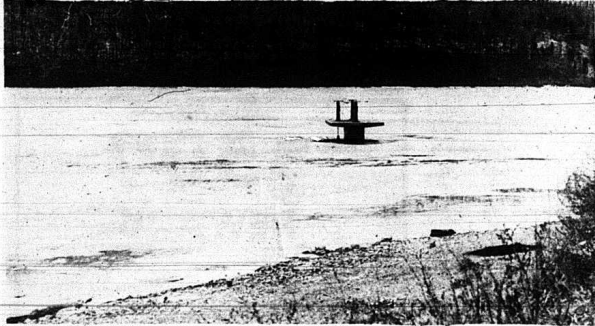

## American Hostages in Iran Released

Fifty-two Americans held hostage in Iran for 444 days were released and flown to Algiers yesterday for an official transfer to U.S. government control. The hostages were taken when militant students stormed the U.S. Embassy in Iran following a revolution in which the Shah was forced to leave the country. After months of negotiations failed, an agreement was finally reached during the last days of the Jimmy Carter administration. As the time approached for American government power to change

hands, seemingly the Iranians were more willing to come to an agreement. The main stipulation of the agreement was that the hostages would be released and in return the U.S. would release all Iranian assets held frozen in this country following the seizure. The former hostages were flown from Algiers yesterday to a U.S. Army hospital in Germany for medical and psychological examinations which were expected to take about 9 days. The Signal does not usually cover state, world or national

news, however, to overlook something which has generated as much public concern and outrage, might appear that we are oblivious or uncaring, neither of which is the case. We rejoice with all America in the peaceful settlement of the crisis.

### FREEDOM APPRECIATION SERVICE

A county-wide Freedom Appreciation Service in cooperation with 10 area churches was scheduled for Wednesday night, January 21 at Rockcastle County High School for 7:00 p.m. The service was planned as a patriotic community effort to express joy and Thanksgiving not only for our freedom, but also especially for the freedom of the 52 American hostages who spent 444 days as captives in Iran and were released on Inauguration Day.

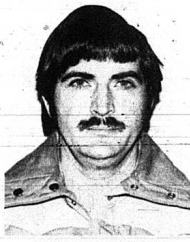
## More Candidates File

## Architect to Survey Property

At a meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Health Thursday morning, Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker told members of the board that he plans to get an architect to inspect the "Old Dinner Bell" building and apprise the board of the estimated cost of renovation and the estimated heating and operating costs. The services of the architect, according to Thacker will be provided by

CVADD at no cost to the county or the Health Department. The county recently took a 90 day option on the property which is located at the corner of Richmond and Maple Streets. If purchased at the \$52,000 price agreed to in the option, the property will belong to the county and the Health Department will be granted a long term lease. Since the state pays a por-

tion of the operating costs for the Department, it is necessary that they have some idea of what operating costs will run before accepting the facility as a home. The architect reportedly will also be able to determine if necessary repairs on the building will be so extensive as to make it more feasible to build a new structure than renovate the large building as it now stands.

### COUNTY FILES PRE-APPLICATION

The purpose of a special meeting of the Fiscal Court Tuesday was to discuss a resolution of the Fiscal Court authorizing the filing of a Community Development pre-application. The resolution was approved for filing the pre-application request financial assistance provided by Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974.

During the meeting the county also adopted an energy conservation strategy for the county.

## When Applying for New Social Security Numbers

In 1979 there were instituted changes in regulations governing the issuance of new social security numbers. These changes have been confusing and hassling many, especially those who have waited until immediately before they have needed the number to apply.

The changes came about because of abuses. Previously not only could a person apply for and get more than one number or work under another person's account number, but a person wishing to establish a new identity, possibly for criminal reasons, could go to a cemetery, find a stone bearing the name and birthdate of a child who died in infancy, write to Frankfurt and get a birth certificate. Now, the Social Security administration requires not only evidence of age in the form of a birth certificate but also evidence of current identity. This can include any of the following: drivers license, school records or report card, school I.D. card, vaccination certificate, insurance policy, adoption record, marriage record, divorce record, newspaper notice of birth, welfare case record, voter registration card, draft card, day care record, etc.

