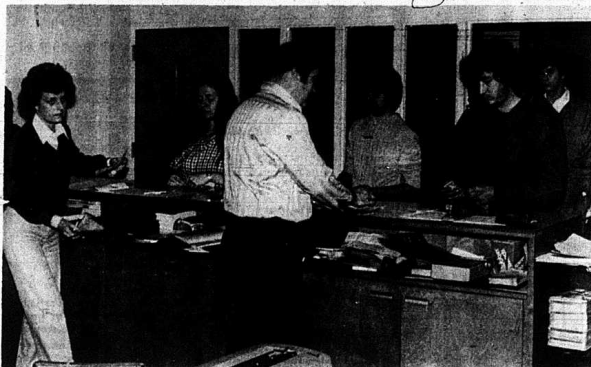

The County Court Clerk's office has been plenty busy lately issuing licenses. Saturday, the last day of February, the line of license buyers extended down the front courthouse steps and for awhile Monday, the line reached back to the judges office. According to Mrs. Bales, County Court Clerk, the

effort to stagger licenses buying has not had time to help the March 1st deadline rush since the cycle of buying has not yet run its full course. The Clerk and deputies sold about 3,000 licenses in February. Saturday and part of the day Monday, they averaged 100 sales per hour.

Board Discusses Drug Policy With Guests and School Officials

The Rockcastle Board of Education met Tuesday night and after acting on several items of business discussed with five guests present the drug policy at the high school and the drug problem in general. The guests included two representatives of RCHS, assistant principal, Ronnie Cash and coach-teacher, Preston Parrett.

Mr. Charles Parsons, school superintendent, said that the drug problem is a concern of everyone and especially concerns all school officials and personnel. He said that he had made numerous trips to the high school to stress his concern to Mr. Cleston Saylor, principal and said that he is convinced that Mr. Saylor, the teachers and staff are making every effort possible to monitor student activities relating to the use of drugs during school hours and on school property.

board's policy of "no loitering" on school property adopted last year and with the help of city police in enforcing the policy this year that school officials had been fairly successful this year in keeping non-students off school property and off parking lots during school hours.

The drug policy discussed at the meeting for the high school is as follows:

- 1) A teacher is assigned to each restroom during breaks.
- 2) A principal is assigned to each smoke break, students are required to smoke in a designated area.

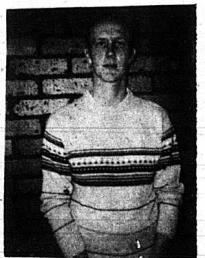


Bradley is Candidate

Supreme Court to Decide Dispute Between Dept. of Revenue-PVAs

The bitter battle between the Department of Revenue in Frankfort and the 120 county Property Valuation Administrators scattered over Kentucky is expected to be settled by the State Supreme Court in a hearing scheduled for April 8th. The case, The Department of Revenue v. Butler, was initiated by Robert Alphin, revenue commissioner, against Robert Butler, Jr., Jefferson Co. PVA. The (Cont'd to P-11)

case was lost by the department in both the Franklin Circuit Court and the Ky. Court of Appeals. The PVA's claim the state is trying to take over their territory and ultimately take taxing authority away from local elected representatives.  After reading the report on

county garbage collection, I wonder if your computer is broke. A contract for \$19,300 a year, then it ends with \$52,000, almost 3 times the original contract.

The new administration has a new man Samuel Pierce. Will that balance when it goes through his computer? He is head of HUD and Revenue Sharing. He may cut Thacker project off. Mt. Vernon and Livingston has their own garbage pickup for the county dump. Most of Livingston goes in the dumpster on 490. What that don't hold goes on the ground which is pushed over the River bank with a bulldozer and Livingston gets their water 1/2 mile below. Rockcastle hauls a lot of garbage from Laurel and Jackson Counties. A truck load of old tires and a garbage load was dumped in and around the dumpster. The boxes had Carpenter's Garage, Annville, Ky. on them.

I see by the paper where we are going to get a new wind mill electric company. They Dutch wind mills is as old as the Pony Express. When the wind blows they pump water in a holding tank at a stock barn. If it was feasible, some electric company would have had it in operation long ago. It is not the good I can do for the community, it is the Revenue Sharing I am after.

To paraphrase Mark Twain: I wonder if this will ally the kind concern by most and, perhaps, disappoint a select few.

