Judge Assures That the County Will Provide

Ambulance Service if CETA Funds are Cut

In Rockcastle, hardest hit by Reagan's proposed abolishment of the Comprehensive Education and Training Act CETA would be the ambulance service. Of the county's 15 CETA workers, 9 are ambulance drivers, 4 are part of the road maintenance crew, 1 is an aide at the Brodhead Senior Citizens' Center and 1 is a community health worker for Home Health. The fiscal year for most federal revenue usually runs from October 1 through September 30 and informed sources say that that will be the end of federal grants to pay CETA salaries however, according to

Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker and his secretary Anna Rose Mullins, no official word has been sent out to them concerning a cut-off date. The CETA program emerged from the Emergency Employment Act (EEA) and came about around 1974 and in Kentucky now provides some 4970 persons with training, a job and income. The period anyone is allowed to remain in the program is 18 months, unless a waiver is obtained through Frankfort and Atlanta. Some of the local ambulance drivers terms have been extended a few months through such a waiver. According to Mrs. Mullins all

the ambulance drivers have been training to become Emergency Medical Technicians. The ambulance vehicles and the building were paid for with revenue sharing and grants and so far the service has been able to operate in the black with the use of CETA drivers. The major expenses of the ambulance service include gasoline, labor and parts, equipment, property maintenance and one-time bookkeeper. The basic cost to the client of an ambulance run is \$25.00 plus \$1.00 per loaded mile plus extra equipment use. According to Mrs. Mullins this rate is low compared to other rates in the

First Blood Drive of the Year

On Tuesday, March 10, 1981, the Rockcastle Homemakers held their first blood drive of 1981 at the Bank of Mt. Vernon, at which 50 pints were donated. The 1981 goal for Rockcastle County has remained unchanged over the past few years and is still 195 pints. When this goal is obtained, as it was last year, then every person in the county would be assured that blood would be available to them anywhere in the United States without having to pay replacement deposit fees on

each pint used. Rockcastle County Homemakers coordinate three blood drives a year with the Central Kentucky Blood Center in Kentucky with the next two being on July 21st and November 17th. These blood drives must average almost 73 pints per drive so that Rockcastle County can maintain this coverage in 1982. The homemakers hope that people will mark these dates on their calendars with a big red pen so that they will remember that they will be helping to save

Forest Fires

Bullens Cautions

So far this year there have been 36 fires which burned over 800 acres in Rockcastle County, according to Steve Bullen of the forestry service. Twenty four were forest fires and 12 were grass fires. The latest fires were March 21st on Paul McNew's and Pauline Mullins' property between Mt. Vernon and Livingston where about 50 acres was burned over. The fire was set in two places. Later the same day a fire was set at Mullins Station where 3 1/2 acres and an old house were burned. According to Bullens two cases of arson are scheduled to go before the grand jury this term. Sixteen of the 36 fires were attributed to arson, about one third to debris burning which got out of hand and the rest to such things as equipment and cigarettes thrown out along the Interstate. Bullens warned people to be extra careful because it is the dangerous season for fires.

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Accident on I-75

Jewell Jones, 47 and Kathy Jones, 16, both of Manchester, Ky. were injured and taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital as a result of an accident on I-75 north of Mt. Vernon. State Police, Jack Lawless, reported that the driver of the car, Sheila Jarvis, 20, also of Manchester, apparently lost control of the car on the icy pavement, overturned and struck an earth embankment. The one vehicle accident happened March 19th about 7:20 a.m.

Health Board Approves Renovation of Building

In an early morning meeting Thursday, the local health department voted to proceed with full renovation plans on the Diner Bell building. The Fiscal Court has plans to purchase (with Area Development Funds derived from Coal Severance Tax Monies) the building and allow the health department to relocate there.

Two options for renovation had been submitted for the board's consideration at a previous meeting. One was to renovate part of the building at a cost of \$67,582 and the second option, which the board agreed to Thursday was to renovate the whole building at an estimated cost of not more than \$79,634.

The board turned down a proposal to build a new structure on county owned land. Steve Midkiff, acting administrator of the department, presented an estimate of \$64,950 from a construction company of Somerset to build a metal and brick structure with the required floor space.

