This week, we received a letter from Joseph R. Beckman, Assistant Vice President, Corporate Communications, L&N Railroad, which reads in part as follows:  
"It is not up to a railroad to decide whether or not to install such devices. The state Department of Transportation, working with the railroad in question, makes a traffic study on a

project. Existing devices. The L&N has more than 2,000 crossings in Kentucky, about 550 of them having active warning devices, and in cooperation with the DOT, it has been installing active or electronic devices in the state on the average of about 40 or 50 a year. And at any given time, L&N will be working on about 200 such grade crossing projects around its 6,500-mile system. If

your local officials feel there is need for active devices at other crossings in your community, I suggest they contact the State DOT in Frankfort.  
The fact is that there is no warning device which can take the place of an alert, careful driver who is aware of the potential danger at a grade crossing. To make more drivers aware of this danger, state officials and railroads offer a program called "Operation Lifesaver." In cooperation with the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, L&N has more than 30 engineers and other interested persons giving this educational program, which has brought reductions in accidents, injuries and deaths at grade crossings. We'd be pleased to arrange such a program if any local service or other organization might be interested.  
These engineers are the ones who first have to see the dead and injured, and wrecked vehicles, and who face danger themselves when a driver thoughtlessly drives into the path of their trains. A train can't stop immediately, but a motor vehicle should be able to."

bration with the tragedy of accidental fire and injury. Damaged or worn light strings, a dry tree and overloaded circuits add up to serious fire risks for you and your loved ones.

**Trees**

A fresh tree will stay green longer and be less a fire risk than a dry one. To check for freshness when buying a natural tree, remember:  
- Examine for color and scent. A fresh tree is deep green in color and has a strong scent of pine.

- Be sure the needles do not readily fall from the tree.  
- The trunk but of a fresh tree should be sticky with sap. When setting up your tree, the following rules should be kept in mind:  
- Place your Christmas tree in a location away from fireplace, radiator or other heat sources.

- Be sure that it is out of your home traffic pattern and does not block a doorway.

- Cut off about 2 inches of the trunk. Mount the tree in a sturdy, water-holding stand with wide-spread legs. Be sure the tree is stable.

- Fill the base holder with water. Keep it full while the tree is indoors. Remember, heated rooms dry trees rapidly and a dry tree is a fire risk.

- If buying an artificial tree, choose one that has been tested for flammability.

**Lights**

Christmas tree lights and other decorations set the theme for the Christmas holidays. Here are some very important points to remember when using them.

- Use only lights that have been tested for safety. Identify these by the UL mark from Underwriters Laboratories.  
- Check each set of lights for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires and loose connections. Discard any of this equipment that is worn or broken.

- Check labels of lights to be used outdoors to see that they are suitable for outdoor use. Never use indoor lights outside.

- Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, walls or other firm support to protect them from wind damage.

- Overloading a circuit with too many lights could cause a fire. Read manufacturer's instructions carefully and do not use more than the recommended number of lights on one circuit.

- Always turn off tree lights and other decorations when you leave home and before going to bed. A short circuit in any of this equipment could cause a fire.

- Keep children away from light sets and electrical decorations.

**Fires**

Used correctly, your fireplace is a source of Christmas warmth and cozy atmosphere. Avoid fire risks by remembering the following rules:

- Before starting your fire, be sure to remove all paper decorations and boughs from the immediate area.

- Be sure the fire is open. Never set up your Christmas tree near the fireplace; this is a potential fire risk.

- Use a screen to enclose the front of your fireplace in order to confine live embers and sparks to the fire box.

- Use care with "fire salts"

which produce colored flames when thrown on a wood fire. They contain heavy metals and cause intense gastrointestinal irritation or vomiting if eaten. Keep away from children.

**Some General Rules for Christmas Safety**

- Keep matches, lighters and candles out of reach of children.

- Avoid smoking near flammable decorations.

- Make an emergency plan to use if a fire breaks out anywhere in your home. See that each family member and your babysitter know at least two escape routes.

- Avoid wearing loose flowing clothes - especially long, open sleeves - near the open flames of a fireplace, stove or candle-lit table.

- Never burn candles near evergreens on a mantelpiece or table.

- Burning evergreens in the fireplace can be dangerous. When dry, greens burn like tinder. Their flames can flare out of control, sending sparks flying about the room.

- Plan for safety. Remember there is no substitute for common sense. Look for and eliminate potential danger spots near candles, fireplaces, trees and electrical connections.

**Coconut Dessert**

And, last, one large cup cool whip, 1 cup powdered sugar. Beat this and spread on top of the pudding and sprinkle with Angel Flake coconut and keep in refrigerator.

