Funeral services were conducted Wednesday at 1:30 p.m. at the Grifton-Schmidt Memorial Home with Rev. John Carter officiating. Burial was in the Mound Hill Union Cemetery, Eaton, Ohio.

Following is an epitaph written for Mr. Johnson.

"...day for the past month, Ed and Irene Johnson shared the 23rd Psalm. It had been important to them both through the years and, as they saw their time together coming to an end, it seemed important that they make this Psalm their own. The 23rd Psalm is indeed a Psalm wondrous fitting for Ed Johnson. He was a man who loved 'green pastures' and 'still waters.' That he loved and respected nature can be seen in a newspaper clipping that was framed and hung in his house entitled 'White Man Crazy.' It describes an American Indian's winning entry to a caption contest involving two pictures of a barren, eroded landscape. The caption describes the white man's ravaging of the earth, waste of natural resources and general disrespect for nature then describes the Indian's legendary unity with the earth's laws of nature.

"...cludes with the analysis, 'White Man Crazy.' Having farmed for many years, Ed Johnson respected the laws of nature and had a deep appreciation for the earth and its abundance.

Psalm 23 continues, 'he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness,' and we remember Ed as a man with strong ideas about honesty, justice and generosity. He was honest. 'When you're farming with someone else,' he told his children, 'if there's ever a question of a bushel or a dollar, give the other man the benefit of the doubt.' He loved justice. He

could not stand the fact that some of his tax dollars went to support people who were too lazy to work and simply lived off of welfare. Yet, he was generous. If there was a real need, Ed Johnson would be there. The story is told of how one day, while searching for an old family grave on a man's property, Ed and Irene discovered that the man was worried about finding school clothes for his 3 children. Ed took all three into town, where he and Irene bought them some school clothes, and not just one pair of pants each, but six - enough to last all year.

"...Thou anointest my head with oil; I may never have had oil poured over his head, but he was constantly pouring information into it. A firm believer in hard work, he nonetheless saw just as clearly the importance of sound and informed thinking. He is known to have read volumes of encyclopedias for pleasure and was constantly using them to look up information. He was fascinated with the Civil War and was literally a walking computer, full of facts, dates, names, places, etc.

"...My cup runneth over." The things which he learned did not stop once they reached his head. Ed loved teaching others and was glad for others to be able to learn from him however possible, whether it meant getting involved with FFA, or sharing recently discovered data from the encyclopedia with a visitor or taking experimental cancer drugs to do his search for a cure, or being willing to share his struggles with death and dying with a small seminary class. Even facing death, Ed's hope was that he might somehow help others to learn.

The Psalm ends, 'And I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.' Ed Johnson was not a 'chummy' man yet in many ways, he had a faith that would put many churchgoers to shame. He had found a faith that enabled him to live 'in the world but not of the world.' For him, faith and life could not be separate issues; religion was not just something for church on Sunday morning. Faith was an integral part of life. Because of his faith, Ed Johnson was a realist. Believing God was in control, he could accept life as it came to him. Even discussing his own death, his question was not 'why me?' Death, to him, was a part of life. To be born, to live, is sooner or later to experience death. In this manner, Ed Johnson's faith enabled him to

see death, not as something freakish, an enemy, but as something natural, a friend. Ed chose as his epitaph, a short poem by Edward Vance Cooke entitled, 'How Did You Die?'

Oh, a trouble's a ton, or a trouble's an ounce or a trouble is what you make it, and it isn't the fact that you're hurt that counts, but only, "how did you take it?"

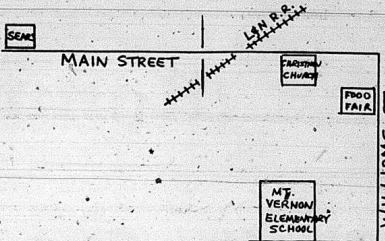
My only son played football at RCHS when he was not on the injured list.

FmHA Aids Kentucky Rural Development

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) experienced another record year in Kentucky according to William E. Burnett, State Director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In a news release, Burnett gave the following breakdown of FmHA loan and grant activity for fiscal year 1980, which ended September 30: \$142.6 million in regular and emergency credit to farmers for farm real estate and operating purposes; \$59.3 million in business and industrial loans and loan guarantees; \$44.8 million in loans and grants for water and sewer systems and other community facilities; and \$117.9 million in loans and grants for new and existing housing for low and

moderate income families.