According to Midkiff none of the board members showed any enthusiasm for the idea of

the county health department merging with adjoining counties to form a regional organization, however, plans were made to meet again early Thursday morning (today) and discuss alternatives. The state has threatened to cut off funds in an effort to force local health departments to reorganize in favor of regions.

Across the state local health departments are fuming about the proposed change mainly because, Midkiff says, the change would likely mean loss of local control since theoretically each county would be allowed a basic number of board members on a regional board with the rest assigned according to population.

There was some discussion at the meeting of filing suit against the state on the grounds that funds were being withheld and health departments were being forced to merge by the Bureau for Health Services. Without legislative authority. However, as was pointed out, a suit takes time and the local departments feel they cannot afford imminent threat of cuts in state revenue.

Deborah Witt Featured on Telethon

August 4, 1980, Deborah Witt, 20, was traveling on Hwy. 461 from Mt. Vernon to a job in Somerset when her car, her grandfather's Pinto, struck a rough place in the pavement and left the road. The car crossed the other traffic lane, dove into a field and hit a telephone pole. Sometime during the split-second sequence of the accident the windshield popped out of the car and Deborah was thrown through the opening.

She says she remembers the sensation of her body somersaulting in the air before she hit a barbed wire fence. Deborah, who was conscious during the whole ordeal said that someone stopped to help about 5 minutes later and when she heard them ask for wire cutters she thought she must be still in the car because she couldn't see it. The only thing she could move were her face muscles.

About 45 minutes later an ambulance arrived and took her to the Lake Cumberland Medical Center where she was immediately transferred to the UK Medical Center in Lexington.

She was given a Tylenol for pain and did not have surgery until her condition stabilized about a week later. She learned later that doctors had given her only 3 hours to live when she first arrived at the Lexington hospital. Deborah's neck was broken in three places and surgery was required to take a portion of her rib bone to fuse to bones in her neck to give her head support.

Even though light in the

room was bright when she was in the Intensive Care Unit, Deborah remembers everything as looking "dark" and the people who came to see her looked "pale and sickly" to her. Her physical discomfort was mainly throbbing pain over her entire body and the sensation that her arms, which lay at her sides were tied behind her back.

For awhile no one would tell Deborah that she was going

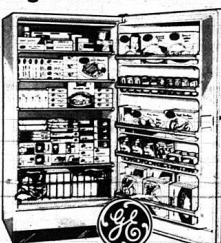

other 7 eastern counties in our ADD region. Laurel County Ambulance Service, for example, charges \$60 per run plus \$1.50 per loaded mile.

Like the surrounding counties, Rockcastle Ambulance Service falls far short of collecting for all its runs. According to Williametta Cromer, bookkeeper, if it weren't for medicare and Medicaid payments for runs the service would not be able to operate in the black even with CETA drivers.

Judge Thacker believes that only part of the CETA program will be cut out, specifically Title VI. The program is funded through Title II and VI. When asked about financial support for the ambulance service were the county to lose its present set-up, Thacker said that the county would be getting no insurance and minimal tax monies and he doesn't expect revenue sharing to be abolished or cut. The ambulance service was previously subsidized in part by county revenue sharing money.

The judge further stated that the county would provide an ambulance service and that there was no threat of being without such a service.

The Sweet Sixteen Revisited

LEXINGTON — I had forgotten what a big show it really is. Other commitments had kept me away from the Kentucky High School Basketball Tournament for a couple of years. I was there last week and it was a grand old time.

The college tournaments just have never captured the same atmosphere. College crowds are usually divided into groups that support one team at the "Sweet Sixteen" when a team loses, that club's supporters just switch their loyalty to another team. The underdog picks up most of the support as the tournament goes along.

The college cheering sections don't have anything about enthusiasm from the high school groups. At the State Tournament the bands played and the cheerleaders gave their last full measure to encourage the home team. One coach I noticed during a game, signaled the cheerleaders to turn it on as his team was locked in a close game. It didn't work. The team lost.

Two things came to mind as I watched the games. Sweatbands have never been so popular and the high scoring stars seldom bother with defense.