## Coon Club Protests Eviction to City Council

Eleven members of the Rockcastle County Coon Club were at Monday night's meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council to discuss with the council their upcoming eviction from the building (old milk house) at Lake Linville which they have used for two years for club meetings.

Delmo Mick, president of the club and spokesman, said the council that club members felt the council should have given the club some prior notice of their intention to make a change so the club members might have come before the council earlier to try and work out some arrangement whereby they might continue using the building.

The council agreed at last month's meeting to allow the boat dock operator, Sterling Hoskins, to renovate the 14x60 building for the use of his father who has agreed to help with maintenance of the city park at the Lake.

Several of the council members stated that it was their understanding that the council would be constructing another building for the Coon Club to hold their meetings. This building will be located across from the playground. The Coon Club was given permission by the council to continue using the building they now occupy until Spring when construction can begin.

Mayor Roland... that money left over from the park grant would be used for construction costs.

In other business, the council approved, by a vote of 3-0, a resolution to accept Greenway Drive as the extension of the hill to the property line of Bill Bailey. Councilman Ernest Stanley originally made a motion to accept the street to the top of the hill for maintenance by Mayor Mullins refused to accept the motion saying there was some question as to the

legality of accepting a dead-end street for maintenance past a private property line. Mr. Bailey has written for an Attorney General's opinion on the question. Three councilmen, Stanley, Tom Welch and Conant Parrett abstained on the motion.

Dwight Griffin, CPA, was before the council to present them with the 1980 waterworks audit. The audit showed the city with a net profit of \$399,240 out of gross income of over \$234,000. This brought up a discussion as to what needed to be done as far as raising water rates to the water districts and it was decided that further action would be taken later when more data was available.

The council also decided to advertise for bids for purchase of another police cruiser.

Charlie B. Renner, who recently retired from the waterworks department, was recognized for his years of service. Mr. Renner, who is presently hospitalized, will be presented with a watch, suitably engraved.

The city was recently granted \$20,000 by the Cumberland Valley Area Development District to be used as matching funds for the required study of the planned renovation of the sewer plant.

## L&N Responds To Nov. 27th Wreck Story

On the November 27th issue of the Signal, we reported a story about a wreck at an L&N crossing where a Kentucky Powder Company truck was struck by a train. The accident occurred at the Mullins Station Road.

A spokesman for Kentucky Powder Co. told us that L&N had refused several times to install signals at the three crossings on the road which are so marked.

The defendant was remanded to jail without bond to await sentencing.

Chuck, a graduate of Asbury Theological Seminary, will be taking a position at the Theological School in Bogota. During the past year, he has been taking courses to familiarize him with the nation of Columbia and the people; their customs, beliefs, etc.

We hope that many of you will come and hear this couple tell about the experiences that have led them in their lives. The morning service begins at 11 a.m. Come and join in the worship and fellowship of Bethany United Methodist Church.

He said that in November, they usually catch someone, "give them a round" and by March they (the students) have gotten brave enough to try it again and he catches someone else.

When asked if the school was doing anything to combat drugs and related problems, Saylor said that he felt the more you stir it the worse it gets. He said that if those spreading the rumors would only come out to the school and observe for a few days, they would see that there is no drug problem. Saylor indicated that drug problems are made evident by violence and aggressive behavior.

When asked if he would be interested in a confidential survey, if one were available, of

students to find out the extent of the drug problem from students themselves, Mr. Saylor said, "No."

Buford Parkerson, principal at MVES said that he was not at liberty to discuss the reported expulsions of four elementary students in a recent incident involving drugs.

Parkerson said that local school board policy recommends automatic expulsion for students who create drug related problems at school.

He also admitted that drugs are becoming a problem in school locally and indicated that he is planning separate student and parent education programs possibly after the first of the year.

## Young Leslie County Girl Came to Teach at Langdon and Stayed

Twenty-five-year-old Miss Cynthia Brewer of Wooten in Leslie County (between Hyden and Hazard) came to Mt. Vernon in 1925 to teach Home Economics at Langdon Girls Boarding School on Williams Street. During the five years she spent at school, she managed a local young bank teener, Vera Cox.

Following their marriage, the Coxes spent four years in Santa Fe, New Mexico where they worked - she as a dietitian and he as a manual trainer in a Presbyterian boarding school for girls whose students included Americans, Indians and Spaniards.

In 1934, when they returned to Mt. Vernon, Langdon was in the process of closing its doors to merge with the new high school and so they bought, from the Presbyterian board, the model cottage next door to the school where Mrs. Cox still resides. The "cottage", built probably around the turn of the century, once had served as a parsonage for the Presbyterian church. When Miss Cynthia taught Home Economics there, the building was being used by the school as a training center for teaching girls practical lessons in home management.

