with practice you can develop

the daily diet. Choose four or
more servings daily of foods
from the bread and cereal food
group.

Enriched yeast breads supply the diet with important
nutrients (fron, thiamin, riboflavin, niacin, energy and some
protein).

Preparation and Storage Tips

1. Compressed (cake) yeast
must be refrigerated and usew
within 2 weeks after purchase.

2. Active dry yeast has a
"before date" stamped on the
package. Check this date before
purchasing or using.

3. Allow bread to cool uncovered on a wire rack after
removal from the pan. Serve
hot, if desired.

4. Yeast rolls are most
flavorful when served hot.

5. To store yeast breads and
rolls at home, place in a tightlycovered box or in a plastic bag.
Refrigerate if not used in a few
days to retard mold.

6. Make a batch of bread
and freeze some for later use.




