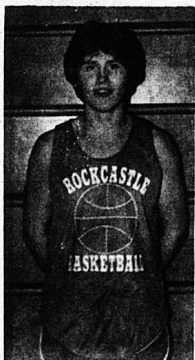

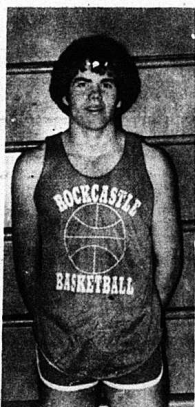


Kelli Thomason, No. 20, puts up a shot in Monday night's action against Oneida. Thomason had 6 points on the night.

LEXINGTON — The Southeastern Conference basketball coaches had an unusual meeting. They were in unanimous agreement on something. The coaches wanted the league to drop its post season tournament. Fat chance.

Coaches can only recommend. The fan presidents and athletic directors make the ultimate decisions. The athletic directors took the coaches unanimous recommendation under consideration and voted it down 9 to 1. The lone vote for dropping the tournament was cast by Kentucky's Cliff Hagan. "I thought our group would vote to keep the tournament," Hagan told me. "I was a little surprised that I was the only one against it," he chuckled.

Okay. The tournament will continue at least for a while. "Probably for several years anyway," Hagan said. "I think we're stuck with it for quite a while. I don't think it will be an annual issue. I don't expect it to even come up for a vote again for some time."

The S.E.C. post season tournament was resumed in 1979 after an absence of 27 years. Both tournaments since have been played in Birmingham and the one in 1981 is also scheduled in that Alabama city. The tournament, if it can't be dropped, could be moved. It has met with only modest success in Birmingham. Cliff Hagan thinks that's unfortunatley too.

"Our conference office is located in Birmingham and there's a lot of politics to keep the tournament there. I have a feeling," says Cliff, "the tournament will stay in Birmingham."

That's a shame. If the S.E.C. is going to continue the tournament and apparently it is, the member schools could realize far more revenue by moving it around. Lexington's Rupp Arena is the largest basketball house in the country and would be sold out months in advance. ## Burley Prices Up ; Supply Short in Rockcastle

Burley prices this year are more in line with the cost of production than they have been in a long time; however, the tobacco crop this year is off at least 30% in Rockcastle County and is very short statewide as well. Farmers suffered loss in the 1979 crop due to the blue mold and in 1980 due to the extremely dry weather. Inflation is expected to cause the 1980 crop to cost about 10% more to produce. Burley growers have been given an extension for making up poundage lost in the past two growing years and, according to informed sources, growers can expect to receive a 5% increase in the amount they can grow in 1981.

Some farmers have voiced concern that, with the increased quotas, the price will be depressed. This is not expected to be the case since the Dept. of Agriculture studies carefully the law of supply and demand and is increasing the quota only enough to meet the demand.

Three things are causing the increased demand. The Federal Commodity Credit Corporation, which buys and keeps in reserve enough to supply buyers throughout the year, sold out in September. This is the first time that the reserve has been depleted. When the shortage again, none is expected to be kept in reserve this year.

The other factor is the rapidly expanding Japanese market. Japan has cut the import tax on U.S. tobacco. The government there has also raised the margin of profit from 7% to 10% which also gives more incen-

tive. The number of Japanese distributors is expected to double.

Burley tobacco furnishes the flavor and aroma for cigarettes which fine cured tobacco does not have. When production of cigarettes with filters increased, the amount of Burley had to be increased to provide the same taste.

The demand indicators should ease farmers' minds about next year's crop prices. One problem farmers should be considering however is barn space. Most burley growers have just enough room to house the tobacco allotted yearly. Next year's 5% increase, plus trying to grow enough to make up for the last two years, may make a critical storage problem for some.

### TOBACCO STOLEN

The tobacco market has opened, farmers are coming up short on poundage and, consequently, some growers are having their year's work stolen from their barns.

At least four farmers have lost tobacco to such thefts. On one had 17 bales stolen and another lost about \$900 worth of tobacco which was hanging in the barn 'not yet bulked or stripped.

