Rockcastle Health Department Aiming for District Organization by July 1

The Rockcastle County Health Department should be part of a district program by July 1, 1981, according to Stev Midkiff, Sanitarian for the de-

Midkiff said that he was Midkiff said that he was told by now administrator of the district, Herman Johnson, that Frankfort was shooting for the July 1st date, apparently because this is the date on which the fiscal year will begin.

Rockcastle's Health De-partment will be part of a district comprised of at least three counties and no more than eight. There are two counties at the present, Clay and Jackson. Midkiff said that it is not definite on the number of counties that will go into the district besides Rockcastle but Midkiff said that he felt like there "I don't think are their right mind can predict that we will get more money by going with the District," Midkiff said, "but if we had refused to go along with the state and not went into the district we would of had 25% of our state funds cut."

Midkiff said that one of the biggest advantages of the district will be that the health department will be getting some more part-time help that they could not have afforded if they had stayed within the county system. He also said that the department might receive more Federal money because the Federal Government gives more money to Districts than to little county systems.

Midkiff said that each
health district will have a supervisor that will watch over the separate counties to make sure the departments are being operated efficiently and effectively and have no problems. "It's better than closing the doors," Midkiff said, "but if we could stay open and operate the way we are now and not have any of our state and federal funds cut I'd rather not be in the



The Career of Ed Hunt...

Kentucky Afield

If you'we been waiting for your favorite stream to get its May stocking of trout, you'll have to wait a while longer, according to Pete Pfieffer, as-sistant Director of fisheries for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

The May stocking has been cancelled, Pfeiffer says, because of weather conditions last summer. The prolonger hot spell; coupled with low water levels in Lake Cumberland, caused a serious loss of trout at the Wolf Creek Hatchery, Kentucky's source of trout.

The intake pipe which

draws water from the lake into the federal hatchery just below the dam is normally deep under the surface, where it can supply the under 60 degree water that trout need. But last summer, when this spring's trout supply was growing, the situation was different, a 'ording to Pfeiffer. "Low v ter and hot weather caused tt. intake pipe to be in a layer of 75 degree water," Pfeiffer says. "As a result, the young trout started dying. The hatchery lost 70,000 trout in a two-day period alone."

Although replacement trout were eventually found, these fish were smaller than the ones that had been lost. These small trout, around five to six inches long, were stocked in April only because the fisheries division didn't realize that they were going to be that small, according to Pfeiffer.

"Trout are stocked on a put-and-take' bassis," he says. "So we would like the fish to be a desirable size-at least around nine inches long-before we stock them. We decided that it would be better to wait a month and stock larger fish than to go ahead, with, the stocking as scheduled.

The cancelled May stocking will be made up later, according to Pfeiffer, by a double stocking later in the year. A total of 30 streams, nine tallwaters and eight lakes are on the monthly. stocking schedule.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service did not cancel its scheduled stocking of streams in the Daniel Boone National Forest, so if you wint some trout fishing during May, one of the II trout streams in the national forest would be your best bet. In the meantime, the intake pipe for the Wolf Creek Hatchery has been temporarily lengthened and plans are underway for a permanent extension





Value of Kentucky **Agricultural Exports Increases**

The value of Rentucky agricultural product exported during the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1980 totaled \$551; million for an increase of 18 percent over the same period at year ealler, according to state and federal reports.

"There is a big foreign demand for Kentucky products and these figures support our belief that those markets are expanding all the time," said Energy and Agriculture Secretary William B. Sturgill.

The export figures were compiled and reported by the Economics and Statistics Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Kentucky & Crop Reporting Service.

Soybean and soybean products accounted for the largest export dollar with \$204.5 million, up 20 percent from the previous fiscal year Second only to North Carolina. Kentucky garnered \$185.1 million from the export of twhich was burley This is an tucky garnered \$185.1 million from the export of tobacco, most of which was burley. This is an increase of 14 perrent over the preceeding year. Feed grains and related products ranked third among Kentucky's agricultural ex-

Kentucky's agricultural ex-ports, accounting for \$137.3 mil-lion in sales, up 29 percent from

last year. The content states is the world's largest producer of white corn, and Kentucky pro-duces approximately 25 percent of the nation's total yield.

"Kentucky wheat exports totaled \$33 million this year for an increase of 68 percent," Stur-gill reported. "We're not going to put Kansas out of business, but \$33 million is an impressive

"The farmers in Kentucky are becoming more and more aware of the export markets," Sturgill added, "and those of us in state government intend to do all that we can to help them make the most of those oppor-tunities."

make the most of those opportunities."

One example of those forts is the trade agreement signed in February between Kentucky and Italy Sturgill said the pact will bring together those responsible for Italy's agricultural needs and, those Kentucky producers who can supply them:

"Gov John Y Brown, Jr has frequently stated his support-for-the-state's-agricultural-community." Sturgill said "We hope there will be more agreements such as the one recently concluded with Italy to guarantee foreign markets for our agricultural products."
