Accident Fatal to Local Woman

Fairy Virginia Loesch, 81, of Route 1, Mt. Vernon, was fatally injured in an accident on U.S. 25, about 9 miles north of Mt. Vernon on Thursday, January 29th.

State Trooper Jimmie Silvers said that Dewayne Allen, 24, of McKee was traveling in front of the Loesch car and slowed down to make a left turn when he was struck in the rear by the oncoming car, driven by Ms. Loesch. Ms. Loesch was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital where she died about an hour later.

Ms. Loesch was born in Texas on February 25, 1899, the daughter of the late Lon and Nat Burroughs Golden and was a member of the Pentecostal Church.

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TENNESSEE MAN KILLED

Ronald Allen Burnett, 15, of Chattanooga, Tennessee, was killed January 28 when the van, in which he was riding, was struck by a tractor-trailer truck about 7 miles north of Mt. Vernon on 175 about 9 a.m.

According to State Trooper Jimmie Silvers, both vehicles were southbound. The van was in the emergency lane attempting to pull out into the driving lane when it pulled into the

CO. ROAD SYSTEM REPORT

According to Paul Hansel, county road supervisor, approximately 800-1,000 miles of county roads have been improved during 1980.

The improvements have been in the form of gravel grade and patch work. The total financial outlay for county roads from July of 1980 through December 30 has been \$286,674.

ACCIDENTS

An accident on Interstate 75, Thursday, January 29, sent Barry Courtney, 45, of Frankfort and Truman Hendrix, 46, of London to the Berea Hospital. According to State Trooper Jack Lawless, Hendrix pulled out to pass, lost control, hit a guard rail and bounced back into the path of the vehicle driven by Courtney.

Hendrix received Class 3 and Courtney Class 2 injuries. The accident occurred about 8:30 p.m., 11 miles north of Mt. Vernon.

Brown Hurt Seriously

Michael Brown, 23, of Mt. Vernon was injured about 7:45 a.m., January 29th, in an accident on Ky. 70, 8 miles west of Mt. Vernon. Claudine Cash, 35, of Brodhead, driver of the second car, was also slightly injured in the accident.

According to State Trooper Greg Ennis, the Cash vehicle pulled out from the Ottawa School Road into the path of the Brown Car. Brown reportedly tried to avoid the collision by swerving but was struck in the right side by the Cash vehicle.

Brown was thrown from the car, reportedly run over by his own vehicle, and sustained class 2 injuries.

He was transferred to St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington where he is in the intensive care unit listed in serious condition.

Bridges to be Built in County According to 5-Year Plan

Governor John Y. Brown, Jr. announced last Friday the state's road program for the next 5 years as part of his continuing effort to remove politics from state spending and construction priorities.

Kentucky Transportation Secretary, Frank Metts, said that the 5 year plan for 1981-85 is the result of 12 months of study and deliberation. "In December of 1979 there were over 900 active projects in the department in some stage of design and about 700 million dollars worth of construction underway," he said. After looking at the plans and the funding fore-

casts, he said he realized there are no "dream roads" in the program which balanced the department's construction plans.

County Burley Growers Allowed to Grow Record Pounds in 1981

Basis burley tobacco quotas for the 1981 season will be 7.5 percent higher as announced by the Agriculture Department in Washington last Friday.

In Rockcastle County, the 1980 basic quota amounted to 3,120,437 pounds, however, due to lost poundage in previous growing seasons, county growers could still grow 627,869 pounds more last year, for a total of 3,788,300 pounds.

The bad part is that, due to last year's drought, poundage was off by about 40% of the original quota, county-wide. The new 1981 quotas permit

Rockcastle County growers to raise a basic 3,354,470 pounds but coupled with the approximately 1,500,000 make-up poundage the county's 1,672 growers will be able to raise a record 4,854,470 pounds.

In anticipation of the new larger limit, farmers are mainly concerned about two factors - barn space and the increase in out-of-pocket expenses incurred in preparing a crop.

A new average 40x60 barn cost about \$10,000 and farmers can expect to face an 8-13% fertilizer increase and an overall 15% increase in crop investment.

And the Rains Came.....

The rain that area residents had been hoping and praying would fall for months came in abundance over the weekend. According to the National Weather Service, Rockcastle County has gotten a little over 2 inches of rain already in February.

