County Burley Growers Allowed to Grow Record Poundage in 1981

Basis buriety tobacco quotas for the 1981 season will be 7.5 percent higher as announced by the Agriculture Department in Washington last Friday.

In Rockeastle County, the 1980 basic quota amounted to 1910 basic quota mounted to 1910 basic quota growing seasons, county growers could have grown 687,863 pounds more last year, for a total of 3,788,300 pounds.

The bad part is that, due to last year's drought, poundage was off by about 40% of the original quota, county-wide. The new 1981 quotas permit

Rockcastle County growers to raise a basic 3,354,470 pounds, but coupled with the approximation of the county? Left growers will be able to raise a record 4,854,470 pounds. In anticipation of the new larger limit, farmers are mainly concerned about two factors-barn space and the increase in out-of-pocket expenses incurred in preparing a crop.

A new average 40x60 barn cost about \$10,000 and farmers can expect to face an \$1.38. fertilize increase and overall 15% increase in crop investment.






