Arrangements were by the Vale Funeral Home in Morrow, Ohio.

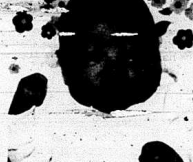
## Eliza M. Pennington

4. We are willing to yield human opinion to the authority of God's word. Jeremiah argued that man's wisdom is not a safe guide in religious matters (Jer. 10:23).

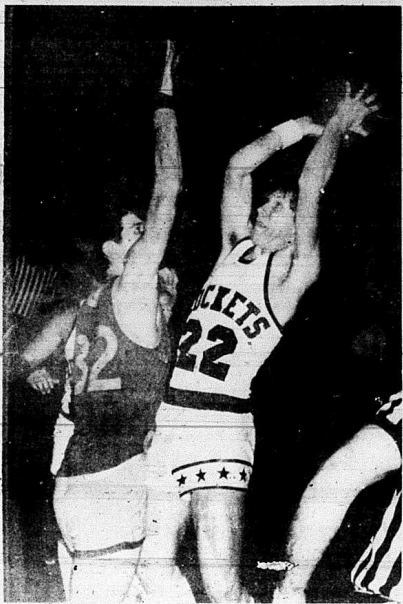
Yes, unity can be had when creeds are discarded in favor of the Bible. It stands to reason that none can unite upon that which has divided religious people - human creeds.

## Rocket Boys Drop Tourney In Finals - Lose to Jackson 59-51

The Rockcastle County boys' team lost their annual Thanksgiving Tournament last Saturday night when they fell to a fine Jackson City team, 59-51.

The Rockets advanced to the final by defeating Nancy in the opening round, 81-52. The Rockets looked very impressive against Nancy to pick up their only win of the early season. Rockcastle had an extremely balanced attack as all 12 men on the varsity saw playing time. Senior forward Danny Offutt had a fine game as he led Rockcastle in scoring with 14. Point guard, Willie Hiatt, and forward Craig McGuire each had 12 points and Steve Phelps

bagged 8. David Burdine, Barry Proctor and Anthony Brock each had 6 each. Clinton Graves and Derrick Singleton each had 4. Billy Reynolds' came off the bench to pump in 7 points and Jeff Stevens scored 2.

Rockcastle simply had a better team man for man than did Nancy and it showed in the final 29 point win. Rockcastle then went against Jackson City in the finals and came away on the short end 59-51. The Rockets were sluggish in the first half, scoring only 17 points; however, Jackson wasn't exactly setting the woods on fire as they were only ahead by 10.

Early in the second half, it

was evident that the inexperienced Rockets would not be able to make up the 10-point deficit. Rockcastle played hard in the fourth quarter, going to the boards on both ends of the floor and making some crucial free throws but, it was to no avail as Jackson City managed to convert on their end of the court. The Rockets fell short for their third loss of the season.

David Burdine led the Rockets in scoring with 15; Ricky Phelps got 10; Willie Hiatt, 9; Clinton Graves and Barry Proctor, 6 each; Craig McGuire, 3 and Danny Offutt, 4.

Earlier in the week, Rockcastle played an excellent McCreary Central team and came away with a stunning 68-52 loss. The Rockets merely stood around on defense and did not hustle as they did in their opener.

The game was close at half-time but McCreary began to pull away in the second half and the game was never in question.

Steve Phelps and Clinton Graves shared scoring honors in this game with 12 each. David Burdine got 8; Willie Hiatt, 6; Billy Reynolds, 5; Danny Offutt, 4; Craig McGuire, 3 and Jeff Stevens, 2.

The boys then traveled to Lone Jack Monday night to play in the SEKC tournament and played host Lone Jack. Again, the Rockets came away on the short end, 75-66.

Rockcastle led for half-time by ten but their inexperience hurt them as they lost the lead and the game in the second half.

Danny Offutt led the scoring with 22 points, Graves got 14, Burdine, 12, Reynolds, 5; Phelps, Proctor and McGuire, 4 each and Stevens, 1.

Rockcastle will play Lynn Camp Wednesday night at Lynn Camp and will host Knox Central next Tuesday night.

### Boys' Coaches' Corner

Our season is now well underway with the playing of four games within the past week.

Last Tuesday, November 25, we opened our home schedule against McCreary Central. We played well early in the game but, during the second

half, our play was, by far, the poorest of the season.

McCreary Central shot extremely well, especially from the outside. We made 21 of 42 from the field for 50%, but did not get enough shots at the baskets to win. Much of the time, we turned the ball over before we could get a shot.

On Friday, November 28, we played Nancy High School in the first round of the annual Thanksgiving Tourney. Our people did a real fine job in this game as we won 81-52. All twelve players saw unlimited action and the substitutes played almost the entire second half. Even though this was a fine performance by everyone we felt that we committed too many fouls in the 24 minutes that we sent them to the free throw line. They made 22 of 29 tries from the charity stripe.