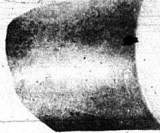

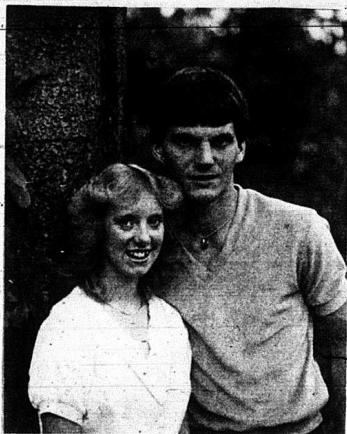

things. The pamphlet was published by the Home Service Department of the East Ohio Gas Company in 1938 and provided a weekly menu for a family of four at a total cost of \$4.00 a week.

A sample of the menu goes like this:

Monday—Breakfast—Creamed eggs, Scotch scones, coffee and milk. Dinner—Swedish meatballs, potatoes and deep dish apple pie. Total cost—56c.

Saturday—Breakfast—Stewed apples, french toast and coffee. Dinner—Toast Callops (made from hamburger), mashed potatoes and canned pineapple. Total cost—48c.

If dinner was served at noon there was no supper. If dinner was served at night, then there was no lunch. This menu might seem a bit skimpy by today's standards, but one could "get by" on it whether in 1938 or 1982.

Noticeably absent from the menus were green vegetables with the exception of one day when green cabbage was listed. Potatoes were listed for every dinner meal and, in most instances, were the only vegetable served.

Even more interesting was a listing of ingredients required and the cost of each at prevailing prices. According to Paul Harvey, noted present-day commentator, grocery prices have more than doubled in the last eight years and, as you can see from the following prices, they have doubled several times dur-

ing the 40 plus years since 1938.

Eggs, 1 dozen, 29c; coffee, 1 lb., 21c; sugar, 5 lbs., 25c; top round steak, 1 lb., 35c; hamburger, 1 lb., 19c; apples, 3 lbs., 11c; potatoes, 5 lbs., 10c; onions, 1 lb., 6c; flour, 5 lbs., 30c; 3 cans tomatoes, 20c and evaporated milk, 8c.

We must remember that there were depression prices. The U.S. had not yet joined the Second World War and there were many people out of work. There were no unemployment checks, social security was in its infancy and welfare checks and food stamps had not been heard of.

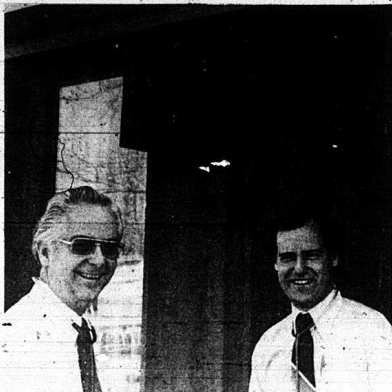

office and that they would make the decision as to whether to present the evidence to the grand jury and seek indictments.

LOCAL NURSING HOMES GIVEN HIGH MARKS

Relatives of patients in Rockcastle County nursing homes give high marks for the quality of care the homes provide, according to a survey conducted by the Kentucky Association of Health Care Facil-

ities. Based on a 1 (poor) to 5 (excellent) scale, the overall average score for the quality of services in Rockcastle County was 4.7.

The Average score for specific services were:

Nursing care: 4.7; Personal attention and staff involvement: 4.7; Activities program: 4.4; Dietary services: 4.6; House-keeping: 4.7.

The surveys were distributed to relatives of each patient earlier this year. Relatives were not asked to identify themselves or the name of the patient.

In addition to the five questions about quality of care, relatives also were asked whether or not they supported increased Medicaid support from state and federal agencies. One hundred percent of those responding favored increased Medicaid expenditures for the elderly.

Many relatives chose to explain their ranking with additional comments.

Typical of Rockcastle County residents was the comment by one whose 80-year-old mot-

her has been in a local nursing home for the past year and a half.

"Mother gets excellent care," the person wrote. "The staff really seems to care. They are understanding and patient in all their dealings with patients and relatives."

The grandson of a 98-year-old patient said he could not ask for better care.

"The staff does everything possible to make each patient happy and content," he wrote.

KAHCF conducted the survey in each county in Kentucky with nursing homes that belong to the association. KAHCF President David Wren said the surveys helped the association assess how relatives of patients perceive the quality of care provided in each home.

"We are alarmed by proposals by the Kentucky Department for Human Resources (DHR) to reduce the scope of the state's Medicaid program," he

said. "The survey is really a report card from people who spend enough time in nursing homes to see and appreciate the quality of care we're able to provide."

Mr. Wren said the quality of care in nursing homes is threatened by the proposal from DHR.

"Patient care is bound to suffer because forty percent of participating facilities will receive less than the cost of providing for Medicaid services if the current reductions are put into effect," he said.

He also said one proposal limiting each facility to 80.1 percent Medicaid patients is unworkable.

"The surveys show that families are very concerned about the distances they would have to travel to visit their relatives if this proposal is adopted."

