## Mt. Vernon Plastics to Begin Production Soon

Next week Mt. Vernon Plastics begins production. The newest addition to the Rockcastle Industrial Park has been "setting up shop" since late fall. Jack Touratsos, president of the newly formed company, said Monday that production is expected to be ahead of schedule as orders for the product, plastic lids, have been much better than expected.

When production gets underway the plant is expected to make more than 200,000 pieces a day.

Plastic pellets for the lids will be received and stored at the plant in silos and piped into the plant presses where they will be ground, melted and injected into molds the size of which meet customer specifications.

This industry puts no chemical or industrial waste into the system and does not have any atmospheric emissions, according to Touratsos. The only waste, he says, will be some plastic pieces which will be ground and resold to industries which make other plastic products such as toys.

Later, Touratsos said, there will be a water cooling system which will circulate water around the molds to cool the lids before they are ejected from the molds. This system will emit a white vapor of moisture as the circulating water is cooled.

Touratsos voiced optimism for the new venture based largely upon the fact that the company sells to the food industry which doesn't fluctuate with the economy as much as some other industries. For instance, he said that last year, which saw a somewhat depressed economy, margarine sales showed a substantial increase. The clear plastic covering on some margarine containers is the type Mt. Vernon Plastics will be making initially.

The company so far has employed six people from Rockcastle County including Becky Hammond and Latham as book-keeper-secretary. Also hired were Alma Louise Mullins, Minta Bullock, Dorothy Lovell and Eliza Argenbright who will be working as production operators. Denny McGuire of Rockcastle and Bob Lawson of Williamsburg were hired as production supervisors.

According to Touratsos, more hirings will correspond with more presses. One press will be in production next week with another arriving next week. More people will be hired in April and in July when a third press is scheduled to arrive. By then it is expected that total employment will have reached 26.

## Continental Telephone Asks for Rate Increase

Reflecting continued inflationary trends and a shortfall in the last increase approved, Continental Telephone Company of Kentucky today filed a request for a rate increase which would generate an estimated \$3.8 million in additional revenue.

The Public Service Service Commission is being asked to

raise basic service rates by about one-third.

About six months ago, the PSC (then known as the Utilities Regulatory Commission) granted a \$2.2 million increase to Continental, but the amount represented only 49 percent of what the Company sought when it filed the previous March 28.

The 1980 request was based on the Company's financial position in 1979.

Eugene Morris, president of CTC of Kentucky, said the com-

## Kirby Charged in Five Count Indictment

Clarence Kirby, 21, was arrested Monday, lodged in the Pulaski County jail and placed under \$250,000 cash bond by Judge Dan Venters on charges of rape, assault and robbery following an early Sunday morning occurrence. According to Lester Burns, Jr., Commonwealth Attorney for Rockcastle and Pulaski Counties, four youths from Pulaski County were returning from a vending machine there. One of the boys in the Pulaski County car got out to get the drinks and was allegedly assaulted by Kirby who was at the station. When one of the girls in the car jumped out and asked him to stop, Kirby and two juvenile companions allegedly kidnapped the four youths, raped one of the girls - a fifteen year old - and robbed and assaulted other members of the group before releasing them.

The two juveniles were arrested later that morning. Burns, along with Sheriff Henry Abney Commonwealth detective Dempsey Combs, State police Jimmie Silvers and Guy Blevins and assistant Commonwealth attorney Reid James searched for and found Kirby in the mountains behind his home Monday and took him into custody.

Tuesday Kirby was indicted by the Rockcastle Grand Jury on charges of first degree rape, first degree sodomy, kidnapping and third degree assault.

Burns stated that he had had full cooperation from local officials in this matter and that he intends to prosecute to the fullest extent of the law.

## Charged in Robbery

Donald Newcomb, Farlie Newcomb and Robert Newcomb all of Livingston have been charged in the March 14 robbery and armed assault of Britton, also of Livingston.

According to warrants taken by Helton, the three Newcombs entered his home, used a pistol to hit him on the head, forcibly robbed him of \$100 by pointing a pistol at him and shot the gun in his home.

The three were lodged in the Rockcastle Co. Jail under \$25,000 property bond March 27th. Two have since been released and as yet the three have not been indicted.

## Fires Burn Over County

About 125 acres burned Saturday along the East Fork of Skags Creek. According to Steve Bullen the fire was set in two different places. The same day two fires were set in the Red Hill section of the county and burned over approximately 15 acres. One of the sets burned over property of the Kenny Paul Griffin heirs and one near the garbage dumpster near Joe Daugherty's property.