Sweatbands are those terry cloth bands the players wear around their wrists. They were usually in the school colors and apparently they've become as much a part of the uniform as the jersey.

College coaches have moaned for years that incoming freshmen haven't bothered to play defense in high school. I saw that. But remember, the colleges recruit the high school stars and the high school coach doesn't want his star fouling out by playing too aggressively on defense.

Winning the State Tournament is the highest honor that can come to a Kentucky high school team. Just getting there is difficult. There wasn't just one winner in Lexington last week, there were 16.

to be a quadriplegic, but one day she asked a nurse if she would be paralyzed. Without consulting a doctor, the nurse said, "Yes". Deborah says that she simply did not believe the nurse. She said, "If I had, I probably would have gone into shock and died."

For a long time after the initial diagnosis of paralysis, she had faith that she would walk and even after the realization finally began to sink in, she remained emotionally strong and positive.

During the five long months of rehabilitation and therapy at Cardinal Hill Hospital, Deborah's determined and positive spirit has netted her special recognition and her accomplishments have surprised even her doctors.

Deborah, a 1979 RCHS graduate, had taken vocational studies and had chosen a career in accounting and bookkeeping before her accident. Her main

concerns during her rehabilitation centered around regaining some of her clerical skills.

Her doctors, she says, did not expect her to get any muscle use back and so it came as a major shock to them that she has gotten back both her upper biceps and her left wrist, which has enabled her to type on an electric typewriter. (She has a special made one ordered which has several extra features to make her using it easier.)

Not only has she learned to type, using a pencil fixed in her hand, her finger muscles are not strong enough but Deborah can type 31 words a minute which sets a record for a quadriplegic.

Also, by using an arched splint, which she can put on herself when it is on a table top, she can write. She says that she can write numbers better than letters probably because she was "more worried about writing numbers". Again, specialist did not think she would be able to write small letters and num-

bers (the kind needed for ledger sheets), but again she fooled the experts.

With her adapted skills Deborah plans to put her ability to use by setting up and keeping her father's business records. Her father, Hewitt Witt, runs a body shop near their home.

Deborah had enjoyed knitting before her injury and while a Cardinal Hill decided to try, but was told that she probably would not be able to achieve this goal. Although it takes lots of effort, she invented her own method, she says, just to prove she could.

Something else which Deborah has learned to do for recreation and has improved her skill at is pool. When she began playing she could hit the ball only 5 or 6 inches, but now she can knock it all the way across the table. She says that this also takes lots of effort and "sweat".

Through her keen intelligence and exceptional spunk Deborah has made outstanding achievements and gained the admiration of the staff at Cardinal Hill. She will be featured on a film about Cardinal Hill Hospital this weekend on Channel 27 during the Telethon. Keith Ward filmed the story about Deborah and it will be aired Sunday, March 29 at 10:15 a.m. She is also featured in a Carolina Hill magazine published recently.

Deborah said that she saw people, young and old, at the hospital give up in defeat at the long struggle back from a crippling injury. Her mom says that she has bad days and good days to which Deborah quickly adds, "Everybody has good days and bad days."

One thing important to Deborah's well-being is the necessity of having someone move her legs and exercise muscles which would die without regular movement. She also has an attendant who is hired by the Bureau of Rehabilitation Services. Her attendant is her close friend and classmate, Ivy Singleton, of Livingston. Ivy helps Deborah's mother attend to her special needs and enriches her social life.

Plans are underway for a

Gospel Sing possibly to be held at the Barn at Renfro, the proceeds of which will go to Deborah.

The Witts have three other children, Gregory 18, Sherry 17 and Frances 12.

(According to Deborah's mother, the Highway crew fixed the rough pavement that caused Deborah to lose control the day after the accident.)

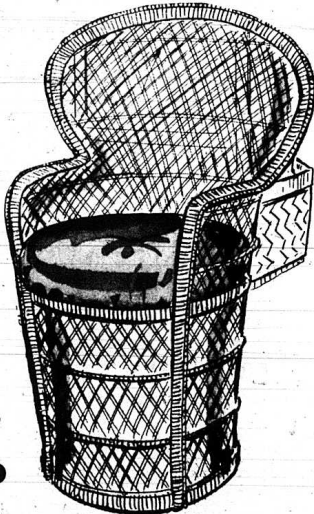

KU Asks for 12.4% Increase

Kentucky Utilities Company today filed retail electric rates with the Kentucky Public Service Commission seeking a 12.4% increase, or \$39.3 million, in annual revenues. William B. Bechannan, Company president, announced that KU also requested an immediate interim increase of \$29.2 million, which is three-fourths of the full amount.