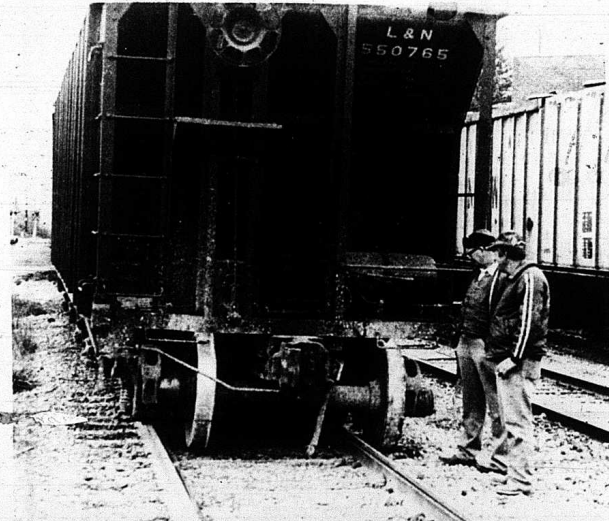

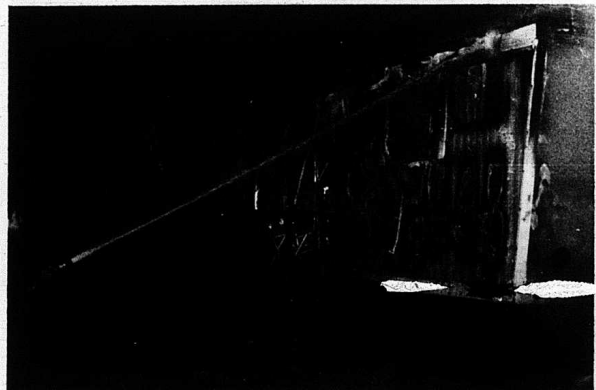
William and Mae McFerron are shown displaying some of their last of their crop of Burley. The November and December tasks of raising tobacco include grading, stripping and tying into hands

## ZEBRA Method is Ideal Way To Renovate Pasture Land

With the dry weather we've had this summer and fall, most pastures in the county are eaten pretty close. For these type pastures, this would be an excellent opportunity to renovate using the ZEBRA method. The next question is what is the zebra method.

In fescue pastures, such as those found in Rockcastle County, it is desirable to establish about 50% clover. The fescue and clovers grow at different times, providing a longer, steadier and more even grazing season. Clover supplements the fescue by providing increased protein and minerals and by fixing nitrogen in the soil. To establish a 50% grass (fescue, hard grass, etc.) - 50% legume (red clover, ladino, etc.) mixture paraquat is sprayed in bands

4-10 inches wide to kill or suppress the grass sod, hence the name "ZEBRA."

Then the clover is either broadcast in February or early March or drilled into the sprayed bands. If the seed is broadcast, the fescue sod needs to be grazed close to the ground or clipped very close to allow for good seed-soil contact. Good results have been obtained using this method. Some of the advantages of renovating fescue fields with clovers are increased beef cattle gains, increased milk production from dairy cow, higher conception rates and calf crops and increased daily gains and weaning weights. Some added advantages of the "ZEBRA" technique over conventional renovation methods include, being able to get the job done early in the season when it is often too wet

for tillage operations; hilly pastures can be renovated without

increasing soil erosion; fields stay smooth for mowers and other equipment; rocks aren't brought to the surface; half the grass is totally undisturbed making possible better yields than if disked and, since the remaining fescue is confined to rows, the clover lasts longer before it is crowded out.

Finally, don't neglect soil testing. Know what is in the soil and how much fertilizer and lime to add. For more detail on how to handle a specific situation, contact Greg Stephens through the Rockcastle Conservation District or the Soil Conservation Service for on-the-farm assistance 256-2541.



# Together After 72 Years of Marriage

50th wedding anniversaries are special events which often get special recognition on the society pages but, Morgan and Ada Abney of Disputanta, have been married 72 years. Mrs. Abney recalls that when they got married on Thanksgiving Day, November 26, 1908, she was 19 and he was 18. Their long married life has produced 13 children. When I asked their names, Mrs. Abney didn't say she couldn't remember their names, nor did she try to name them all, she just handed me the Family Bible and let me read for myself the following names: William Stanley, Evelyn Bernese, Thelma Sue, Eula Ijane, Ella, Robert, Myrtle, Everett Preston, Flossie Ann, Elijah-Edward, Cecil Burgess, Annie Mure and Hobert. They lost none as children, but two died in adulthood - Hobert and Annie Mure.

The Abneys, who have always lived in Rockcastle County, have observed much change during their lifetime together but one thing that Mrs. Abney still believes strongly in is

birthing babies at home. She said that she had all her children at home and nursed them all. She believes children are healthier that way. Both Mr. and Mrs. Abney say their children were seldom sick. Mr. Abney said they went through an "awful lot of hard times raising the big family. The Old Master was with me. (There were some) miracles worked."

Mr. Abney supported his family by farming, working in a sawmill and anything he could do to "make a dime." Mrs. Abney worked as hard making clothes, raising, storing and cooking - food and washing clothes for 15 people.

Mrs. Abney said that they had a good life together, but nothing toward her husband and said, "He turned out pretty wild for a while, but he soon got over it." Mr. Abney doesn't hear well and so the remark went unchallenged.

In 1960, a calf ran over Mrs. Abney and broke both arms, both legs, her hip and her pelvis. She also has had a stroke. Until the misfortune, she had never been in a hospital. She is now able to get around

but not very easily. She said she falls a lot. This summer, she fell and broke her nose and hurt her face.

Mr. Abney fixes his breakfast and Mrs. Abney gets hers. The other two meals are usually provided with help from a 69-year-old son who lives in a two-room apartment in their home. The other 10 children come in and help them out and Mr. Abney says they have good neighbors and friends who look after them also.

## Get An Early Start on Holiday Cooking

The holiday season creates an energy shortage of its own too much to do in too little time. We want to finish the shopping, get those Christmas cards-out, make dozens of different kinds

of cooking and handmade gifts and decorate the house to look like the centerfold of a housing magazine.