From this area, the applica-

tion for a new number goes for documentation to Richmond, where the identity has to be verified. The application then goes to the Bureau of Data Processing in Baltimore, Md. where records are searched to make certain no number has been issued to the person before and to make sure that the new number they issue is unlike any ever issued before. The number assigned singles out a social security record from 200 million others. Anyone applying for a number in the last several months has learned that what ideally is supposed to take six weeks, usually takes several months.

Like it or not, numbers are becoming increasingly important in the identifying process of a heavily populated country. Social Security numbers are required to obtain a drivers license, to join the military and to gain pay from work. Therefore, it is of great importance to apply for a number for children long before they need the number and then put it in a safe place. Social Security officers strongly recommend applying for a child's number soon after birth, to join the military and to obtain. All that is needed then, is a birth certificate and a statement from the doctor or the child's hospital identification bracelet.

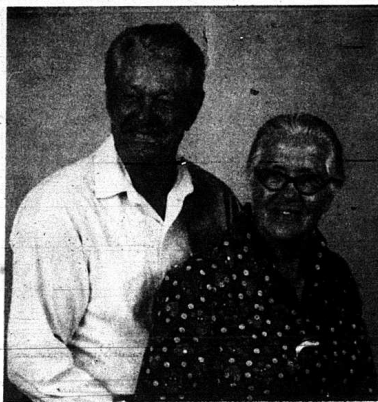

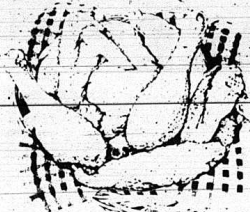

**Fashions for the Physically Handicapped**  
Although clothing for the physically handicapped does not differ in style from general apparel, such garments contain special features that provide wearing comfort and ease in dressing. The psychological and physical factors associated with clothing may be multiplied and emphasized in those who are physically handicapped.

Getting dressed can be made easier or more difficult by details such as the type of fastenings and the location and type of openings. The physically handicapped person develops a sense of independence with clothing that is easy to put on, fasten, take off and care for.

Characteristics of garments, in relation to design lines, details and fabrics, make the usual activities of daily living and the demands of work easier to cope with. Also, abnormalities can often be totally or partially disguised by clothing design.

The psychological aspect of clothing is especially important for the physically handicapped. Clothing can make the individual feel like one of the group and help him overcome the feeling that he is different from others.

However, whether one has a disability or not, clothing helps determine how you feel about yourself. For the handicapped person, colors, fabric and style can call attention to an individual's personality rather than his disability.

Many features that add to the wearability of a garment for the handicapped can be found in other fashions. They can easily be transferred to keep these features in mind as you shop for fashionable and comfortable garments for the hand-

apped.

\*Wrap-around styles in slits, skirts and dresses to provide extra width over the hips.

\*Skirts with some fullness or too much fullness can interfere with the use of crutches or wheelchairs.

\*Pants or slacks that have zippers inserted the length of the inseams for ease in slipping the garment over a leg brace.

\*Lined pants or slacks to prevent wear from braces.

\*Front openings, large flat collars, and cuffs with large rings for ease in grasping and handling.

\*Low collars or necklines that do not ride up on the neck, especially for the person confined to a wheelchair or wearing a body or neck brace.

\*Slippery linings for ease in putting on and taking off a coat or jacket.

\*Carefully fit socks and stockings to prevent wrinkles that can cause pressure sores.

**Making a Bathroom Convenient for Handicapped**  
For an elderly or handicapped person, it can be frustrating or impossible to perform cleanliness routines in a bathroom not equipped with safe and appropriate apparatuses. But, with thoughtful planning, the elderly and handicapped can carry on usual grooming routines. It can be accomplished by rearranging the bathroom, supplying different surroundings or remodeling to include safe, convenient fixtures and furnishings.

Altering a bathroom can range from easy-to-make changes to the more complicated, perhaps even remodeling, depending on the person's degree of mobility or type of handicap.

Some of the simple additions include attaching grab bars securely to the wall near the tub, shower, sink and toilet. If remodeling within firm fixtures, keep in mind that some tubs and toilets include grab bars as part of the unit. Check that grab bars are non-skid.

Supply non-breakable soap dishes and drinking glasses. Place these other grooming aids, towel racks, toilet tissue roll, mirrors, counter and storage space at a height for convenient access.

Provide a sturdy, slip-resistant seat in bathtub or shower. Tub and shower flooring should have a non-slip surface. If not built-in, apply rough textured adhesive strips. Wall-tiled, wall-to-wall carpeting provides a surface for more secure footing to prevent falls on slippery floors.

