Mock Disaster Drill - A Cooperate Effort for Preparedness

A bus wreck was the setting for the semi-annual mock disaster staged last Thursday by the Rockcastle County Hospital. The action took place behind the Old State Garage in Mt. Vernon and personnel from the hospital and ambulance service and the Rockcastle County Rescue Squad handed various injuries due to the mock wreck. The hospital is required by the State License Bureau to stage such a drill at least twice annually. Students and staff of the Harry Sparks Vocational School provided the necessary "victims" for the drill.

Parsons; Loyd Cain, director of the HSVS, students and staff; William Taylor, State Troopers Jack Lawless and Jimmie D. Silvers; City Policeman Frank DeBorde; Mt. Vernon Fire Chief John Cox and members of the department; the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service and Central Vending Company. Gary G. Asher, Fire, Safety and Disaster Coordinator for the Rockcastle County Hospital coordinated the drill.

FOOTBALL-Emotional Crisis for Moms

"Mamas don't let your babies grow up to play football." That would probably never make a hit song like Wrayton's, but it is a refrain that has kept running through my mind the last few weeks as my son, who is a junior in high school, decided in mid-season to join the football team.

My first fear centered around the fact that he was not in shape or experienced enough to play after not having played football since the 8th grade. I consulted myself with the thought that he would probably not be allowed to play in a game this year and that maybe by next year he would change his mind.

My second emotion was almost as crushing as if he had announced he was joining the Army. Something like, "How could he do this to me, his poor mother?" After all the time I've spent hunting shoes that tell him his player rolls are not so tight close to the T.V. and to look where he was going. If I only had the energy expended by all the times I've said, "Get down out of that tree, you're going to break your neck." "Put that down you might put your eye out." "Watch out! That looks like it's going to explode."

It is obvious that a person can be injured doing some very simple, non-violent things, but, to me, playing football is to playing most other sports as

speeding or racing a car is to driving one.

Maybe it just takes a while to become a hardened football fan. Right now, I can't keep from getting a suffocating, sick feeling when a player rolls and writhes or lies limp on the field from an injury. I am always amazed at fans who take this opportunity to get refreshments or to catch up on conversation. My inclination is to get up and run - either to the injured player, which is not acceptable behavior, or as far away as I can from the scene, and I don't have the nerve to do that either. So, I usually sit with my eyes glued to the injured player to see if he wakes off the field or is carried to the ambulance that's always waiting at football games.

Now I have nothing against other children playing football except that I don't think it is a good idea to put so much money and glorification into a sport that perpetrates violence. I used to believe that football, like other sports, builds character as well as physical fitness; however, I began to question the belief after I overheard the local high school team, a few years ago, paying themselves up for a game by chanting, "KILL BEARS!"

Now I am more to slapping their helmets. The football season is over and I can finally breathe deeply and smile and wish that there could be school competition in such things as track, gymnastics, tennis, hand, golf, debate, drama, art, math, creative writing and science.

KENTUCKY'S BIG MOSS ATTACK

LEXINGTON — Just a few years ago, when Kentucky was winning the Peach Bowl and coming back to win 10 games the next season, Perry Moss was running the Wildcats offense. Moss left U.K. in 1978 after three seasons to coach in a new pro league. The pro league plays its games during the summer and Perry was in his off season when Fran Curci called. He volunteered to come back and help the Wildcats through the last 5 games on the schedule as the quarterback coach. His influence can be seen on the Wildcat offense.

We have two outstanding quarterback prospects in Larry McCrimmon and Randy Jenkins. Moss was telling me "You want a quarterback who can throw, of course. You also like to have an athlete who has good movement and he has to have some leadership ability." McCrimmon and Jenkins both have those talents. They make mistakes, sure, but they're young and we can clean up those mistakes. We may have two of the finest young quarterbacks of any major college football team in the country."

What is this Kentucky team lacking to be a winning football team? We're really got that far away," Moss said. "We need a good spring practice. We need to have a good recruiting year. I'll in some spots where we are weak. There's a great nucleus of young players here and I am very much impressed with the attitude since I came back. That's a great credit to Coach Curci and the coaches. Our practices have been great. This is a fine group and with the nucleus we have, I think you're going to see them win a lot of football games."

Kentucky is firing up in the "wishbone" formation much of the time. Moss came back to Kentucky. We're not a wishbone team," Moss says. "Actually, we're in a full back backfield. We're in the three deep backs and we line up in a spread. We're a multiple offense, really. We like to give the other team's defense a lot to prepare for when they're going to play us."