In the Scaffold Cane area two fires were set within 15 minutes of each other, near the Scaffold Cane Baptist Church. Only 2 acres burned there.

Sunday a fire burned over 100 acres near the KOA campground at Boone Hollow, a fire was set and, while the firefighters were fighting it, two more were set on top of the hill near the Maple Grove Church.

Between 50 and 100 acres

were burned Sunday when a dumpster was set afire near Brush Creek. On KY 1004, there were also two sets.

According to Bullen, local forest ranger, during the day Sunday, 21 fires were set between Donald French's sawmill and the boat dock springs.

Also Sunday fires burning between 500 and 1,000 acres were fought by the S. Forest Service in the area behind the Red Hill Baptist church. They used planes to drop fire retardants on the blazes. Bulldozers and fire plows were used to help local fire departments and two from other counties.

Sunday also saw four sets behind White Star in Livingston and at Calloway. Eleven acres were burned over in the Copper Creek area as a result of two sets.

"If one more dollar is cut from Kentucky's higher education budget, there will be a measurable drop in quality." This is the position being echoed by most of the Commonwealth's higher education officials.

It is important to note that a university or community college is a bureaucracy and a bureaucracy must continually strive to be efficient. In approximate figures, there are 85,000 full-time students and 23,000 employees of which 6,500 are faculty members in state-supported universities and community colleges. This means there is one employee for every 3.5 students and 3.5 employees for every faculty member.

In this light it would seem that significant reductions in the state education budget can be made without deteriorating the quality of services being provided to the classroom student in Kentucky's higher educational systems.

For example, at the March meeting of the Capital Construction and Equipment Purchase Oversight Committee, officials from Murray State University offered a proposal seeking to take \$231,000 from their operating fund, for the purpose of constructing a bowling alley on the campus.

The committee unanimously rebuked Murray's proposal. However, the Department of Finance has final authority over the matter.

Also, at the March meeting of the Budget Review subcommittee on Higher Education, the state Council on Higher Education was directed to compile a list of all surplus property owned by state-supported universities, including acreage. The

University of Kentucky by itself owns over 22,000 acres, although it is not all surplus. The lease or sale by auction of some of these surplus properties could represent a revenue source for the Commonwealth's educational systems.

Perhaps the most noticeable example of inefficiency in Kentucky's higher education system is Kentucky State University.

Kentucky State University has an annual appropriation of \$1 million. There are only 2,000 full-time students at the Frankfort-based university and of that number over half are from states other than Kentucky.

Almost everyone is in favor of education. However, even with a \$185 million budget cut, expenditures by state government in fiscal year 1981-82 will be 11% more than in Fiscal year 1980-81.

A government or university which cannot continue to provide the beneficial services within the limits of this increase, is being mismanaged.

### CONFERENCE ON AGING

The Kentucky White House Conference on Aging will be held May 19-21 on the campus of Kentucky State University in Frankfort. A total of 420 delegates from throughout the Commonwealth will be attending this conference. Twenty-seven (27) of these delegates will represent the eight counties within the Cumberland Valley Area Development district.

Nominations for delegate selection are currently being accepted by the Cumberland Valley Area Agency on Aging. 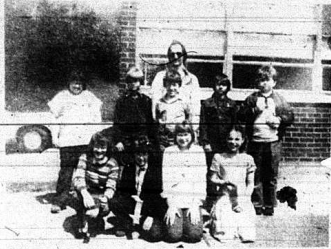

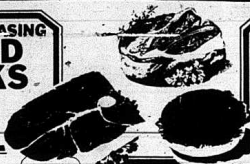

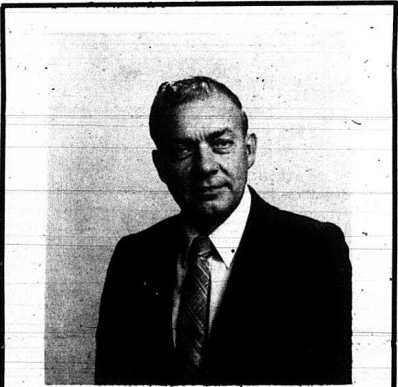

### Everyone Needs Iron

Everyone needs iron found in foods to build good healthy blood. Yet iron deficiency is the most common nutritional deficiency in North America. In a nationwide survey in 1971-72, three population groups were identified as having below standard intake of iron. Groups at risk were both sexes aged one to five; females aged 18 to 44; and both sexes aged 60 and over. In cooperation with the Mt. Vernon Home Health Agency and the Public Health Department, six senior Berea College nursing students and one instructor are working on a community project aimed toward prevention or reversal of iron deficiency in the Mt. Vernon population. From hemoglobin values statistically gathered last fall in Mt. Vernon, certain age groups were found to be deficient or at high risk for low iron. These groups were infants, preschool children, and women of childbearing age.