The increase would amount to \$3.29 monthly for a typical residential customer without electric heating who uses 616 kilowatt hours (kwh) per month. The bill of a typical all-electric residential customer using 1,513 monthly would increase \$9.32 per month.

"We sympathize with our customers' frustrations over rising electric costs," Bechannan

said. "Our employees are working hard to hold down costs, and we are pleased that our rates are well below the national average, even with the proposed increase."

KU's president said that inflationary pressures, rising labor and material costs, and increased debt and other capital requirements required KU to seek rate relief now. "We will continue working to keep expenses as low as possible, but it is inevitable that these costs will continue to rise," Bechannan noted.

"The Company's earnings dropped from \$2.60 per common share in 1979 to \$1.51 in 1980," he commented. "Inadequate earnings have impaired our Company's credit and operations, and will continue to deteriorate unless we receive a favorable response to our interim request."

KU's current rates were approved last October, when a 9.4% increase was granted, and are based on the cost of operations during the 12 months ended January 31, 1980.

"In spite of operating economies and efficiencies, costs have risen substantially since then," Bechannan said. "Present rates do not produce sufficient revenue to meet current or future financial obligations and to maintain dependable service to our customers."

He outlined three examples of increased costs:

- ...construction expenditures to meet projected customer needs will total \$635 million for the five years, 1981 through 1985. This will require substantial new capital at sharply increasing costs which will include \$108 million in debt and equity securities scheduled during 1981.
- ...environmental costs totaled about \$93 million through 1980, and by the end of 1985 KU projects expenditures will total \$150 million for protecting the environment.
- ...the cost of borrowing money has risen enormously. In January, 1980, the average cost of long-term debt (the amount paid to bondholders) was 9.16%. By the end of the year, it had risen to 9.62%. The average interest rate on KU's short-term borrowings rose from 13.24% to 19.25% during the same period.

"This means, of course, that we must have adequate revenue to meet these increased debt payments and adequate rates to bring in that revenue," Bechannan said. "Unless the Company obtains immediate interim rate relief, it could lose its credit ratings, forcing our customers to pay excessive financing costs required to continue necessary construction."

Bechannan explained that adequate rates translate into a long-term benefit by enabling the Company to borrow at the best available interest rates and attract investors on favorable terms. In the long run, this benefits customers by keeping rates as low as possible, Bechannan concluded.

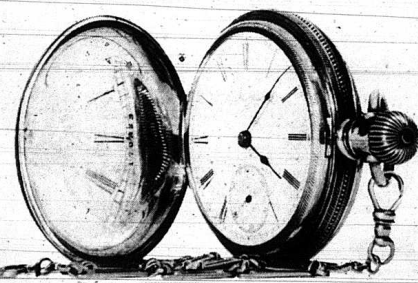

Holbrooks' Underground Home on Lake Providing Unique Pleasure for Family

John E. Holbrook admits that he is more pleased than he expected to be with the underground home he and his wife, Faye, have built on the shores of Lake Linville.

One of the things that makes the house so nice, is that it is warm. John says that it is the first time he's been warm in years. The only source of heat is a large wood burning stove made by Paul Cash. There is no fan or duct work connected to the stove; however, it sits in the corner of two thick concrete walls which absorb, hold and radiate the heat to other parts of the house. According to John, when the temperature outside gets above 45, there is no need for heat inside. The stove is usually fed only once or twice a day. No air conditioning is

planned, however, an air-circulating fan is being installed to keep down humidity in the summer months.

The main construction difference in this and the average home is the 8" thick walls and the 10" thick ceiling necessary for support. Covering all the outside walls and the roof is 2" of insulation. Three feet of dirt covers the roof. Surprisingly the house doesn't seem dark or damp or any of the things usually associated with being below ground and use only problem with moisture has been on the front wall which faces the sun. Condensation has occurred in this corner where the warm and cold air meet but with a little insulation, John expects to remedy this.

