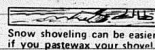

Drought Affected Farmers Receive Loans from FmHA

William E. Burnette, State Director of the Farmers' Home Administration (FmHA), announced today that new FmHA regulations permit actual loss loan calculations to be made on current price averages for farm commodities. All of Kentucky's 120 counties were designated as Emergency loan counties by the State Director to assist farmers who suffered actual crop losses because of the drought during the 1980 crop year.

Effective immediately, crop loans to farmers who suffered losses because of the drought will be calculated on major commodities as follows: Corn - \$3/bu.; Soybeans - \$7.20/bu.; Alfalfa - \$80/ton; Mixed Hay - \$65/ton; Barley - \$2.50/bu.; Rye - \$2.40/bu.; Oats - \$1.60/bu. All prices, except oats, are at a (Cont. to 4)

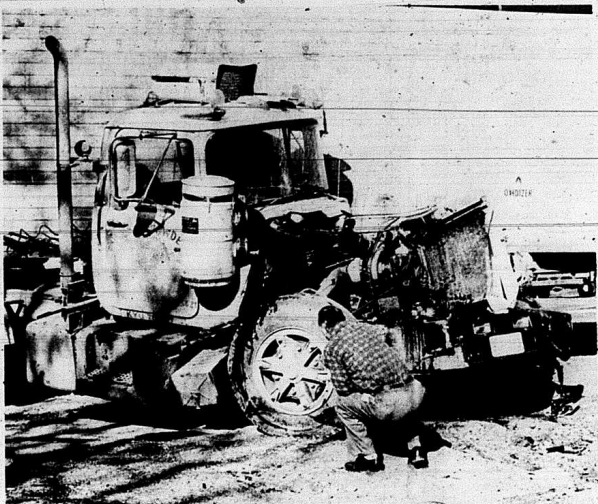
Rockcastle Native Wins Election

John E. Phillips, a native of Rockcastle County now residing in Great Falls, Montana, was recently elected to the Montana House of Representatives.

A veteran of over 31 years of military service, Phillips retired from the United States Air Force as a Chief Master Sergeant on April 30th of this year. A great deal of his military career was spent working with the Air Force's Intercontinental Ballistic Missile Systems, starting with the nation's first ICBM - the Atlas - at Cheyenne, Wyoming in 1959.

Prior to his retirement, Mr. Phillips was stationed at Malmstrom Air Force Base, near Great Falls, which controls one of the nation's largest Minuteman missile complexes. There, he held the base's top enlisted position as senior enlisted advisor to the commander for over eight years. As a member of the Montana Legislature, he will still be representing military people since his district encompasses the Air Force base.

Mr. Phillips is the son of C.W. (Wally) Phillips, who lives in the Red Hill section of the county. He is a graduate of Livingston High School and is married to the former Margaret Carpenter of Livingston. They have one son, John, Jr., who is an engineer with an aerospace firm in Utah.

L & N Crossing Site of Another Accident

State Police from Laurel County investigated a truck-train accident about 7:35 a.m. Friday on the Mullins Station Road.

Hospitalized was Karl Ashley of Broadhead, driver of the Kentucky Powder Co. tractor-trailer which was traveling west when he approached the track.

Mr. Ashley reported that he did not see or hear the train and nosed into the path of the L&N engine. The truck was struck in the front end and the cab part which was pushed back into the trailer and caught fire. The truck was loaded with ammonium nitrate, a blasting agent; however, the agent must have dynamite to cause a real, immediate danger.

The train engineer said that he blew the whistle as he rounded the curve as he is required to do but Ashley maintained that he did not, police reports said.

The four crossings on this road have been the scenes of numerous bad accidents in years past. The only one with flashing lights is the first one off of U.S. 25. The others are marked with railroad crossing signs but no automated signals.

The L&N Railroad Co. have reportedly refused several times to install signals at other three crossings. The crossings are dangerous because in all cases, the view is, at least, partially obstructed due to topography.

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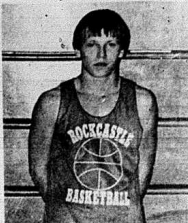

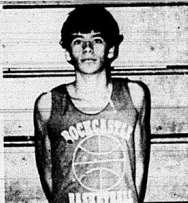
The team is very inexperienced this year and it showed up to some extent Friday night. Williamsburg scored with 22 seconds to go in the game to

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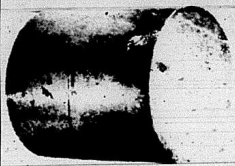

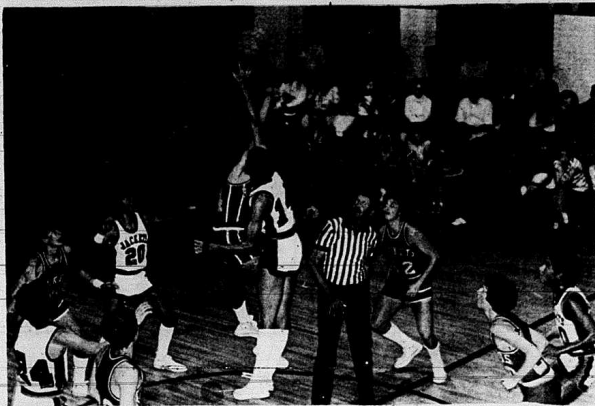
