By Nancy Mullins Next week Mt. Vernon Plas-vices begins production. The new-est addition to the Rockcastle Industrial Park has been "set-ting up shop" since late fall. Jack Touratos, president of the newly formed company, said Monday that production is ex-pected to be ahead of schedulis-tids, have been much better than expected. When production gets un-derway the plant is expected to make more than 200,000 pieces a day. Plastic pellets for the Ilds will be received and stored at the plant presses where they will be ground, melted and injected customer specifica.

This system will emit a white vapor of moisture as the circulating water is cooled. Touratoso voiced optimism for the new venture based large-ly upon the fact that the com-pany sells to the food industry which doesn't fluctuate with the economy as much as some other

economy as much as some other industries. For instance, he said that last year, which saw a somewhat depressed economy, margarine sales showed a sub-

stantial increase. The clear plas-tic covering on some margarine containers is the type Mt. Ver-non Plastics will be making initially. The company so far has employed six people from Rock-castle County including Becky Hammonds Latham as book-







weath's higher education offic-lais. It is important to note that a university or community coll-ege is a bureaucracy and a bureaucracy must continually strive to be efficient. In approximate figures, there are 85,000 full-time stu-dents and 23,000 employees of which 6,500 are faculty mem-sitiles and community colleges. This means there is one em-ployee for every 3.5 students and 3.5 employees for every faculty member. In this light it would seem that significant reductions in the state education budget can be made without deteriorating the quality of services being provided to the classroom stu-ention Kentucky's higher edu-cational aystems. For example, at the March meeting of the Capital Con-struction and Equipment Pur-chase Oversite Committee, of fichils from Murray State Uni-versity offered a proposal seek-ing to take \$231,000 from their on the camput, the unimous-The comstructing a bowling alley on the camput, the Department of Finance has final authority over the mater. However, even with a \$185 million budget cut, expenditues by state govern-ment in fiscal year 1981-82 will be 11% more than in Fiscal year 198-81. A government or university