Several years ago the Hol-

brooks began considering the underground home as a unique approach to "beating the heating" costs of maintaining a home. He says that his wife did not think much of the idea at first, but after they began researching and attending displays, she gradually became accepting of the project. The plans, which include a sewing room, living room, dining room, kitchen, 4 bedrooms, two baths, a bath-utility and a two car garage, came from Davis Caves and Earth Sheltered Homes of Chicago who helped with the special engineering problems of construction. There is about 2500 square feet of floor space in the house which was built at an approximate cost of \$35.00 per square foot, probably a little below the average be-

cause they did much of the finish work themselves.

Excavation began in 1978, construction began in the spring of 1979 and, according to John, finishing touches will probably take until the fall of 1981.

Gardening in Limited Space Areas

So you'd like to have a garden, but don't have the space or the right kind of soil. That's really no problem. With a little effort and some ingenuity a "green thumb" ability can be demonstrated that the individual never realized existed. You simply start gardening in what is described as a "raised bed" or in a container.

There are soils, such as heavy clay soil, that are hard to manage in developing a garden. Good drainage is really important. Plant roots can't develop without a constant supply of oxygen and constant removal of carbon dioxide. In soil, water replaces air, and if the water doesn't move through quickly, roots may suffocate.

If you have "impossible soil" the best advice is to rebuild the soil or just start from scratch with new soil in a "raised garden" or in containers.

Rebuilding soil takes a long time. Organic material and lots of it must be added to soils that are too heavy. Compost, manure, aged sawdust, or ground bark added to clay soils make them more mellow and easier to work. Add the organic material until at least a third of the final soil mix is organic matter.

So a person who wants to make a garden could well use the raised bed or container method, if a small garden is the goal.

Raised beds have been around for a long time and simply allow above-the-soil planting. Raised soils can be framed and held in place by stones, railroad ties, logs, lumber, brick and concrete blocks of a variety of dimensions. If lum-

ber is used, it is best to use pressure-treated lumber that will resist decay and will last longer.

A raised garden speeds up spring planting. In a wet, cool spring, the soil in a raised bed will warm up and be ready for planting weeks before regular garden soils can be planted.

With soil above ground level, there is never too much rain, for drainage away from the bed is possible. Unless the soil around the bed is flooded, the raised bed will never be waterlogged.

Another advantage is that a person doesn't have to kneel or "bend double" with a raised garden. You sit on the edge of the raised beds when weeding, and unless the dimensions are too large, cultivating can be done with a putty knife instead of a hoe.

A raised bed can be an attractive element in all four seasons. The color of flowers and vegetables comes and goes with the seasons and in a raised bed there is a resulting order to the garden in every season.

Unless you have a lot of "specialty gardeners" herb gardeners, collectors of miniatures in bulbs and flowers, cactus or whatever the specialty gardeners appreciate the restraint and the "close-to-eye-level" of the raised beds.

Where space is really limited, container gardens are the answer. Almost anything will grow in a container as long as drainage holes are provided and good loose soil is used in the container. Container gardens are excellent for patios and apartments.

Soil Conservation District News

By Roy G. Brown

The year of 1981 is moving

along at a very rapid rate. Plans should already have been made for our farming program.

Every acre of our farms should be planned for its most productive use. Whether it be cropland or woodland, most of our woodland is a very important part of our farming. It needs careful cleaning out of all trees, undergrowth and over-woodland and large open spaces need to be set to some kind of productive seedlings. You know that a tree planted has many uses, such as lumber, shade, wind break, a home for birds, squirrels, flood protection by taking up rainfall by their roots in the soil and leaves providing a mulch and also a beautiful landscape. We may not see all the results but future generations will.

With the farm programs being cut severely in order to balance the budget we need to take a closer look at our farming operations.

Some ways to cut expenses is to take soil samples to determine the right amount of plant food to apply for each crop. Make a few trips over a field as possible in seedbed preparation and seeding (no-till planting) is a great help in this.

Purchase good quality seeds and plant the right amount to get the best stands and no vacant spaces.