You can add fuel to your personal energy crisis, however, by planning, cooking and freezing some dishes now before activities get too hectic and this doesn't mean a lot of extra work now.

For example, double a favorite casserole recipe. Eat one dish now and freeze the other. Meatloaf ingredients, prepared in quantity, can double as the traditional meatloaf and meatballs.

Just broil the meatballs

until done, drain the grease and refrigerate until cold. Then line a cookie sheet with the cooked meatballs and freeze individually. They'll be ready to package, freeze and use as you need them for hurry-up meals.

While your meatloaf is in the oven, put in a few scrubbed potatoes, follow these directions:

- 8 med. baking potatoes
- 1/4 to 1/2 cup heated milk
- 4 tsp. butter or margarine
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 egg
- 2 green onions, finely sliced
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper

Scrub potatoes, then dry, pierce skins with a fork. Bake at 400 degrees F for about 1 hour or until soft. Cut slices from long side of each potato. Scoop out, leaving a 1/4 inch thick shell. Using a mixing bowl, mash potatoes, beating in enough hot milk to make potatoes smooth and fluffy. Add butter, stir in cheese, egg, onions, salt and pepper. Spoon back into shells, mounding slightly. These are ready to serve.

To serve later in the day, cover potatoes and refrigerate until 30 minutes before serving time. Uncover and heat at 350 degrees F for 30 minutes.

To freeze, set potatoes on baking sheets; place in the freezer for several hours or until firm. Remove, wrap and bake each potato at 350 degrees F for about 1 1/2 hours.

When freezing for cooking in microwave, wrap each potato in plastic wrap before wrapping in aluminum foil. When you are ready to bake potatoes in microwave, remove foil and bake in clear wrap. Makes 8 servings - about 175 calories each.

Homemade soup is another cost-cutter that is convenient to store in the freezer. Save bones from roast beef, chicken or ham meals. A little meat goes a long way when you add vegetables, beans, barley, rice or noodles.

Soups and stews are a great way to use leftover vegetables, broth and liquids from cooked vegetables. Save these in small plastic containers in the freezer until you have enough to build your own soup pot.

If your traditional dinner calls for ham or turkey, plan for companion foods to accompany these meats after the big feast. Turkey and ham make delicious sandwiches, but they also combine well with broccoli, green beans, corn, asparagus and other vegetables.

Quick and nutritious casseroles can also be put together with meat, vegetables, soup, cheese and such toppings as dry, crushed cereal or bread crumbs. With some of these extras already on your shelf, meals will appear quickly and you'll conserve your own energy at the same time.

As you plan for Christmas baking, watch for specials on such staples as sugar and flour. Buy enough to get you through holiday baking.

When baking for the freezer, consider that most cakes freeze well; but bake first, then freeze. The same goes for cookies. Some pies need to be frozen and then baked - for example, fruit, pumpkin, mincemeat and sweet potato.

It's generally better to bake chiffon and pecan pies first. Don't freeze cream and custard pies unless gelatin and cornstarch are used. Steam puddings and baked fruits can also be frozen.

If you're planning to freeze a cake, don't use cream fillings, seven minute or boiled icings. They don't have good quality when thawed. Instead, use cooked candy-type or buttercream frostings.

To freeze cakes, cover a piece of clean, heavy cardboard, about 2 inches larger than the cake, with heavy duty aluminum foil. Put the cake on this to freeze.

When freezing desserts, it's generally best to freeze unwrapped for several hours or until the top and sides are firm. You can use metal cake and cookie boxes for freezer containers if the lids fit tightly.

Plastic freezer bags are also good. Putting the bags into cardboard boxes will further protect the dessert. Use your frozen desserts within two to three months. It's best to thaw them uncovered in the refrigerator before using.

By following these make-ahead tips you will be able to take the time to enjoy the festivities without a lot of last-minute scurrying around.

### Is Conscience a Safe Guide?

Many people say, "It does not matter what one believes or does in religion, just so he follows his conscience." This is not true in secular matters. In traveling on the highways, we do not follow conscience about the road to take - we use the road map. In matters of health, we do not follow conscience - we want a doctor. We may take poison in all good conscience and die because our conscience was wrong.

Honesty, sincerity and a good conscience do not change the physical laws of nature. Nature's laws were framed by the same God who gave us the laws of religion and worship. Why then should we think conscience could change any of God's laws.

Conscience is not safe in the business world. Sincerity does not keep banks from failing, businesses from going broke, or companies from losing money. It is not enough in marriage. Many marriages fail, not because of insincerity, but because of other factors.

If conscience is not safe in these matters, why should we think it safe in religion? Conscience is not our guide; it serves as a court. It is the exercise of one's judgment of

knowledge previously acquired.

Conscience may accuse or excuse (Rom. 2:12-15) or bear witness (Rom. 9:1). Conscience warns us only when we are going contrary to what we have been taught.

When one is doing what he has been taught to be right, his conscience is clear and is spoken of in the Bible as good (Acts 23:1), pure (2 Tim. 1:3), and void of offence (Act 24:16). If one violates what he has been taught, his conscience is said to be defiled (Titus 1:15) or seared (1 Tim. 4:2).