Mt. Vernon community citizens can help each other by learning about low iron and how to prevent this nutritional deficiency. The Mount Vernon Signal and the Mt. Vernon radio station are donating space and time in the interest of community involvement and education. Some classes are being taught in public schools and at the Senior Citizens Center. Pending funds, flyers and posters will be distributed in many local groceries and health and public agencies for circulation. Families can grow iron-rich foods.

### HEALTH BOARD MEETS

In a brief Thursday morning meeting Rockcastle Health Board voted unanimously to recommend to Fiscal Court that the local health department be placed in a regional district along ADD lines in accordance with recent state health care reorganizational efforts.

The board's little recourse since recent information handed down to local departments from the state threatened the withdrawal of 0% of state funds to county departments of health unless they complied with the state's recommendation.

According to Steve Midkiff, health administrator, the regional board will be made up of

the County Judge-executive, one member of the local board of health, plus one member for each 15,000 population.

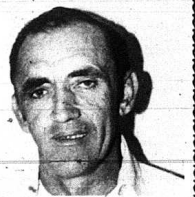

### Can a Child of God Fall From Grace?

Mr. Sam Morris, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Stamford, Texas, boldly and clearly sets forth Baptist doctrine regarding the subject of falling from grace. The following is a quotation from his tract entitled, "Do a Christian's Sins Damn His Soul?"

"We take the position that a Christian's sins do not damn his soul. The way the Christian lives, what he says, his character, his conduct, or his attitude toward other people, a man may pray, all the Bibles he may read, all the churches he may belong to, all the services he may attend, all the sermons he may practice, all the debts he may pay, all the ordinances he may observe, all the laws he may keep, all the benevolent acts he may perform WILL NOT MAKE HIS SOUL ONE WHIT SAFER; AND ALL THE SINS HE MAY COMMIT FROM IDOLATRY TO MURDER WILL NOT MAKE HIS SOUL IN ANY MORE DANGER. THE WAY A MAN LIVES HAS NOTHING TO DO WITH THE SALVATION OF HIS SOUL." (Emp. mine-Austin Mobley).

Many Baptists are shocked to see their doctrine so clearly stated, not having realized the consequences of it. Most Baptist preachers do not preach this plain, for it is repulsive in its true form. Some say that they do not agree with Mr. Morris' statement. Ask your Baptist preacher if he agrees with Mr. Morris. If he says no, ask him which of these sins WILL damn the Christian's soul? Will murder damn the Christian's soul? Will murder cause the Christian to be lost in hell? Adultery? Drunkenness? Idolatry? Lying? Baptist doctrine says no! Mr. Morris correctly sets forth Baptist doctrine and NO BAPTIST PREACHER CAN DENY IT WITHOUT SURRENDERING HIS POSITION THAT A CHRISTIAN CANNOT FALL FROM GRACE.

My baptist friends, do YOU believe that a Christian could lie, murder, steal,

cheat, get drunk, curse God, worship an idol, commit adultery, etc. and still be saved? Mr. Morris says YES! Baptist doctrine says YES! What do YOU say? Do you realize that to bid God speed to preachers who preach it is to partake of their sin? (2 John 9:11).

"But a child of God won't do these things," some say. Noah found grace in God's sight (Gen. 6:8), was saved (Heb. 11:7; 1 Pet. 3:2), yet GOT Drunk! (Gen. 9:20-21). Paul wrote to Christians warning "LIE NOT one to another" (Col. 3:9) and to STEAL NO MORE" (Eph. 4:28), and "let NO CORRUPT COMMUNICATION proceed out of your mouth" (Eph. 5:29). Further, Paul, guided by the Holy Spirit warned the Corinthian Christians, "Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall" (1 Cor. 10:12). To Galatian Christians seeking to be justified by the law of Moses he said, "Christ is become of no effect unto you, whosoever of you are justified by the law; ye are fallen from grace." (Gal. 5:4). In Jude verse 5 we read, "I will therefore put you in remembrance, though ye once knew this, how that the Lord, having saved the people out of the land of Egypt, afterward destroyed them that believed not."