Good lighting is essential. A soft night light eliminates dangerous groping for a light switch. Store medications separately from other items and label each in large, clear letters or some other form for easy identification.

Level-type faucet handles may be easier to manipulate than others. Other desirable features may be thermostatically controlled fittings on the outside of the tub or shower.

Don't overlook accessories that make bathing and grooming easier and more comfortable. A sponge with a pocket to hold soap can be readily grasped for lathering. It also helps to keep the soap in hand. A backbrush, hose-spray attachment and a well-lit mirror attached to the wall near the wash basin are other aids to consider.

Of course, the entire bathroom should be kept clean. If the person has to take care of the room alone, provide long-handled brushes and sponges, as well as a convenient spot for storing cleaning products and cloths.

If designing a new bathroom, keep in mind that more space is needed for persons in wheel chairs or dependent on walkers. Also, a toilet measuring 18" from the floor is more convenient than a conventional 15" model. A wall-mounted one is easier to clean. Consider also setting the wash basin 36" high rather than 31", providing space

Have plenty of counter space available on either side of the basin for grooming essentials and medications. Finally, it's a good idea to install a telephone in the bathroom and a call signal button so help can be summoned in an emergency.

### Does Man Have An Immortal Soul?

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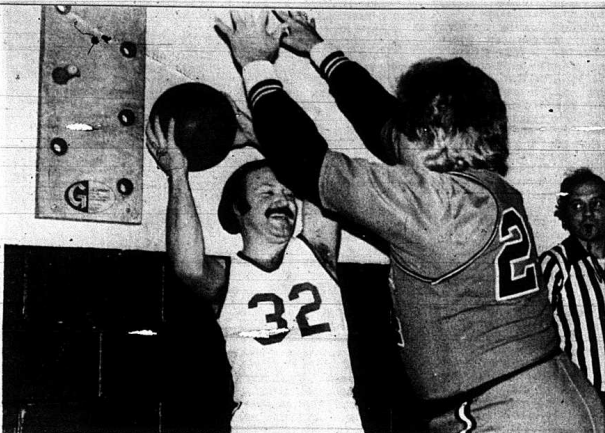
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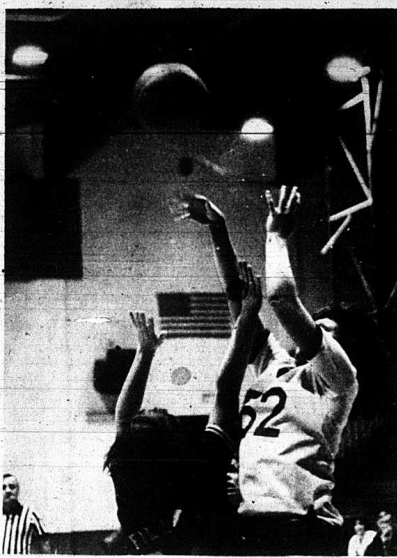

On Saturday, January 17, we made the short trip across 461 to Somerset for a game with the Briarjumpers of tradition rich Somerset High School. They took the opening tip and scored on a jumper by A.I. Goner from the outside. Somerset made their first fine field goal attempts and seven of their first nine. We were down by a 14-0 score before we could put any points on the board. The basic problem in this opening quarter was that we let them have the ball too much by turning it over against their containing zone press. After we settled down

somewhat their token pressure did not give us that much of a problem with the exception of the fact that we did not execute the 2-on-1 and 3-on-2 situations early after getting the ball into the basket area. To say the least we were again intimidated as was evidenced by our inability to make the easy shots under the baskets. Again we tried to alter our normal shooting habits and several times shot the ball from close-in range without drawing fire. Other contributing factors, especially in the first half, was that we did not get back on defense and our very poor free throw shooting. 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# Fire Precautions

The advent of numerous local fires, blamed on fireplaces, fireplace inserts and wood heaters, has prompted our local fire department to issue some cold weather warnings which relate to the safe installation and operation of these energy-saving heating sources.

Anyone not familiar with the design and/or construction of a grate or fireplace in which they are now or planning to build a fire or install an insert, should have someone familiar with construction or fire prevention check for possible fire hazards. This should include inspection of old fireplaces and chimneys which have not been used for some time as well as new chimney construction which have never been used. Older chimneys, which perhaps for some time have been used as a vent for oil or gas heaters but are being replaced with wood or coal heaters, should also be checked for safety.

