Green Thumb Program in Rockcastle

When Virgie Sowder was assigned to Mt. Vernon's Office of City Clerk as a Green Thumb worker she felt right at home. Just across the hall she had spent more than six years serving the public as police judge.

Virgie's life as police judge began after the death of her husband, Walter W. Sowder, when she was appointed to complete his term of office. After those two years Virgie campaigned for the position and served four years as a duly elected official in her own right.

"My husband had never been defeated in his 31 years of politics and I would have felt bad if I hadn't won that election," Virgie says.

As a Green Thumb worker Mrs. Sowder helps City Clerk Mary McClure by preparing the "water" cards ready for mailing, filing, answering the phone, running errands to the post office, the bank, and the courthouse among other duties. She's been at the job almost three years and in that time has become a valuable assistant to Clerk McClure who insists, "I just couldn't get along without her."

Working only three days a week (Green Thumb is a part-time employer) allows Virgie to make quilts while she is home and during the summer she raises a garden and mows her own yard.

The Green Thumb Program has been active in Rockcastle County for three years. Nationally the program began in 1953 to provide employment for qualified rural elderly men over the age of 55. It began as a project for roadside beautification, hence the name Green Thumb. In the 15 years Green Thumb has continued to grow and has spread into all fields of employment and now includes both men and women. The program operates under a grant from the U.S. Department of Labor and is sponsored by the National Farmer Union. Virgie Sowder is one of the eight Green Thumb workers employed in Rockcastle County.

At the A. S. C. S. Office, first floor of the courthouse, Grace Sunderhaus also works as an office assistant. She says it's a busy day when she addresses and stuffs 1700 envelopes for the A. S. C. S. Office to distribute to Rockcastle farmers. And

that's only one of her many duties. She also answers the phone, files, runs errands, etc. When Grace began with the Green Thumb program she was assigned to the library but finds that in her present position she enjoys being able to communicate with people. And with those 1700 patrons listed in the office files it's easy to meet new people.

Upstairs in the Ambulance Service office Green Thumb Shelby Decker spends Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays as assistant to Willametta Cromer. Her position requires that she help with the paper work necessary for keeping Rockcastle's Ambulance Service records in good order. And, of course, there's duties similar to the other Green Thumb office assistants.

Shelby's seven children have made her grandmother of 18. She still likes to sew, make quilts, and raise a garden. But during the hectic summer season canning the vegetables that grow in the garden is done late in the evening or at night.

Since they began working for Green Thumb in July, 1977, Ames Bowman and Ben Cox have always worked together. Now as part of a weatherization crew the two find needy elderly through the Community Action Office with other workers, some trainees of the CETA program.

Under the weatherization program homes of low-income elderly are made warmer for winter by caulking windows, replacing broken windows, adding weather stripping or insulation, underpinning a house, or painting a roof. Home owners furnish the materials with weatherization crews doing the work. Weatherizing these homes conserves energy for more critical purposes.

At the county garage John McGuire answers the phone, does general maintenance with his sponsor listed as the fiscal court. Herbert Evans can be found performing janitorial duties at the courthouse with the latest addition to the ranks of the Green Thumb program. Arthur Bullock also helping as courthouse custodian.

Across the nation 16,000 Green Thumb employees have added new dimensions to their lives by increasing their income and by having a sense of well-being by service to others.

Icy Roads Cause Christmas Eve Accidents

Icy roads apparently caused two accidents locally on Christmas Eve.

Taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital December 24th after a one-car accident were Paul Hamm, 46, Martha Hamm, 46 and Kandi Hamm, 9, all of Route 1, Brodhead. The Hamm's were later transferred to the Pattie A. Clay Hospital in Richmond.

The accident occurred when, according to State Trooper Jack Lawless, the Hamm car, which was traveling east on Hwy. 150 about 4 miles west of Mt. Vernon, apparently hit an icy spot in the road, left the highway and struck a tree. The occupants were listed as having Class 2 injuries.

Sara Jean Stewart, 26, of Atlanta, Georgia received minor injuries and was taken to Berea Hospital when the car in which she was riding struck an icy patch and overturned several times in the road before coming to rest on an embankment.

The accident occurred December 24th about 12 miles north of Mt. Vernon on Interstate 75.

Two other occupants in the car were not injured.