Men inspired of the Holy Spirit taught that Christians CAN SIN. Mr. Morris teaches that he may commit all the sins from "idolatry to murder." Paul says they will damn his soul (Gal. 5:19-21). Mr. Morris says they WILL NOT! Who do you believe: Paul or Baptist doctrine!

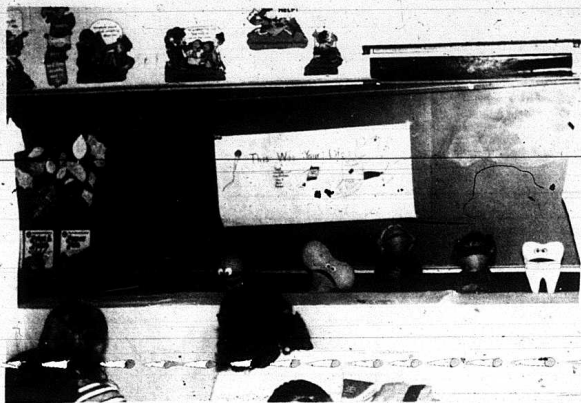

pany has established a good track record of being reluctant to seek rate increases. "It had been five years since our last request," said Morris.

"Because our request was painstakingly realistic, given five years of inflationary inroads into our buying and borrowing power, we were disappointed in the Commission's ruling last fall."

It meant the Company had to begin immediately to re-assess its financial position and determine whether it would have to curtail its modernization and improvement program or to come back to the Commission soon for another increase.

"Recognizing our customers' needs for ever-better telephone service, we have chosen to come back to the Commission," Morris said.

In addition to the revenue request shortfall in 1980, Continental has continued to be plundered by a double-digit inflation rate. This has meant not only a weakened ability to buy vital equipment and to support salaries but a much more costly borrowing rate for capital to fund improvements and modernization.

Between 1976 when the previous rate increase was granted and the 1980 grant, a \$94 million improvement program was undertaken by Continental in Kentucky.

All service was upgraded to one and four-party.

"In order to make other major improvements in service, as well as to maintain the present quality, we must have this new rate increase," Morris said.

Currently, the Company is charging \$1.50 per resident phone and \$2 for a standard business phone furnished by

Continental...in addition to the basic service or "line access" charge.

It is the line access charge that will vary among Continental's 41 exchanges.

A typical proposed line-access rate change would occur in Caneyville where one-party residential customers' rates would go from the current \$12.35 to \$16.45 and four-party customers from \$9.40 to \$12.65.

One party business rates would go from \$20.95 to \$28.80 and four party from \$13.85 to \$19.20.

While typical of Continental exchanges, Caneyville rates are higher than many of the 41 exchanges, lower than some.

And the individual instrument charge, which would be a uniform \$1.75 per Continental-furnished rotary-dial phone for business as well as residential

customers, would be shown as an extra charge under the proposal.

Continental Telephone of Kentucky served 81,896 telephones as of December 1980, about 4 percent more than a year earlier.

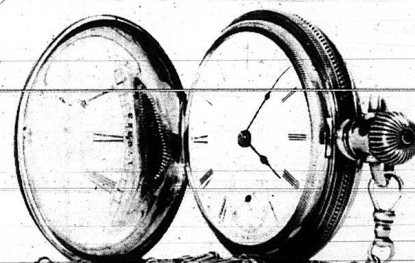

Successful aging is also dependent upon accurate information about aging. The purpose of this quiz, developed by Family Life Specialists with the University of Kentucky, is to teach facts about aging, encourage discussion, and perhaps stimulate you to do some reading and research on your own.

Simply read each of the following statements and circle

either 'T' for true or 'F' for false. Check your answers with those at the end of this article.

## ATF Releases Figures

Gerard C. Benedict, Special Agent in Charge of the Louisville District of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) released figures today which indicate a growing problem in the coal-producing counties of Kentucky.

In 1978, 1,850 pounds of explosives were reported stolen throughout the Commonwealth. This figure grew to 6,790 pounds in 1979. During 1980, more than 27,330 pounds were stolen or reported missing, according to Special Agents in Kentucky recovered more than 29,856 pounds. A considerable amount of the recovered explosives had never been reported to ATF as missing or stolen. These figures place Kentucky in the dubious distinction of being one of the top three states for reported stolen explosives.