In the championship game against Jackson High of Breathitt County, we got off to a slow start for the first time this season. We could not generate any offense in the first half and trailed 27-17 at intermission.

The biggest problem we were confronted with during this game, one we never did solve, was the ability of Jackson to get the ball inside to their big man. Jackson played a fine game and controlled the tempo up until the fourth quarter. During the fourth quarter, we began to get them in a running game and staged a strong comeback. We were very proud of the way our players came back. The final score was 59-51 in favor of Jackson.

On Monday, December 1, our third game in four days, we participated in the SEKC tournament versus Lone Jack at Lone Jack. The first quarter of play was almost flawless from our standpoint. Our execution was superb and it was the best quarter we had played this season. At one point, we led 28-16, midway of the second quarter, only to see this lead cut to 34-30. During the second half, we played as poorly as we had played well in the first half. As the game ended, Lone Jack had won their fourth game of the season by a score of 75-66.

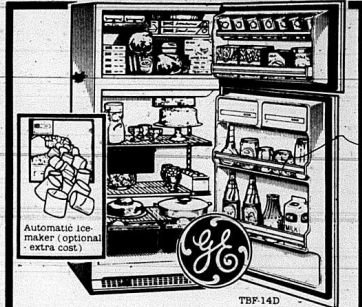
In five games, we have been plagued with inconsistent, poor defense and failure to attack the defense aggressively.

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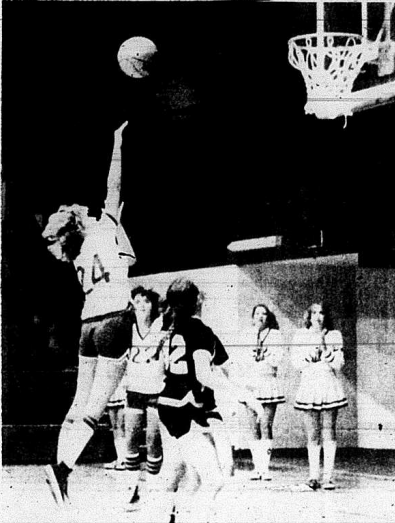

### KENTUCKY AFIELD

Squirrel season opened way back in August and a lot of hunters went out then, couldn't find many squirrels, decided populations were low and gave up for the year.

But early-season hunting is the hardest and least productive of any. A trip now through the same woods that seemed barren last summer could well be an eye-opening experience, and enough to convert you to late-season hunting.

The trees, whose heavy foliage provided good hiding places for squirrels last summer, are bare now, so the flicker of a gray, bushy tail will be more obvious. And food has become harder for the squirrels to find, forcing them to concentrate near what is available.

This is the time of year the hunter who prefers to take his squirrels with a .22 rifle waits for. He can scout out a good stand of nut-producing hardwoods with plenty of squirrel sign, arrive quietly just before dawn and often take his limit from that one spot.

The soft bark of a .22 doesn't scare squirrels nearly as much as the boom of a shotgun, so if the hunter sits quietly after shooting, the squirrels will soon resume their activity and afford the hunter additional shots.

If you do hunt with a .22, remember to be careful - those little bullets can carry over a mile and will ricochet off hard surfaces or even off water. If there's any question about safety, leave the .22 at home and go with a shotgun.

Another productive squirrel hunting technique is to hunt from a tree stand - perhaps the same one you built for duck hunting. Squirrels don't seem to pay much attention to humans off the ground and will often almost run over a hunter sitting in a tree.

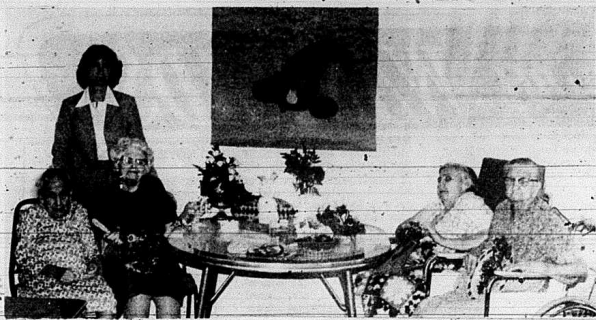

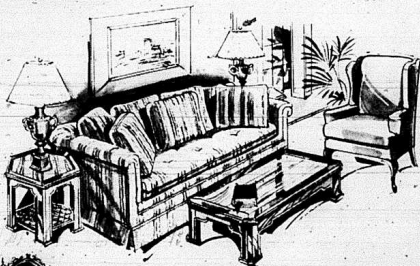

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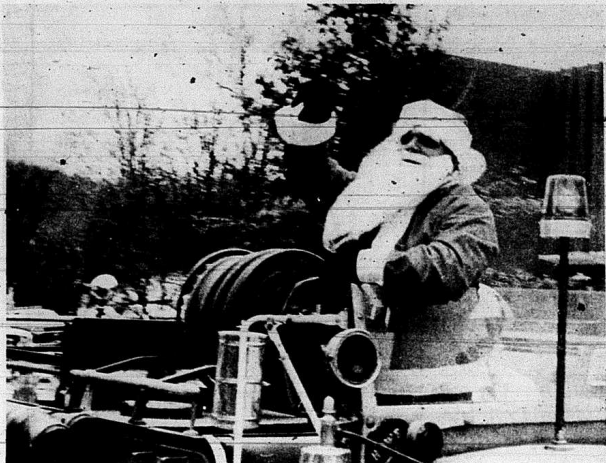

