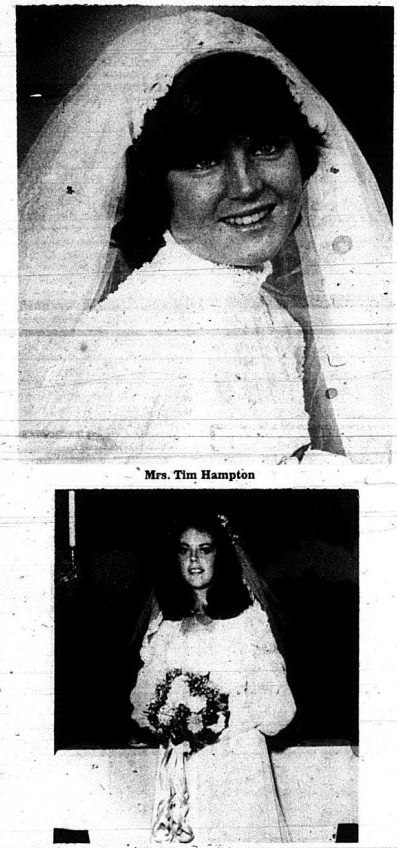

business from the 26x60 weatherboard store in the present location of Mt. Vernon produce. "I didn't try to 'Jew' him. He offered it at a good price and I

just bought it," Mr. Bob said. The brick building was being rented out for use as a chicken hatchery at the time of the purchase. So, he let the renter stay until the end of the hatching season before he made the addition and took occupancy. Later he bought some adjoining property from Lewis Miller and in 1976, bought the large block building that now sits on the site of his original store building.

Mr. Bob said that he never would have believed that "they could run the little farmer out of the hen and egg business" but that is what happened with the advent of the big broiler houses and larger company operations. Sensing the changes that were to come, Mr. Bob combined some capital outlay with faith in the market and converted the emphasis of the business to that of a farmer's supply store and feed mill.

The mill opened for business in 1959, grinding, mixing and selling feed. It was almost any need of today's farmer can be obtained there.

The business has become a family business with the help of son, John, who drives the tri-axle tandem truck that does the major part of the hauling for the mill and another son, Wayne, who runs the Mt. Vernon business. Mr. Bob says he is retired but admits that he keeps the books for the Willailla mill which they leased a few years ago and "helps out."

Mr. Bob does not keep himself so busy in his business, even though it is a demanding one, that he has not had time to take an active part in city affairs. For some twenty years he has been a member of the Mt. Vernon City Council.

Outfoxing High Food Prices
Most of us talk about inflated food prices, but very few of us know what to do about them. We are all up against the battle of the bulging food budget. It would be a good idea for all of us to learn how to curb food costs without sacrificing the quality or quantity of family meals.

Supermarkets are where most people get most of their foods. There are more than 10,000 items in the big stores and that makes grocery shopping pretty confusing. If you stopped to look at each item for 30 seconds, you wouldn't get out of the store for approximately 11 days. The typical shopper makes one purchase about every 30 seconds while in the store.

The Daily Food Guide is a good foundation for assuring adequate nutrition. Each of the groups has economical foods that are nutritious. For example, versatile whole grain oats are a good buy since they are higher in protein than any other grain and are a good source of fiber. Oats also are excellent as a meat extender. Dry beans and lentils are low cost replacements for meat. Selections within the fruits and vegetables group vary with geographical locations, season and the form.

Buy the quantity you can reasonably use. Consider store space and the time required to use the foods. Large quantities are not always a better buy. Compare the unit price with smaller quantities to assure a good buy.

We all need variety in the food we eat. Unless food is appealing, the goal of providing nutritional needs may not be fulfilled.

Shop Wisely For Food
Concentrate on nutritional foods and cut out the frills. Plan your meals from the five food groups which are basic to health: meat, milk, fruits-vegetables, bread-cereal, other.

Plan menus from the five food groups, then make the marketing list and stick to it. In most supermarkets, your action plan will take you around the outer aisles of the store for the basic foods. It's wandering in those center aisles that tempts you to impulse buying.

Shop the sales. After your marketing list is made out, check it against newspaper ads for sales. Perhaps a vegetable, fruit, meat cut or cheese on sale will fit your menu plan just as easily as what you have on it. Coordinate your purchases with other trips. It's energy-foolish to use gas going to an out-of-the-way store to pick up a bargain or two unless it's on your way to work, the pharmacy, cleaners or whatever.

Shop alone and only after eating. Husbands, children and friends seem to be full of suggestions that cause you to stray from that all-important list.

Coupons—these may come from many places, such as newspapers, magazines, mail or in-store. If you use and like a certain product, they're fine. If you don't like a certain product, 50 cents off is not going to make you change your mind. And, of course, you must have the coupons organized when you plan to use them, then be certain to take them along with you while shopping.

Check per-unit prices for savings. If you have no preference on a certain product, checking the per unit price (usually per pound or below the product) can help you decide. If on sale, use your personal calculator to figure the price as the sale price is not always listed on the item or price rail strip.

Buy generic products or house brands. These are usually lower priced than brand name, advertised products.

Foods in season may be the bargains, but not always. Canned tomatoes, for example, are 49 cents to 59 cents a bunch while canned ones are four cans for a dollar. Or just one store in a chain may be getting rid of their stock of certain frozen vegetables or fruits. You decide which is the bargain.

Most homemakers and families agree that, "made from scratch tastes best, costs less." If you have the time, do it. Also, if you have the time, what you can prepare yourself saves processing cost. That includes fixing vegetables for stew, cutting chicken into pieces, making

breads and cookie crumbs, etc. Check expiration dates on items such as milk, cheese, meat, etc. Bakery goods with expired dates may often be bought at a savings.

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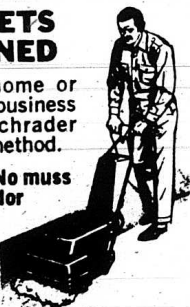

Keith is 5'8" and weighs 140 pounds. He has been playing basketball for 7 years and is in his third season as a member of the Rocket "A" and "B" teams.

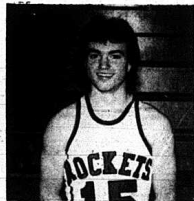
Football is another sport Keith participates in and he has plans to play baseball this spring. He is a member of the Athletic Club, WICA Club and Quail 4-H Club.

Steve Holcomb

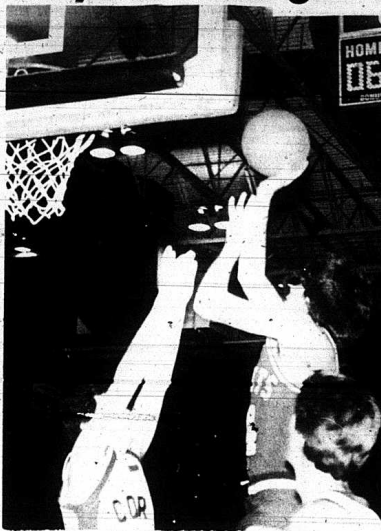