Since investigations in other parts of the country have shown that Kentucky may be a source for criminal misuse of explosives and because of the growing incidence of theft, Mr. Benedict stated that ATF Special Agents in Kentucky will place additional emphasis on the enforcement of federal storage requirements. Many times it has been shown that failure to follow ATF Department regulations has made it all too easy for thieves to gain access to legally stored explosive material. The safe and proper storage of explosives is the responsibility of the owner and user of the explosives.

ATF will be placing added emphasis on enforcing the various storage requirements as written by Congress and the Secretary of the Treasury as they pertain to security of explosives. In the event that a willful violation occurs which indicates both negligence and a disregard for public safety, the investigation will be referred to the United States Attorney's office for appropriate action.

Thefts of explosives should be reported to the nearest ATF office. There are offices located in Ashland, Bowling Green, Lexington, London, Louisville and Paducah. In addition, explosives users may report thefts by utilizing toll-free telephone number 1-800-424-9555. The information will be immediately relayed to the appropriate ATF office.

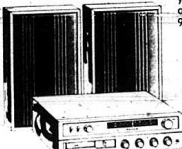

## Colburn Presents Statement of Support On Funding For ARC

On March 12, 1981, Andy Colburn of Stanford, at the request of local and area officials and the ADD districts presented a statement of support to the State Congressional members on funding for the Appalachian Regional Commission. The statement was also submitted for entry into the Congressional Record.

In summation, Colburn told the members verbally that the people of Kentucky Appalachian wanted the opportunity to offer their children the means of earning a livelihood if they choose to stay in the area, and if they choose to leave have the educational and cultural background to compete with other children from any other region.

Statement of Andy Colburn presented to the Kentucky Congressional Members on funding for the Appalachian Regional Commission at Washington, D.C.

### Gentlemen:

My name is Andy Colburn and I am representing the Stanford/Lincoln County Chamber of Commerce and the Lincoln County Industrial Authority. I speak on behalf of the people of Lincoln County and the adjacent counties in our trade areas. Lincoln County is on the Western edge of Kentucky Appalachia. Our area is econom-

ically disadvantaged with unemployment running consistently several points higher than the state and national average. January, 1981 figures, just released, show an employment rate of our County at 19.1%.

With the advent of the interstate highway system and the decline of the railroads, Stanford/Lincoln County found itself becoming isolated from the main stream of commerce. As a direct result of the isolation more and more of our citizens found it necessary to seek employment in other counties. A recent study showed 43% of the persons surveyed are daily commuters to these counties.

To reverse this trend and give our community the economic boost it needs to retain our youth, and build the quality of life that all citizens are entitled to requires the combined effort of all of us working together.

We have long considered the Appalachian Regional Commission a partner in progress, for it has filled a financial need that made possible a number of projects so necessary to our goals, and thinks to Appalachian Regional Commission we see hope in our future.

Possibly no other government agency has the ability to

stretch dollars and provide the leverage so necessary in the people oriented projects. Appalachian Regional Commission with local effort and with local funds, government grants, and with just a few dollars implement programs that would have otherwise been out of reach for areas in our economic status.

To cite just a few examples of the importance of the Appalachian Regional Commission to our area, let's look at the projects already underway.

Land for a modern Industrial Park was acquired with local funds. To properly develop this site with utilities and streets was beyond the capabilities of the local community. With the help of an Appalachian Regional Commission grant of \$140,000, E.D.A. and state agencies combined to make possible a total financial package of \$847,000 for completion of this project. The park, when completed in 1982, will have space for 8 to 10 small industries, and when fully developed should provide permanent employment for five to six hundred residents in the area.

A small Appalachian Regional Commission grant of \$59,000 made possible the completion of a thirty bed skilled nursing facility. This facility is operated in conjunction with our acute care hospital, and provides adequate nursing care for our citizens without undue hardship on the hospital.

The youth in our area in particular, have not had the advantages of planned recreation areas. Once again with the aid of a small Appalachian Regional Commission grant in the amount of \$50,310, these parks, with lighted ball fields and tennis courts are under construction.