## Rockcastle School District Ranked 32nd in Line for Construction Assistance

At the December school board meeting Tuesday night, School Supt. Charles B. Parsons read the board a letter from the Kentucky School Bldg. Authority which stated, in part, that the Rockcastle County School District is now ranked 32nd in line for state assistance for construction. School districts are ranked according to need and the percentage of aid funded by the state is also calculated based upon need.

The estimated cost of a new elementary building at Mt. Vernon to serve 900 students is \$3,528,000 with the state offering to put up \$2,272,032 or 64.4%. The local district would have to be responsible for the remaining \$1,255,968. A proposed addition to Roundstone Elementary of 4 classrooms and dressing rooms would cost approximately \$260,736 with the state providing \$167,914 and the local district the remaining \$92,822.

Mr. Guess' letter further stated that "In the event we receive the 3 million conditional appropriation at the end of the current fiscal year, your rank would provide you with a fair chance to be funded. As you probably know, we did not receive the first 3 million conditional appropriation at the end of June 30, 1980."

Mr. Parsons submitted, for the board's scrutiny, the 1980 audit report prepared by J. Courtney Horton, CPA from Mt. Sterling.

The following persons were approved to receive GED Certificates: The King, Mayzell Mary, Elsie Burton and Doris Carr.

The board also approved the use of school buses for the Renfro Valley Christmas Party, sponsored by the Rockcastle County Jaycees. The Jaycees will furnish the gasoline.

Dennis Ray Lawrence, David Wayne Hunt, Polly Risinger and Janis Southerland were employed, subject to certification, as substitute teachers. Henry Lee Hayes was hired as a full-time bus driver to replace James Moore.

In other business, the board accepted the low bid on food items for lunchroom use and approved advertising and accepting sealed bids for dishwasher supplies. Bids will be opened at 1 p.m., December 19.

Eastern Kentucky University was granted the use of 6 classrooms at Mt. Vernon Elementary School for extension classes. The University has agreed to pay the school district \$200 per semester per course for extra utilities required.

## Beshear Files Complaint in Franklin Circuit Court

Attorney General Steven L. Beshear announced recently that his office has filed a complaint in the Franklin Circuit Court challenging the rate increase granted by the Kentucky Utilities Co. by the Energy Regulatory Commission. KU requested \$30 million additional revenues and was awarded \$27.7 million.

"This action by the Energy Regulatory Commission is unprecedented in awarding a major investor-owned utility 92 percent of the revenues it requested," said Beshear. "The shareholders of KU received a

significant increase in profits when their return on equity was increased from 13 percent to 13.9 percent. This excessive and inflationary rate increase is a severe burden upon the customers of KU, particularly senior citizens and those on fixed incomes."

According to Beshear, the attorney general's expert witness testified that KU's coal inventory was \$20 million in excess of the optimum level. The Energy Regulatory Commission agreed that KU's coal inventory was excessive, but failed to reduce KU's capital structure by the \$20 million. Consequently, said Beshear, the Kentucky ratepayers are forced to pay for KU's bad management decisions.

"If allowed to stand, the commission's order will set a bad precedent which could allow every utility in Kentucky to receive all the money they ask for, regardless of either their need or the consumer's ability to pay," Beshear said.

## County receives \$50,000 Grant to Build County Health Facility

County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker announced at the December Fiscal Court meeting Tuesday that the county had been awarded a \$50,000 grant from the Cumberland Valley Area Development District Agency for construction of a new facility to house the local county health department. The department presently rents space in the courthouse. The Judge said that he was unsure when actual construction would begin but that the money was expected to be received within the next 30-40 days.

Also receiving monies through county appropriations are the City of Livingston and the City of Brodhead. Mayor Bobby Wilson, representing the Livingston City Council, was told by County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker that the city

would receive \$15,000 towards the purchase of a new fire truck. Partial payment of \$10,000 was promised by March 1 by Judge Thacker. If the full amount were not available this fiscal year, the remaining portion of the pledge would be included in the 1981-82 budget, according to the wording of the motion.

The fire truck is available at a total cost of approximately \$45,000. \$30,000 of the cost will be funded by A.D.F.