According to Mt. Vernon Water Superintendent, Matt Powell, Lake Linville, the 470 acre local water supply was down 3/4 feet before Sunday, when the rains came. Streams, springs and branches quickly filled the lake to over flowing by Sunday afternoon. The lake is now at the normal level for the time of year.

Powell wasn't the only one rejoicing at the rainfall. Farmers who have struggled through two consecutive years of ad-

verse growing seasons, one wet and one dry, were relieved to see ponds and cisterns filling up and the ground soaking up the moisture.

January was one of the driest months on record for several years and was especially dry for January with only one inch of rainfall and 7 inches of snow. Snow is not equal to rainfall in moisture content and is usually figured as 10 inches of snow being equal to one inch of rain. City employees who were doing work on lines before the rain in January said that the ground was "bone dry" as far down as 8 and 9 feet.

The rain that fell Sunday was the kind the area needed - the slow persistent kind that soaked in rather than ran off.

L&N Coal Train Derails Near Livingston

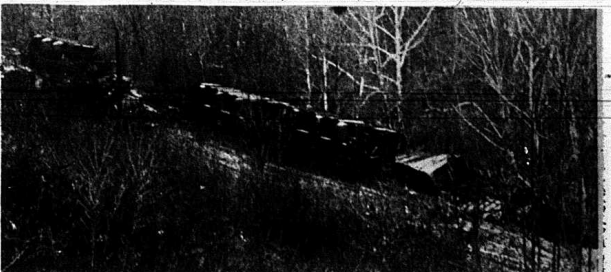
An Louisville and Nashville train northbound bearing 101 cars from Corbin to Cincinnati derailed about 12:40 Sunday morning Feb. 1. All 101 cars being pulled by 4 diesels were loaded with coal. No hazardous materials were being carried at the time and there was no threat of fire however, the derailment which happened

about 1 mile north of Livingston caused the rail line to be blocked until about 8:45 Sunday night when one of the double tracks was cleared for rail traffic.

The cause of the derailment is being investigated by company officials. The derailment affected the second half of the train beginning with the 53rd

car. Twenty-three cars left the track, some overturning, some turning crosswise of the track and some with only one or two wheels off the track.

According to a company spokesman, clean-up began early Sunday morning and will likely take several days with wrecker and crews from Corbin heading the effort.

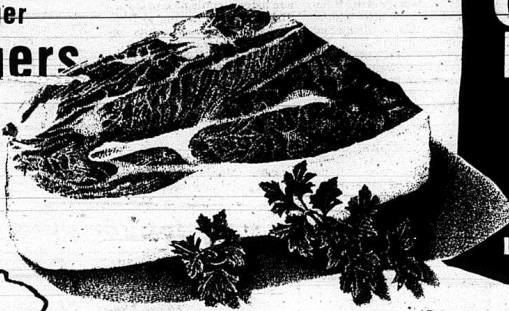

situation as that currently faced by Kentucky. New York did not take appropriate action and several state legislators had to be elected three times in one year as the result of a federal court ruling.

As of January 28th, sixty-three incumbent Kentucky legislators had not filed declaration papers to seek re-election, because of the probability that their districts will be changed by either a special session or a court challenge.

There is justification for a special session to redistrict the state and one way to do this is to call, because the amount of federal funds a community receives is primarily based on population. And because, under the new constitutional amendment, 100 state representatives will be elected for three years in 1981 and 19 state senators will be elected for five year terms in 1981 and 1983, which would mean that equal representation under the one-man, one-vote principle would not be evident until 1988.

Calloway of Crooked Creek

The stories in this article have been told and retold many times and like folk music, there may be some slight deviation from the original story; however, they are based upon true events and contain some of the color and flavor of the area and time in which they took place.

The Scotch-Irish people who settled the Crooked Creek section of the county were not dull or mute, to say the least. They were, for the most part, typically "clever" (hospitable), passionate, tough and, despite the serious struggle to survive, enjoyed immensely the "comic relief" of "playing jokes and retelling funny stories as a means of entertainment.

Calloway Mullins came to the Crooked Creek area from North Carolina in the late 1700's or early 1800's and sometime thereafter, either from his parents or by his own initiative, acquired some 7,500 acres of land.

He built a two-story log house at the ford of Crooked Creek about a mile and a half from Mullins Station near where Crooked Creek joins Roundstone Creek. Old man Allen Owens, a bachelor who "stayed about with everybody" stayed some with Calloway and his wife, Polly, and worked for them. Calloway was always pulling jokes on Allen just to hear him "rare."

