One hundred percent of those re-sponding favored increased Medicaid expenditures for the elderiv





Jesus calls us to serve Him now in, in this life, even though doing so may not be easy.


Jesus said, "Whoever does not take up his cross and follow in my steps is not fit to be my disciple."
