The conductor and the engineer of the train reported that the driver approached the crossing and looked but then pulled into the path of the oncoming train.

Mrs. Cromer suffered cuts, bruises, a broken wrist and back injuries. She was transferred to the Patti A. Clay Hospital in Richmond.

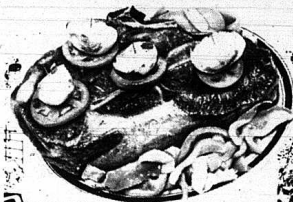

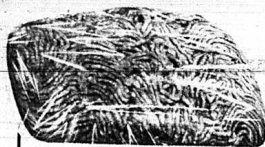

2 eggs
¼ cup lukewarm water
6 cups flour

Scaid milk, add sugar, salt and fat. Allow to cool until lukewarm. Beat eggs and add to mixture. Add yeast dissolved in lukewarm water, and enough flour to make a soft dough. Place in a well-greased bowl in refrigerator until ready to use. Shape rolls, place in a greased pan, set in warm place and allow to rise until light. Bake at 375-400 degrees for 15-20 minutes. Variations: Cinnamon Rolls or Crescent Rolls.

Cinnamon Rolls

Roll dough in oblong shape to about ¼" thickness. Spread with melted butter and a mixture of ¼ cup sugar and 1 teaspoon cinnamon. Roll up tightly into a long roll (like a jelly roll). Cut with a string into 1" pieces. Place rolls cut side down on a greased baking pan, leaving about 1 inch space between rolls, or place in muffin tins. Fat may be added to the cinnamon or substituted for it. Bake as directed above.

Crescent Rolls

Roll dough ¼ to ½ inch thick and 4" squares. Cut each one diagonally, making two triangles. Brush each triangle with melted butter. Starting at the long side, roll up each triangle, keeping the point in the middle. Place on a greased baking sheet, bringing the ends toward each other to form a half-circle or crescent. Allow to rise until doubled in bulk. Bake as directed above.

Add Warmth On A Cold Winter Day—Bake Some Bread

Breads supplement important nutrients needed daily for health. Homemade breads are a real treat, and they make any meal more appealing. Bread-making may be new to you, but with practice you can develop the skill.

Bread is an essential part of the daily diet. Choose four or more servings daily of foods from the bread and cereal food group.

Enriched yeast breads supply the diet with important nutrients (iron, thiamin, riboflavin, niacin, energy and some protein).

Look for other bread recipes (such as whole-wheat breads) for added fiber and variety in your diet.

Preparation and Storage Tips

1. Compressed (cake) yeast must be refrigerated and used within 2 weeks after purchase.
2. Active dry yeast has a "before date" stamped on the package. Check this date before purchasing or using.
3. Allow bread to cool uncovered on a wire rack after removal from the pan. Serve hot, if desired.
4. Yeast rolls are most flavorful when served hot.
5. To store yeast breads and rolls at home, place in a tightly-covered box or in a plastic bag. Refrigerate if not used in a few days to retard mold.
6. Make a batch of bread and freeze some for later use.

Ways to Use Leftover Bread

- Croutons: butter slices of day-old bread, cut them into cubes and brown in a 375 degree oven. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese, paprika or herbs. Use in soups or salads.
- Breadsticks: Tear crusts from bread slices and cut into one-inch wide strips. Brush on all sides with melted butter. Sprinkle with grated cheese, crumbled bacon or sesame seed. Bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees or brown under broiler. Serve with soup or salad.
- Soft bread crumbs: Cube fresh or slightly-stale, thinly-sliced bread. Store in a plastic freezer bag. Keep two months in freezer or 1 week in refrigerator. Use in meat loaf, salmon loaf, dressings, stuffing or casserole toppings.
- Dry Bread Crumbs: Grind dry or frozen bread through food chopper, using fine blade, or roll on wax paper with rolling pin. Store in tightly-covered container. Use in breadings, chops, croquettes, etc.
- Foundation Refrigerator Rolls
1 cup milk
1 cup water
¼ cup fat
¼ cup sugar
2 teaspoons salt
1 yeast cake or pkg. active dry yeast

1980 REPORTED SAFE YEAR ON KENTUCKY HIGHWAYS

State Police have reported that 1980 was the safest year on Kentucky highways since 1974.

According to figures released by Acting State Police Commissioner A.D. Fortner's office, 816 persons died in traffic accidents during the past year. It was the fewest number of deaths reported since 1974 when the annual, statewide fat-

ality toll dropped to a 12-year, record low of 795.

State Police said that the 1980 fatality figure was considered "especially significant, in light of the fact that it represents the biggest decline recorded in what, since 1974, has been a general, overall trend toward more fatalities." In 1976, the fatality toll was 892; in 1976, 874; in 1977, 958; in 1978,

893; and in 1979, 905. Although it will be approximately 90 days before state police complete their final tabulation of the state's highway safety record for 1980, they expect that, besides the dramatic turnaround in the number of traffic deaths, the death rate computed on the basis of total miles travelled also may turn out to be "the best ever."

Legislative Subcommittee Approves Revenue Bill

County governments could increase their revenue substantially if a bill approved by a legislative subcommittee becomes law.

The bill would allow sheriffs, county clerks and jailers to invest idle funds in "safe" investments such as government bonds or certificates and insured accounts in banks or shares of savings and loan associations. The interest earned from these investments could then be turned over to the county as excess fees.

Local governmental bodies can already invest their idle funds but sheriffs, clerks and jailers cannot.

The subcommittee on county finance of the Interim Joint Committee on Counties and Special Districts approved the proposed legislation at a meeting in Frankfort last week. The bill will be recommended to the full committee in February.

representatives of the two water districts in the county—North and West—and with David Cash, a board member from Brodhead, to apprise them of the probably need in the near future to raise water rates to them.

Mayor Roland Mullins said the last audit report of the MT. Vernon Waterworks showed a profit of \$369 which he said was no problem in that the water works was not set up to make a profit and that as long as the city could operate at a break-even level then there was no problem. But, he cited several problems foreseeable in the near future to this level being maintained. Rising costs are of course the big factor, including huge jumps in the cost of electricity to operate the water plant. Mayor Mullins said that the waterworks had explored all avenues of keeping expenses down even to not replacing two recent retirees from the waterworks.

The city is waiting for an engineering report that will detail the water rates will have to be raised to districts, Brodhead and possibly to Mt. Vernon customers to decide on what percentage the increase will be. This report is expected to be given the council at the January 22 meeting and Mayor Mullins invited the representatives of the districts and Brodhead back

to that meeting so they could be immediately aware of any action that was taken.

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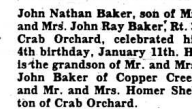