Groups of six 8th grade girls spent six weeks each living in the cottage. Each week, they assumed the role of a different family member including mother, father and siblings. The girls shopped, planned meals and budgets, cooked and cleaned. The cottage, from time to time, served as a "clinic" for tonsil removals. The nursing staff at Langdon assisted Dr. Pennington from London in the surgery as well as supervising the convalescence. Mr. Vernon told me about his tonsillectomy which took place there and about the resulting hemorrhage which, luckily, the nurse was able to stop.

Later, during the depression, Mr. and Mrs. Cox worked as supervisors for the N.Y.A. which was a government supported program for youths. Mr. Cox built a little stucco building, on the backside of their property to use as a shop to teach the boys woodworking. It later was made into a dwelling. Among other things, the boys made chairs and tables for classrooms. It was during this time that the youths built the wall around the small city park. Mrs. Cox taught the girls to sew and the clothes were provided to those who needed them. Her classes were taught in the vacated Langdon classrooms.

After their N.Y.A. employment, Mr. and Mrs. Cox both worked for Ralph Griffin, while

he was in the furniture business. Mr. Cox also worked some for C.C. Cox Hardware and Mrs. Cox was employed, for several years, at the locker plant located where Nellie's Beauty Salon is now.

In the late 1930's, Mr. Cox made his wife a loan, patterned after the famous Mrs. E. C. Whitt Weavers. She taught herself how to use it, to be "booked" and "bluffing her way through," she says. At first, she wore rugs for herself and friends. Later, in 1962, when Mr. Lair opened a craft shop at Renfro, she sold him some of her weavings. Her business has steadily grown and includes placemats and table runners as well as rugs. Because of a recent severe fall and injury to her back, she has been unable to supply regular customers who like to buy her handmade items for gifts.

According to Mrs. Cox, her husband, nicknamed "Swiftie" as a young paper boy by Judge Brown who was always ready for his paper before it arrived, was a wire designer. He designed, and together they made, over 85% of their furniture, including chests, buffets, chairs, tables, beds and kitchen cabinets. They preferred to use either walnut or cherry wood. Their "acorn" bed was designed after Mr. Cox closely observed an acorn and reproduced it in wood. Their cabinets are designed with glass panels in the doors.

Despite the fact that Mr. Cox was afflicted with a crippling and very painful arthritis, he was self-sufficient until about four years before his death. Among his other numerous interests and hobbies were drawing, oil painting and gardening.

The skill and artistic ability of these two would have to impress even the hard-to-impress but also meaningful is the obvious delight in and appreciation of the natural beauty of the earth. Simple things most of us take for granted never go overlooked in the Cox home. Gaudy store-bought things do not decorate the house but rather, buckets of bitterness or dried flowers, handmade baskets and polished and hand-burred roots found in the back-yard; things that because they cannot be bought in a department store might have their artistic value overlooked.

Appropriately because Mr. Cox loved and appreciated good woods, Mrs. Cox chose a solid walnut casket for him when he died and placed upon it a flowery wreath. They had been blooming shortly before he died.

Also impressive to me in my late acquaintance with the couple and, I am sure, to other was the obvious constant mutual devotion and admiration they shared.

## Demonstration Employment Project

One hundred Kentucky mothers have new jobs at four Kentucky hospitals under a demonstration employment project.

Initiated by Gov. John Y. Brown, Jr., to provide salaried jobs for women who are currently unemployed and receiving aid to Families with Dependent Children benefits, the project opened 100 positions Oct. 1 at four health facilities operated by the Department for Human Resources.

"There are waiting lists at all four hospitals," reported Mary Eades, coordinator of the Kentucky Health Care Employment Project.

While 89 of the slots were filled by mid-November, Eades said 11 additional women had been hired and would begin working Dec. 7.

### USE ZIP CODES FOR BEST MAIL SERVICE

Postmaster James O. Smith reminds customers that, for the best service this Christmas season, they should use ZIP Codes, place their return address in the upper left corner of the envelope and use proper postage.

"By following these suggestions," Postmaster Smith said, "you will be assured good mail service this holiday season."

It is important, Smith said that families double-check envelopes to be certain that proper postage is affixed. Envelopes without postage will be returned to senders, if possible, or delayed by postage-due procedures.

"When the return address is placed on envelopes bearing holiday greetings, it also helps remind friends of one's current address," the postmaster said.

And, if the family to whom a holiday message is sent moved more than a year ago, it cannot be forwarded. With a return address, Postmaster Smith said, such letters are returned to the sender with a notation that the forwarding order has expired.

Lexington has hired 26 health aides and seven service workers, a total of 33 women, under the project. Hazelwood Hospital in Louisville has hired 10 nurse's aide trainees and four service workers.