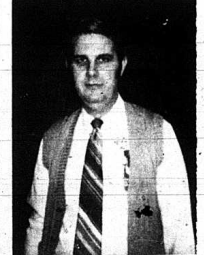

The Community of Crab Orchard has long been hampered with inadequate waste water treatment facilities. Recently an E.P.A. grant was obtained, but only after Appalachian Regional Commission provided \$149,275 to finish out the necessary financial package. When completed, this project, including local funds, will exceed \$2 million and provide the community with adequate waste water treatment facilities.

The above cases show that with the addition of only \$398,585.00 of Appalachian Regional Commission funds, projects totaling \$3,747,000.00 have been made possible.

These projects will all directly benefit the people, and the economy of the area. These projects have made the best possible use of local dollars.

Even though there was no official art teacher at Brodhead, Mrs. Elizabeth set aside a time for art and taught us all we could absorb of what she knew in the area. We were graded on each piece of art work and were given an art grade on our report cards. In later years when Mrs. Elizabeth's class was downstairs, she had her students turn their desks to face the windows in the fall and paint a huge maple tree in the school yard as the leaves changed colors.

Every Friday afternoon students were encouraged to develop communication skills and to get before the group by performing a "show". A microphone was constructed from a broom handle stuck into a bucket of sand with a can on top. Students sang, told jokes or stories and each week a different student served as master of ceremonies.

Mrs. Elizabeth found a play about atomic energy and assigned parts to students. We came up with the sound effects

and were allowed to go into the high school science room and record the play on tape. It was later "aired" on WRVK. We could have read or been lectured all day about geiger counters or the effects of radiation, but it would not likely have made the lasting impression on us as doing the play did.

I remember that Mrs. Elizabeth's explanations were very vivid. Quite often she chalked diagrams to help describe lessons while we sat in awe. Her lessons were not always directly from a 6th grade text book. For instance, she once drew and explained about a back condition and spinal surgery of a relative whom she had visited over the previous weekend. The hour or more discussion taught us about the condition, introduced us to new words, made us appreciate good health, gave us insight into our teacher's life and world and served as a healthy vent for the teacher's stress and emotion.

Unlike 25 years ago, the emphasis in education now is on "enrichment", "reinforcement" and "creativity" and there is open-armed acceptance of these teaching techniques. Mrs. Elizabeth Mullins will always be to me a special teacher and a special person.

Elizabeth Francisco Mullins was born and reared in Brodhead, attended school at

Eastern and Western Colleges and began her 42-year teaching career when she was 18 years old. All except 3 or 4 of her teaching years were spent at Brodhead. She retired in 1971 and lives in Brodhead where she appears to enjoy retirement as much as she used to enjoy teaching.

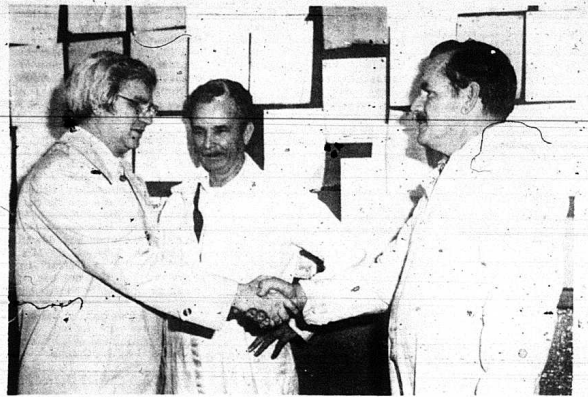

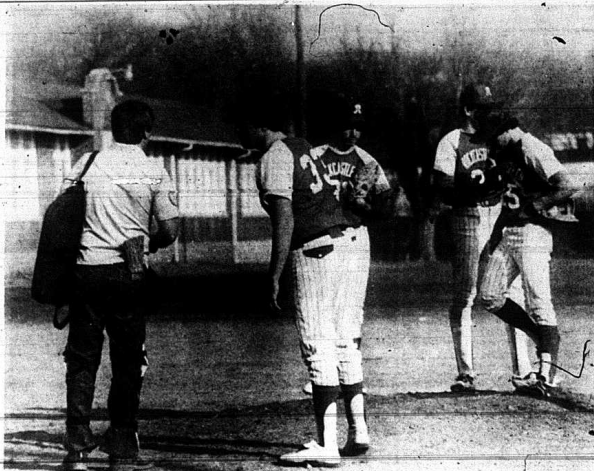

**Fishing Report**

Water temperatures at most of Kentucky's large lakes are now in the 50's and fishing should improve steadily as the waters continue to warm. The lake-by-lake rundown, as reported by fish and wildlife conservation officers:

Kentucky: crappie fair over submerged cover (8-12 feet deep); black bass fair casting crank baits along shoreline cover; in tailwaters, catfish slow; clear, stable at one foot above winter pool and 50 degrees. Barkley: black bass fair on

crank baits off rocky points; crappie fair over drop offs and submerged cover (12-15 feet deep); in tailwaters, white bass, crappie and catfish slow; clear to murky, stable at one foot above winter pool and 50 degrees.