Local Fires

One room of a house occupied by the Greel Cotton family was damaged in a Friday night fire. The fire, which by all indications, started around a bad fire, had been extinguished by the time the local fire department arrived. The house, which is located in the vicinity of the Gregory Motel, reportedly also belong to the Gregorays.

About 3:30 a.m. Christmas morning Mt. Vernon Fire Department in controlling a fire at the home of Mike Mink at Calloway. The Mink's lost two rooms, the kitchen and living room. Firemen were unsure as to how the fire began - whether from a chimney or electrical wiring.

The local fire department also responded to a potentially dangerous situation Sunday noon at Dr. George H. Griffith's residence on Williams Street.

According to fireman Gary Hansel, crescent from the use of the fireplace, had apparently built up in the chimney and caught fire inside the chimney.

The fire was brought under control with a fire extinguisher and no damage resulted to the home.

Coal Truckers' Strike Closes Two County Tipples: Haulers Want More

The coal haulers strike, which began several weeks ago and affects approximately 12 counties in Southeastern Kentucky, has shut down two coal tipples in Rockcastle County.

A spokesman for RODA Enterprises, Inc. owned by R.B.S. Inc. of Cincinnati, Ohio and located at Snider, said they had been closed because of the strike for two weeks and they had no indication of when they will be shipping.

Warren-Jasper Coal Co. of Burr has been closed since December 18. The company, according to their spokesman, gets its coal supply mostly from Jackson, Clay and Laurel Counties. He further stated that they

had had pickets but no violence as they had not forced the issue.

Upon questioning of the independent truckers who were picketing at Warren-Jasper, spokesman James Baldwin stated the main reason for the strike is the fact that truckers get about \$4.90 a ton less than rail freight charges and they are demanding to be paid the "I.C.C. rate of 6.5c to 7.5c per ton mile." Truckers presently receive between 3.5c and 4c a ton mile. Baldwin said that truckers haul about 95% of the coal from Rockcastle County to Ohio. When they cross the state line, they are often fined between \$105 and \$5,000 for hauling a product illegally across a state line. The truckers do not have I.C.C. licensing required. Baldwin said that truckers do not want to pull overloaded trucks and would appreciate it if the DOT would enforce present weight limits on all trucks.

Sentencings

A charge of third degree burglary was amended to first degree criminal trespassing for William White and Harold Lewis Northern in Circuit Court recently.

The charges resulted from a burglary last April of the Ed Mullins home on Scaffold Cane. White received an eight month sentence and Northern 12 months in the county jail.

A charge of murder, filed against Lester Frankie Griffin in the death of J.L. Browning last January, was amended to second degree manslaughter and Griffin was sentenced to nine years in the penitentiary on December 18 by Judge Philip K. Wicker.

The sentencing was made without a recommendation for probation or conditional discharge.

Also during this term of Circuit Court, Floyd Fletcher was found guilty of a charge of theft by unlawful taking, stemming from an incident at Lake Linville in July when Fletcher was charged with taking a boat belonging to Floyd Whitehouse of Ripley, W. Va.

He was sentenced to six months and sentence was probed for two years.

Earl M. Crowe, charged with second degree robbery in the February 2nd robbery of the Burr Hill Shell Station, was sentenced to twelve months in the county jail with the sentence probed for two years.

For James Dooley, the charge of second degree assault on Roger Schaffer and stemming from an incident last December was amended to third degree assault. He was ordered by the court to pay \$100 and costs.

Jerry Rowe was found guilty of first degree criminal trespassing - a charge amended from burglary - and was sentenced to twelve months in the county jail as a result of a March 20th charge of unlawful entry into the dwelling of James E. Taylor and of knowingly receiving stolen property of \$100 or more.

In the past year, ever since the Rockcastle React started the "Jaws of Life fund," I've had a lot of people to ask me, "what is React?" I want to try and explain the purpose of React. We are a group of civilian volunteers for radio emergency service to the public. React is a nationwide organization of nearly 1,200 volunteer groups totaling nearly 40,000 volunteers who utilize equipment in the Citizens Radio Service to monitor Emergency Channel 9 and provide local two-way radio communication in response to emergencies. React teams are prepared to provide supplemental communications in any emergency. Effective local two-way radio communications have proved valuable whenever normal telephone communications are interrupted because of fire, blizzard, earthquake, flood, hurricane, tornado or other disasters. Through a cooperative understanding between the American National Red Cross and React, local teams are encouraged to participate in their community's pre-

disaster planning. We report accidents - summon medical aid - keep traffic moving - report road conditions and give road directions.

