

First, I would like to state that I am in no way associated with any candidate in the campaign for Rockcastle County Sheriff. However, I would like to refresh the memory of each voter in this county concerning an incident which took place in the Rockastle County Jail during the time Oscar "Larney" Durham was serving as Deputy Jailer.

Even though I had not been informed of any charges against me, I was taken to the jail where I was assaulted by Mr. Durham. As a result of the severe?—ting I received, I was hospitalized for several days. My jaw was broken and three teeth were displaced. For eight weeks I could consume only liquids because by jaws were wired together.

I brought suit against Mr. Durham and he was indicted by the Grand Jury. He was brought to trial and convicted of Third Degree Assault. Mr. Durham was sentenced to thirty days in jail, one year of probation, and fined \$500. I also filed civil suit against Mr. Durham which he chose to settle out of court.

This incident is a matter of public record. Please think about it before you vote and I'm sure you'll agree that we don't need or want a man of Oscar "Larney" Durham's caliber as Sheriff of our county.



Restoration Programs Aiding Wild Turkey and Deer in State

Not too many years ago it was hard to find wild turkeys and deer on National Forests-or anywhere else in the South-but ensive restoration programs by State Wildlife Agencies have seen the turkey population in-crease five times in the past 20 years and deer herds nearly double every 10 years since

double every 10 years since 1930. The dramatic change has been due to a number of things such as development of live trapping and restocking tech-niques, recovery and manage-ment of forest habitat and pro-

miques, recovery and manage-ment of forest habitat and pro-viding essential protection.

The management of wild-life on the Daniel Boone Na-tional Forest is a cooperative effort between the USDa Forest Service and Kentucky Depart-ment of Fish and Wildlife Re-sources. One of the purposes of Forest Service land manage-ment is to manage habitat (food, shelter, water) for birds and animals. The states are respon-sible for setting hunting and fishing seasons, bag limits and the methods for taking game and fish. and fish

and fish.

Much of the hunting and
fishing in the South takes place
on National Forests with an
average of four million visitor
days of hunting and three milion fishing visitor days a year.
A visitor day is 12 hours of use
How trees are grown and
harvested affects fish and wild-

life habitat. The National For-est wildlife program is coordin-ated with timber and other re-source management activities such as recreation and water-

shed protection.

An indication of the em-An Indication of the em-phasis placed on wildlife and fisheries management in recent years is the fact that the Forest Service has 78 employees in the Southern Region who have de-grees in wildlife and fisheries. One National Forest-the One chita in Arkansas-has wildlife technicians on each of its technicians on each of its 12 Ranger Districts. The Daniel Boone has added two new wild-life biologist positions in the

life biologist positions in the last year.

The featured species system has guided wildlife management on the Daniel Boone National Forest in recent years. Under this system, the Forest Service, in consultation wildlife Agencies, selects a wildlife species for a unit of land. Forest management is a dapted to meet the ability requirements-food, cover, water-of the particular species. requirements-food, cover, wat-ter-of the particular species All other wildlife species with similar or overlapping needs will also prosper. As an ex-ample, when habitat conditions for wild turkeys are met, a wide array of songbirds, deer, rac-coons, squirrels and other spe-cies also benefit. In addition to coordinating wildlife with other resources

such as timber, the Forest Service uses direct habitat improvements to aid wildlife and fish habitat. These can include planting food crops, fertilizing, prescribed burning to stimulate new growth, creating wildlife openings and waterholes, and controlling aquatic weeds.

Featured species selection is based on: habitat capability compatibility with other, some converse; public interests and needs; cooperator and public involvement and maintenance of the variety of native plant and animal species.

of the variety of native plant and animal species.
Wild turkeys are featured on more than four million acres of the 12.5 million acres of National Forests in the South. Turkey populations now are reported as high as they ever have been and the turkey harvest on National Forests in 1979 was seven thmes what it was 20 years ago. Turkey population on some areas of the Daniel Boone National Forest are high enough to provide brook stock to stock additonal areas.

has proven especially beneficial to wildlife. Under this system,

has proven especially beneficial to wildlife Under this system, forests are grown, harvested and reproduced in stands that contain trees of essentially the same size Each year small areas of mature trees are harvested and the areas reforested. About 1.5 - percent of all Southern National Forest acreage is harvested and replanted each year. Birds and animals need habitat variety. Food and cover requirements may be met in areas raning from clearcuts to mature stands of a hundred years of age or more. The scattered openings in the forest which are characteristic of even-aged management greatly increase the capacity of the forest to support wildlife.