The other two facilities, Western State Hospital in Hopkinsville and Central State Hospital in Louisville, will add 11 new workers to their project staffs Dec. 1. Currently, Western State has filled 29 of 33 jobs. Central State has hired 13 women and will fill the remaining seven slots next month.

The boys then hosted a fine Knox Central team Tuesday night and came away on the short end of the score - this time 68-82.

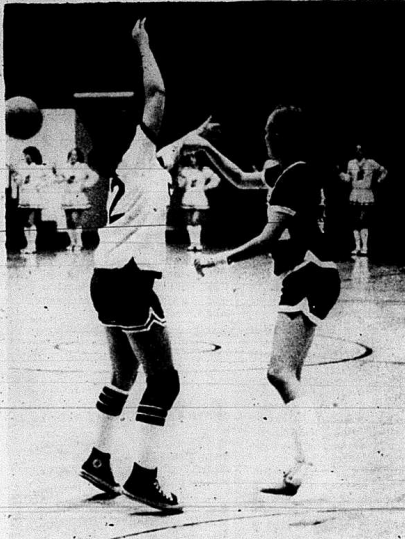
The Rockets played hard the entire game but were simply outmanned by the bigger and stronger Knox Central team.

### KENTUCKY AND KANSAS HAVE A CLOSE CONNECTION

LEXINGTON — The Kentucky Wildcats face another basketball toughie Saturday night when the Kansas Jayhawks invade Rupp Arena. It's surprising to me that it will be only the thirteenth meeting between these two traditional powers in view of their close connection.

The connection is Adolph Rupp, the man who built Kentucky's great basketball tradition. The late Wildcat coach played his college basketball at Kansas University and was a native of the Sunflower state. College basketball's record is still Rupp's 874 wins. The man he beat out was his old coach, Phog Allen. Allen is second in number of wins with 771.

I find it a little strange the two men didn't face each other but once in view of the long tenure both had as head coach at their schools. The only time Rupp and Allen faced each other in the arena was in 1950. Allen brought his Jayhawks to Memorial Coliseum. It set up a confrontation between the two best centers in college basketball, Kentucky's Bill Spivey and Kansas' Clyde Lovellette. I was a spectator high up in the stands that night and Spivey absolutely ate Lovellette alive. When Lovellette fouled out, Coach Rupp took Spivey out of the game and the place went wild. Kentucky won 68 to 39.

Coach Rupp's first visit to his alma mater, some thirty years later. Phog Allen had retired. Kentucky didn't have one of its better teams. I was broadcasting the games by then and I don't think I ever saw Coach Rupp as nervous before a game as he was that day. His team had lost two straight going into the Kansas game but it laid it on the line that night and won 77 to 72 in an overtime.

Kentucky and Kansas play more frequently now. Most of the games have been close with the Wildcats dominating the series. But the game I will never forget was in 1977. Joe B-Hall was in his fifth season as head coach. Rupp had retired and was ill. We got back to the hotel after Kentucky's 73 to 66 win in Lawrence, Kansas when we got the word. Coach Rupp was dead.

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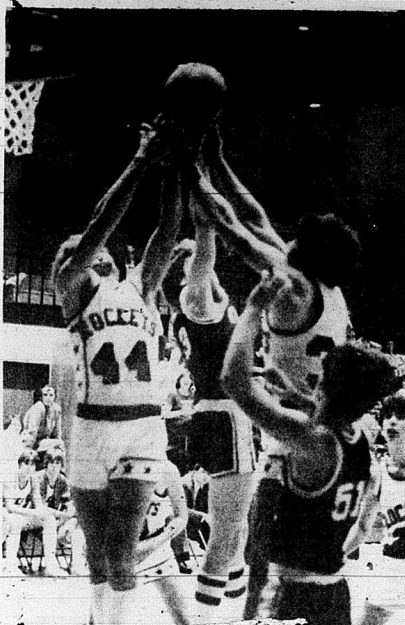

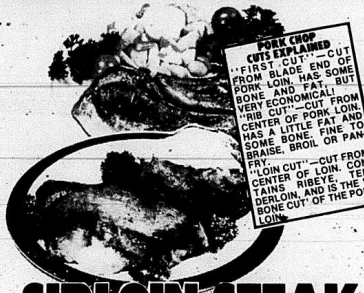

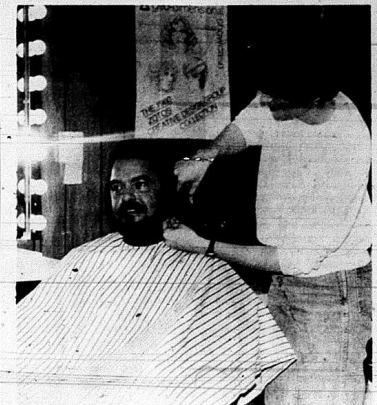