Our objective is to eventually provide sufficient coverage so that you can call a React monitor at any time, anywhere and get assistance on Channel 9. If you are interested in joining this movement, contact your local React team - 758-8418 or 758-8526.

The mental picture most small town people conjured up stimulated both fear and relief - fear that such a dangerous substance had penetrated American society and relief that the big cities, with their drug and crime problems, were far away.

Many of us tend to think that drugs and drug abuse are new. While they may be relatively new here, in the 1800's, English novelist, George Eliot, wrote *Silas Marner*, a short novel which included a laudanum (10% opium in alcohol and water) addic-

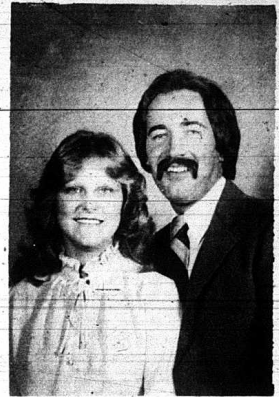

personal and real property taxes are put on separate bills, real property owners are tempted to ignore their personal property bill.

Testimony before the subcommittee has revealed that part of the problem with real property tax-collection in some counties is that the assessment records are outdated. Therefore, sheriffs are charged with collecting taxes on property that

does not exist, or are not charged to collect taxes on property which does exist.

The Kentucky Revised Statutes provide for the Department of Revenue to make maps of counties for tax purposes and this is to be completed by July 1984. However, Revenue personnel claim that not all the county mapping will be complete by 1984 because of insufficient staff and funding.

The subcommittee has directed their staff to draft legislation to make the collection of county taxes more efficient.

The subcommittee has recommended that real property and personal property taxes be placed on the same bill. This would make the tax bills both easier for the sheriff to collect

and the citizen to pay. The subcommittee has recommended that county sheriffs be given a greater incentive to collect taxes.

A bill is being drafted to give sheriffs an expense allowance for collecting taxes. Under this plan a sheriff would receive an expense allowance of \$1,200 if he collected 95 percent of a county's taxes and on up to \$6,000 for collecting 99 percent. Sheriffs collecting less than 95 percent of a county's taxes would not receive any expense allowance.

Also, the subcommittee is studying the possibility of requesting additional appropriations for the Department of Revenue so that county mapping projects can be completed by July 1, 1984.

The County Finance subcommittee will review these bill drafts and perhaps add some modifications. After this process is completed the legislation will be considered by the interim joint committee for Counties and Special Districts. If the full interim committee approves the bills, they will then be pre-filed for the 1982 legislative session.

armed with credit cards, gift certificates or cash left over from the holidays. And, whether after Christmas shopping is wise or wasteful will depend on how consumers react to these kinds of enticing come-ons.

Shoppers should recognize the reason for after Christmas sales: to dispose of old stock before the next inventory is taken. Secondly, it is wise to remember that the store's reduction in prices usually reflects how successful its holiday season has been. If most of the stock was sold before Christmas, then January sales will be quite limited. If holidays sales were slow, then the store will probably be offering some real bargains.

Clothing and seasonal items, such as Christmas decorations, usually carry the greatest price reductions. Some stores, however, supplement their merchandise with other stock brought in especially for the sale. This supplemental stock usually does not offer as much of a savings. Occasionally "close-out" sales will be offered. This means that for some reason the merchandise will not continue to be sold. Items could have been overpriced, poorly designed or not used by most store customers.

If the close-out is due to a change in design, for example, it

may offer a good buy. But, beware of poor quality.

Other guidelines to getting real bargains at after Christmas sales:

*Inspect all merchandise carefully before you buy. The item may be a highly desirable Christmas gift that was returned or faulty merchandise that would not sell at a regular price.

*Be sure all labels, care instructions and other pertinent information are included with the sale item.

*Consider your needs and intended use. Just because an item is substantially reduced does not mean it is a good buy. Many sale items end up accumulating in the closet.

*Remember that most sale items cannot be returned.

*Compare prices at competing stores. An item reduced 15 percent in one place, for example, may sell regularly for less at a rival store.

*If you have room to store them until next year, Christmas cards and decorations are usually reduced after the holidays.