Not all National Forest wildlife management greatly increase the capacity of the forest to support wildlife. There are management directions for non-game, else such as, the Mississippi Sandhill Crane, the alligator, Red-Cock-daded Woodpecker and for song-birds.

Consumer Alert

By Attorney General Steven L. Beshear

Today's housing market has caused many Kentuckians, particularly young couples and the elderly, to seek less traditional options in purchasing a home. Some people have found mobile homes to be a viable

mobile homes to be a viable alternative.

Attorney General Steven Beshear warns, "When you'decide to purchase a mobile home you should take the following steps to ensure your new home will bring you pleasure for years to come."

Shop around first. Decide the type of layout that best suis your needs. Remember, a dealer can order a mobile home made to your specifications for little additional money.

Once you have decided on your mobile home be sure you know exactly what you are responsible for and what the dealer will take care of, for instance:

dealer will take care of, for instance:

Is delivery and set-up paid for by the dealer. Who is responsible for the electrical work elecessary to hook up your home. (The costs for this work vary greatly and if you are responsible call several electricans for the best price. You may save \$100 or more.)

Do outside steps for the front and back come with the home. Again, these can be expensive if you must jurchase them from a retailer.

If you purchase appliances
with your mobile home who is
responsible for any warranty
who have been might be needed.

derpinning the home. Most
dealers do not offer this service
but 'they may and you should
ast: Even if they do s.xt install
the undernings they may he the underpinning they may be able to include the cost of mater-

ials in your contract and you need only supply the labor.

Above all, don't be atraid to ask about anything which is not clear. Your dealer should be willing to work closely with you so that your home is what you desire. Remember, this is a major investment and unlike the mobile homes of yesteryear, these should be designed to last 3. years or more if-properly maintained.

"Kentucky has a mobile home lemon law that protects purchasers of new mobile homes, it spells out certain requirements of the manufacturer such as an inspection of the mobile home within 10 days after receipt of a notice concerning a manufacturing defect. A purchaser of a new or used mobile home should contact the consumer protection division for a copy of the law or to report a complaint, "Beshear said.

After purchasing your new home, you will need to locate in either in a park or on a lot that you have prepared. Parks differ just as subdivisions or apart-ment complexes do.

of the community. Some parks
in Kentucky are designed just
for the rettired person of rocouples while others ofter special areas for young children.
Many have restrictions which

If you decide you would rather locate on your own land, be careful when purchasing that the local zoning laws allow mobile homes in that area. Also, you will be responsible for site preparation including such

On the other hand, cloudy rainy weather can produce some of the biggest strings of fish for anglers willing to brace the ele-

ments.

The amount of sunlight is probably the key. Fish's eyes have fixed pupils, which means that the will way they can regulate the amount of light entering their eyes is to move to a location where there is less

light.

So when kright sunshine his clear water con texpect to find fish in open, shallow water-they'll most likely be either in deep water or in the shade-behind a stump, under a drift pile or on the shad side of a submerged boulder.

the fish will be free to move
about, come into the shallows
and generally feed more actively
and aggressively.





"Judge Not"

Usually, we pay little attention to unsigned letters because we believe that those who write them are rather cowardly, wishing to criticize with no personal rebuff; somewhat like a person who hides behind the a person who hides behind the bushes in the dark and takes a shot at you. However, we re-cently received an unsigned let-ter in response to our article, "Can a Child of God Fall From Grace 2" that we mish to "Can a Child of God Fall From Grace?" that we wish to re-spond to. The anonymous re-spondent labeled the article in "paor taste," and reminded us that Jesus said, "Judge not" (Matt. 7:1).

that Jesus said, "Judge not."