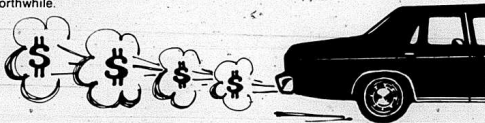

gazine ads. We can do most of our shopping at home if we want.

It's time to start making up mail orders for Christmas gifts. It can take anywhere from one to four or five weeks to receive your order and perhaps longer for factory-shipped items. You also need to allow extra time for mailing gifts to people or for exchanging or returning unsatisfactory merchandise.

Shopping Tips

Order from a company you've heard about or done business with before.

Note their policies on guarantees, refunds and exchanges. Never send cash. Pay by check or money order.

Be sure to fill out everything you should mail in form.

Keep a record of your order, along with name and address of company, date ordered, etc.

Return unsatisfactory merchandise immediately. Let com-

pany know the reason.

Where To Complain

Just in case you have a complaint you haven't been able to work out with the company, here's what you should do:

For a Kentucky-based company, register your complaint in detail and in writing with the Division of Consumer Protection, Office of the Attorney General, Room 34, The Capitol, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601, or write to Director, Office of Consumer Affairs, Washington, D.C. 20201.

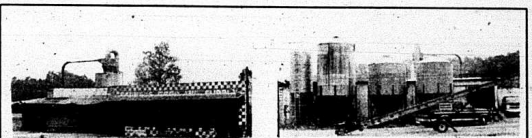

Discover which playthings are his or her favorites, and why. When he gets a new toy, let him figure out how to play with it himself, unless his frustration level gets so high that he just has to have a little help.

When you join him, play at his level. Imitate his ways of playing. You can suggest another way of playing with a toy after a while, then back off and let the youngster take the lead again.

Once you get to know your child's play interests and skill levels, it will be easy to buy suitable toys. If there are several children in the family, or if other children visit often, choose some toys that offer a variety of play experiences at different skill levels. A set of wooden blocks, for instance, has all kinds of play value for different ages.

Check out your toy selections for safety. A toy should have no rough edges or sharp places, no detachable parts small enough for a young child to choke on - even if the toy is for an older brother or sister. It should be non-toxic, durable, easy to clean and flame resistant.

