County, candidates have spent inywhere from no money at all o \$2,58:50 as of April 24, according to the campaign fl-nancial records on file in the county clerk's office. April 24th was the date that candidates seeking county wide office must file the first of three financial reports showing exactly how much they have spent thus far in the primary election. spent

election. The money has been spent in a variety of ways such as newspaper and radio advertis-ing, printing, campaign work-

ing, printing, campaign work-ers, gas, etc. One candidate's financial report, Graydon Cummins, Democratic candidate for Judge Executive, was not on file in the clerk's office as of April 24th. This is an apparent violation of Kentucky Law KRS 121:180 through 121:200 which says the discretion must be that financial reports must be filed 32 days prior to the elec-

The water and sever bill increase was the main item of business at the regular monthly meeting Monday night of the Mt. Vernon City Council Jack Crawford, Jr. and Crawford Engineering told the Gubert Moore of Crawford and Crawford Engineering told the final figures on the water and sever increase by the June meeting. The main reason for the increase in the bills is the fact that maintenance and ope-rating costs have risen so drasti-cally in the past several years causing the water department to have trouble operating at the present rate. Another big reason the city water department is having dif-ficulty making ends meet is that they are selling more than half their water to the City of Brod-head. Northern Rockastle Wa-ter District and Western Rock-castle Water District and receiv-ing only 22.05 percent of their income from these district\*

The County of Rockcastle has been operating without a garbage contract since March 13th of this year, according to records on file in the County Clerk's offrice. Magistrate Frank DeBorde

Magistrate Frank DeBorde brought the matter to the åtten-tion of the fiscal court last Tuesday and was told by Coun-ty Judge Executive Hubert Thacker that the garbage con-tract was in force until Revenue Sharing Funds ran out. However, this does not ap-pent to be the case since a check of the contract say in paragraph 2 that, "The period of this contract shall be for three (3)

years from the date hereof, with option to renew for an addition-al two (2) year period, by agree-ment of both parties in writing ment of both parties in writing at least two (2) months prior to the expiration of the original period, provided however, that the County shall have the right to sooner terminate this con-tract without obligation to the Contractor should Federal Rev-enue Sharing funds be discon-tinued." enue

promised to support efforts which would **referent** the Gun Control Act of 1968. The President's commit-ment was voiced by his Depuity Counselor, Rear Admiral Rob-ert M. Garrick USNR (RET), ert M. Garrick USNR (RET), keynote speaker at the National Rifle Association's 110th ann-ual meeting held May 1-5 in Denver, Colorado. "The President's philosophy on the 1968 Gun Confrol Act is exactly the same as yours," Admiral 'Garrick told the as-sembly, "He is a member of the

Admiral Garrick said that the President supported the Mc-Clure-Volkmer Bill, designed to correct certain areas of the gun control act which have allegedly, been used to violate gun own-ers' civil liberties. The McClure-Volkmer Bill, which was introduced in both houses of Congrass on April 29th will also



# May is National High Blood Pressure Month

Blood Pressure and an Controlling high blood pressure means a lifelong com-mittment to treatment that of-ten includes charges in lifestyle. Along with daily medica-tion, you may be asked to lose weight or cut back on salt or smoking. Doing these things will heln your medication work will help your medication work better and shorten the time for

better and shorten the time for you to reach your blood pres-sure goal. However, this is usually easier said than done. Everyone knows it is not easy to change habits, but with the help of a variety of health

professionals you can make these changes. Your physician may refer you to other health professionals interested in helping you. For example, you may be referred to a health educator. a nutritionist or a registered dietitian for counseling on such topics as ways to remember to take your medication, weight reduction, or ways to reduce your salt intake.

Your pharmacist can alen sour pharmacist can also assist you with your blood pressure treatment. One way is to advise you on when and how to take your medicine. Another is to explain any possible side <u>effects</u> or bodily reactions you may experience when taking your particular medication. Your pharmacits can also ad-vise you if other medicines or nonpresoprition, drugs might cause problems when taken in combination with high blood pressure medication. Some pharmacits may even be e cause problems when taken in combination with high blood pressure medication. Some pharmacists may even be e-quipped to measure your blood

dulpped to measure your blood cressure. Other health professionals may also be able to measure your blood pressure, including the doctor or nurse on duty where you work, perhaps your dentist, or others who see your regularly for health care needs, such as optometrists, podiat-rists or doctors and nurses in

such as optometrists, podiat-rists or doctors and nursés in local health department clinics. Some health professionals have specialized in aspects of care traditionally performed by physicians. If you live in a rural area, you may find a phys-ician assistant or nurse practitioner taking your personal and family history, performing, a phsycial examination, ordering basic laboratory tests, or adjusting your medication dosage. Whatever the treatment set







# COMPACTED SOIL CAN HARM TOBACCO PLANTS

Raising a profitable tobac-co crop takes hard work and close attention. But conscien-tious tobacco producers may do more harm than good if they overstill fields or work them

wet. Over-tilling, especially dur-ing Kentucky's wet Over-tilling, espagially dur-big Kentucky's wet season, can compact the soil and result in small, boor quality or dead tobacco plants, according to Dr. Lloyd Murdock, Extension soils specialist at the University of Kentucky Research and Educa-tion Center in Princeton. "Tobacco growers can and often do over-till their fields," Murdock said. "They till at least three times, usually dur-punds the problem of soil com-paction."