Grants for the repair and rehabilitation of housing represent less than 1 percent of the total dollars obligated in the housing program, according to Burnett. These grants are limited to the indigent elderly and must be used to remove health and safety hazards in owner-occupied homes. Burnett said the large increase in FmHA obligations during the past two fiscal years is due mainly to a significant expansion in the agency's farm programs. Agriculture-related loans jumped from approximately \$40 million in 1978 to over \$183 million in 1979.

Figures for 1980 include a loan guarantee of \$31.7 million under the business and industry program for the construction of an alcohol plant with the capacity to produce 21 million gallons of ethanol annually for use in gasoline. Burnett indicated the loan guarantee represents (Cont. to 6)

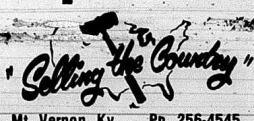

Just 24 to mention a few. Lest someone say that these Scriptures are not written for the benefit of Christians, we ask: who would allow sinners fall from grace (Gal. 5:4) unless he was in grace to start with, anyone that once could fall from a roof unless he was on the roof.

Suppose a businessman should make a will, bequeathing his business and all its proceeds to his son. Conditions of the will are that the son must: (1) operate the business himself as long as he is mentally competent to sell it; and (2) never move to another state. If he fails to meet any of these conditions, the business or its proceeds would go to other heirs.

Beloved, be not deceived by false theories. You can fall from grace and you can be lost. Even the great apostle Paul took precautions "lest that by any means, when I have preached to others I myself should be a castaway" (1 Cor. 9:7). The Lord did not waste space in the Bible warning us against that which is impossible for us to do.

When the businessman dies, the son takes over the business and successfully operates it for a time. Then he decides that he would prefer to go back to his old job and he contracts a lawyer to prepare papers to sell the business. How would he fare in this venture? The lawyer wouldn't have to look far in the records before he discovered that the son could not sell the business unless he wanted to relinquish the proceeds.

Had the preacher who asked the question taken the time to study the context of the Scripture he read, he would have readily seen that there were conditions to maintaining eternal life. Anytime one of His sheep falls to hear His voice, or falls to follow Him he shall perish just as surely as he who hears His voice and follows Him shall never perish. This is the inescapable conclusion of this Scripture.

Thus it is with the will of Jesus. It is certainly true that He gives eternal life to those who "hear his voice and follow him" (John 10:27). This and (2) lous gift was not and cannot be earned (Eph. 2:8-9), but it can be and often is forfeited. There are conditions which the heir must meet if he is to enjoy the benefits of the will. (1) He must "operate" the business himself (1 Cor. 15:58, 2 Cor. 5:10, et al.). (2) He must never "sell" it (Prov. 13:22) and (3) He must never move from his faithful "state" to another (Col. 1:23; Eph. 4:14; et al.). If he meets these conditions, regardless of what other men may do to him, they are unable to pluck him out of the God (John 10:29) and eternal life is his.

To the Christians in the church in Galatia, Paul writes: "Be not deceived, God is not mocked; for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to the flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption, but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting. (Gal. 6:7-8).

There are numerous Scriptures in the New Testament warning Christians against falling away; i.e. 1 Cor. 10:12; Heb. 4:11; 2 Pet. 1:10; 3:17; Luke 8:13; Heb. 6:6; Gal. 6:4; 2 Thes. 2:3; et al.

James said, "Brethren, if any of you do err from the truth, and one convert him, let him know, that he will convert the sinner from the error of his way, shall save a soul from death and shall have a multitude to be saved from death. He that is lost, shall lose all things that he has lost." (James 5:19-20-emp. mine, am). We see then that a brother becomes a sinner when he errs and his soul needs to be saved from death. He has lost.





stuffing and vice-versa. Usually tightly packed, the stuffing is the last part of the bird to cook up to temperature. So, if you cook the bird and stuffing together, make sure the interior of the stuffing reaches 165 degrees F.

Stuff the bird just before (Cont. to 9)

Holiday time is approaching and hunting season is already here. That means fowl time, too.

With the domestication of the wild turkey, chances are that the bird you eat won't be the one you brought down in the field. But, whether wild or domesticated, waterfowl or upland game bird - for the table and safe eating, you should treat them almost exactly alike.

Traditionally, many holiday tables will be laden with turkey. Those first settlers from across the Atlantic picked up the custom from native American Indians some 400 years ago. Americans of all races and creeds have remained loyal to the custom throughout the years and turkey has graced Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's tables since.

Why present a special problem to the cook - not because of the nature of the bird, but because of the way it usually is prepared. Americans generally seem to prefer their holiday fowl stuffed and it's the stuffing that causes the problem. This applies whether it is bread, meat or any other kind of stuffing.

