## Windmill Project Sought By Judge-Executive

A federal grant for \$182,500, to fund an experimental alternative energy source, specifically, a windmill to generate electricity is being sought for Rockcastle County by Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker. The project, which was written up for the county in January of this year by Tri-County Community Development Agency of London, is a "long-shot" and has only a remote (51) chance of being funded, according to Jim Cass, head of the agency. Another spokesman for the agency said that by April they should have some information from the Housing and Urban Development headquarters in Atlanta (HUD) as to the status of the application, that is, whether it

has qualified for further examination by officials there.

According to Tri-County, the Engineering Department of The University of Kentucky has offered to provide technical assistance and engineering skills for a one-year period as well as an evaluation of the project.

A site for the windmill generator has not been definitely established as yet, but one of the sites under consideration is near the Senior Citizens building on the Brodhead Fairgrounds, according to Judge Thacker.

Kentucky Utilities has agreed, as is required by law, to buy from the county any excess power which the windmill generates but is not needed by the user.

 I would like to make one small correction in the article which appeared last week concerning the Ku Klux Klan. The person named Bob Adams was described as being the brother of "Devil" Bill Adams. This is not correct.

"Devil" Bill was the son of Feathergill Adams, born in Culpeper County, Virginia on February 4, 1755, the son of Absalom Adams and a Miss Feathergill. Feathergill was a Baptist minister and a wagoner in the Revolutionary War. He died in Garrard County on November 7, 1807 after having suffered a stroke while preaching in the Feathergill Adams meeting house. That church is now the Antioch Christian Church.  
 Feathergill and his wife, Elizabeth had eleven children: Nancy m. John Hutcherson, Margaret m. Beverly Joseph Brown, William ("Devil") Bill m. Rebecca Lawrence, Elizabeth m. Mr. Rugison, Virginia m. Nicholas Smith, Judith m. cousin Walter Adams, Absalom m.

Elizabeth Slayton, Mary m. cousin Reuben Adams, Katherine m. Thomas Brown, John m. Catherine Sampson and Martha m. John Radcliff.  
 "Devil" Bill died in 1847 and he and his brothers would have been too old for night riding after the Civil War.  
 I have no idea who Bob Adams was, but I would like to place him in anyone's hands.

Although the number of points scored by both teams during the half was of a considerable amount we were able to control the temp of the game somewhat against the fast-paced Patriots.

Both teams got off to a slow start, but Lincoln County did play well enough to increase their lead to 11 points. Although we had outbounded them 14:13 during the first half they took a decided advantage on the boards in this period. Trailing by 5 many at 15 points during the fourth stanza we were forced to get in more of a running game, but were not able to cut into the deficit any.

Last night we traveled to Williamsburg for a game with the Whitley Co. Colonels. The final score was 83-64 in favor of the home standing Colonels. At times this game was played very much like the previous game with Lincoln Co., although this game was played at a much faster pace from start to finish. During the first half of play we mounted leads of six and seven points on several occasions and had numerous opportunities to increase our lead. We could never get over the hump. We would miss an easy lay-in or make a careless turnover that repeatedly allowed Whitley Co. to cut into our lead, tie the score, and eventually go ahead by one at 35-34 at the half. Even so, we had played well during this time against the much quicker and faster Colonels. The third quarter saw us struggle on offense, partially because we got to standing and we did not attack their 3-2 zone very well. As the quarter came to a class we were trailing by a score of 60-46. During the fourth period we half court trapped and full court pressed, but to no avail. Even though Whitley Co. had outscored us in field goals by only 2 at 30-28 it was at the free throw line when they did most of their damage as they made good on 23 of 36 tries while we only made 8 of 16. 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

### Fundamentals of Chest Pass

The two-hand chest pass is probably the pass that is most used in basketball, although in recent years the overhead pass has seemed to take some precedence. To insure proper execution of the chest pass the following fundamentals must be followed:

- 1) Grip the ball firmly with both hands.
- 2) Place your hands on each side of the ball evenly.
- 3) Spread the fingers comfortably.
- 4) Bring the ball to the chest area.
- 5) Keep the ball in close to the body.
- 6) Keep the elbows in close to the body.
- 7) Step with either foot toward the man to whom you are passing.
- 8) Push the ball with your thumbs and fingers.
- 9) Turn the hands inside-out to insure proper follow through.
- 10) Aim the ball at the chest area of the man to whom you are passing.
- 11) Use the wrists upon release.
- 12) Let your legs help you when passing.

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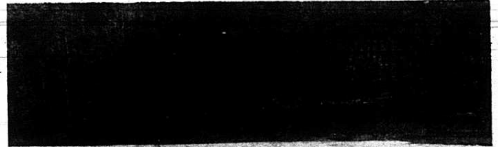

**MERINGUES**

No one knows which clever cook first discovered the wonderful results of whipping egg whites and then sweetening and stabilizing the airy mixture with sugar. We do know that the name, meringue, probably comes from the European town of Mehringhen, where a 16th century pastry chef created memorable desserts from those simple ingredients.

A meringue can do many things: top a pie, pudding or cake, swirl with nuts, dried fruits or coconut to become cookies or candies; lighten elegant fillings; smooth frozen desserts, even insulate ice cream for a trip to the freezer. Meringue beings with egg whites, which are liquid. As you beat the clear, almost opalescent liquid you incorporate air, first in large bubbles, then in countless tiny air cells. The liquid becomes a white foam increasing seven or eight times in volume!

Be sure beaters and bowls are sparkling clean and free from any fat. Use only metal or glass bowls; plastic bowls, even clean ones, can have a greasy film that can prevent foaming.

Separate the eggs carefully. Be sure not even a bit of yolk gets in with the whites because fat in the yolk can keep the foam from forming. Separate the eggs while they are cold.

Leg egg whites stand at room temperature for about half an hour after separating. They will whip to greater volume than if beaten when cold.

Add 1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar (or other acid ingredient as recipe directs) for each egg white before beating.

Beat with rotary beater, which or electric mixer at high speed just until foamy. Then gradually begin adding sugar, and whip to greater volume than if beaten when cold.

Check to be sure the sugar is dissolved by rubbing a bit of meringue between your thumb and forefinger. If you can still feel sugar crystals, beat some more.

Soft peaks are mountains of meringue that come up as you lift the beaters and then fold over at the tips.

Stiff peaks are mountains whose peaks remain upright after you lift the beaters away.

Choose a dry, not humid, day to make meringue. Because of the high sugar content it can absorb moisture from the air and become limp and sticky. Microwave Meringues You can microwave soft meringues on top of pies or puddings. Microcook about one minute on full power for each egg white. Meringue is done when point of knife inserted horizontally into the side comes out clean. Hard meringues don't work in a microwave because they will not dry and become crisp as in a conventional oven.

**Cherries in the Snow.**

6 egg whites  
1/2 cup cream of tartar  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1-1/2 cups sugar  
1 tsp. vanilla  
Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Beat together first three ingredients until foamy. Add sugar gradually and beat until stiff peaks form. Add vanilla. Spread in buttered and floured 13x9 inch pan. Place pan in oven, turn off heat and leave in oven overnight. Use following topping:

**Topping**

1-6 oz. pkg. cream cheese  
1 cup sugar  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 pint whipping cream  
2 cups miniature marshmallows  
1-1/2 oz. can cherry pie filling  
1/2 cup cream together cheese, sugar and vanilla. Whip cream and add to cheese mixture. Fold in marshmallows. Spread over meringue. Refrigerate several hours (approx. 6). Top with cherry pie filling. Yield: 10-12 servings.