Brodhead will receive \$10,000 for the purchase of communication equipment. Representing Brodhead at the meeting was Brian Bussell, fire chief.

In other business, at the request of Doug Brock, the court voted to direct county attorney James Lambert to write a letter to David Fredericks asking him to move a

building presently sitting on county right-of-way near Lake Lovins. The city recently deeded the property to the county for the purpose of building a road around the far side of the lake and connecting to the Clyde Barnett Road.

The County received unanticipated revenues in the following amounts: \$34.91 from the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board; \$10,101.33 from a pass-book saving account with the Continental National Bank of Louisville; \$5,350.00 from the Department of Natural Resources, Environmental Protection Agency for surface mining in Rockcastle County and \$400 for 4 months rental of a county building for storage space from Lovins Construction Co. of Somerset.

## Two Old Wreck Stories

In 1920, following active duty in WW I, Bennett Mullins had returned home to Rockcastle but put together again the pieces of his future - a future which included a railroad job he had left when called to fight the Germans. The L&N Railroad Co. gave the 29-year-old veteran his old brakeman job back.

He was riding in the engine room of a freight train about 3 o'clock one warm afternoon. The train was said to have been going too fast. Reportedly, several of the crew were in a hurry to reach Corbin in time to attend a party with their wives.

Whether planned or a freak accident, something went on the track inside the tunnel at Mullins Station. The train had not the time nor the ability to stop or even slow down in time to avoid the horrible wreck that followed.

The train was heavily loaded and, as the heavy cars rammed the engines, the steam escaped from the boilers scalded the injured men. The steam, combined with the darkness in the tunnel, caused the terrified men to be trapped for a longer time than would otherwise have been the case.

George Mullins, rescued him from the wreckage inside the tunnel. Bennett later told of the emotion he felt when he finally heard George hollering, "I'm a comin', Bennett," as he approached with a lantern. The steam and the impact

killed several of the crew and Bennett, feeling that he, too, was going to die from the unbearable burns, said to his uncle, "I think it best to go through the World War and come home and get killed at Mullins Station!"

He was taken to the hospital in London. His back and neck were burned horribly. Rescuers were careful not to touch the steamed flesh for fear it would fall off. Though scalded, he recovered a later received \$2,000 in damages, a small fortune in 1920.

The train was loaded with a variety of consumables. Stories are told of the horrible sounds of the screaming livestock. Stories are also told of how the hams, oranges, stoves, dresses, cheese and other items on board the train permeated the community. Men in the community got a heating stove and tried to carry it home. He was unable to get it home, however, because he "ruined" his back in the attempt. Many of the dresses were cut up and made into quilt tops. Some, no doubt, were worn.

One woman went to the station carrying two washpans, one in each of two meal sacks she had tied across her horse. After she sold her melons at the store, she loaded two hams from the train in each of the sacks. The rumor had been spread, possibly by the railroad, that the hams had been treated with a dangerous pre-

Without a moment's hesitation, he deftly filled all pockets and the inside of his shirt. Reportedly, he and others of his family made 3 or 4 such trips before others began to realize what had happened. Little else could have so distracted them to cause them to leave the store unattended.

The man carried the sealed hiding place and returned for more only to discover that someone had stolen his first load. Within 10 minutes or so, local officials stood guard. One man, determined that all was not lost, lay down, drenched up.

Dear Mr. Anderkin,

My name is James Terill Wilson and I reside in Somerset, Kentucky. I am a senior at the University of Kentucky, majoring in Appalachian Studies. For the past two years, I have been researching and am presently writing a biography of John C. Mayo, Sr. of Paintsville, Kentucky. Mr. Mayo lived from September of 1864 to May of 1914.

While completing my research, I have uncovered many forgotten achievements of Mr. Mayo. Among these were the organization of Northern Coal and Coke Company (1901), reorganizing Consolidation Coal Company (1902), organization of the Paintsville National Bank (1902) presently first National Bank of Paintsville, founding of Mayo College, Paintsville (presently Mayo State Vocational School), construction of the Mayo Mansion and Mayo Methodist Church (1904-1912), both of Paintsville.

In addition, Mayo was the primary force in bringing the B&O, C&O and L&N Railroads into East Kentucky. At one time, John C. Mayo controlled thru leases, deeds and options, over one-fourth of Eastern Kentucky's mineral wealth. Mayo also was responsible for implementing the Broad-form deed throughout Central Appalachia.

I would sincerely appreciate any information which you or your readers might have on the life of John C. Mayo. I assure you that proper acknowledgement and documentation will be given to anyone who can be of assistance in helping give this man credit long past due. Anyone having anything to tell about Mayo's story may write within the next few weeks to my address.

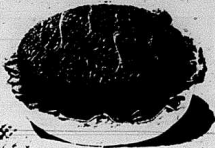