During the heating season, chimneys of any wood burner should be checked about every month (depending upon the size of the opening) for possible build-up which can ignite and cause a "chimney fire." In order to check, the fire must be out and, if pipe is used, it must be taken down and cleaned out. Built-in chimneys must be inspected with a light and cleaned from the top of the house. One indication of build-up is reduced draft or poor drawing.

There are commercial chemical soot reducers on the market locally which can be periodically tossed on the fire to help control chimney build-up; however, they do not eliminate creosote.

In a chimney fire, the intense heat, combined possibly with a faulty chimney, can create potential danger. Also, of some concern to the fire department, in such calls is the possibility of the gummy hot tar and fire shooting from the chimney and catching the roof on fire. The extreme heat can also cause the mortar to crack.

According to local firemen, victims of chimney fire can toss handfuls of soda up the chimney in an effort to control the blaze until the firemen arrive.

Woodburning stoves should be installed with caution, taking care to cover the floor beneath and the area around, with a fireproof protection. The fire department recommends

keeping the wood stove at least three feet from anything that will burn, including most non-masonry walls. They also recommend the flue pipe be kept at least 12 inches away from any combustible material (wood, paper, cloth) on all sides and it should be surrounded by some type masonry.

Most fireplace inserts are recommended for use in stone or brick fireplaces only (not for use in "prefabricated" "zone clearance" "manufactured" or "factory-built fireplaces.") Some of these fireplaces may be faced with brick but the inside will not be made of brick. These fireplaces are made for installation near materials that can catch fire. They use air flowing through the firebox to cool the fireplace. An insert could interrupt the cooling air and could cause an increased risk of fire in the walls and floor. If in doubt as to the materials used in construction of a fireplace, a person should get a qualified mason to check before installing an insert.

## Legislative Report

The executive administration is preparing to spend \$550,000 in the next eighteen months to open a state Commerce office in Tokyo, Japan.

An initial \$245,000 expenditure to open and staff the office was approved by the Personal Service Contract Review subcommittee on January 13th. However, the approval was not unanimous because the committee's two Republican members voted against the contract.

Although funds to establish the Asian Commerce office were approved by the 1980 General Assembly, Republicans did not support the program then, because they felt the revenue could be better spent within the Commonwealth's border.

\$114 million has already been trimmed from the state's budget this year and economic forecasts indicate that reductions in the neighborhood of \$170 million will have to be made next year.

In spite of the opposition to the Commerce policy, the administration did give the committee an opportunity to review the contract before expenditures were investigated. Also, the administration plans to return, with an evaluation of the program, in six months for approval of an additional \$300,000 to operate the office in fiscal year 1981-82.

With beneficial education programs already being reduced and increased reductions imminent, if a Commerce office in Tokyo to woo industry and explore export markets is not inappropriate, it at least has poor timing.

Further, there is little evidence that a foreign Commerce office such as the one in Brussels, Belgium, has any positive impact on the Commonwealth's economy. And there is substantial evidence to prove that irresponsible reductions in vital services and surplus funds always result in tax increases.

In other action, the committee decided to extend its review of a \$5,000 contract for a schematic design by an architect that will be used to build fifty-stall horse barns at the state fair grounds in Louisville.

The barns are slated to cost \$900,000 in funds provided by an already approved, by the Department of Finance, state Fair Board bond-issue. Here again, Republicans are opposing this contract because it constitutes a misplaced priority. Funds should be directed there are already seventeen horse barns on the Fair

grounds.

Also, the committee voted to look into the possibility of requesting extra aid in submitting a contract for approval to also identify the board of directors of corporations that are awarded state contracts.

An accident at the junction of the Copper Creek Road and U.S. 25 near Conway early Wednesday morning sent Gregory H. Chandler, 18, of Rt. 3, Crab Orchard, driver of one of the cars involved, to the Rockcastle County Hospital with cuts and bruises.

The driver of the other, Janet L. Jenkins, 24, of Rt. 3, Berea, was not injured, according to state policeman Danny Coleman. Ms. Jenkins stated that she was going around a curve when she applied the brakes and lost control of the car on the slick road. Her car slid into the path of the Chandler car and then went over an embankment.