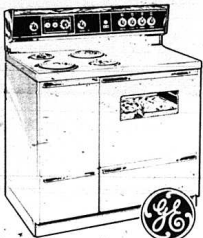

Six From Here Pass PVA Exam; One Files

A record number of persons took the state examination to qualify as candidates for property valuation administrator in their home counties in the May 26 primary elections. Revenue Commissioner Robert H. Allphin announced last week.

Allphin said 353 persons passed the test out of the 496 who took it last week, for a pass ratio of 71 percent. Four years ago, 282 out of 397 who took the examination passed it, a pass ratio of 66 percent.

Those from Rockcastle County passing the test were: Earl Cummins, Clarence Hasty, Jr., Harry Elmer Hale, Errel Cromer, Deborah Reynolds and Joseph Lambert. Thus far, only one, Harry (Elmer) Hale, has filed as a candidate for the office of PVA.

Passing the test does not mean a person automatically will be a candidate for property valuation administrator. In past years, several persons who qualified on the examination did not file to run in the primary. The filing deadline this year is April 1st.

At least one person qualified in all but 11 counties, compared to 23 counties in 1977. The 11 counties where no one qualified this year are Anderson, Bath, Breathitt, Campbell, Clay, Estill, Lee, Leslie, Union, Webster and Wolfe.

A second test will be given for prospective candidates from these counties only on March 13 and 14. State law requires that the test be given a second time for prospective candidates from those counties in which no one passed the examination on the

first round.

Incumbent property valuation administrators are not required to take the examination to run for reelection.

The second examination will be given by the Department of Revenue with the assistance of the State Department of Personnel at five test sites. Tag test sites, as required by law, are located within the Congressional districts which contain at least one county where no one passed the test last week.

By Congressional district, the times and places for the second test are:

First District-Hopkinsville, Department of Revenue District Office, Hammond Plaza, March 13, 9 a.m.

Second District-Owensboro, Department of Revenue District Office, 311 W. 2nd Street, March 13, 1 p.m.

Fifth District-Middlesboro, Middlesboro High School Library, W. Cumberland Ave., March 14, 9 a.m.

Sixth District-Frankfort, Ky. Room C-3, First Floor, Capitol Annex, March 13, 9 a.m.

Seventh District-Pikeville, Pikeville High School, 116 N. Mayo Trail, Room 215, March 14, 9 a.m.

Prospective candidates are encouraged, but not required, to take the test at the test site in their respective Congressional district. The second test will be open only to residents of the 11 counties where no one qualified. Persons from these counties who failed the first test, as well as other prospective candidates from those counties, may take the second test.

Effort to Remove "Sexist Language" From the Bible

3) All teachers are alerted to be on the look-out for any abuse of drugs or alcohol and required to report such to the principal.

4. The principal follows up on each clue or rumor.

All students excused by the principal's office for clearance. Only one student at a time is permitted in the restroom unless a teacher is there.

Any student on prescribed medicine must report same to the principal.

Any student caught with drugs is expelled 20 school days on first offense and for the semester on the second offense.

8. Any student caught selling or "pushing" drugs is expelled permanently.

9. All students are taught the ill effects of drugs in the drug education program at the schools.

10. Teachers are given proper in-service on drug education.

After discussion by the group of the policy, superin-

tendent Parsons with the full approval of the board said that he would encourage all principals to schedule a drug education assembly at which parents would be encouraged to attend. The assemblies would be geared to educating students as to the possible damaging physical and psychological problems caused by drug use.

Mr. Parsons further stated that he had worked with elementary teachers who had formulated a drug education unit to be taught at various times throughout the year in the elementary grades. The board voted to advertise and accept bids for the fall: backstop and fence for the baseball field at RCHS, labor and materials for upgrading the fire department plant at Brodhead, Livingston and Roundstone schools and fire and extended coverage insurance on school buildings. They also accepted lump-sum bids for food bids and employed Congleton-Morris Engineers of Lexington to prepare plans and specifications on the fire alarm upgrading project.

The board approved the issuance of applications to all certified personnel for next year. Mr. Parsons said that he hoped reduction in staff if needed would be taken care of by teachers retiring.

G.E.D. Certificates were approved for Leda Gail Mason, Charles Legier, Dennis Marier and James Mason were hired as substitute bus drivers.

will loose control and authority over PVA's.

The problem seemingly began when Alphin required PVA's to boost their assessment levels to 90-95% of full evaluation in order to achieve some measure of equalization. The problem grew when the department drug it felt on certifying many counties' reports for various and undefined reasons.

The Department of R.v. enue fears that a court victory for PVA's would allow them to get away with under assessing property and overwhelm the department's ability to seek equalization.

