and seeing that the person's needs are taken care of.

Telephone reassurance is carried out by center workers. Every day or so, home clients are called and checked on. Mr. Ballinger commented that the staff is well trained and handle problems in a kind and reassuring manner. He says that it takes these special people to be able to deal with so many people, some who may complain and nag. He feels that our center is very fortunate.

Some hot meals are taken to those not able to go to the center for whatever reason. These are usually persons with no relatives live close or those

who have been referred by other agencies.

Chore service is also provided for senior citizens when needed. This includes anything a person cannot do, but which needs doing to improve home life. Shopping, doctor appointments and medicine pick up are provided when possible.

Legal aid is provided when needed by legal aid service from Somerset.

Once a month, Cheryl Witt, Home Economist, provides a nutrition awareness program. Health screening, including blood pressure, eyes, hearing, respiratory and blood tests, is carried out by the Berea College of Nursing.

Lance Dillingham has been on the board of directors since the local program got underway. He is pleased that it has expanded to over twice its original size. The program is funded by the federal government and administered by the Cumberland Valley Area Development District which, according to Mr. Dillingham, "always cooperated with us real good, along with the county and city governments."

especially potatoes. They are buying more beef, poultry, fish, nuts, fruit, soft drinks, dessert and alcohol, especially beer and wine.

The supermarket food dollar now consists of 38 cents for meat, poultry, fish and eggs, 20 cents for fruits and vegetables, 12 cents for dairy products, 7 cents for breads and cereals, 7 cents for sugar, candy, soft drinks and desserts; 4 cents for beer and wine and the remaining 7 cents for fats, oils and other foods.

Not all the changes in eating and buying habits have brought nutritional benefits. Studies continue to show people in this country are not as well nourished as they might be. Americans still consume too many calories and too much fat, cholesterol, salt and alcohol.

Sugar and alcohol consumption has increased dramatically since 1965. Americans are drinking 38 percent more alcoholic beverages, mostly beer and wine. They buy less sugar and candy, they actually consume more sugar - largely in soft drinks, punches and desserts.

Use of soft drinks and desserts has jumped a whopping 155 percent in 15 years. Per capita consumption of soft drinks is now 33.8 gallons per year. That amount contains 54.4 pounds of sugar. That is the equivalent of each American drinking a 12 ounce can of soda every day and consuming more than three teaspoons of sugar in that 12-ounce can.