Barren: black bass fair on spinner baits and crank baits off deep banks; crappie fair over submerged cover (8-10 feet deep); clear to murky, rising slowly, one foot above winter pool and 54 degrees.

Nolin: crappie fair to good, white bass and walleye fair in Broad Ford area of headwaters; clear to murky, rising slowly, 13 feet above winter pool and 58 degrees.

Rough River: crappie slow over submerged cover; clear to murky, rising, 12 feet above winter pool and 52 degrees. Herrington: crappie slow over submerged cover and around stick ups; clear, stable at 15 feet above winter pool and 48 degrees.

Green: black bass fair to good on jigs and live nightcrawlers over drop offs and stump beds; crappie fair over submerged cover (8-6 feet deep); clear, rising slowly, three feet above winter pool and 50 degrees.

Cumberland: white bass fair to good in heads of creeks on spinners and small crank baits; crappie fair over submerged cover (8-12 feet deep); black bass slow to fair on medium to deep runners in coves and off steep banks; rockfish slow in Beaver Creek and walleye fair in South Fork; in tailwaters, trout good; clear to murky, rising, 26 feet below timberline and 52 degrees.

Dale Hollow: white bass fair in heads of large tributaries on spinners and jogs; crappie fair (but small) over submerged cover (10-12 feet deep); clear, stable at six feet below normal pool and 53 degrees.

Laurel: trout fair on worms, cheese and corn and by trolling medium to deep runners along steep banks; crappie slow around stick ups; clear, stable at 21 feet below power pool and 48 degrees.

Cave Run: crappie slow around stick ups; clear, rising, two feet above winter pool and 48 degrees.

Buckhorn: crappie slow to fair over submerged cover; black bass and white bass slow in tributaries on spinners, jigs and live nightcrawlers; clear to murky to muddy, stable a winter pool and 53 degrees.

Grayson: crappie slow over submerged cover; clear, stable at winter pool and 52 degrees.

Dewey: black bass slow jigging nightcrawlers and jigs along shoreline cover; muddy, rising, at winter pool and 52 degrees.

Fishtrap: crappie slow over submerged cover; murky to muddy; stable at winter pool and 51 degrees.

# First Step To Summer Job-- A Social Security Number

Young people planning to work for the first time this summer should be aware that the first step is to get a social security number. It is time to take that first step is right now, according to Bob Anderson, manager of the Richmond Social Security Office.

Many young people may not realize that getting a social security number takes a little longer today than it did for their parents. Mom and Dad probably walked into a social security office one day and walked out with a social security number and card. Today many of you can even apply by mail if you wish, but either way it takes about 6 weeks to receive a social security number and card.

The major reason for the difference is that the application is now more closely scrutinized to assure the applicant's correct identity, citizenship, or lawful alien status and age. When the social security system first started 45 years ago and in its early years, the concern was to make it as easy as possible for people to get a social security card. Now that the system is a household word—the Nation's primary means of providing an income to a family at the retirement, death, or disability of the breadwinner—the major concern is that the card and the rights it represents are protected from fraud and abuse.

Moreover, the social security number represents your key to your earnings record and future benefits based on it. Eligibility for benefits is based on your date of birth and the amount is based on your covered annual earnings shown in your record over your working lifetime. Incorrect information on the application for a number could seriously affect your benefit rights later.

Many employers will not hire you unless you can show a social security card because the law requires them to collect and pay social security taxes on the earnings of each person they employ, and they need your correct social security number for this purpose.

People 18 or over must apply for a card in person, but people under 18 may apply by mail or phone.

If you were born in the United States, a birth or baptismal record will be necessary for proof of age and citizenship. For proof of identity, we may accept any document which includes your signature, photograph, or physical description, such as driver's license, draft card, voters registration card, marriage record, school identity card, newspaper birth announcement, and similar documents.

You should submit either the original document for a copy certified by the agency which issued it. We will return any documents you submit.