*There is considerable risk in buying sale clothing "for your child to grow into," or for your use "when you lose weight." Children do not grow at a uniform rate and you may not lose the weight you plan to.

*Watch "sale fever" - it is

contagious. Often shoppers will buy just because everyone else is.

*If using credit, carry a running total of your bill to discourage overspending.

Contact Your County Extension Office for Energy Conservation Information

If you have questions about energy conservation or want additional information concerning specific energy saving practices, your county extension office is the place to contact.

Each county extension office has bulletins and publications of file pertaining to such things as insulation, storm doors and windows, heating and cooling, plus a variety of other materials on subjects including appliances, home safety and other linked to energy and energy conservation.

If the agents in the office are unable to immediately answer your questions, they can contact specialists at the UK College of Agriculture to obtain the information.

Your county extension agents have a great variety of information available, not only concerning energy and energy conservation, but on many other subjects as well. You are invited to use the county agents' services whenever information about energy, agriculture, the home and family, or community development is desired.

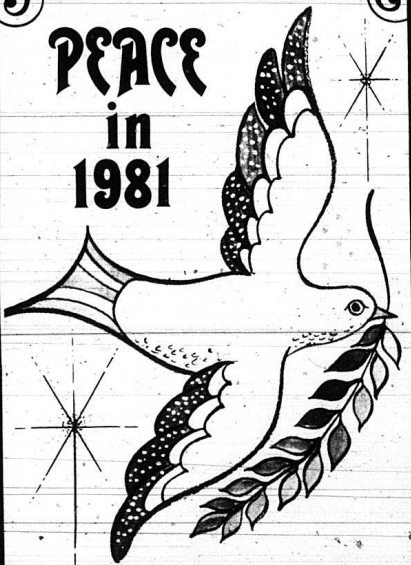

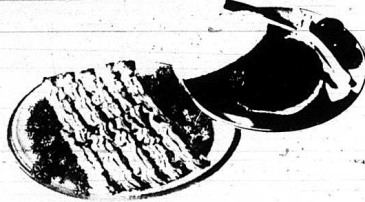

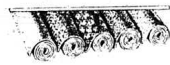

Cawood Comments

THE WILDCATS' NEW YEAR'S SLUMP

LEXINGTON — It was December 30, 1976. It was well past 10 p.m. and time was critical as we left Louisville's Freedom Hall for the rush to Lexington to catch a plane. A police escort got us through the heavy traffic and we were on our way, rolling east on I-64.

Ralph Hacker and I were on our way to Atlanta for the Peach Bowl game the next afternoon. We had just watched Kentucky annihilate Notre Dame 102-78 in their annual basketball game. Only Joe Hall's liberal use of reserves kept the margin from being worse. Much worse Kentucky had massacred a very good Notre Dame team. The performances of Roney, Phillips, Givens, John, son, Claytor and Shuler had been so awesome I turned to Hacker and said, "Ralph, this might be the most powerful Kentucky team there has ever been."

I soon would have to eat my words. Form failed to hold up as Kentucky turned to the Southeastern Conference. The Cats had to go to an overtime to beat a weak Georgia team by two points in Jopp Arena. It was also a two-point win at Vanderbilt. Then, back in Rupp Arena, Tennessee put it to Kentucky.

I bring all of this up because it seems to happen every year. After the Notre Dame game Kentucky seems to go into its swan song. Some say it's because the Wildcats reach such an emotional high they have a psychological crash after the game. If that theory is correct, Joe Hall has done something about it. He scheduled Maine between the Notre Dame game and the start of the conference race this year.

I'm inclined to go along with a second theory, that boredom sets in with the players. For approximately three weeks they are the only students on campus. While their colleagues are home for vacation, the players are all alone at U.K. with no classes, no dates, nothing much to break the routine except practice. Coach Hall has tried, without much success, to remedy that. He has organized volleyball tournaments, bowling tournaments, all sorts of things. Still, the Wildcats go into their New Year's slump.

It will be interesting to see what happens when they face a very good Georgia team Saturday afternoon in Rupp Arena.

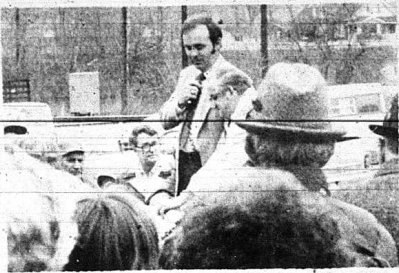