Early one morning Calloway went out hunting by himself along a path near Roundstone Creek. The path led around a mountain on a bluff above the creek. He ran onto and killed a moose bear and her two cubs, arranged them in the path so they would appear as alive as possible and went home. He asked Uncle Allen to get the axe and come help him cut a "bee tree" that he had found.

As they neared the place where the bears were, Calloway said, "Uncle Allen, what would you do if you ran into three bears right in the middle of the road?" Allen promptly replied, "Jesus Christ, Calloway Mullins, I'd chop their heads off with my chopping axes!" About that time, Allen, who was in front, ran upon the bears, let out a whoop, threw the axe toward the mountain and went over the ledge into the creek. He came clamboring back up to find Calloway laughing "fit to be tied" and railed, "Jesus Christ, Calloway Mullins, you could cause a man to drown himself!"

One of Calloway's many tricks backfired on him. He had a mean bull fenced off above his house and took Uncle Allen up there under some pretense. Allen and Calloway remarked, "Allen, if that bull was to get after me, I'd crawl in that holler log there." Calloway had planned to make some excuse and leave Allen in the field with the bull, but the bull closed in before Calloway could make his escape. They both made a dive for the log where they stayed for several hours until the bull got tired of butting the bark off the log and left.

Glad that Calloway had been caught in his own trap, Allen cried, "Jesus Christ, Calloway Mullins, you like to get us both killed that time."

Some time after 1820, the exact date is undetermined, there was a phenomenal occurrence in the form of a total eclipse of the sun which caused

great fear and excitement. Chickens went to roost, the stars and moon came out, and the "stars began to fall." As Calloway, Polly, their children and Uncle Allen stood looking up into the heavens, Uncle Allen observed, "Keep your eye on that main fugerment (moon). If it falls, we're all gone to Hell and oblivion."

There was much wild game back then and often men in the area got together to go hunting. Uncle Allen usually went alone, but since his taste ran more to rabbit meat than venison, he brought home rabbits. As the men gathered in to cook the deer in big open kettles outside, Uncle Allen laid his whole skinned, cleaned rabbits on top of the stewing meat to cook. (The next part is hard to believe) but the story goes that as he ate, he also devoured the bones. He was reportedly a big man and maybe the meat cooked until the bones were tender. (I'm just telling the story).

Election day was an exciting time in those days, mainly because people usually got hurt, killed or drunk, sometimes all three though not necessarily in that order. Seldom did it fall that somebody got mad.

For years, Calloway's house was a polling place. Polly cooked up a big lot of food and served dinner to the voters for a quarter. One particular election, a man named Sid Azbill, who had a reputation for making and selling moonshine, came to vote, but he was late. Everyone else had eaten, but he paid his quarter and went inside to what was left. Sid reportedly had a "bad tongue" and feeling cheated spat his use of it. He came out into the yard where Polly was standing and said, "Pol, ain't nothin' in there to eat." She quickly retorted, "What's in there is plenty good enough for you, ole Sid Azbill."

He asked her to return his quarter and she refused. More words were no doubt exchanged, but before Sid walked

Sue Bennett College Receives Funds from Sears-Roebuck

Fashions For The Elderly

Today's "over-sixty" individuals can "look forward" not only to retirement but also to retaining their individuality through attractive, dress and personal appearance. You can enjoy color and fashion as much in your later years as you did at age 20. Clothing tastes and needs constantly change as people mature. But how they change depends on lifestyle, physical condition and all of the other personal characteristics that accompany each stage of life.

Until recently, it was assumed that when you reached age 50, you would don the "uniform" of the older person—drab colors and uninteresting designs and fabrics. It was also assumed that older people, both male and female, were not interested in clothing.

It is impossible to describe a "typical" elderly person, but

there are some physiological changes that create common characteristics in individuals as they reach the older years.

As muscles lose their tone and strength, the upper arms tend to become flabby, and abdominal curves become more evident. Such factors, plus a re-distribution of weight (arms and legs thinner, wastline thicker, hips larger) can increase the problem of finding ready-to-wear that fits comfortably and looks attractive.

Personal coloring changes are also a factor. In addition, pigmentation of the hair and skin becomes less intense, skin wrinkles develop and deepen, and hair becomes thinner. Such changes may also mean that some colors worn in the past no longer look attractive.