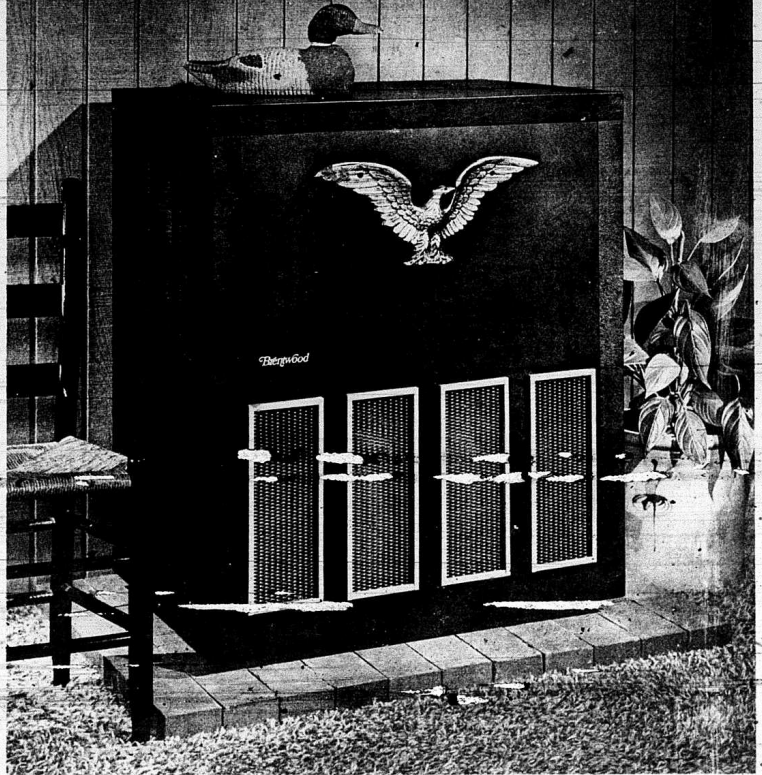

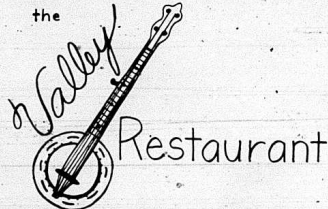
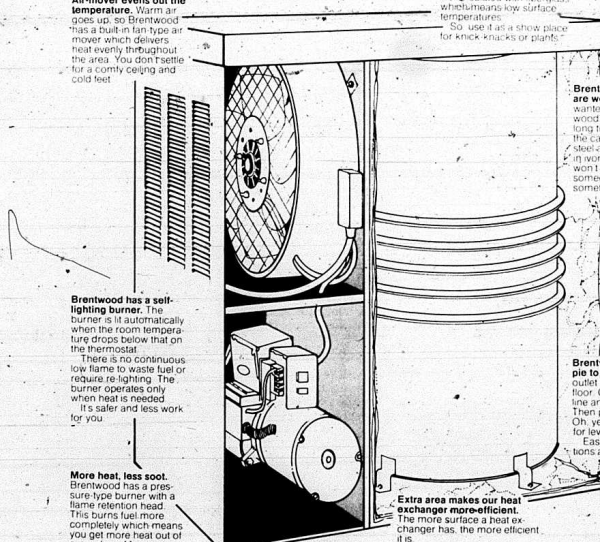

KYDOT Lists Priorities For Snow and Ice Removal

Snow and ice removal priorities for State Roads have now been determined for the 1980-81 winter season, according to State Transportation Secretary Frank Metts. Individual county maps that show the four levels of priority are now available.

The maps show the priority system of each individual road, according to A. R. Romine, Assistant State Highway Engineer. The priority system is necessary to coordinate the activities of the various crews so that continuing routes will be treated at nearly the same time. Since the Department of Transportation can not do all roads at the same time, it is desirable the early efforts provide a meaningful network to facilitate long trips.

The maps will benefit the public when they are forced to

make long trips during the early stages of typical winter storms. During severe storms, workers will stay on the first priorities until they are clear.

The priority guidelines follow:

Priority One: Interstate highways, parkways (toll roads), urban expressways, and any other state maintained road of exceptional traffic volume.

Priority Two: State primary roads (such as U.S. 60, U.S. 127), expressways, by-passes and other roads with slightly lesser traffic volume.

Priority Three: Some state secondary roads such as KY 52, some rural secondary roads and other roads with moderate traffic.

Priority Four: All remaining state maintained roads not included in one of the first three categories.

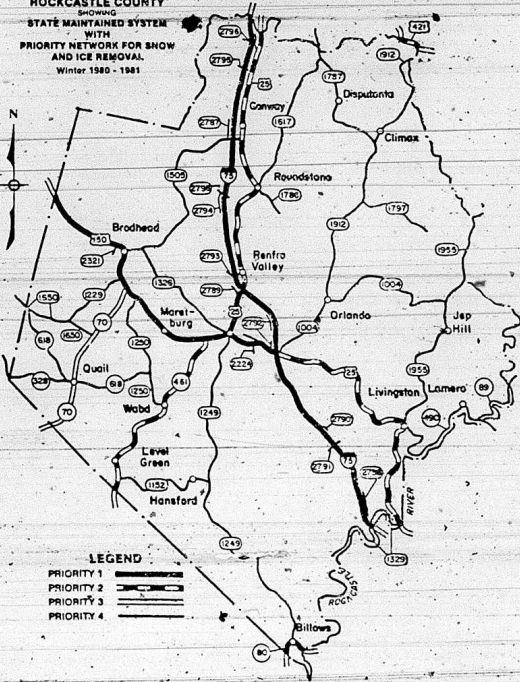

Whereas the County of Rockcastle has received unanticipated revenues in the amount of \$6,230.41 from the Commonwealth of Ky., Coal Severance Economic Aid Funds.

It is ordained by the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County that:

SECTION ONE: The annual Budget for fiscal year 1980-81 is amended to:

(a) Increase receipts from the Coal Severance Economic Assistance Fund by \$6,230.41 to include revenues from the Coal Severance Economic Aid Fund.

(b) Increase budget expenditures Account Number: 500 Road Maintenance by \$6,230.41

SECTION TWO: The sum added to budget expenditure account in Section One is appropriate for general governmental purposes.

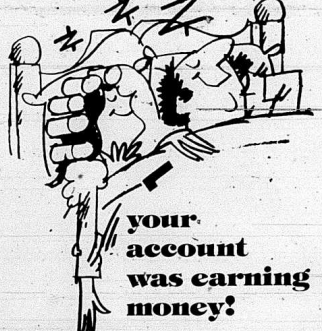

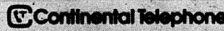
