Engineers Meet With Council To Discuss Possible Rate Increases

Crawford and Crawford Engineers of Burnside and Richard Moore of Schimpeler-Corradino of Louisville met with the Mt. Vermon City Quuncil and representatives of the Western, Northern and Brodhead water districts Thursday night to discuss operational costs of the water and sewer facilities and possible rate increases necessary to Mt. Vermon water customs.

water and sewer facilities and possible rate increases necessary to Mt. Vernon water customers and water districts in the near future.

Within the past, several months, the council has. — working with these engineering firms who are aiding the city in a 20-year plan to meet Federal EPA upgrading requirements for the sewer plant. The renovation will be 75% funded by the government with shared cost of 25% by the city of Mt. Vernon. The amount the city would have to put up would be approximately \$187,500.

and councilmen The mayor and councilmen inquired as to the possibility of inquired as to the possibility of using at least pagt of water department surplus that is bound by the bond ordinance to be held in reserve. The bond ordinance states that a set monthly sum must be put in reserve not tr. exceed a total reserve of \$180,000. Presently the accrued amount is around \$160,000.

Mayor Roland Mullins stated Tuesday of this week that he is checking with bond holders, seeking permission to use these funds since the improvement is a capital improvement is a capital improvement on facilities previously financed by these existing bonds. According to Mullins, the remaining portion could possibly be obtained from a 5% PHA loan. The Mayor further stated that he and the council would work to keep the minimum water and sewer bill at the current rate if it were at all possible.

Long Dry Spell

According to Water Superintendent, Matt Powell, Jr., unless we receive some much needed percipitation this winter and spring, the water situation in the area may become worse than we experienced last summer. "If the dry continues." Powell said, "the lake will possibly drop at a faster rate than it has dropped so far." According to his measurements, the lake is 3% feet below normal which is the lowest it has been since January of 1970 when it first filled up, and Powell says that the long-range rain forecast is not very encouraging.

Transition: Key to "Mr. Bob's" Success

It has been 42 years since a young 25-year-old man by the name of Bob Jasper came to town and entered into a business partnership. Since then, the business and the man have kept a relatively low profile, while successfully making the smooth transitions demanded of the changing times, supply and market.

"Mr. Bob," as he is commonly referred to around town, credits his older brother, Artur, for whom he worked for several years in Science Hill, with helping him get started in business. His brother owned and operated a poultry, eggrand cream business similar to the one Mr. Bob operated in London and later in Mt. Vernon. A fire destroyed his first business and

In the thirties, Everett Chaney was operating an established egg, chicken and sour lished egg, chicken and sour lished egg, chicken and sour where a big white block building now sits on Spring Street behind the Bank of Mt. Vernon. In 1939, Chaney, sold Mr. Bob half interest in the business and, two years later, sold him the remaining interest.

In those days, the business consisted of buying and reselling surplus rural products, including walnuts, yellow root, Mayapple root, animal pelts

and ginseng, in addition to the and ginseng, in addition to the regular products commonly bought. Mr. Bob remembers, that, in those days, he and his brother in Science Hill would load a ton and a half truck with wainuts and send them to St. Louis. Now, he says, it is hard to find find the state of the same products were usually brought into the station; however, a ton truck made some pick-ups from country stores. A Chevrolet ton and a half truck, diven in these early





So, he let the renter stay on until the end of the hatching season before he made the addition and took occupancy. Later he bought some adjoining property from Lewis Miller and, in 1976, bought the large block building that now sits on the site of his original store building.

Mr. Bob said that he never would have believed that "They could run the little farmer out of the hen and egg business" but