ing the wet season, which com-pounds the problem of soil com-paction." How easily and how firmly soil compacts depends on the type of soil and the amount of pressure applied to it. The siti and silt-loam soils which com-prise nearly all of Kentucky's soils have natural resistance to compaction, said Murdock. But when these soils are wet, they will compact easily under push-ing pressure. Plows and disks are the main causes of soil compaction, with the disk the biggest of fiender, Murdock said, since sev-eral hundred on the bottom of the disk blade and are applied to the source sure of the disk blade and are applied

the disk blade and are applied to the soil. The pressure of tractor wheels on soil also can compact it, bût the implement behind the tractor usually tills it out again. Severe soil compaction can, be dvastating to tobacco plants, because it can thwart proper root growth. In firmly-packed soil, a plant's large root may grow down four of five inches to break through, may make a 90 degree turn, Murdock said. "The root will ty to find a crack in the pan." he said, "and if it doesn't find one large enough, will grow sideways for a while, then stop growing." Moist spots in tobacco

Moist spots in tobacco fields, or areas of limited plant growth, are signs the soil is compacted, Murdock said. He compacted, Murdock said. He recommends that producers check for packed soil by trying to push as soil probe or sharp-ened rod through the soil in various spots in the fields. This test will show where the soil is compacted, and, as the probe breaks through, how deep the disk pan is.

compacted, and, as the probe breaks through, how deep the disk pan is. The best way to overcome soil compaction is to prevent it-by not tilling wet fields, said Murdock. But it is not always possible to stay out of wet fields. If growers have to work set soil, he said, they should consider using a field cultivator which uses a lifting rather than pushing action. In fields where soil is com-pacted, tobacco producers can break up the disk pan by run-ning a chisel plow through. Then when the soil is dry, they can finish with the disk and set under good soil conditions. MILKING PRACTICES

One danger of incorrect or careless milking procedures is, that air may enter the milking machine and increase the risk of mastitic infections in dairy cattle, according to Dr. William Crist, extension dairy specialist in the UK College of Agricul-ture

Crist, extension dairy specialist in the UK College of Agricul-ter fair is allowed to enter the milker, small milk droplets smay be propelled at high speed toward the end of the test, Crist sid. These droplets may con-tain mastitic organisms that can enter the udder upon impact with the test. Near the end of the milking process, there is a greater risk of introducing infection, he added, since with reduced milk flow, bacteria are less likely to be flushed out of the test or udder. "For this reason," said Crist, "the vacuum to the claw should be shut off before the test cups are removed, as the least quarter milking out ahead of the others, Crist sug-gested following this general rule of thumb: "If the test ou will hold fast without slipping, it should be left on the test. But if it is apparant that the liner will slip, shut off the vacuum to that teat cup and remove the cup." Slight overmilking, with

Nelson says, makes it increas-ingly important for landowners to be aware of the techniques of wildlife enhancement.and wildlife enhancement-and there are many things a land-owner can do to help wildlife. 





The largest baby born in Kentucky weighed 14 pounds and one ounce. The number of Kentuckians dying from chronic diseases has risen significanity in the past decade, while the number of deaths due to infectious diseas-es has declined. These are just two of thou-

es has declined. These are just two of thou-sands of pieces of health related information and data logged in computers at the state center for health statistics within Ken-tucky's Department for Human Resources.

tucky's Department for Human Resources. The department's health and vital statistics offlice has been designated the state center by Gov. John Y. Brown, Jr. and Human Resources Secretary Grady Stumbo. The designation makes Kentucky one of 25 states with health statistics cen-ters and part of the Federal Cooperative Health Statistics System. System

Cooperative Health Statistics System. A health data office has existed in Human Resources since 1976, according to Charles Kendel, director of the office that has become the state center for health statistics. "Basically, this designation now makes the health data office the focal point for keeping all of Kentuc-ky's health related data," Ken-dell said. "Before, most of our work was related strictly to health planning, while now we work wising health services per-sonnel of treuds in everything from the frequency of disease (cont. to 16)





The average monthly Con-"sumer Price Index rose by 11.2 percent from the first quarter of 1980 through the first quarter of 1981, which is the measuring period for the 1981 benefit in-crease. This increase results in an automatic 11.2 percent cost-of-living increase.

The secretary's statement followed the announcement by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the March CPI increase. Cal-culation of the benefit increase was, according to law, based on the CPI for urban wage samers and clearical workers.

The increase in Social Se The increase in Social Se-cufity benefits will be reflected in the checks to about 36 million beneficiaries. The SSI increase will go to about 4 million recipients.

By state law, the Council on By state law, the Council on Higher Education sets suition fees for the state universities. The new tuition rates were designed to bring UK's fees closer to its benchmark institu-tions, those schools outside the state similar to UK in size and scope. Tuition and fees for under-

graduate students from outside the state were raised from \$1,016 per semester this year to \$1,159 per semester, effective next fall.

next fail. Semester fees for graduate students will be \$408 compared to \$376 for the current school year. Nonresident graduate stu-dents will pay \$1,206. Nonresi-dents this year paid \$1,068. Increased tuition rates were also confirmed for law, pharm-acy, medical and dental stu-dents.

also confirmed for law, pharm-acy, medical and dental stu-dents. Students at the Lexington Technical Institute, one of UK's community colleges, will pay the same per-semester fees as students on the main campus. Tuition and fees charged students at UK's other commun-ity college were not increased and will be the same as the current school year-\$195 per semester for Kentucky resi-dents and \$500 per semester for nonresidents.