## STATE SCS HEAD RETIRES RECENTLY.

One of Kentucky's noted conservationists has retired and urged Kentuckians to accelerate their concerns and efforts to control the misuse of the state's precious natural resources. Glen E. Murray, the head of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in Kentucky retired on December 31, 1980 with 36 years of federal career service.

Murray has held the SCS state conservationist position in Kentucky since July 1969.

He has provided innovative leadership to SCS's 900 personnel in their efforts to assist landowners and units of government throughout the state in the wise and prudent use of the states soil and water resources base.

Murray, a native of Colorado, joined the Soil Conservation Service in 1946 in Utah following a tour of duty with the U.S. Army Corps. He moved up the SCS ranks as a career

The Mt. Vernon Signal Thursday, January 22, 1981 P-11 federal employee serving in Utah, New Mexico, South Carolina and Oklahoma prior to coming to Kentucky.

He has received the Secretary of Agriculture's Special Merit Award, USDA's Superior Service Award, SCS's Outstanding Performance Award on three occasions and has been honored as a Fellow of the Soil Conservation Society of America.

In representing SCS Murray has been an active participant in such organizations as the Kentucky Association of Conservation Districts, Kentucky Soil and Water Conservationists.

His professional career has centered around as he put it, "as a dedicated public servant fulfilling an obligation to people in helping them realize the wise use of our Soil and Water Resources in a manner that will serve the needs of today and be of benefit to future generations."

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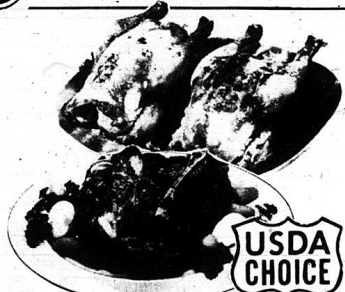

2 part time persons. The main office is located in a trailer on Main Street. During 1980 they provided services to 430 undup-

licated clients and received 13,056 visits. Local, state and federal government funds maintain the centers plus some private pay.

#### Offices

The Mt. Vernon Fire Department fought 40 fires within the city limits and 60 fires in the county last year. These responses include grass and forest fires. City funds and money raised through community interest support the Broadhead Fire Department, which has 25 volunteers.

Sixteen firemen help with the fire fighter efforts of the Livingston Fire Department which responded to a total of 40 fires during 1980. Of the first 3 were within the city, 19 in the county, 3 were aid rendered to other fire departments and 15 were grass and forest fires. The department gets help from the city and from fund raising efforts.

The Mt. Vernon Fire Department housed in the building with city government, responded to 31 fires in the city limits and since last February, carried water to fight 45 county fires for a total of 76 responses. The department has 14 volunteer fire fighters and is funded by city taxes.

The Mt. Vernon City Police filled out 320 reports including 206 arrests and 114 traffic violations. There are presently 3 full time policemen and 1 part time.

#### County

The Rockcastle County Library, located at the entrance to Ford Subdivision owns a total of 27,100 books. During 1980, 63,784 books were checked out

from the library and the bookmobile. The library has 3 part time employees and receives help from the county and state.

The Circuit Court Clerk in connection with the office of Circuit Court and District Court reports the following number of cases for 1980: 215 Circuit Civil, 57 District Civil, 171 Small claims, 82 Probates, 73 judgments, 617 misdemeanors, 719 traffic, 110 felonies and 92 juvenile. Five persons handle the work of the Circuit Clerk's office. The clerk is an elected official who's term runs for 6 years.

During the year 1980, the Sheriff's Office reports 77 criminal arrests and 440 jury summons plus billing and collecting for taxes. The sheriff employs 2 deputies and is elected for a 4 year term.

The County Court Clerk reported 66 deeds, 277 real estate mortgages, 1,279 chattel mortgages, 129 marriage licenses, 174 leases, 57 power of attorney, 2,573 hunting and fishing licenses, 399 deer licenses, 6 turkey licenses, 10 deer licenses, 3615 truck leases, 5,494 car licenses, 208 motorcycle licenses, 365 trailer licenses and 3,214 transfers. The county court clerk runs for the elected office every four years.

The County Jail reports approximately 700 different persons were lodged at the county jail during the year. The jailer's term is four years.

Records, as to how much money had been spent and how many miles of road maintained in the county since inception of the new road program, were not obtainable from the County Judge/Executive or from the county road supervisor.