The word "judge" is used in the Bible in both a positive (John 7:24) and negative (Matt. 7:1. Rom. 2:13) sense. Jesus deals with its use in the bad sense in Matt. 7:1-5. His reference is to Pharisaical hypocrisy. The placed heavy burdens upon others (Matt. 23:4, 16, 18), yet did not keep God's laws themselves. They were like the father who lectures his son about the evils of drinking alcohol-while miking a cocktail for himself. Of these, Jesus said, "...first, cast the beam out of thine own eye; and then thousand the said th

out of thy brother's eye" (Matt. 7:1-5).

But Jesus also said, "Judge righteous judgment" (John 7:24). He means that we should render judgment which the law dictates; not a judgment of one's own decision based upon appearances. If all judgment is prohibited, then no person could criticise another for any rohibited, then no person ould criticize another for anycould criticize another for any-thing and my critic would be guilty of judging me for using "poor taste" in what I wrote! Try living in a society where all judgment is prohibited for a while. We could have no judge

on the bench, no jury and no preachers in the pulpit.

Preachers of the gospel are commanded to "Preach the commanded to "Freach the word - reprove, rebuke and exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine" (2 Tim. 4:2). This ministry cannot be fulfilled without judging. The Bible teawithout judging. The Bible tea-ches that people can believe a lie and be damned (2 Thes. 2:11-12). John exhorted, "Try the spirits, whether they be of God" (I John 4:1). Jesus warned, "Beware of false prophets" (Matt. 7:15). We use extreme caution in we believe and practice and these scriptures are talking

about religious teachers. Preachers and Christians are not fulfilling their God-given responsibilities unless they rebuke and warn sinners of wrongdoing (Acts 20:226-31.) This requires righteous judgment.

We want our readers to understand that, in reviewing things taught by various religious groups, we are motivated only by love for them and Jesus gious groups, we are motivated only by love for them and Jesus Christ. It is our conviction that we cannot be faithful to Him unless we not only preach the truth (positive) but also expose error (negative). So what we write is in love and kindness. It is not our intention to hurt anyone; we desire only to be helpful. When we place truth alongside error, we do so because we know that only truth will make one free from sin (John 8:32) and that believing and obeying anything other than truth will surely cause on to be lost (2 Thess. 1:7-9; Gal. 1:6-9). We strongly disagree with respective doctrines taught by denominations and intend continues and single doctrines taught in religion and when anyone thinks we have done otherwise, we welcome his or her response.

If one has the right attitude If one has the right attitude, he will not resent having his religious practices called into question, for we know that the Bible teaches: "prove (test) all things" (I Thess. 5:21). One who becomes angry or defensive be-cause another "knocks" his reli-gion may be afraid of what a search for the truth might reweal. (A salesman with bad watermelons doesn't want them plugged!) Truth does not fear honest investigation. Peter honest investigation. Peter said, "...be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason concerning the hope that is in you with meekness and fear" (I Pet. 3:15). No person has a monopoly on truth in religion, but the Bible does have such a monopoly. The Personal Service Con-tract Review subcommittee re-viewed ninety-two personal ser-vice contracts during its April 14th meeting. The nie

The niety-two contracts represent \$1.8 million in state

expenditures over the next twelve months.

At the request of three state agencies the committee gave its approval for a decrease in amount of funding for twenty contracts, resulting in a reduction in state spending of \$313,800. Fifteen of the decreased confracts were originally proposed by the Department

The most interesting of the contract decreases was \$193,20O reduced from the budget for state government offices in Japanand Belgium. Unfortunately, all of the high-salaried staff-assigned-to-these-foreign-offices will be maintained and headquartered in New York City. headquartered in New York City.

In other action the commit-tee rejected a contract seeking a sixteen percent pay increes for the executive vice president of the Kentucky State Fair Board. This proposal would have raised the shlary from \$47,500 to \$58,500 per year.