Many people find that they can attractively wear colors in their older years that they could not wear when they were younger. In addition, cosmetics, wigs and hairpieces help many older people achieve the special individual look they desire.

Fashions for the elderly need not be drab. The importance of lively colors-colors that reflect one's personality rather than the elderly stereotype.

away knowing he'd been had, he said, "Pol, I don't hate your head, I don't hate your legs, I don't hate your #s, I hate your black heart."

Sid was later charged with making moonshine and tried in "government court" out at London. A "big gang" went with him to try to help defend him or maybe just to see the event. The case was called with the usual

announcement, "The United States of America against Sid Azbill Whereupon Sid raised his hand up and yelled back, "That's too much agin' one man."

Sid had been housekeeping with an old woman who was also tried and convicted along with Sid. The pressure of the trial had no doubt caused the romance to cool because when they were both sentenced after being found "guilty," Sid nodded toward the woman and plead, "Send me to jail, but don't make me room with that SOB."

In the early 1870's, Calloway was "stobbed" in the kidney about a mile from the Saltpeper Cave. He and his boys were working near the Big Cave Spring clearing ground to build a house for Bagg, one of Calloway's sons. A bunch of drunks came by and a fight ensued. Bill Haley, from the head of Crooked Creek, was accused of stabbing Calloway. Later that day, Sheriff Ashlie Owens, Calloway's son-in-law, ran Haley into the Saltpeper Cave and killed him. Calloway lived a year or so after that, but died possibly of complications from the wound, reportedly in his 70's.

In the plans for Rockcastle County is bridge replacement at Roundstone Creek and L&N Railroad on Ky. 490, bridge replacement over Negro Creek on U.S. 150, 0.4 mile and 0.7 mile east of Ky. 1250 and bridge replacement at Big Hurricane Branch, 7.8 miles northeast of U.S. 150 on Ky. 1265.

Rockcastle's bridge replacements are expected to cost an estimated 1.7 million dollars.

Calling on the Name of the Lord

Frequently we hear someone say, "Just call on the name of the Lord and He will save you."
There is no question that one must call upon the Lord to be saved. Joel had prophesied of the time when men would "call on the name of the Lord" (Joel 2:32). Peter quoted this prophecy on the day of Pentecost and applied it to the Christian era (Acts 2:21). Paul used this idea in discussing the possibility of mankind's being saved (Rom. 10:13). The Corinthian Christians had called upon the name of the Lord Jesus Christ (1 Cor. 1:2).
The need of the hour is for all men to call upon the name of the Lord, but how does one call upon the Lord for salvation? This is not done by prayer; by crying "Lord, Lord." Jesus said, "...why call ye me Lord, Lord, and do not the things which I say?" (Lk. 6:46). Prayer is never given as a condition of salvation for the alien sinner in the New Testament. The way to answer this question is to look at Bible example of those who called upon the name of the Lord.
Peter had informed people on Pentecost to "call upon the name of the Lord" for salvation (Acts 2:21). They "called" by asking, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" (V. 37). Peter told them to repent and be baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ for the remission of sins" (V. 38). So when one calls on the Lord he is asking, "What must I do?" and then doing

what the Lord requires. When Saul of Tarsus was told by Ananias to "Arise, and be baptized and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord" (Acts 22:16), he had been praying and fasting (Acts 9:11). But he had not "called upon the name of the Lord" because he still had his sins! It was this very same man who said, "For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Rom. 10:13). We can be sure then that those who still have their sins have not called upon the name of the Lord by praying and/or fasting. Paul explains what he meant in Romans 10:13 by the following verses. Callers must hear, believe and obey the gospel. "How shall they call on him in whom they have not believed-heard?" (V. 14). "But they have not all obeyed the gospel" (V. 16). See Mark 16:16 also.
The Corinthians called upon the name of the Lord (1 Cor. 1:2). What had they done? "...and many of the Corinthians hearing, believed, and were baptized" (Acts 18:8). That is how they called upon the name of the Lord for salvation.
We must conclude that "calling upon the name of the Lord" and "obeying the gospel" are synonymous terms. Have you called upon the name of the Lord by obedience to his gospel? Now is the time! (2 Cor. 6:2).

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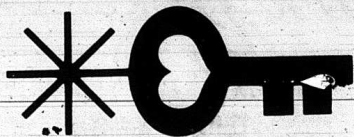