In an article in last Sunday's Courier Journal, Rockcastle County was shown to have, by far, the highest percentage of full cash value of assessed property in all three categories: residential, farm and commercial of any county in the State. Rockcastle's residential property was listed at 159% of the full cash value, farm property was at 134% and commercial property at 158% of the full cash value. Rockcastle is the only county whose ratio is under review or investigation by the Department of Revenue, according to the article. No one is sure just what all this means or if the findings of the investigation will make any difference in future assessments.

BIRMINGHAM — There's always that chance. It will be an upset if any team other than L.S.U., Kentucky or Tennessee wins the Southeastern Conference tournament here this week but there is always that chance.

Any team that wins here automatically qualifies for the N.C.A.A. tournament. Kentucky, L.S.U. and Tennessee appear to already be shoo-ins for an invitation to the post-season classic but the action this week is important to them too.

Kentucky's junior forward, Chuck Verderber, has played in both S.E.C. tournaments since the post-season meet was reinstated after an absence of 28 years.

"It's important to be playing well by now," says Chuck. "We didn't go very far in the N.I.T. or the N.C.A.A. the past two years, even though we were runners-up in the S.E.C. both times. We need to win it this year and be on a peak next week."

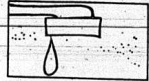

Persistent Detective Work Helps Men Recover Truck

During the early morning hours of January 20th, a truck belonging to Jerry Carter and Roger Parsons was stolen from the parking lot of the Kiwi Drive-In Restaurant at Renfro Valley.

The theft was discovered about noon and reported to the state police who took the necessary information and told the owners that they would enter the data on a national crime computer, a method by which many stolen items are recovered. Due to the fact that the theft occurred during a time when a transfer of detectives was taking place in Rockcastle County and no detective was specifically assigned to this county, the investigation seemed to be lagging.

Having a personal interest in the case, the owners decided to become do-it-yourself detectives. They began at the scene of the crime and asked questions of possible witnesses at a nearby service station where they received a lead to two fellows who had made a phone call to Pulaski County from the station.

After checking with the phone company which refused to release any information about the call, they obtained a court order from trial commissioner Robert Robinson and got the requested information. From this information they got a warrant for questioning one of the suspects who stated that he saw the truck near a strip mine, accepted a ride from someone who picked him up in the truck. The companion's name was learned and a warrant was issued for his arrest, but still Carter and Parsons had failed to locate their truck.

On Feb. 20th one month after the theft a bulldozer operator found the truck near a strip mine pit in Pulaski County and reported it to the Sheriff.

The truck, which the owners had used in a water delivery service, had been stripped of the back wheels valued at about \$1,000, a 3 1/2 horse power water pump, worth about \$350, two booms, 2 chains and some spark plug wires. After finding the truck, it took 4 hours working with a wrecker and a 4-wheel drive to get it out of the location it had been left in.

As luck would have it these amateur private eyes tracked

down the wheels and spark plug wires in a service station in Somerset. According to Carter, the Pulaski County attorney refused to issue them a search warrant for the service station because they were "civilians". The Pulaski Sheriff refused to sign the search warrant, so the detectives went without search warrant and recovered their tires which the station owner said he had bought for \$75.00.

Parsons and Carter felt that the truck would have been further stripped if the weather had been good, but there again luck was on their side, however I doubt seriously if they would admit to feeling very lucky about the whole ordeal. True, the truck, a Chevrolet converted to run on propane gas and valued at around \$5,000, was recovered, but Carter estimated the phone bill to be at least \$100, a wrecker bill of \$200 plus time spent and travel expense in investigating and unrecovered parts not to mention business lost during the time.

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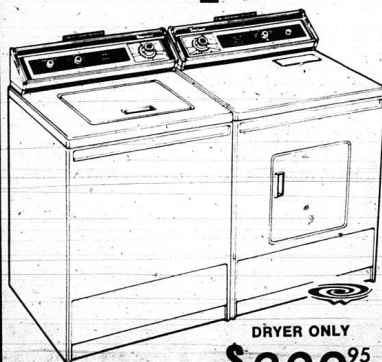

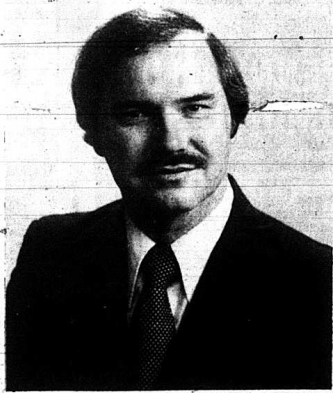
Jesus calls us to serve Him now in, in this life, even though doing so may not be easy.