Check crops often to see if insect or disease damage is noticed.

See that harvesting equipment is in good operation and not waste any seed or forage.

Work land at all times on the contour if at all possible to conserve soil, water and plant food.

For more help and important information on soil conservation, see your soil conservationist at the Rockcastle Soil Conservation District in the courthouse in Mt. Vernon.

Legislative Report

Kentucky's state representatives and senators are continuing to pre-file bills for the 1982 General Assembly.

Legislators and interim committees pre-file bills well in advance of a regular session in order to give the public and other legislators ample opportunity to study their proposals.

Pre-filed Bill 3 seeks to require installation of a child passenger restraint system in motor vehicles and establish penalties for non-compliance.

This bill has been referred to the Interim Joint Committee on Transportation.

Pre-filed Bill 9 seeks to prohibit an employer from discharging an employee because of the marriage or plans for a marriage to a co-employee, unless there are additional justifiable grounds. This bill has been referred to the Interim Joint Committee on Labor and Industry.

Pre-filed Bill 13 proposes to create a new section of the Constitution to provide for the recall of elected officials upon a petition bearing the signatures of twenty percent of the applicable electorate. This bill has been referred to the Interim Joint Committee on Elections and Constitutional Amendments.

Pre-filed Bill 17 seeks to amend Section 170 of the Constitution to increase the "Homestead Exemption" allowance from \$6,500 to \$20,000 of assessed property valuation. This bill has also been referred to the Interim Joint Committee on Elections and Constitutional Amendments.

Pre-filed Bill 15 seeks to amend Section 170 of the Constitution to increase the "Homestead Exemption" allowance from \$6,500 to \$20,000 of assessed property valuation. This bill has also been referred to the Interim Joint Committee on Elections and Constitutional Amendments.

Pre-filed Bill 22 proposes to require moped operators to have regular motor vehicle operators' licenses rather than a special moped operators' license. Also, seeks to require a moped operator to obtain liability insurance. This bill has been referred to the Interim Joint Committee on Transportation.

Pre-filed Bill 24 seeks to extend the \$25,000 death benefit for policemen and firefighters to volunteer policemen and firefighters. This bill has been referred to the Interim Joint Committee on Counties and Special Districts.

Pre-filed Bill 27 seeks to regulate persons who buy and sell property made of precious metals such as gold and silver. This bill has been referred to the Interim Joint Committee and Business Organizations and Professions.

An interim joint committee is one that meets between legislative sessions and is composed of both representatives and senators.

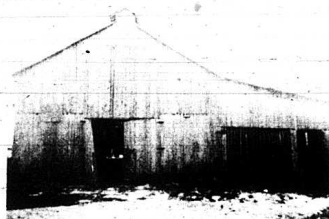

Cooperative Extension Service - 1981

What is the Cooperative Extension Service? Extension work is an out-of-school system of education in which adults and young people learn by doing. It is a partnership between the county, state and federal governments, the University of Kentucky and the people. It provides services and education designed to meet the needs of the people. Its fundamental objective is the development of the people.

What are the primary functions of the Extension Service? To help the people of the county or area... help themselves through educational programs aimed at improving their home, standard of living and community life. These educational programs deal generally with agriculture, family living, resource development and youth. This service is available to all people of the county regardless of income level, race, occupation, sex, national origin, religion, age, or handicap.

Who are the staff of the Cooperative Extension Service? In Rockcastle County there are three positions: County Extension Agent for Home Economics and County Extension Agent for Agriculture, County Extension Agent for 4-H. Currently, Cheryl Witt is the Home Economics Agent and Tom Mills is the 4-H Agent. The Agriculture Agent position is vacant. There are over one hundred Extension specialists who serve the state with technical assistance. Fifty specialists are located throughout Kentucky working on an area basis.

How is the Cooperative Extension Service Financed? The state and federal governments pay approximately eighty percent of the total cost for operating the Extension Service in the county. County governments pay an average of twenty percent of the costs. Money from the federal and state governments are channeled through the University of Kentucky, and is spent in conducting the state and county Extension programs.