If you want to be super-safe, cook the stuffing separately. Most people don't and most cooks believe the turkey adds flavor to the

Veterans Should Verify Income

Each year, many veterans and their dependents are asked to verify their income in order to determine their continued eligibility for Veterans Administration pension. According to Lee Caudill, Director of the VA Regional Office in Louisville, any veteran or dependent who needs assistance in completing the Income Questionnaire may call the VA's toll-free number, 1-800-797-4862.

In addition, local representatives of service organizations such as Disabled American Veterans, the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Paralyzed Veterans of America and the Kentucky Center for Veterans Affairs may be available to assist veterans in filling out their I.Q. cards.

Veterans may call local service organization officers to find out which post or chapter is

participating in this program. Mr. Caudill said.

The VA Regional Office and the service organizations are working together closely in an all-out effort to insure that all veterans and dependents complete their cards on time. The questionnaire must be completed and mailed no later than December 25, 1980. Failure to return the cards will result in an interruption of pension checks and cause undue hardships for veterans and their families.

Legislative Report

By: Rep. Harold DeMarcus

The Budget Review subcommittee on Education of the Appropriations and Revenue Committee has commenced a fiscal review of the Commonwealth's educational systems.

With a \$163 million budgetary shortfall predicted for the state in fiscal year 1981-82, and since education spending constitutes the largest portion of Kentucky's budget spending, reductions must be made in this area to avoid more drastic measures. Further, the situation is complicated by two factors.

First, in the last few years, significant progress has been made in the state's educational

systems and the legislature does not intend to take any action that might stymie this progress.

Second, the executive administration has reduced education spending for fiscal year 1980-81 by \$47 million. Some of these reductions in elementary and secondary education, especially in the areas of student fees and vocational education, have produced a negative effect on the classroom student. The

legislature does not intend to recommend any budget reductions that directly affect the classroom student.

However, in the last nine years, student population in the state's elementary and secondary schools has declined by 58,000 students. While in the same period, education personnel has increased by 5,200 and of this number 3,000 are non-teaching

Considering the decline in student population, these non-teaching positions could be considered of questionable value to the classroom student.

The education subcommittee's goal should be to prepare an extensive list of recommendations for making operating procedures in the Department of Education and the state universities more efficient and cost effective.

The subcommittee's agenda over the next few months entails visiting ten agencies in the Department of Education and the campuses of eight state universities.

In addition to the subcommittee's policy of visiting each agency and institution being unorthodox and probably unproductive, the time and expense required to send the subcommittee to various points across the Commonwealth is not efficient or cost effective in itself.

Further, members of the Education Committee's subcommittee on Higher Education will also travel to the eight state universities. This action will only result in the endeavor's cost being doubled.

The Budget Review subcommittee on Education cannot produce any recommendations for efficiency in state government if it fails to first lead by example.

The words have long ago disappeared and now it is simply referred to as the old beer barrel. The battered old keg annually goes to the winner of the Kentucky-Tennessee game. There have been several keg-nappings where bands of students from one school has raided the other school's campus and spirited the barrel away. Vanderbilt even got in on the action in 1961. The Commodores were to meet Kentucky in a basketball game in Knoxville. Hoping to win the support of Tennessee fans, the Vandy students raided Lexington and made off with the barrel. This will be Fran Curci's eighth game as the Kentucky coach. He has seen his teams win twice and lose five times. Twice he has seen the Vols book Kentucky's path to a post season bowl. In only his second season, his Wildcats played the Vols in Knoxville. A berth in the Liberty Bowl rode on the outcome. Tennessee coach, Bill Battle, installed his "Liberty" formation, an unbalanced line, and the Vols won 24 to 7. Last year, Kentucky needed only to beat Tennessee to go to the Hall of Fame Bowl. 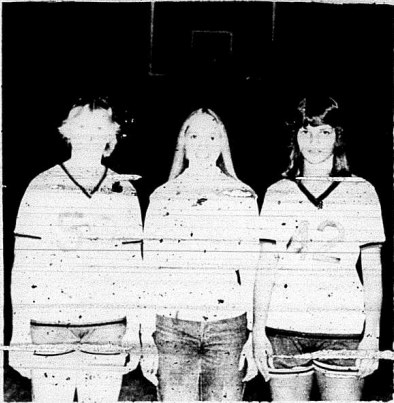

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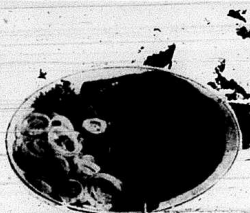