How are the funds used that are appropriated by individual counties? All money appropriated in the county is spent in the county. These funds are used for traveling expense for the extension agents, secretarial help, office facilities, and to pay a

portion of the salary of the 4-H agent.

What is the relationship between Cooperative Extension service and the University of Kentucky? The Cooperative Extension Service is a part of the University of Kentucky. All Extension Agents and specialists are joint employees of the University of Kentucky and the United States Department of Agriculture.

Who determines the county Extension Program? This is determined by the people of the county working with the County Extension Council, 4-H Council, Homemakers Council and other committees and groups in cooperation with the county Extension staff. Programs are based upon needs and desires of the local people. This is why extension programs vary from county to county.

Results of Extension Programs During the Past Year

4-H
4-H enrollment for 1979-80 was 1,194 with members in thirty-six organized school clubs, two community clubs and three special interest groups. 133 persons (including 21 teens) work with 4-H programs as volunteer leaders. The most popular projects were energy conservation, dog care, arts and crafts, foods, health, Mulligan Stew, and window sill gardens.

4-H members participated in the following county, area and state-wide activities during the past year: achievement records (476), exhibits at Brohead (22) and state fairs (17), poster contest (219), 4-H camp (69), demonstration contest (11), talk meet (5), variety show (96), award of excellence (11), Kentucky 4-H Week (5), land judging (9), dairy show (5), fashion revue (4), and Older Youth Contest (2). (Numbers in parenthesis are participants).

Project groups, meeting after school, gave training to sixteen youth in foods and woodcraft.

Two county Variety Show specialty acts appeared on TV.

Showcase Program.

Teen-4-H members received information on job preparation at club meetings. Other club programs included Parliamentary Procedure, Thanksgiving and Christmas Traditions, The Story of the Stars and Stripes, a Trip through Rockcastle County, Energy Conservation, and How to Give a Demonstration.

Home Economics

The Extension Home Economics program is three-fold: special interest educational programs, advisor to homemakers club, and supervisor of the Expanded Foods and Nutrition program.

Special interest programs reached 481 persons with information on estate planning, self defense for women, food preservation, holiday entertaining, low-cost meals, weight-often use, basic clothing construction, tailoring, Kentucky history, chair seating and needlecrafts.

Senior citizens groups at Brohead and Mt. Vernon are given monthly programs on nutrition.

Other areas of work were programs for nursing home residents, 84 newly married packages, 476 4-H and other youth in foods, health, nutrition, consumer education, and quilting.

New methods used to provide educational information

were correspondence course on money management and store displays on food preservation.

The Homemakers Club program includes six clubs and at-large membership of 122; up nine percent from last year. In addition to monthly lessons in home economics and related areas, the Homemakers Clubs toured the State Capitol at Frankfort and sponsor an Outstanding Home Economics Student Award each year.

Eighty-one families were enrolled in the Expanded Foods and Nutrition program. Two nutrition assistants work with families showed improved eating habits and several have become involved in other extension programs. Sixty-seven youth were involved in three Nutrition Day Camps last summer.

In addition to groups and clubs, home economics educational information is provided through daily radio programs, weekly news columns, and five newsletters. Microwave Newsletter and Saving Sewing Newsletters were begun in addition to Foods and Nutrition, Young Families, and Homemakers newsletters.

Community Development

Assistance was given by Extension personnel to the following organizations: Rockcastle County Improvement Council, Rockcastle County Rural Development Committee,

Food Stamp Crisis Committee, and Brohead Fair Board. A County Administrative Committee was organized with ASCS, SCC and FMHA to aid in cooperation in programming and use of facilities. In addition, the Quail Quackers 4-H Club has been involved in Community Pride Projects and Homemakers Club have sponsored parks, community activities, provided schools with equipment, and sponsored blood drives for the county.

Agriculture

With the retirement of Lee Durbin, February 27, 1980, Rockcastle County has been

without an Extension Agent for Agriculture. Farmers' requests for information have been taken care of by the 4-H and Home Economics agents. Special problems have been referred to UK specialists for recommendations.

230 soil test recommendations were made; four news articles published; Beef Cattle facts mailed monthly, and Extension staff cooperated with ASCS and Soil Conservation Service in establishing agriculture programs.
